RE: Memorializing the United States Congress to Pass the No Anonymity in Immigration **Enforcement Act of 2025**

Honorable Legislators:

The practice of U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agents wearing facial coverings during enforcement operations has emerged as a matter of serious public concern. Communities across the country have repeatedly shared their apprehension regarding the lack of transparency and the limited accountability to which ICE officers are held. The presence of anonymous law enforcement does not foster a sense of safety, instead it erodes public trust and can be perceived as a form of intimidation.

Moreover, allowing ICE agents to operate without clear identification opens the door for individuals to impersonate law enforcement officers with dangerous consequences. When agents wear facial coverings and omit visible identification, it becomes easier for criminals to mimic their appearance and tactics, facilitating crimes such as fraud, intimidation, and abuse against vulnerable communities. This lack of accountability not only undermines the integrity of legitimate enforcement efforts, but also puts the public at greater risk by blurring the lines between lawful authority and criminal impersonation.

H.R. 4004: No Anonymity in Immigration Enforcement Act of 2025 is designed to increase accountability and public trust by ensuring ICE agents are identifiable during immigration enforcement activities. This bill prohibits ICE agents from wearing facial coverings during enforcement operations and requires them to visibly display their names and agency affiliation on their garments.

Further, H.R. 4004 is carefully crafted to promote public trust while maintaining operational safety. The bill includes narrowly defined exceptions, allowing agents to cover their faces in cases involving an imminent threat to life or serious bodily harm, or when protective gear is necessary for medical or safety reasons. In such instances, supervisory personnel must review and document the use of the exemption within 48 hours of use to ensure it was justified. If found to be inappropriate, disciplinary measures are to be initiated promptly. Additionally, the legislation establishes clear compliance protocols, disciplinary mechanisms, and annual reporting requirements to Congress on enforcement practices and public complaints.

This legislation is critical not only to maintain public trust and safety in our institutions, but to uphold democratic principles of protecting the dignity and rights of individuals encountering immigration enforcement. When law enforcement officers are clearly identifiable, it reinforces the rule of law, deters potential abuse, and allows communities to seek redress when misconduct occurs. Transparency in enforcement practices is essential to fostering trust between communities and government institutions; trust which is vital for public safety, civic cooperation, and the legitimacy of our legal system.

We urge the United States Congress and President Trump to enact H.R. 4004: No Anonymity in Immigration Enforcement Act of 2025, and reaffirm our nation's founding commitment to transparency, accountability, and fairness in law.

RE: Memorializing the United States Congress to Pass the Disabled Veterans Housing Support Act

Honorable Legislators:

Many disabled veterans face persistent and unnecessary obstacles in accessing affordable housing. One of the key challenges faced by disabled veterans stems from how federal income eligibility guidelines are currently structured. Under the existing law, service-connected disability compensation is often counted as discretionary income when determining eligibility for housing assistance. This accounting practice can unfairly disqualify disabled veterans from vital housing programs, despite their actual financial need.

H.R.224/S.1714: Disabled Veterans Housing Support Act, seeks to correct this inequity by amending the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. Specifically, this amendment would require state, local, and tribal governments administering federal housing funds to exclude service-connected disability compensation from income calculations when determining whether a veteran qualifies as a person of low or moderate income. Additionally, the bill would require the Comptroller General to assess how disability compensation is treated across all United States Department of Housing and Urban Development programs and to recommend changes to improve housing access for veterans.

Removing systemic barriers to housing support for disabled veterans is common sense. This change reflects a simple truth: disability compensation is not discretionary income; it is a recognition of injury or illness sustained in service to our nation. Counting this compensation against veterans in need-based housing determinations imposes a systemic penalty on those who have already borne significant physical and emotional costs for their country.

We urge the United States Congress and President Trump to enact H.R.224/ S.1714: Disabled Veterans Housing Support Act without delay. Ensuring service-connected disability compensation is no longer counted against veterans is a matter of justice. It's time to fix this inequity and reaffirm our nation's commitment to those who have sacrificed in defense of our freedom.

