Honorable Legislators:

The City of Rochester and Monroe County are experiencing a growing housing crisis, with rising rates of homelessness and an increasing lack of affordable housing options. In recent years, Rochester has seen a troubling increase in the number of individuals and families experiencing homelessness, with local shelters at capacity and more residents being forced into precarious housing situations. Meanwhile, the availability of affordable housing has not kept pace with demand, leading to housing instability for low-income residents, many of whom are at risk of displacement. Rochester continues to struggle with high rates of poverty, with a significant number of households spending more than a third of their income on housing costs.

New York State has a responsibility to ensure that all residents have access to safe, stable, and affordable housing, particularly as housing costs outstrip wages and social safety nets remain insufficient to meet the needs of vulnerable populations. The Housing Access Voucher Program (HAVP) would provide essential assistance by functioning similarly to the federal Housing Choice Voucher Program (Section 8) but with broader eligibility and greater flexibility. This would include coverage for individuals and families experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness, including those who do not qualify for federal assistance.

HAVP would offer ongoing rental assistance to those with extremely low incomes, ensuring that recipients pay no more than 30% of their income toward rent. This approach would significantly reduce housing instability and prevent homelessness. Furthermore, investing in HAVP would not only improve housing security but also reduce costs associated with emergency shelters, healthcare, and other crisis interventions caused by homelessness.

Vouchers are an important tool to address housing affordability. Monroe County should join local governments across the state that are calling on New York State to fund and implement HAVP as a necessary tool to address the housing crisis.

Families should never have to worry about accessing healthy food within their neighborhoods. Yet, millions of people across the country live in food deserts, communities which lack access to affordable, nutritious food. This issue disproportionately affects low-income neighborhoods and rural areas, where grocery stores are scarce or non-existent.

Food insecurity is one of the most pressing issues facing our communities. In fact, according to the latest *Feeding America Map the Meal Gap* report, Monroe County has one of the highest food insecurity rates in the region, with over 12% of residents, roughly in 8 people, facing hunger.

It provides not only financial assistance to establish new grocery stores but also ensures these stores focus on offering unprocessed, nutrient-rich foods and staple items at affordable prices. 

Honorable Legislators:

The New York for All Act (A.3506 / S.2235) would prohibit and regulate the discovery and disclosure of immigration status by New York State and local government entities.

Immigrants are integral to the fabric of communities across New York State, including here in Monroe County. They are our neighbors, coworkers, caregivers, and small business owners. Immigrants make up nearly a quarter of the state's population and contribute billions in taxes and economic activity every year.

New York has made important strides in protecting the rights and dignity of immigrant residents, including expanding access to driver's licenses, tuition assistance, and legal defense. However, gaps in state and local policies continue to leave immigrant New Yorkers vulnerable to federal immigration enforcement through unnecessary collection and disclosure of immigration status.

Policies which allow state and local agencies to share this information not only place individuals at risk of detention and deportation—they also undermine public safety. When immigrant residents fear interactions with local law enforcement or government officials, they are less likely to report crimes, seek assistance, or access critical services. Research shows communities with policies limiting cooperation with ICE experience *lower* crime rates and *stronger* economic outcomes.

The New York for All Act would establish consistent, statewide standards to prevent entanglement with federal immigration enforcement. Specifically, the bill would:

- Prohibit state and local agencies from inquiring about or disclosing a person's immigration status unless required by law;
- Require transparency and reporting of all communications between state/local entities and federal immigration enforcement;
- Bar ICE from entering non-public areas of government property without a judicial warrant;

Ensure individuals held in local jails are informed of their rights, including the right to decline ICE interviews and the right to legal counsel.

Immigrant New Yorkers deserve to be treated with dignity and equal protection under the lawregardless of which agency or jurisdiction they encounter. Passage of the New York for All Act would make New York a leader in protecting immigrant communities and strengthening trust between government and the people it serves.

We respectfully urge the Legislature to pass—and the Governor to sign—this vital legislation.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that this Honorable Body adopt a resolution supporting the designation of the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway, confirming that Monroe County will not approve any requests for new off-premise outdoor advertising signs along the designated Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway route, and committing to work in partnership with the other municipalities along the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway and local and regional stakeholders in order to support future Byway program development.

The proposed 550-mile Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway ("Byway") begins at the New Jersey border in the Southern Region and travels through twenty-two counties, before concluding at Niagara Falls. Within Monroe County, the Byway route follows Route 31, except for a segment that travels down East and West Main Street in the City of Rochester.

The Byway serves to commemorate Harriet Tubman's historical impact, and will further enrich Monroe County as a destination for heritage tourism. In adopting the proposed resolution, the County would signal its commitment to protecting, preserving, and promoting the unique resources along the route.

The specific legislative action required is to adopt a resolution supporting the designation of the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway, confirming that Monroe County will not approve any requests for new off-premise outdoor advertising signs along the designated Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway route, and committing to work in partnership with the other municipalities along the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway and local and regional stakeholders in order to support future Byway program development.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(27) ("conducting concurrent environmental, engineering, economic, feasibility and other studies and preliminary planning and budgetary processes necessary to the formulation of a proposal for action, provided those activities do not commit the agency to commence, engage in or approve such action") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

The required action is revenue neutral and no net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by this Honorable Body.

