ENSURING RESPONSIBLE SPENDING OF RECOVERY ACT FUNDS

Funding available under the Recovery Act has clear purposes – to stimulate the economy through measures that modernize the Nation’s infrastructure, improve energy efficiency, and expand educational opportunities and access to health care. HUD strongly urges grantees to use CDBG-R funds for hard development costs associated with infrastructure activities that provide basic services to residents or activities that promote energy efficiency and conservation through rehabilitation or retrofitting of existing buildings. While the full range of CDBG activities is available to grantees, the Department strongly suggests that grantees incorporate consideration of the public perception of the intent of the Recovery Act in identifying and selecting projects for CDBG-R funding.

A. SPREADSHEET FOR REPORTING PROPOSED CDBG-R ACTIVITIES

Grantees must provide information concerning CDBG-R assisted activities in an electronic spreadsheet provided by HUD. The information that must be reported in the spreadsheet includes activity name, activity description, CDBG-R dollar amount budgeted, eligibility category, national objective citation, additional Recovery Act funds for the activity received from other programs, and total activity budget. B. CDBG-R INFORMATION BY ACTIVITY (COMPLETE FOR EACH ACTIVITY)

In anticipation of receipt of CDBG-R funds, Monroe County issued a Notice of Fund Availability (NOFA) to all municipalities in the CDBG Consortium on March 20, 2009. The NOFA instructed applicants to submit public works projects that would meet all standard CDBG eligibility criteria, as well as be able to demonstrate job creation/retention and be ready to begin within 120 days of award. On April 10, 2009 the County received 11 project proposals for public works projects from 11 different municipalities and 1 proposal for public services, with total requests of \$654,500. The County is proposing to fund each of the projects submitted, up to a maximum of \$50,000 each. Six projects will be undertaken in low-mod income areas and the remaining projects will serve low-mod clientele.

All of the proposed public works projects provide for job creation/retention of full time construction and labor jobs, some of them being held by municipal employees and some private sector. Applicants were required to state all expected jobs to be created and retained by the proposed activities. It is anticipated that the 11 public facilities improvement projects that are proposed will create/retain a total of 69 full time jobs and the public service project will create 40 new full time jobs.

The proposed public works projects will also contribute to the long-term economic stability of the community by investing in the permanent infrastructure of 11 municipalities. The projects provide for construction and/or replacement of roads, sidewalks and sewers, as well as various improvements to increase the access to public facilities and services for those County residents most in need.

Monroe County received a public service project application from Association for the Blind and Visually Impaired-Goodwill (ABVI) for expansion of the existing Call Center, which provides employment for low-income, blind and visually impaired persons. The Call Center Expansion project will substantially increase the number of jobs by creating 40 new full time, permanent positions. The proposed CDBG-R allocation for ABVI will be used to partially fund the purchase of adaptive equipment to enable persons who are blind or visually impaired to gain independence and self-sufficiency through full time, permanent employment.

All of the proposed projects included in this submission will be able to be contracted and/or begin construction within 120 days of the grant agreement from HUD and will create or retain a total of approximately 109 jobs.

The project list and narrative follows and includes all of the required elements listed below. Also attached is the Spreadsheet for Reporting Proposed CDBG-R Activities and a map indicating the location of each of the 12 proposed projects.

PROJECT NARRATIVES

Brighton Road Repaving **\$ 73,765** **1 Job Created/Retained**

Resurfacing of 13,100 SY of roadway on Dorking Road, Knolltop Drive, Holloway Road and Idle Lane, in the Town of Brighton with 2" of asphalt concrete, using Town forces. This project is located within three Low-Mod Census Tracts and will result in the retention of one full time job within the town workforce. The project also provides long-term economic impacts by improving the existing infrastructure.

Chili Sidewalk Construction **\$69,000** **3 Jobs Created/Retained**

Construction of 680 LF of sidewalks on Old Scottsville-Chili Road in the Town of Chili. This project is located in a Low-Mod Census Tract and will result in the retention of three full time jobs within the town workforce. The project also provides long-term economic impacts by improving the existing infrastructure.

Henrietta Sanitary Sewer Repairs **\$68,000** **6 Jobs Created/Retained**

Repair 75 LF of sanitary sewer and manhole replacement along Crimson Bramble Road in the Town of Henrietta. The project is located in a Low-Mod income area and is expected to create or retain 6 full time jobs through contractors. The project also provides long-term economic impacts by improving the existing infrastructure.