Memorializing the New York State Legislature to Pass and Governor Kathy Hochul to Sign Bills A1452/S5651, Prohibits the Acquisition of Real Property by Foreign Countries and Entities of Particular Concern

Honorable Legislators:

Throughout the United States, real property and agricultural land is increasingly owned by foreign countries and entities, giving cause for concern from American farmers, homeowners, and lawmakers. Over the past several years, more than half of the States in the Union have passed laws restricting foreign ownership of real property. Namely, twenty-eight States prohibit foreign individuals, corporations, businesses, governments, and government subsidiaries from purchasing or investing in agricultural land in their respective State.

While Federal law cannot dictate what the States do regarding property ownership, foreign countries and entities deemed a national security threat present real risks to our country and our state. To address this gap, Republican Legislators in New York have introduced Assembly Bill A1452 and Senate Bill S5651, which would prohibit the acquisition of real property by foreign countries and entities of particular concern. This legislation is narrowly tailored—only applying to individuals, businesses, and governments identified on official U.S. Department of State or other federal security designation lists, including China, Russia, Iran, Pakistan, and North Korea, as well as terrorist organizations such as ISIS, the Houthis, and the Taliban. By restricting land ownership from countries and entities of concern, we can effectively mitigate potential risks to our food supply, infrastructure, and national security, while preserving investment opportunities from our allies and trusted international partners.

Furthermore, unchecked foreign investment into the American real estate market has the potential to harm American citizens even absent a direct national security threat. In agricultural markets, foreign-owned land in the United States increased from 26.1 million acres in 2012 to nearly 45 million acres in 2023—an increase of more than 70 percent over just eleven years. Between 2022 and 2023 alone, foreign ownership of U.S. agricultural land grew by 1.58 million acres. With excessive foreign ownership, everyday Americans and farmers face restricted access to land, undermining opportunities for growth and threatening their ability to achieve the American Dream.

In residential markets, foreign buyers purchased approximately 78,100 U.S. homes between April 2024 and March 2025, totaling \$56 billion in sales—a 33 percent increase over the prior year. Chinese buyers alone accounted for \$13.7 billion of that spending, an 83 percent increase, often

paying in cash and well above median market prices. In competitive states like New York, this level of foreign investment can dramatically reduce the number of available homes, leave properties vacant or converted into rentals, and allow foreign buyers—armed with greater access to capital—to routinely outbid American citizens. The ripple effect is higher property values, increased property taxes, and the displacement of long-time residents from the communities they have called home for generations.

Please join us in calling upon the New York State Legislature to pass and Governor Kathy Hochul to sign bills A1452/S5651 to prohibit individuals, entities, and countries of concern from purchasing and investing in real property in the State of New York. Our residents deserve a government that puts Americans first, protects our farmland and neighborhoods, and ensures that New Yorkers and Monroe County residents can remain in their hometowns without being priced out by foreign nationals designated as threats to our nation.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize an intermunicipal agreement among Monroe County and the Towns of Irondequoit, Penfield and Webster to renew the Irondequoit Bay Coordinating Committee for the period of October 1, 2025 through September 30, 2030, with the option to renew for one (1) additional five-year term.

The purpose of this agreement is to ensure a coordinated and consistent effort by the Irondequoit Bay Coordinating Committee ("IBCC") and the Irondequoit Bay Technical Staff ("IBTS") in advising on the environmental effects of development around Irondequoit Bay. The IBTS convenes regularly to address ongoing Bay-related issues, such as the review of development applications, updates on water quality monitoring, and the coordination of safety measures. Recent initiatives have included the installation of speed limit signage, "Rules of Irondequoit Bay" postings, and partnership with the Monroe County Sheriff's Marine Unit and the U.S. Coast Guard on waterway traffic, accident response, and large gathering protocols. Given that Irondequoit Bay is a designated freshwater wetland under the jurisdiction of the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation ("NYS DEC"), IBTS also works closely with the NYS DEC to address critical environmental concerns, such as invasive aquatic vegetation, water level management, and Bay water quality. Additionally, the IBTS partners with the New York State Department of State to ensure the Harbor Management Plan aligns with and advances each town's Local Waterfront Revitalization Plan.

There have been four (4) previous intermunicipal agreements between Monroe County and the Towns of Irondequoit, Penfield, and Webster in 1985, 1997, 2010, and 2015. During that time, the IBCC and IBTS supervised the development of management measures, a hiking plan, a biological study, a harbor management plan, and harbor management laws.