WHEREAS, the historic qualities of the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway, as described in the corridor management plan, and the surrounding areas have been appreciated and celebrated for over a century by the residents of New York State, as well as tourists, historians, artists, authors, and other visitors to the region; and it is this unique combination of the journeys of Harriet Tubman and those Freedom Seekers who traveled on the Underground Railroad that create the special sense of place that is vital in telling the New York story of the human desire for freedom and the historic sites they created during their journey to emancipation; and

WHEREAS, the Steering Committee of the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway, composed of representatives of 22 municipalities along the proposed scenic byway route, committed to work cooperatively to protect and promote the historic, scenic, recreational, and economic well-being of the 544-mile Corridor throughout the state and agreed to pursue the nomination of the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway; and

WHEREAS, under the leadership of the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway Steering Committee, each of the 22 counties contributed to the development of this corridor management plan by forming local byway groups, encouraging public participation, and leading individual meetings of the Collaborative; and

WHEREAS, the Advisory Committee of the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway, consisting of relatives of Harriet Tubman, descendants of Freedom Seekers, Harriet Tubman and/or Underground Railroad historians, representatives from state and federal agencies has strengthened the historic integrity, representation, and the principles of the corridor management plan; and

WHEREAS, in the process of developing this corridor management plan, the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway Steering Committee has strengthened the bonds of intermunicipal cooperation, and the involved entities envision further benefit through scenic byway designation including sustained collaborative progress, increased funding opportunities for recommendations identified in the plan, enhanced partnerships with agencies responsible for the stewardship of resources along and adjacent to the byway route, and an improved transportation experience that preserves, interprets, and promotes the corridor's intrinsic qualities and resources; and

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:



Memorializing New York State Governor Kathy Hochul to Immediately Rescind Executive Order 47.3 and Ensure All State Prisoners Awaiting Transfer Are Transferred into the State Prison System

Honorable Legislators:

Over the past several months, New York State Corrections Officers have raised the alarm about unsafe working conditions, chronic understaffing, and excessive mandatory overtime—conditions exacerbated by the implementation of the so-called HALT Act. These officers exercised their right to protest, demanding safer conditions and basic respect for the risks they take every day.

Instead of addressing these legitimate concerns, Governor Kathy Hochul chose retaliation over responsibility. Through Executive Order 47.3, she terminated over 2,000 Corrections Officers and banned them from future employment in the Department of Corrections and Community Supervision (DOCCS), stripped their peace officer certification, and prohibited them from serving in any local government role across the State. This extreme and punitive action targeted the very individuals who risk their lives to uphold public safety, sending a dangerous message: stand up for yourself, and you'll be silenced.

Even more disturbing is the fact that these officers were not only fired but effectively blacklisted from public service. By removing their state-issued peace officer certification, the Governor ensured that these men and women—many of whom have spent their careers serving with honor—are barred from continuing their public safety careers at the local level. This vindictive move goes beyond punishment; it's career destruction, carried out without due process, with the clear intent to ruin livelihoods and silence dissent. No state that values law and order should ever treat its public safety personnel this way. Their peace officer certification must be reinstated immediately so that these trained professionals can continue protecting their communities.

Rather than fix the staffing crisis she created, Governor Hochul's administration is now advancing policies to release prisoners early—further jeopardizing public safety and eroding the public's trust in our criminal justice system.

At the same time, Counties like Monroe are being financially punished. State law requires the transfer of sentenced inmates to state prison within ten days. After that, the State reimburses Counties only \$100 per inmate per day. Yet the actual cost of housing a state inmate in Monroe County Jail exceeds \$219 per day, placing an unfair burden on local taxpayers amounting to thousands in added daily costs and over \$15,000 every single week due to the State's failure to meet its obligations.

This Executive Order has only made a bad situation worse. It has destabilized our correctional system, endangered officers still on the job, and increased pressure on County jails and budgets across New York. Therefore, we urge you to join us in calling upon Governor Kathy Hochul to immediately rescind Executive Order 47.3 in its entirety, reinstate the peace officer certification of all affected personnel, and direct the Department of Corrections and Community Supervision to resume the prompt transfer of all State prisoners into the custody of the State prison system.

Honorable Legislators:

Strong schools and strong farms are at the heart of strong communities. Senate Bill S591A recognizes that local partnerships between schools and farmers benefit not only students and educators, but also the hardworking families who feed New York State. This legislation takes a common-sense, fiscally responsible step by expanding an existing reimbursement program—already in place for school lunches—to include eligible food purchases made for breakfast and snack programs.

First established in 2018, this reimbursement program was designed to encourage schools to purchase fresh, minimally processed foods from local New York farms. However, the program has been unnecessarily limited—only counting lunch toward the 30% local sourcing threshold, and leaving out items served at breakfast or as snacks, such as milk, yogurt, cheese, and fresh fruits. As a result, only 49 of New York's 686 public school districts qualified, and just seven received reimbursement—an unacceptable return on investment for a program with such promise.

Senate Bill S591A would make simple, smart updates to this underutilized program. It proposes a \$10 million appropriation through the State Education Budget and allows schools to count locally sourced breakfast and snack purchases toward the 30% threshold. This isn't about expanding bureaucracy or creating new entitlements—it's about making an existing program work better for the communities it was meant to serve.

According to Hunger Solutions New York, 4,912 schools in the state operate lunch programs, serving over one million students. Additionally, 1,562 schools serve free breakfast to over 500,000 children. By modernizing the local sourcing incentives to reflect these realities, we can ensure that taxpayer dollars support New York farms, not out-of-state distributors.

Many already work directly with area farms to provide fresh, healthy products to students, but they do so while balancing tight budgets. S591A empowers local school leaders to continue these efforts by easing outdated restrictions—not by increasing spending without accountability.

Therefore, I urge you to join me in calling upon the New York State Legislature to pass and Governor Kathy Hochul to sign Senate Bill S591A. This bill protects taxpayer dollars, supports small farms, strengthens school nutrition programs, and gives local school districts the flexibility to make smart, community-focused choices.

The MWRR Capital Projects State Assistance Program is available to counties to provide up to a 50 percent match of eligible costs for capital projects that enhance municipal recycling infrastructure. Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the Oswego County Soil and Water Conservation District in the amount of \$137,200 for the period of April 1, 2024 through December 31, 2026 for the Water Quality Program and authorize an intermunicipal agreement with the Monroe County Soil and Water Conservation District in an amount not to exceed \$87,600 for the period of April 1, 2024 through December 31, 2026 for the completion of water quality projects.

The purpose of this grant is to assist counties that are members of the Finger Lakes-Lake Ontario Watershed Protection Alliance ("FL-LOWPA") in funding programs to improve water quality. Oswego County Soil & Water Conservation District is the sponsor organization for FL-LOWPA, responsible for the administration of this grant. In Monroe County, program components will include planning, education, and implementation of individual projects to improve water quality. The grant will be used to undertake water quality programs including the United States Geological Survey Cooperative Agreement for stream monitoring, public education of invasive species, and stream bank erosion repair projects. The County has received this program specific grant for nearly three decades. This year's funding represents an increase of \$30,000 from last year.