East Rochester Sidewalk Improvements \$83,000 8 Jobs Created/Retained

Installation of new sidewalks and pedestrian walkways from Wilson Avenue and East Chestnut Street into Eyer Park in the Village of East Rochester and new sidewalks on 6 village streets that do not currently have safe pedestrian access. The project involves a total of 2,800 LF of sidewalk construction and is anticipated to create or retain 8 private sector, full time jobs. The project is located within a Low-Mod area and also provides long-term economic impacts by improving the existing infrastructure and increasing accessibility for those most in need.

Scottsville Sanitary Sewer & Sidewalks \$73,361 4 Jobs Created/Retained

Replacement of 1,355 LF of existing sidewalks on Browns and Beckwith Avenues in the Village of Scottsville with 8' wide sidewalks. Replacement and/or relining of 1,850 LF of sanitary sewer on Browns Avenue. The project will retain 4 full-time town workforce jobs. The project is located within a Low-Mod area and also provides long-term economic impacts by improving the existing infrastructure and increasing accessibility for those most in need.

Webster Village Watermain Project \$50,000 2 Jobs Created/Retained

Replacement of 800 LF of water main on Donovan Park Road in the Village of Webster. The project will retain 2 full-time jobs, is located within a Low-Mod area and also provides long-term economic impacts by improving the existing infrastructure.

ABVI-Goodwill Call Center Expansion \$50,000 40 Jobs Created/Retained

Association for the Blind and Visually Impaired-Goodwill Industries is expanding its Call Center operations by rehabilitating an existing building at 526-546 South Clinton Avenue in Rochester. The expansion will allow ABVI to create another 40 full time jobs for low-mod and visually impaired people. The project allocation will fund a portion of the purchase of adaptive equipment for use by the Call Center employees allowing them to become independent through employment. The Call Center takes approximately 60,000 calls per year for 211 Lifeline Crisis, Counseling, Information and Referral and the Growing Up Healthy Hotline.

C. PUBLIC COMMENT

Monroe County published a Public Notice in The Shopping Bag Advertiser and The Daily Record on April 22, 2009 to solicit public comments on its Substantial Amendment to the 2008 Annual Action Plan submission for CDBG-R. A public hearing was conducted on May 13, 2009, at CityPlace, 50 West Main Street – 3rd Floor Auditorium, in Rochester, which was attended by 10 people, including Monroe County Community Development staff.

Patricia A. Stevens, Community Development Manager, conducted the public hearing and informed attendees of the following relative to the CDBG-R funding:

“In addition to our annual program allocations, Monroe County will receive 2009 Recovery Act funding. This allocation is considered by HUD to be a supplemental appropriation. As such, HUD is treating the use of its CDBG-R to be a Substantial Amendment to our current, approved Consolidated Plan and 2008 Annual Action Plan. The Recovery Act is designed to provide a boost to our economy and create jobs, restore economic growth and strengthen America's middle class. As announced on February 25, 2009, Monroe County is to receive a CDBG-R allocation of \$515,914.

The CDBG-R program investments will support infrastructure projects that are ready to go. Funds are to be used primarily for economic development, housing, infrastructure and other public facilities activities that will quickly spur economic investment, increase energy efficiency and create and retain jobs. Priority will be given to projects that can award contracts in 120 days from the date funds are made available. An additional requirement is that all iron, steel and manufactured goods used in infrastructure projects be produced in the United States.

Monroe County issued a Notice of Funding Availability on March 20, 2009, to obtain proposals from Community Development Consortium municipalities to be prepared to allocate the CDBG-R funds within the 120-day deadline. There were eleven public facilities improvement project proposals submitted in response to this NOFA and one public service project. All proposed projects have been evaluated for consistency with the overarching goals of the Recovery Act as well as all applicable CDBG regulations. A complete list of proposed projects for the CDBG-R

funding is available at this hearing and will be included in the Substantial Amendment to the 2008 Action Plan, which will be posted on our website at www.monroecounty.gov. The public comment period for the CDBG-R Substantial Amendment and the proposed projects will be May 13 – June 1, 2009. All comments received will be included in the final submission to HUD on June 5, 2009.”