This intermunicipal agreement memorializes the continued dedication of all involved parties and articulates the goals, roles, and responsibilities of the IBCC and IBTS, as well as non-signatory local and state agencies.

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of District Attorney Sandra Doorley and Sheriff Todd K. Baxter.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services in the amount of \$3,006,416 for the District Attorney's Office, the Office of the Sheriff, and the Department of Public Safety, Office of Probation - Community Corrections for the Gun Involved Violence Elimination ("GIVE") Partnership for the period of July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2026.

This project provides resources enabling the Monroe County law enforcement community to target violent criminals and those possessing weapons in a coordinated effort to reduce violent crime in Monroe County. The primary goals of this partnership are to support targeted firearm and violent crime reduction efforts within Monroe County and to increase the solvability of non-fatal bullet-to-body shooting cases in the City of Rochester by working in tandem with the Rochester Police Department from the onset of each investigation. This is the twelfth year the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents an increase of \$93,958 from last year.

Funds will be used specifically to help support the following programs in the following departments:

- District Attorney's Office: Supports eight (8) existing Assistant District Attorney positions (50%) assigned to prosecute violent felons and criminals possessing illegal weapons, four (4) existing Assistant District Attorney positions (100%), two (2) existing District Attorney Investigator positions (100%), and one (1) existing Victim Witness Advocate (100%) to comprehensively investigate and prosecute non-fatal bullet-to-body shootings; and, provides the Boys and Girls Clubs of Rochester, Inc. with an \$8,000 sub grant to continue its Street SMART Program.
- Sheriff's Office: Supports an existing Sheriff's Criminal Investigator (50%), a Road Patrol Deputy and a Jail Deputy (100%), and underwrites part of the overtime costs of the Office of the Sheriff's participation in joint anti-crime efforts and community engagement details with the other GIVE agency partners.

Office of Probation - Community Corrections: Supports the cost of an existing Assistant Chief Probation Officer (75%), an existing Probation Supervisor (100%), two (2) existing Senior Probation Officers (100%), and two (2) existing Probation Officers (100%). Additionally, it supports Cognitive Behavioral Interventions designed for high-risk offenders, enhanced electronic monitoring capability, and underwrites the overtime costs of the Office of Probation - Community Correction's participation in joint anti-crime efforts with the other GIVE agency partners.

The funding amounts are as follows: \$1,507,645 for the District Attorney's Office, \$518,679 for the Office of the Sheriff, and \$980,092 for the Department of Public Safety, Office of Probation - Community Corrections.

ENACT A LOCAL LAW AMENDING CHAPTER 286 OF THE GENERAL LOCAL LAWS OF MONROE COUNTY ENTITLED "JUNIOR DEER HUNTING PILOT PROGRAM"

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. Chapter 286 of the General Local Laws of Monroe County is hereby amended as follows:

- Legislative intent. The intent of this Local Law is to authorize Monroe County to permit 12- and 13-year-old individuals to participate in the new hunting opportunities pursuant to Environmental Conservation Law § 11-0935. The enacted 2021-2022 New York State Budget included a pilot program expanding the opportunity for young hunters, aged 12 and/or 13, to hunt with firearms and crossbow through 2023 if a County authorizes such participation in the pilot program within their municipality via local law and this provision was later extended through 2025. Monroe County's hunters are a large and important part of our community and this opportunity would allow adult hunters the ability to introduce and teach the proper values and ethics of hunting to the next generation. In addition, teaching such safe, proper and lawful hunting methods to young people will provide a rewarding and productive experience while providing food to families across the area and contributing to deer population control efforts.
- § 286-3 Authorizing pilot program in Monroe County. Pursuant to Section 11- 0935 of the New York State Environmental Conservation Law, Monroe County hereby authorizes participation in the temporary pilot program to allow a hunting license holder who is twelve or thirteen years of age to hunt deer with a crossbow, rifle, shotgun, or muzzle-loading firearm through 2025the periods of time prescribed by the State, including any extensions of time hereinafter enacted by New York State.
- Section 2. The Clerk of the Legislature shall notify the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation upon final adoption of this local law in accordance with Section 11-0935 of the New York State Environmental Conservation Law.
- Section 3. This local law shall take effect after filing with the Secretary of State pursuant to Section 27 of New York Municipal Home Rule Law.