The Monroe County Soil and Water Conservation District will provide stormwater management consulting and project management services to identify and implement water quality improvement projects, such as stream bank erosion and shoreline stabilization, in Monroe County and serve as the program manager for the New York State Watercraft Steward Program to control invasive species in Monroe County.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$137,200 grant from, and to execute a contract, and any amendments thereto, with the Oswego County Soil and Water Conservation District for the Water Quality Program for the period of April 1, 2024 through December 31, 2026.
- 2. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Environmental Services by appropriating the sum of \$137,200 into pure waters fund 9307, funds center 8572020100, Office of Environmental Quality.

- 3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute an intermunicipal agreement, and any amendments thereto, with the Monroe County Soil and Water Conservation District, 145 Paul Road, Building 5, Rochester, New York 14624, for the completion of water quality projects, in an amount not to exceed \$87,600 for the period of April 1, 2024 through December 31, 2026.
- 4. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.
- 5. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(27) ("conducting concurrent environmental, engineering, economic, feasibility and other studies and preliminary planning and budgetary processes necessary to the formulation of a proposal for action, provided those activities do not commit the agency to commence, engage in or approve such action") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

This grant is 100% funded by the Oswego County Soil and Water Conservation District. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

The Monroe County Soil and Water Conservation District is a not-for-profit agency, and the records in the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that it does not owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize contracts with the approved schools, agencies and individuals listed in Attachment A, and additional approved subcontractors as needed, in a total amount not to exceed \$45,000,000 annually for the provision of services for the Preschool Special Education Program (Preschool Program) for the period of July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2028.

The Preschool Program is a federally mandated program through the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. Monroe County is required by New York State to administer the Preschool Program to children, age three to five, who are eligible for special education services. The County fulfills this responsibility by contracting with a variety of eligible, State-approved, Preschool Program providers for evaluations, consultations, education and related services. The Preschool Program providers, who deliver Special Education Classrooms, Evaluations and Special Education Itinerant Services, submit an application and go through an approval process with the New York State Education Department. Based on the most recent school year with completed data (2023-2024), the Preschool Program served 3521 Monroe County children.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute contracts, and any amendments thereto, with the approved schools, agencies and individuals specified in Attachment A, and additional approved subcontractors as needed, for the provision of services for the Preschool Special Education Program, in a total amount not to exceed \$45,000,000 annually, for the period of July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2028.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

of Health for Support of the Monroe County Nurse-Family Partnership Program

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 324 of 2024, to accept additional funding from New York State Department of Health in the amount of \$842,935 for support of the Monroe County Nurse-Family Partnership Program.

The purpose of this grant is to provide support of the County's existing Nurse-Family Partnership ("NFP") program. The NFP program is an evidence-based nurse home visiting program that has been rigorously evaluated and includes expertly trained nurses delivering the services per a standard curriculum. The grant will provide a portion of the funding for the NFP program annually providing home visits to up to 300 high-risk, first time mothers, their infants and families to improve their pregnancy outcomes and their health, well-being and self-sufficiency. Funds will be used for partial salary and benefits of existing positions, administrative costs, training, printing, purchase of supplies to run the program, and vendor contracts. This is the seventh year the County has received this grant.

Funds will also be used to contract with UR Medicine Home Care, Licensed Services, Inc. dba Visiting Nurse Signature Care to provide the nurses who make home visits to all NFP clients, and for administrative support in arranging for travel, accommodations and training for the program.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend Resolution 324 of 2024 to accept an additional \$842,935 from, and to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Department of Health, for support of the Monroe County Nurse-Family Partnership Program, bringing the total program award to \$5,700,775.
- 2. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Public Health by appropriating the sum of \$337,174 into general fund 9300, funds center 5803050000, Nurse-Family Partnership.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications within grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.

4. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Partial funding for this grant is included in the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Public Health, general fund 9300, funds center 5803050000, Nurse-Family Partnership. The appropriated amount will adjust the current funding to that established by the grant.

This grant is 100% funded by the New York State Department of Health. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept additional funding from the New York State Office of Mental Health ("NYSOMH") and the New York State Office of Addiction Services and Supports in the total amount of \$303,361 for the Court Navigator Program, and amend Resolution 427 of 2024 to authorize contracts for the provision of Mental Health, Developmental Disability, and Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services in 2025 and increase the contracts from an amount not to exceed \$51,475,417 to an amount not to exceed \$51,778,778 for the period of January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025. An updated Attachment A is attached reflecting the additional Mental Health, Developmental Disability, and Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services to be provided through contracts with the County and the vendors selected for the provision of those services.

The additional funding will provide for the services of Court-Based Mental Health Navigators pursuant to a previously authorized contract with Coordinated Care Services, Inc. This funding is expected to cover salaries, fringe benefits, administrative expenses, and program oversight.

Additional services and vendors identified in the updated Attachment A include the Incentive Stipend Program, the Youth Peer Mentoring Program, the Skill Building Program, the Homeless Support Service Program, the Senior Screening Program, and the Re-entry Program. Request for Proposals were issued for these services, with Housing Options Made Easy, Inc. D/B/A Recovery Options Made Easy, Compeer Rochester, Inc., Lifespan of Greater Rochester, Inc., House of Mercy, Inc., East House Corporation, YWCA of Rochester and Monroe County, and Delphi Drug & Alcohol Council, Inc. selected as the most qualified vendors to provide these services. These selected vendors and the services to be provided are set forth in greater detail in the updated Attachment A.

Please refer to the attached Purchase of Services Information Forms for disclosure of information required pursuant to Resolution 223 of 2007, as amended by Resolution 11 of 2008.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services in the amount of \$1,420,159 for the 2024 Statewide Interoperable Communications Grant Program for the period of January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2026.

This grant provides funding to facilitate the development, consolidation, and/or improved operation of public safety communications in Monroe County to support and enhance statewide interoperable communications for first responders throughout New York State. Funds will be used to support ongoing replacement of the County's cache of public safety radios and infrastructure. This is the tenth time the County has received this funding. This year's funding is the same amount as last year.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$1,420,159 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services for the 2024 Statewide Interoperable Communications Grant Program for the period January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2026.
- 2. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Public Safety by appropriating the sum of \$1,420,159 into general fund 9300, funds center 2406010000, Public Safety Communications.