One written comment was received during the public comment period and it follows:

Commenter #1: Sandra L. Frankel, Supervisor, Town of Brighton – “I wish to express the Town of Brighton’s support for the inclusion of our Brighton Road Repaving Project in an amount of \$50,000 in the Amendment. With these funds, supplemented with Town funds for labor and equipment, we will overlay three roads within income-eligible areas. These projects are ready to begin upon approval. Thank you for recognizing the needs of our community. Please enter this comment into the record.”



CERTIFICATIONS

(1) **Affirmatively furthering fair housing.** The jurisdiction will affirmatively further fair housing, which means that it will conduct an analysis to identify impediments to fair housing choice within the jurisdiction, take appropriate actions to overcome the effects of any impediments identified through that analysis, and maintain records reflecting the analysis and actions in this regard.

(2) **Anti-displacement and relocation plan.** The jurisdiction will comply with the acquisition and relocation requirements of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970, as amended (42 U.S.C. 4601), and implementing regulations at 49 CFR part 24; and it has in effect and is following a residential anti-displacement and relocation assistance plan required under section 104(d) of the housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, in connection with any activity assisted with funding under CDBG-R.

(3) **Drug Free Workplace.** The jurisdiction will or will continue to provide a drug-free workplace by:

1. Publishing a statement notifying employees that the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, or use of a controlled substance is prohibited in the grantee's workplace and specifying the actions that will be taken against employees for violation of such prohibition;
2. Establishing an ongoing drug-free awareness program to inform employees about –
 - (a) The dangers of drug abuse in the workplace;
 - (b) The grantee's policy of maintaining a drug-free workplace;
 - (c) Any available drug counseling, rehabilitation, and employee assistance programs; and
 - (d) The penalties that may be imposed upon employees for drug abuse violations occurring in the workplace;
3. Making it a requirement that each employee to be engaged in the performance of the grant be given a copy of the statement required by paragraph 1;
4. Notifying the employee in the statement required by paragraph 1 that, as a condition of employment under the grant, the employee will -
 - (a) Abide by the terms of the statement; and
 - (b) Notify the employer in writing of his or her conviction for a violation of a criminal drug statute occurring in the workplace no later than five calendar days after such conviction;
5. Notifying the agency in writing, within ten calendar days after receiving notice under subparagraph 4(b) from an employee or otherwise receiving actual notice of such conviction. Employers of convicted employees must provide notice, including position title, to every grant officer or other designee on whose grant activity the convicted employee was working, unless the Federal agency has designated a central point for the receipt of such notices. Notice shall include the identification number(s) of each affected grant;
6. Taking one of the following actions, within 30 calendar days of receiving notice under subparagraph 4(b), with respect to any employee who is so convicted:
 - (a) Taking appropriate personnel action against such an employee, up to and including termination, consistent with the requirements of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended; or

(b) Requiring such employee to participate satisfactorily in a drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation program approved for such purposes by a Federal, State, or local health, law enforcement, or other appropriate agency;

7. Making a good faith effort to continue to maintain a drug-free workplace through implementation of paragraphs 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6.

(4) **Anti-lobbying.** To the best of the jurisdiction's knowledge and belief:

1. No Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of it, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the awarding of any Federal contract, the making of any Federal grant, the making of any Federal loan, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement;

2. If any funds other than Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement, it will complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions; and

3. It will require that the language of paragraph 1 and 2 of this anti-lobbying certification be included in the award documents for all subawards at all tiers (including subcontracts, subgrants, and contracts under grants, loans, and cooperative agreements) and that all subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.

(5) **Authority of Jurisdiction.** The jurisdiction possesses the legal authority to carry out the programs for which it is seeking funding, in accordance with applicable HUD regulations and other program requirements.

(6) **Consistency with Plan.** The housing activities to be undertaken with CDBG-R funds are consistent with its consolidated plan.

(7) **Section 3.** The jurisdiction will comply with section 3 of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968 (12 U.S.C. 1701u), and implementing regulations at 24 CFR part 135.

(8) **Community development plan.** The jurisdiction certifies that the consolidated housing and community development plan identifies housing and community development needs and specifies both short-term and long-term community development objectives that have been developed in accordance with the primary objective of the statute authorizing the CDBG program.

(9) **Following a plan.** The jurisdiction is following a current consolidated plan that has been approved by HUD.