Enacting a Local Law Amending Chapter 286 of the General Local Laws of the Administrative Code of Monroe County Entitled "Junior Deer Hunting

Pilot Program"

Honorable Legislators:

In 2021, this Honorable Body enacted a local law pursuant to Environmental Conservation Law 11-0935 that created a Junior Deer Hunter Pilot Program. Prior to the adoption of the 2021-22 New York State Budget, the minimum age for a junior hunter to hunt deer with a firearm or crossbow with adult supervision was fourteen (14). Section 11-0935 of the Environmental Conservation Law allows counties to create pilot programs for twelve- and thirteen-year-olds and has now been extended through December 31, 2030. This local law would make it so Monroe County would not have to continuously pass legislation each time New York State extends the program. The Junior Deer Hunter Pilot Program offers an opportunity for young outdoor enthusiasts to engage in one of New York State's most popular recreational activities. With hunting being a significant part of the state's cultural and ecological landscape, extending this program would ensure that young hunters receive the proper guidance and education from experienced adults. This would not only enhance their skills but also instill a deep respect for wildlife conservation and safety, developing a new generation of responsible hunters.

By indefinitely extending the Junior Deer Hunter Pilot Program, we can continue to provide young hunters with invaluable hands-on experience that cannot be replicated in a classroom setting. The mentorship from seasoned hunters helps young participants learn essential skills such as tracking, patience, and ethical hunting practices. These skills are not only crucial for hunting but also teach valuable life lessons about responsibility, respect for nature, and the importance of conservation efforts.

Safety is a paramount concern, and the structured environment of the Junior Deer Hunter Pilot Program ensures that all participants are taught the necessary safety protocols and ethical standards. The program includes comprehensive safety measures and supervised hunting experiences, reducing the risk of accidents and promoting a culture of safety among young hunters. Extending the program will allow more young people to learn these critical safety practices in a controlled and supportive environment.

Finally, extending the Junior Deer Hunter Pilot Program aligns with broader conservation and wildlife management goals. By fostering an appreciation for hunting and wildlife management

at a young age, the program helps ensure the long-term sustainability of New York's diverse ecosystems. Participants learn about the balance between wildlife populations and their habitats and how responsible hunting practices contribute to this balance. This educational component is crucial for developing informed and conscientious hunters who will continue to support and advocate for conservation efforts throughout their lives.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1) Schedule and hold a public hearing on the proposed Local Law.
- 2) Adopt the Local Law as attached.

This is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environment Quality Review Act. This action will have no impact on the revenues or expenditures of the current Monroe County budget.

We ask that this referral be deemed a Matter of Urgency so that a public hearing may be held at the September 9 meeting of the Legislature for final passage by your Honorable Body before deer hunting season begins on September 27.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept three (3) grants from the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority ("NYSERDA") in the amounts of \$10,000 for the 1 Star Designation Clean Energy Communities Grant; \$125,000 for the period from June 1, 2025 through December 1, 2028 for the 2 Star Designation Clean Energy Communities Grant; and \$150,000 for the period from June 1, 2025 through December 1, 2028 for the 3 Star Designation Clean Energy Communities Grant to support the purchase of electric vehicles and equipment.

Monroe County was awarded three (3) grants for increasing electric vehicle and equipment purchases as part of an initiative by NYSERDA to provide resources for projects aimed at addressing climate change and its effects. This project complements the goals established in the Monroe County Climate Action Plan, Phase I (Resolution 276 of 2022) and adopted as part of the Climate Smart Communities pledge (Resolution 260 of 2020). Completion of these projects will further Monroe County's goal of achieving Silver Certification, the highest level in the program.

The Monroe County Department of Environmental Services will lead the project funded by this grant and administer the grant requirements, and coordinate with Weights and Measures and the Parks Department to facilitate deployment of these new electric vehicles.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize agreements to permit the following commercial use of County park facilities for which an admission price will be charged.