- 3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balance during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.
- 4. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

This grant is 100% funded by the New York State Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 129 of 2024 to accept additional funding from the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services in the amount of \$2,345,967 for the Office of the Monroe County Public Defender, the Office of the Monroe County Conflict Defender and the Assigned Counsel Program, for the provision of indigent legal services, for the period of April 1, 2024 through March 31, 2027.

The additional award will be used for the Office of the Public Defender to increase funding for specialized services, rent and relocation, computers and furniture along with the creation of one (1) Senior Project Manager and for existing personnel, contractual and specialized services, CLE trainings, rent, supplies, legal research materials, professional licenses, travel, computer and database expenses in the Monroe County Conflict Defender's Office and the Assigned Counsel Program. This additional funding will also fund the Felony Conflict Plan in the Assigned Counsel Program. Over the three (3) year period, the funding amounts for the Office of the Monroe County Public Defender increased from \$26,089,122 to \$27,654,470; the Office of the Monroe County Conflict Defender increased from \$6,681,672 to \$7,082,572; and the Assigned Counsel Program increased from \$6,328,656 to \$6,708,375. This additional funding will bring the grant total to \$41,445,417.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Amend Resolution 129 of 2024 to accept an additional \$2,345,967 and to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract and any amendments thereto, with the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services, for the Office of the Monroe County Public Defender, the Office of the Monroe County Conflict Defender and the Assigned Counsel Program for the provision of indigent legal services, bringing the total award to \$41,445,417 for the period of April 1, 2024 through March 31, 2027.

- 2. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the Office of the Public Defender by appropriating the sum of \$1,565,347, into general fund 9300, funds center 2601010000, Public Defender Administration.
- 3. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Public Safety by appropriating the sum of \$362,725 into general fund 9300, funds center 2402010000, Conflict Defender.
- 4. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Public Safety by appropriating the sum of \$379,719 into general fund 9300, funds center 2402020000, Assigned Counsel Program.
- 5. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to create one (1) Senior Project Manager, Group 17, in the Public Defender's Office as part of the amended 2nd Statewide Expansion of the Hurrell-Harring Program grant.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services in the amount of \$2,610,417 for the Fourth Upstate Model Family Representation Program for the Office of the Monroe County Public Defender's Family Representation Office for the period of April 1, 2025 through March 31, 2028.

This grant will provide funding for the salary costs equivalent to one (1) Special Assistant Public Defender and two (2) Assistant Public Defender Grade I, three (3) Sr. Caseworkers, one (1) paralegal, and one (1) parent advocate. The funding will also cover costs associated with case management systems, expert services, technology, furniture, training, mileage, and travel. This is the second time the County has received this grant. This year's funding is the same amount as the previous award in 2021.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$2,610,417 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services for the Fourth Upstate Model Family Representation Program for the Office of the Monroe County Public Defender's Family Representation Office for the period of April 1, 2025 through March 31, 2028.
- 2. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the Office of the Public Defender by appropriating the sum of \$2,610,417, into general fund 9300, funds center 2601010000, Public Defender Administration.

- 3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.
- 4. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

We recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize the conveyance of a temporary environmental conservation easement to the Town of Penfield on the property located at 1775 Kennedy Road, Penfield, New York, Tax ID: 111.01-1-27 ("Property") for forty (40) years from the effective date of the easement.

The County originally purchased the 76-acre Property in 2015 to provide a buffer to adjacent lands that were the site of the former Gloria Drive Landfill. Your Honorable Body authorized the purchase of the Property by Resolution 239 of 2015.

Monroe County (Grantor) intends to convey to the Town of Penfield (Grantee) the right to preserve and protect the Property for the duration of the easement. With this easement, the County and the Town seek to retain the Property in its natural condition and to prevent any use of the Property that could impact the conservation value of the Property. The term of this easement shall be forty (40) years from the effective date of the easement.

Honorable Legislators:

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Monroe County Elections Commissioners Jackie Ortiz and Peter D. Elder.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2025 Capital Budget to increase funding by \$2,000,000 for the project entitled "Replacement of Voting Machines" from \$0 to \$2,000,000, and to decrease funding by \$2,000,000 for the project entitled "Voting Equipment," from \$2,000,000 to \$0, and authorize interfund transfers.

The \$2 million reallocation for voting machine replacement is necessary to address critical logistical challenges and comply with updated voter capacity requirements. Initially allocated for electronic pollbooks, these funds are now needed to purchase additional ES&S voting machines, ensuring a seamless transition between early voting and Election Day without transferring machines between locations.

The original allocation was based on a registered voter count of 480,000, but following the Presidential Election, that number has exceeded 500,000, requiring an increase in machines at select polling sites. Furthermore, machine allocation must be calculated at the poll site level, meaning additional voting machines are required at certain locations to meet demand.

Additionally, per NYS BOE Resolution 23-27, a single ExpressVote XL machine cannot serve more than 450 voters, with additional machines at the same site limited to 550 voters each, further necessitating this reallocation.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Amend the 2025 Capital Budget to increase funding for the project entitled "Replacement of Voting Machines" by \$2,000,000, from \$0 to \$2,000,000, for a total project authorization of \$14,000,000.

- 2. Amend the 2025 Capital Budget to decrease funding for the project entitled "Voting Equipment" by \$2,000,000, from \$2,000,000 to \$0, for a total project authorization of \$0.
- 3. Authorize an interfund transfer in the amount of \$2,000,000 from capital fund 2124, Voting Equipment, to capital fund 1996, Replacement of Voting Equipment.

Our Monroe County legal offices have all experienced losing attorney staff to other counties, or being unable to recruit qualified candidates due to our residency requirement. Our neighboring counties generally do not require attorney staff to live within the county in which they serve. This Local Law would allow Monroe County to attract a broader pool of applicants and remain competitive with neighboring counties by permitting attorneys employed by the County to reside in either Monroe County or an adjoining county, while still ensuring that senior leadership positions in each of the County legal offices are required to reside in Monroe County.