(10) **Use of funds.** The jurisdiction has developed activities so as to give the maximum feasible priority to activities that will benefit low- and moderate-income families or aid in the prevention of slums or blight. Additional activities may be included that are designed to meet other community development needs having particular urgency because existing conditions pose a serious and immediate threat to the health or welfare of the community where other financial resources are not available to meet such needs. It has complied with the following criteria:

1. **Maximum Feasible Priority.** With respect to activities expected to be assisted with CDBG-R funds, it certifies that it has developed its Action Plan so as to give maximum feasible priority to activities which benefit low and moderate income families or aid in the prevention or elimination of slums or blight. The Action Plan may also include activities which the grantee certifies are designed to meet other community development needs having a particular urgency because existing conditions pose a serious and immediate threat to the health or welfare of the community, and other financial resources are not available);

2. **Special Assessments.** The jurisdiction will not attempt to recover any capital costs of public improvements assisted with CDBG-R funds by assessing any amount against properties owned and occupied by persons of low- and moderate-income, including any fee charged or assessment made as a condition of obtaining access to such public improvements. However, if CDBG-R funds are used to pay the proportion of a fee or assessment attributable to the capital costs of public improvements (assisted in part with CDBG-R funds) financed from other revenue sources, an assessment or charge may be made against the property with respect to the public improvements financed by a source other than CDBG-R funds. The jurisdiction will not attempt to recover any capital costs of public improvements assisted with CDBG-R funds, unless CDBG-R funds are used to pay the proportion of fee or assessment attributable to the capital costs of public improvements financed from other revenue sources. In this case, an assessment or charge may be made against the property with respect to the public improvements financed by a source other than CDBG-R funds. In addition, with respect to properties owned and occupied by moderate-income (but not low-income) families, an assessment or charge may be made against the property with respect to the public improvements financed by a source other than CDBG-R funds if the jurisdiction certifies that it lacks CDBG-R or CDBG funds to cover the assessment.

(11) **Excessive Force.** The jurisdiction certifies that it has adopted and is enforcing: (1) a policy prohibiting the use of excessive force by law enforcement agencies within its jurisdiction against any individuals engaged in non-violent civil rights demonstrations; and (2) a policy of enforcing applicable State and local laws against physically barring entrance to or exit from a facility or location that is the subject of such non-violent civil rights demonstrations within its jurisdiction.

(12) **Compliance with anti-discrimination laws.** The CDBG-R grant will be conducted and administered in conformity with title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. 2000d), the Fair Housing Act (42 U.S.C. 3601-3619), and implementing regulations.

(13) **Compliance with lead-based paint procedures.** The activities concerning lead-based paint will comply with the requirements of part 35, subparts A, B, J, K, and R of this title.

(14) **Compliance with laws.** The jurisdiction will comply with applicable laws.

(15) **Compliance with ARRA.** The jurisdiction will comply with Title XII of Division A of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009.


(16) **Project selection.** The jurisdiction will select projects to be funded, by giving priority to projects that can award contracts based on bids within 120 days from the date the funds are made available to the recipient, and that will ensure maximum job creation and economic benefit.


(17) **Timeliness of infrastructure investments.** When the jurisdiction uses CDBG-R funds for infrastructure investments, the grantee will give preference to quick-start and finish activities, including a goal to use at least 50 percent of the funds for activities within 120 days of enactment of the Recovery Act.

(18) **Buy American provision.** The jurisdiction will ensure that all iron, steel and manufactured goods used in construction, alteration, repair, or maintenance of a public building or public work project assisted with CDBG-R funds under the Recovery Act must be produced in the United States unless the Secretary finds that: (1) the requirement is inconsistent with public interest; (2) those goods are not reasonably available or produced in sufficient quantity in the U.S.; (3) or the use of the goods will increase the project cost by more than 25 percent.

(19) **Appropriate use of funds for infrastructure investments.** The Governor, mayor, or other chief executive, as appropriate certifies, that any infrastructure investments have received the full review and vetting required by law and that the chief executive accepts responsibility that the infrastructure investment is an appropriate use of taxpayer dollars. Alternatively, a grantee's chief elected official certifies that infrastructure investments will receive the full review and vetting required by law and that the chief executive accepts responsibility that the infrastructure investment is an appropriate use of taxpayer dollars.

(20) **70% of CDBG-R for LMI.** The aggregate use of CDBG-R funds shall principally benefit persons of low and moderate income in a manner that ensures that at least 70 percent of the grant is expended for activities that benefit such persons over the life of the CDBG-R grant.