- Silvano D. Orsi/Marsica Holdings, LLC for the Little Italy Festival of Rochester, NY to be held at Ontario Beach Park, a festival featuring Italian food from local vendors, music performed by local musical acts, cultural exhibits, a blessing ceremony honoring Saint Anthony of Padua, cultural dancing, and an appreciation award ceremony, scheduled for Saturday, August 30.
- BX Media Group for a Concert in the Highland Bowl, an adult concert featuring the musical styles of neo soul and old school funk, scheduled for Friday, September 26.

As part of this licensing process, each group would be required to pay the normal daily rental fee established in the 2025 Monroe County Budget for any park lodge or shelter used, as well as a standard Special Use Event Permit fee based on the anticipated attendance at their event (\$350 for over 1,000 people, \$150 for 251-1,000 people, and \$50 up to 250 people.) Events would be required to submit proof of insurance as required for parks special events and proof of appropriate licensing or permitting for other activities subject to such restrictions (e.g., liquor permits).

The specific legislative action required is to authorize agreements to permit commercial use of County park facilities with Silvano D. Orsi/Marsica Holdings, LLC and BX Media Group.

Honorable Legislators:

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Sheriff Todd K. Baxter.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize an intermunicipal agreement with Churchville-Chili Central School District ("District") in an amount not to exceed \$132,415 for reimbursement to the Monroe County Sheriff's Office School Resource Program for the period of September 1, 2025 through June 30, 2026, with the option to renew for two (2) additional one-year terms at amounts to be agreed to by the parties, but in no case less than \$132,415 per year.

The District will be provided a full-time Monroe County Sheriff's School Resource Officer ("SRO") during the 180-day school year, plus an additional 8 administrative days and overtime deemed necessary by the request and approval of the District and Sheriff's Office. The SRO's primary duty is to promote an atmosphere where students, teachers, and staff feel safe. The SRO may assist in the investigation of suspected criminal activity occurring on District property and/or related to the District. This assistance shall be provided in consultation with school administrators, in accordance with New York State Law and District policy. As an educator, working with classroom teachers and other District personnel, the SRO may present information and answer questions on a variety of topics, such as the law, drugs, safety, crime prevention, and violence prevention, concepts of safety, traffic laws, general law, and crime prevention techniques. The goal of the presentations is to increase student, staff, and community awareness and understanding of laws and personal safety. I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services in the amount of \$3,117,673 pursuant to Raise the Age legislation for the period of April 1, 2024 through March 31, 2025.

Raise the Age legislation was enacted with a number of objectives. It aims to reduce crime victimization; provide meaningful opportunity for a life without the stigma of a criminal record for adolescents who turn away from crime; eliminate the disproportionate incarceration of 16- and 17-year-olds of color in adult jails and prisons; reserve the juvenile placement system for only those young people who present a risk to public safety; and create therapeutic out-of-home placement settings for young people who do not present a risk to public safety.

In order to achieve these objectives, the Monroe County Office of Probation – Community Corrections has developed a Comprehensive Plan that utilizes a combination of increased staff resources, specialized training, and expanded community programs and services.

Implementation of the Comprehensive Plan will reduce the reliance on out-of-home placement, reduce the reliance on detention, reduce the need for family court adjudication, increase the adjustment rate of diversion cases, reduce the rate of probation violations, reduce the rate of long-term recidivism, and arrange for community-based services to improve outcomes for youth.

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Sheriff Todd K. Baxter.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a change of classification in the Sheriff's Table of Organization of one (1) full time Officer Wellness Clinician position to two (2) part time Officer Wellness Clinician (group 16) positions.

Sheriff Baxter desires to enhance the MCSO's mental health wellness program to support deputies by providing services to build their resilience as they respond to stressful events daily in their workplace. Such stressors negatively affect a deputy's ability to cope and respond on the job and at home. The wellness program will be led by an Officer Wellness Clinician professionally trained in counseling and mental health support.

Effective police reform will involve various initiatives, one of which is addressing the mental health and wellness of MCSO deputies. Sworn and civilian staff that participate in wellness programs shows commitment to their work, families, and the community. A formalized wellness program will demonstrates to MCSO staff that their mental health and wellness are leadership priorities and essential resources within the department.

As the workforce has been canvassed for wellness positions in hours not typically associated with clinicians (early evenings and/or late evenings), the Sheriff's Office has found candidates are more conducive to non-traditional hours if working in a part-time capacity. Therefore the Sheriff can accommodate those non-traditional hours by utilizing part time Officer Wellness Clinicians.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to authorize a change of classification in the Sheriff's Table of Organization from one (1) full time Officer Wellness Clinician position to two (2) part time Officer Wellness Clinician (group 16) positions.