- 2. Enact a Local Law entitled "Waiver of Residency Requirement for Attorneys Employed by Monroe County."

LOCAL LAW NO OF 2025
ENACT A LOCAL LAW ENTITLED "WAIVER OF RESIDENCY REQUIREMENT FOR ATTORNEYS EMPLOYED BY MONROE COUNTY"
BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:
Section 1. A new chapter shall be added as Chapter 392 of the Monroe County Code entitled "Waiver of Residency Requirement for Attorneys Employed by Monroe County" and shall read as follows:
§ 1 Definitions. Defined terms used in this local law shall have the same meaning as ascribed to them below:
COUNTY shall mean Monroe County.
ATTORNEY shall mean an individual employed by Monroe County as an Assistant District Attorney, a Deputy County Attorney, an Assistant Public Defender, or an Assistant Conflict Defender, provided however that for purposes of this Chapter it shall not mean anyone in a position in Pay Group 22 or above.
Residency Requirement. Public Officers Law § 3, as amended or changed, is hereby amended and superseded in its application to the County as follows: provisions of Public Officers Law § 3, as amended or changed, requiring a person to be a resident of the political subdivision or municipal corporation of the state for which he or she shall be chosen or in which his or her official functions are required to be exercised, shall not prevent a person from being employed as an Attorney by the County, provided that such person resides in the County or any adjoining county within New York State.
Section 2. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law or the application thereof to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this law, or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such order or judgment shall be rendered.
Section 3. This local law shall take effect in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Home Rule Law and the Monroe County Charter.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services in the amount of \$58,159 for the 2024 Paul Coverdell Forensic Science Improvement Program for the period of February 1, 2025 through January 31, 2026.

This program provides funding for the Monroe County Crime Laboratory to fund accreditation expenses, supplies and travel for training which will improve the quality and timeliness of forensic services. This is the twenty-third year the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents an increase of \$726 from last year.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$58,159 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services for the 2024 Paul Coverdell Forensic Science Improvement Program (Monroe County Crime Lab) for the period of February 1, 2025 through January 31, 2026.
- 2. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the Monroe County Department of Public Safety by appropriating the sum of \$58,159 into general fund 9300, funds center 2408040100, Monroe County Crime Laboratory.

- 3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.
- 4. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law, and when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5 (c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

This grant is 100% funded by the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.


Honorable Legislators:

We are living in unprecedented and uncertain times. Across the country, we are witnessing widespread constitutional, statutory, and human rights violations happening every day. Our nation is entering dangerous territory – and local governments must respond. As home to Rochester, the city of Frederick Douglass and Susan B. Anthony, Monroe County has a long and proud tradition of standing up for the civil liberties and human rights which must be the backbone of a free society.

Memorializing an affirmation of constitutional principles is a statement of values which affirms our commitment to human dignity, fairness, and equal protection under the law for all persons, regardless of race, sex, religion, national origin, immigration status, or political views. Those same values are embodied throughout the United States Constitution. Notably, the Fourteenth Amendment forbids governmental actors from "depriv[ing] any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law" and from "deny[ing] to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws." This action imposes no legal restrictions on the Monroe County Departments, but instead, reflects a moral and policy stance in the face of increasingly aggressive and constitutionally infirm federal immigration enforcement tactics.

Immigrants – including those with legal status and asylum seekers who avail themselves of the legal process established by Congress – are being detained without charges, denied access to legal counsel, and in some cases, deported to third-party countries without due process. Students, workers, and families are being "disappeared" from communities like ours under the guise of federal immigration enforcement. Judges who uphold the Constitution are being openly threatened with impeachment by political leaders at the highest level of government, and federal officials have indicated they may ignore judicial rulings altogether - in stark violation of sacrosanct separation of powers principles fundamental to our constitutional order.

Monroe County must take a stand. Affirming our support for Constitutional Principles explicitly reaffirms our commitment to due process, equal protection under law, access to legal counsel, freedom of speech, and the right to live free from fear of unlawful detention or discrimination.



This is not about shielding criminals. We all agree individuals convicted of serious crimes should face appropriate consequences. This is about protecting families, students, workers, and vulnerable people who are being swept up in a system that no longer resembles justice.

At a time when our federal institutions are failing to uphold basic human, civil, and constitutional rights, Monroe County has an opportunity – and a responsibility – to lead and stand on the side of such dearly-held constitutional principles as freedom of speech, petition and assembly, due process of law, equal protection under law, and the separation of powers.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$3,030,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, NEW YORK, TO FINANCE THE COST OF TRAFFIC SIGNAL AND SYSTEMS REPLACEMENT-GROUP 1, IN AND FOR SAID COUNTY, AT AN ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST OF \$3,030,000 AND SUPERSEDING THE BOND RESOLUTION ADOPTED ON APRIL 11, 2023 (RESOLUTION NO. 116 OF 2023)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE AFFIRMATIVE VOTE OF **NOT LESS THAN TWO-THIRDS OF THE TOTAL VOTING STRENGTH** OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. For the object or purpose of financing the cost of Traffic Signal and Systems Replacement-Group 1 in the City of Rochester and Town of Greece, in and for the County of Monroe, New York (the "County"), there are hereby authorized to be issued \$3,030,000 bonds of the County, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The duly adopted current Capital Budget of the County, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is hereby amended to provide for the appropriation of an additional \$2,750,000 to pay the cost of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes (\$280,000 having been heretofore appropriated from one or more Capital Budgets). The period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes is twenty (20) years, pursuant to subdivision 72(a) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost thereof is \$3,030,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$3,030,000 bonds of said County herein authorized, provided, however, that to the extent any state and/or federal aid and/or grant and/or gift is received for the aforesaid purpose, the County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to accept and shall use such funds to redeem any outstanding indebtedness incurred for such purpose or apply it, dollar for dollar, to reduce the amount of bonds to be issued for such purpose.

Section 3. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a grant agreement with the State of New York to accept financial assistance related to two (2) projects at the Frederick Douglass - Greater Rochester International Airport.