Honorable Legislators:

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Sheriff Todd K. Baxter.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize an intermunicipal agreement with the Town of Greece for police tactical team cooperation with the Monroe County Sheriff's Office to formalize a relationship between the Greece Police Department and Monroe County Sheriff's Office SWAT units for the period of August 13, 2025 through August 12, 2028, with the option to renew for three (3) additional one-year terms.

This agreement will provide for more efficient utilization of law enforcement resources and services, making tactical team resources available to each participating entity from the other participating entity in the event of an emergency, and eliminate the need to follow the formal procedure set forth in General Municipal Law §209-m to request assistance from the other party in the form of personnel or equipment.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to enter into an intermunicipal agreement, and any amendments thereto, with the Town of Greece for police tactical team cooperation with the Monroe County Sheriff's Office for the period of August 13, 2025 through August 12, 2028, with the option to renew for three (3) additional one-year terms.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not included new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

This intermunicipal agreement will have no impact on the revenues or expenditures in the current Monroe County budget.

Subject: Authorize the Creation of a Radiological and Chemical Officer in the Department of Public Safety

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize the creation of one (1) Radiological and Chemical Officer, Group 17, in the Department of Public Safety.

Monroe County has radiological response responsibilities necessary to serve and protect our community due to our proximity to the Ginna Nuclear Power Plant. As a condition of radiological funding, Monroe County is obligated to employ or contract with a radiological officer. This is a critical position given the State and Federal mandates imposed on the County to maintain the required equipment, supplies, plans, and procedures to implement radiological emergency preparedness programs.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the creation of one (1) Radiological and Chemical Officer, Group 17, in the Department of Public Safety.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for this position is included in the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Public Safety, general fund 9300, funds center 2408030200, Radiological / Shelter. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Rochester School Bus Safety Program

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize an intermunicipal agreement with the City of Rochester to support the City's school bus safety program.

Pursuant to Local Law No. 3 of 2022, Your Honorable Body enacted the Monroe County School Bus Stop Arm Demonstration Program, which imposed monetary liability on the owners of vehicles for failing to stop at school buses displaying red visual signs and stop arms. Thereafter, the County Legislature adopted Resolution 364 of 2022, which authorized the County Executive to enter into a contract with BusPatrol America, LLC to provide and implement a comprehensive school bus stop program ("Monroe County School Bus Safety Program").

Since 2023, the County has implemented the Monroe County School Bus Safety Program, with four school districts participating and a fifth expected to join this fall. On October 22, 2024, the City of Rochester passed an ordinance to establish its own school bus safety program and later executed an agreement with BusPatrol America, LLC to implement its program. During the past year, Monroe County Public Safety staff have engaged with the City of Rochester's Public Safety team to discuss how the County and City might work together to advance student safety.

Monroe County currently employs two full-time enforcement technicians to review video evidence regarding potential violations and to certify or deny whether violations have occurred under its School Bus Safety Program. Given the County's experience with the program and to avoid the hiring of additional personnel, the City has requested that the County permit its Public Safety technicians to review the video evidence for the City's school bus safety program. BusPatrol, LLC has committed to reimburse the County fully for the additional time that the County's enforcement technicians will devote to reviewing the City's video evidence.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute an intermunicipal agreement, and any amendments thereto, with the City of Rochester to support the review and certification of video evidence for the City's school bus safety program.

Subject: Approval of Monroe Community College's 2025-2026 Operating Budget

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body approve the operating budget of Monroe Community College for the fiscal year September 1, 2025 through August 31, 2026 as submitted by the College.

The proposed 2025-2026 Monroe Community College ("the College") budget has been reviewed by me, as well as the staff of the County's Office of Management and Budget. I concur with the request of the College.

The following resolution was adopted by the Monroe Community College Board of Trustees at their meeting on June 9, 2025:

RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Monroe Community College approves the Operating Budget for the fiscal year September 1, 2025 through August 31, 2026 in the amount of \$120,600,000.