New York State requires a formal resolution by Your Honorable Body to release State Aid monies to Monroe County for these projects. The two (2) projects are associated with the 2024 Aviation Capital Grant Program.

1. Replace one existing Class 4 Aircraft Rescue and Fire Fighting Vehicle (R3-2006 Oshkosh Striker) (State Project PIN 4A08.20)

Federal Share (90%) \$1,070,997 State Share (5%) \$ 59,500 Local Share (5%) \$ 59,500 \$1,189,997

2. Reconstruct the existing Baggage Claim Control System (Design and Construction) (State Project PIN 4A08.21)

Federal Share (90%) \$2,930,917 State Share (5%) \$ 162,829 Local Share (5%) \$ 162,829 \$3,256,575

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a grant agreement, and any amendments thereto, with the State of New York to accept financial assistance for the two (2) projects listed above at the Frederick Douglass - Greater Rochester International Airport.

For all of the projects listed above, this is a Type II action pursuant to 6 NYCRR §617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for these projects, consistent with authorized uses, is included in capital funds 2109 and 2051 respectively, and any capital fund(s) created for the same intended purpose. The local funding for these projects will ultimately be provided by the Monroe County Airport Authority from Airport generated revenues. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

The existing high mast poles and their foundations will be visually inspected and assessed for any weathering and wear. Thickness gauge measurements will be taken at each pole to identify any potential material thinning.

This project will be funded by a Federal Aviation Administration grant of 90%, a New York State Department of Transportation grant of 5%, and a local share of 5%.

The Department of Aviation recommends authorization of a contract with McFarland Johnson, Inc., a designated airport consultant per Resolution 365 of 2023, to provide design services for the Terminal Apron High Mast Lighting Replacement Project.

This project involves the replacement of seven traffic signals at various locations in the City of Rochester and Town of Greece. The signals to be replaced are located on Dewey Avenue at: Denise Road, English Road, Britton Road, Maiden Lane, and Stone Road, and on Ridgeway Avenue at Mount Read Boulevard and at LaGrange Avenue. The project will include replacement of underground conduit, mast arm signal poles, pedestrian signal upgrades, replacement of non-compliant sidewalk ramps, and installation of video vehicle detection. The project was originally scheduled for construction in 2026, however, the current schedule is to start construction in spring of 2025 with completion by fall 2025. The current total project estimate is \$3,030,000.

Major funding will be provided by Federal funds in the amount of approximately 95% of the project cost with overall project administration by Monroe County.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$3,030,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, NEW YORK, TO FINANCE THE COST OF TRAFFIC SIGNAL AND SYSTEMS REPLACEMENT-GROUP 1, IN AND FOR SAID COUNTY, AT AN ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST OF \$3,030,000 AND SUPERSEDING THE BOND RESOLUTION ADOPTED ON APRIL 11, 2023 (RESOLUTION NO. 116 OF 2023)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE AFFIRMATIVE VOTE OF **NOT LESS THAN TWO-THIRDS OF THE TOTAL VOTING STRENGTH** OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. For the object or purpose of financing the cost of Traffic Signal and Systems Replacement-Group 1 in the City of Rochester and Town of Greece, in and for the County of Monroe, New York (the "County"), there are hereby authorized to be issued \$3,030,000 bonds of the County, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The duly adopted current Capital Budget of the County, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is hereby amended to provide for the appropriation of an additional \$2,750,000 to pay the cost of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes (\$280,000 having been heretofore appropriated from one or more Capital Budgets). The period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes is twenty (20) years, pursuant to subdivision 72(a) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost thereof is \$3,030,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$3,030,000 bonds of said County herein authorized, provided, however, that to the extent any state and/or federal aid and/or grant and/or gift is received for the aforesaid purpose, the County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to accept and shall use such funds to redeem any outstanding indebtedness incurred for such purpose or apply it, dollar for dollar, to reduce the amount of bonds to be issued for such purpose.

Section 3. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, the chief fiscal officer of the County under the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may sell such bonds or notes at public or private sale, at a discount or premium, at fixed or variable rates of interest or at no interest whatsoever, or as capital appreciation bonds, and with such amortization of principal as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine is most favorable to the County, and in compliance with any rules of the State Comptroller applicable thereto.

Such bonds or notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may, in the event it is determined to issue variable rate bonds or notes, enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance, sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds or notes, as authorized under Section 54.90 of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer is also authorized to enter into such agreements and take such other action as may be necessary or appropriate and lawful to assure that, to the extent possible, (i) interest on the bonds and notes authorized hereby will not be includable in the gross income, for federal income tax purposes, of the recipients thereof, and (ii) to enable the purchaser thereof to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12. The Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer is hereby further delegated all powers of this County Legislature with respect to agreements for credit enhancement, derived from and pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, for such bonds or notes, including, but not limited to the determination of the provider of such credit enhancement facility or facilities and the terms and contents of any agreement or agreements related thereto.

Section 5. All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds or notes, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds or notes, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds or notes, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds or notes, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds or notes (and if said bonds or notes are to be executed in the name of the County by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the County), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds or notes, or may contract on behalf of the County for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds or notes shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals, in addition to those required by Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes, as authorized by this resolution, may be contested only if:

- such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or
- 3) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This resolution shall supersede Resolution No. 116 of 2023, being a bond resolution dated April 11, 2023, except to the extent that any indebtedness shall have been contracted or encumbrances made thereunder. The purpose of this superseding bond resolution is to effect the following: to increase the maximum estimated cost of the purpose to \$3,030,000, and to provide \$3,030,000 bonds therefor, an increase of \$2,750,000 over the \$280,000 bonds authorized under Resolution No. 116 of 2023.

Section 8. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the objects or purposes described herein.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2025-2030 Capital Improvement Program to expand the scope of and to advance the Turk Hill Road Bridge Over Thomas Creek Tributary project from 2027 to 2025; amend the 2025 Capital Budget to add a project entitled "Turk Hill Road Bridge Over Thomas Creek Tributary" in the amount of \$939,000; authorize financing for the project in the amount of \$939,000; and authorize contracts with Colliers Engineering & Design, Architecture, Landscape Architecture, Surveying, CT P.C. in the amount of \$446,129.33 for engineering services and the New York State Department of Transportation for the Turk Hill Road Bridge Over Thomas Creek Tributary project in the Town of Perinton.