Approval of this budget will provide funding for 8,000 state-aidable full-time equivalent students during the College fiscal year. Adoption by Your Honorable Body is required before the State University of New York can approve its share of the College budget.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Schedule and hold a public hearing.
- 2. Approve the total Monroe Community College operating budget in the amount of \$120,600,000 and a sponsor contribution by the County of Monroe in the amount of \$21,550,000.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(27) ("conducting concurrent environmental, engineering, economic, feasibility and other studies and preliminary planning and budgetary processes necessary to the formulation of a proposal for action, provided those activities do not commit the agency to commence, engage in or approve such action") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

The approval of this budget will require an appropriation of \$21,550,000 in the County of Monroe budget year 2026 as the County sponsor contribution.

Overview - Highlights

The full-time student tuition rate will increase by \$150 to \$5,200/year. The base state aid rate remains flat at \$2,997 per fulltime equivalent (FTE) student. The net cost per FTE student reflects a year-on-year decrease of \$780 or 5.3% The college's 2025-2026 gross budget reflects a 3.0% increase from the 2024-2025 budget. driven primarily by the increase in budgeted enrollment offset by the increase in the net budget.

ENROLLMENT – 8,000 (state-aidable) FTEs

Unduplicated headcount for state-aidable students, in total, will approximate 20,534 in 2025-2026 Increase of 600 FTEs or 8.1% greater than the state-aidable enrollment in the 2024-2025 budget of 7,400.

PERSONAL SERVICES EXPENDITURES will increase \$1.4M or 2.2%. This includes contractual commitments under employee labor contracts, and student-centered staffing realigned with enrollment expectations.

EMPLOYEE BENEFITS will increase by \$2.0M due primarily to increases in health care and pension benefit costs. EQUIPMENT EXPENDITURES will increase by approximately \$350K. Expenditures for equipment represent less than 1.0% of the college's operating budget. CONTRACTUAL EXPENDITURES will decrease by approximately \$220K or 1.1% as costs are aligned with budgeted 2025-2026 revenues.







For the 2025-2026 year, base state aid is the higher of \$2,997 per FTE or 100% of the 2024-25 SUNY approved base aid. Under the enacted funding floor, state aid amounts to \$29,921,110 or 26.6% of the net revenue budget.	
The net operating budget of \$112,317,000 equals the gross operating budget minus offsetting operating revenues and budgeted appropriations not allowable for state aid, such as Other Sponsored Programs. This is the basis for the tri-party funding partnership: the state, local sponsor, and student revenue.	













Gross Budgeted Expenditures per FTE Student



- For the 2025-2026 year, the gross budgeted expenditure per FTE student is \$15,075, down \$749 from the 2024-2025 gross budgeted amount of \$15,824. This is due primarily to the anticipated increase in stateaidable credit enrollment.







Subject: Approval of Monroe Community College's 2025-2026 Operating Budget

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body approve the operating budget of Monroe Community College for the fiscal year September 1, 2025 through August 31, 2026 as submitted by the College.

The proposed 2025-2026 Monroe Community College ("the College") budget has been reviewed by me, as well as the staff of the County's Office of Management and Budget. I concur with the request of the College.

The following resolution was adopted by the Monroe Community College Board of Trustees at their meeting on June 9, 2025:

RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Monroe Community College approves the Operating Budget for the fiscal year September 1, 2025 through August 31, 2026 in the amount of \$120,600,000.

Approval of this budget will provide funding for 8,000 state-aidable full-time equivalent students during the College fiscal year. Adoption by Your Honorable Body is required before the State University of New York can approve its share of the College budget.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Schedule and hold a public hearing.
- 2. Approve the total Monroe Community College operating budget in the amount of \$120,600,000 and a sponsor contribution by the County of Monroe in the amount of \$21,550,000.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(27) ("conducting concurrent environmental, engineering, economic, feasibility and other studies and preliminary planning and budgetary processes necessary to the formulation of a proposal for action, provided those activities do not commit the agency to commence, engage in or approve such action") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

The approval of this budget will require an appropriation of \$21,550,000 in the County of Monroe budget year 2026 as the County sponsor contribution.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.