The Turk Hill Road Bridge is County owned and spans the Thomas Creek Tributary in the Town of Perinton. The project involves the rehabilitation or replacement of the bridge along with highway approach and channel improvements. The current schedule is to conduct preliminary engineering and final design during the years 2025-2026 with an anticipated construction start in 2027.

The estimated project cost was re-evaluated to account for the need to reconstruct the bridge one side at a time to maintain traffic on the other half during construction, which increased the estimate significantly. This is necessary due to the lack of an adequate detour route that would avoid sending thousands of vehicles daily through the Village of Fairport. The current total project estimate is \$5,369,000.

Major funding will be provided by Federal funds in the amount of approximately 95% of the project cost with overall project administration by Monroe County.

Monroe County was recently awarded Federal funding for this project through the Bridge NY program. New York State requires that construction of the project begin no later than two (2) years after award and that the project be completed within three (3) years of commencing construction.

Several consultants were considered, with Colliers Engineering & Design, Architecture, Landscape Architecture, Surveying, CT P.C. rated the most qualified for this project.

A cost breakdown of the services is as follows:

Total	\$446,129.33

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 3. Authorize financing for the project entitled "Turk Hill Road Bridge Over Thomas Creek Tributary" in the amount of \$939,000.
- 4. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract with Colliers Engineering & Design, Architecture, Landscape Architecture, Surveying, CT P.C., 280 East Broad Street, Suite 200, Rochester, New York 14604, in the amount of \$446,129.33 for engineering services for the Turk Hill Road Bridge Over Thomas Creek Tributary project in the Town of Perinton, and any amendments necessary to complete the project within the total capital fund(s) appropriation.
- 5. Authorize the County Executive or his designee, to execute a contract, and any amendments thereto, with the New York State Department of Transportation for the Turk Hill Road Bridge Over Thomas Creek Tributary project in the Town of Perinton.
- 6. Incorporate by reference and adopt the attached resolution required by New York State for NY Bridge Funding for the Turk Hill Road Bridge Over Thomas Creek Tributary project.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(2) ("replacement, rehabilitation or reconstruction of a structure or facility, in kind, on the same site") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for this project, consistent with authorized uses, will be included in the capital fund to be created and any other capital fund(s) created for the same intended purpose. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

This project involves the replacement of the bridge carrying Vintage Lane over Round Pond Creek, approximately 300 ft east of the Vintage Lane/ Mill Road/ Long Pond Road intersection, along with highway approach work and stream channel improvements. The current schedule is to conduct preliminary engineering and final design during the years 2025-2026 with an anticipated construction start in 2027.

The estimated cost of the project has increased primarily due to an expanded scope of work that requires reconstruction of the bridge one side at a time to accommodate the significant volume of traffic on Vintage Lane and the bridge's close proximity to Interstate 390. The higher cost of materials, equipment, and labor in recent years has also contributed to the estimated cost increase. The current total project estimate is \$4,346,000.

Partial funding will be provided by Federal funds in the amount of approximately 35% of the project cost with overall project administration by Monroe County.

Monroe County was recently awarded Federal funding for this project through the Bridge NY program. New York State requires that construction of the project begin no later than two (2) years after award and that the project be completed within three (3) years of commencing construction.

Several consultants were considered, with Greenman-Pedersen, Inc. rated the most qualified for this project.

For the object or purpose of financing the cost of the replacement of Vintage Lane Bridge Over Round Pond Creek, in and for the County of Monroe, New York (the "County"), there are hereby authorized to be issued \$829,000 bonds of the County, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The Klem Road Culvert is County-owned and spans Shipbuilder's Creek Tributary in the Town of Webster. The project involves the replacement of the culvert along with highway approach and channel improvements. The current schedule is to conduct preliminary engineering and final design during the years 2025-2026 with an anticipated construction start in 2027. The current total project estimate is \$2,196,000.

Partial funding will be provided by New York State funds in the amount of approximately 68% of the project cost with overall project administration by Monroe County.

Monroe County was recently awarded New York State funding for this project through the Bridge NY program. New York State requires that construction of the project begin no later than two (2) years after award and that the project be completed within three (3) years of commencing construction.

Several consultants were considered, with Fisher Associates, P.E., L.S., L.A., D.P.C. rated the most qualified for this project.

Programs, for the 2024 DNA Capacity Enhancement Program

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the United States Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs in the amount of \$591,603 for the 2024 DNA Capacity Enhancement Program for the period of October 1, 2024 through September 30, 2026.

The purpose of the DNA Capacity Enhancement Program is to increase the capabilities of the Monroe County Crime Laboratory DNA analysis section by providing supplies for casework, mandatory continuing education in human identification science, maintenance of equipment and expenses related to the continued accreditation of the Laboratory. This program allows the Laboratory to continue to provide timely services to the region's law enforcement community and judicial system. This is the nineteenth year that the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents an increase of \$64,862 from the previous grant.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$591,603 grant from, and to execute a contract, and any amendments thereto, with the United States Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, for the 2024 DNA Capacity Enhancement Program for the period of October 1, 2024 through September 30, 2026.
- 2. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Public Safety by appropriating the sum of \$591,603 into general fund 9300, funds center 2408040100, Monroe County Crime Laboratory.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.

4. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law, and when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5 (c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

This grant is 100% funded by the United States Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

This program provides resources to support local law enforcement agencies with expenses related to discovery and pretrial reforms that took effect on January 1, 2020. These reforms require prosecutors to share evidence in their possession soon after arraignment and well in advance of trial. Eligible expenses include administrative support, computer equipment, data connectivity, training and related materials, overtime costs, litigation readiness, pre-trial services, and other discovery related expenses. This is the third year the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents a decrease of \$100,150 from last year.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2025 Capital Budget to increase funding for the projects entitled "Network Infrastructure" by \$1,000,000, from \$8,300,000 to \$9,300,000, and "Office Equipment Refresh and Replacement" by \$2,500,000, from \$11,500,000 to \$14,000,000, and to decrease funding for the project entitled "ERP/Security" by \$3,500,000, from \$8,570,000 to \$5,070,000, and authorize interfund transfers.

The \$1,000,000 increase for the Network Infrastructure project is needed to support the higher cost and accelerated replacement schedule of several network components, including a VxRail server, the addition of new and replacement of old primary firewall routers, and the replacement of aggregate switches.

The \$2,500,000 increase for the Office Equipment Refresh and Replacement project is needed to support the county-wide replacement of employee laptop and desktop hardware. The higher cost of this replacement project is largely driven by the shift toward more remote/hybrid work schedules that are better supported by laptop hardware rather than desktop hardware.

Each of the above increases can be supported and offset by an aggregate \$3,500,000 decrease and transfer from the ERP/Security project. Cash contributions to the ERP/Security project for the past several years have not been fully utilized, and it is foreseen that the transition from SAP to Workday will require reduced annual funding.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend the 2025 Capital Budget to increase funding for the project entitled "Network Infrastructure" by \$1,000,000, from \$8,300,000 to \$9,300,000, for a total project authorization of \$9,300,000.
- 2. Amend the 2025 Capital Budget to increase funding for the project entitled "Office Equipment Refresh and Replacement" by \$2,500,000, from \$11,500,000 to \$14,000,000 for a total project authorization of \$14,000,000.
- 3. Amend the 2025 Capital Budget to decrease funding for the project entitled "ERP/Security" by \$3,500,000, from \$8,570,000 to \$5,070,000, for a total project authorization of \$5,070,000.
- 4. Authorize an interfund transfer in the amount of \$1,000,000 from capital fund 1815, ERP/Security, to capital fund 1816, Network Infrastructure.
- 5. Authorize an interfund transfer in the amount of \$2,500,000 from capital fund 1815, ERP/Security, to capital fund 1817, Office Equipment Refresh and Replacement.

This is a Type II action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

These amendments to the capital budget and interfund transfers will have no impact on the revenues or expenditures in the current Monroe County budget.



This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Sheriff Todd K. Baxter.

We recommend that Your Honorable Body adopt a Home Rule Message in regard to the above bill that will authorize Monroe County to offer an optional twenty year retirement plan to Deputy Gregory M. Prokop of the Monroe County Sheriff's Office Road Patrol.

Deputy Prokop was hired to work in Monroe County as a part-time road patrol deputy on October 7, 1991. In April 1996, Monroe County adopted the 20-year retirement plan provided in §§552 and 553 of Article 14-B of the Retirement and Social Security Law for Road Patrol division of the Sheriff's Office. In February 2000, Deputy Prokop became a fulltime deputy. The New York State Retirement System informed him he had one year from the adoption of the retirement plan in 1996 to become a member of the 20-year plan. Section 2. The 2025 operating budget is hereby amended by appropriating general fund committed fund balance in the amount of \$405,000 into the Department of Human Services, Office of Mental Health, general fund 9001, funds center 5702010000, Mental Health Services.
Section 3. This resolution shall take effect in accordance with Section C2-7 of the Monroe County Charter.

Authorize a Contract with Delphi Drug & Alcohol Council, Inc. for Substance Use

and Addiction Treatment Screening and Referral Services

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a contract with Delphi Drug & Alcohol Council, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$405,000 to provide substance use and addiction treatment screening and referral services in Monroe County for the period of April 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025.

The Open Access Program run by Delphi Drug & Alcohol Council, Inc. ("Delphi Rise") provides substance use and addiction treatment screening and referral services for approximately 2,000 individuals in Monroe County annually, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Due to federal funding cuts to critical public health programs that were announced in late March, Delphi Rise has already been forced to reduce services from 24/7 to 8 a.m. to midnight several days per week, depriving the community of this critical service in the overnight hours, when some vulnerable individuals seek treatment. Without immediate bridge funding, it is expected that Delphi Rise will be forced to close the Open Access Program entirely on or around May 31, 2025. This dynamic situation constitutes a community health emergency worthy of immediate County action.

The County's opioid settlement funds enable the County to provide bridge funding for the remainder of 2025 without relying on the tax levy, while Delphi Rise, together with community advocates and our state and federal delegations seek restoration of Open Access funding from the federal government or additional funding from New York State on a longer-term basis. Pursuant to the Section 5 for the Monroe County Procurement Policy, and as communicated to this honorable body under separate cover, I have waived the Request for Proposal and/or Request for Qualification Requirements for a professional service contract to address this community health emergency and ensure the continuation of these vital services in Monroe County.

Please refer to the attached Purchase of Services Information Form for disclosure of information required pursuant to Resolution 223 of 2007, as amended by Resolution 11 of 2008.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract and any amendments thereto, with Delphi Drug & Alcohol Council, Inc., 72 Hinchey Road, Rochester, New York 14624, to provide substance use and addiction treatment screening and referral services in Monroe County in an amount not to exceed \$405,000 for the period of April 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025.
- 2. Amend the 2025 operating budget by appropriating general fund committed fund balance in the amount of \$405,000 into the Department of Human Services, Office of Mental Health, general fund 9001, funds center 5702010000, Mental Health Services.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for this contract will be available in the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Human Services, Office of Mental Health, general fund 9001, funds center 5702010000, Mental Health Services, once the requested budget amendment is authorized. This contract requires \$405,000 of additional net County support for which the appropriation of committed fund balance is requested.

Delphi Drug & Alcohol Council, Inc. is a not-for profit entity, and the records in the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that they do not owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes.

I recommend that this matter receive favorable action by Your Honorable Body.

The Open Access program operates 24 hours per day, seven days a week to support people struggling with addiction. Clients are welcomed by a Peer Advocate, who has lived experience: knowing firsthand what clients have been through, and is non-judgmental. Peer Advocates will

assist in developing a plan for next steps and answer questions regarding the process of recovery. A qualified evaluator will work with each client and assess that client's treatment/recovery needs. Delphi shares the various types of services and will discuss what best meets the client needs and personal goals. The team will assist with transportation and applying for benefits. They will also connect the client with community resources, from food to housing to mental health treatment.