Overview - Highlights

The full-time student tuition rate will increase by \$150 to \$5,200/year. The base state aid rate remains flat at \$2,997 per fulltime equivalent (FTE) student. The net cost per FTE student reflects a year-on-year decrease of \$780 or 5.3% The college's 2025-2026 gross budget reflects a 3.0% increase from the 2024-2025 budget. driven primarily by the increase in budgeted enrollment offset by the increase in the net budget.

ENROLLMENT – 8,000 (state-aidable) FTEs

Unduplicated headcount for state-aidable students, in total, will approximate 20,534 in 2025-2026 Increase of 600 FTEs or 8.1% greater than the state-aidable enrollment in the 2024-2025 budget of 7,400.

Appropriations - Highlights

PERSONAL SERVICES EXPENDITURES will increase \$1.4M or 2.2%. This includes contractual commitments under employee labor contracts, and student-centered staffing realigned with enrollment expectations.

EMPLOYEE BENEFITS will increase by \$2.0M due primarily to increases in health care and pension benefit costs. EQUIPMENT EXPENDITURES will increase by approximately \$350K. Expenditures for equipment represent less than 1.0% of the college's operating budget. CONTRACTUAL EXPENDITURES will decrease by approximately \$220K or 1.1% as costs are aligned with budgeted 2025-2026 revenues.







Other sources of net revenue totaling \$13,381,083 or 11.9% include charges to other counties, non- resident tuition, interest and rental revenue allowable under SUNY guidelines, and use of allocated fund	
Student revenue (tuition and technology fees) will total \$47,464,807 or 42.3% of the net revenue budget. Amended tuition limitation regulations allow community colleges to exceed the limit of one-third of the net budget. This budget anticipates that this amendment will continue.	
Sponsor contribution amounts to \$21,550,000 – an increase of \$250,000 over last year. This represents 19.2% of the net revenue budget.	
State aid is provided in the form of enrollment-based funding as determined by SUNY. For the 2025-2026 year, base state aid is the higher of \$2,997 per FTE or 100% of the 2024-25 SUNY approved base aid. Under the enacted funding floor, state aid amounts to \$29,921,110 or 26.6% of the net revenue budget.	
The net operating budget of \$112,317,000 equals the gross operating budget minus offsetting operating revenues and budgeted appropriations not allowable for state aid, such as Other Sponsored Programs. This is the basis for the tri-party funding partnership: the state, local sponsor, and student revenue.	









Gross Budgeted Expenditures per FTE Student


- This graph compares Monroe Community College's total cost per full-time equivalent (FTE) student with the average cost per FTE student for all community colleges under the program of the State University of New York (SUNY)
- For the 2025-2026 year, the gross budgeted expenditure per FTE student is \$15,075, down \$749 from the 2024-2025 gross budgeted amount of \$15,824. This is due primarily to the anticipated increase in stateaidable credit enrollment.
- The budgeted cost per FTE of \$15,075 is \$1,891 or 11.1% below the computed SUNY average of \$16,966 for the 2024-25 year.






Monroe Community College 2025-2026 Operating Budget – Downtown Campus

Honorable Legislators:

Labor Day is a time to recognize the dedication, skill, and contributions of the men and women who keep Monroe County moving forward. To celebrate their hard work, this legislation establishes Honoring Our Workers – Leisure for Less Week, a time when we give back by making recreation and community experiences more affordable for everyone.

During this special week, Monroe County will temporarily reduce admission prices at the Seneca Park Zoo, greens fees at County golf courses, and fees for temporary food vendors. These reductions will make it easier for families, seniors, small businesses and individuals from all walks of life to enjoy our parks, attractions, and events without financial barriers.

Beyond honoring our workforce, this initiative will also strengthen our local economy. More visitors to the Zoo, golf courses, and community events will lead to increased secondary spending on food, beverages, souvenirs, and rentals, benefiting local businesses and tourism.

Honoring Our Workers – Leisure for Less Week rewards the people who give so much to our community - turning Labor Day into a week-long celebration of recreation, connection, and community pride.

The specific legislative actions required are to:

- 1. Amend the 2025 Operating Budget, Parks Fees, Golf Fees to reduce Weekdays 9 holes to \$11.00; Weekends 9 holes to \$12.00; Weekdays 18 holes to \$14.00; Weekends 18 holes to \$15.00; Permit Play 9 holes to \$7.00; and Permit Play 18 holes to \$8.00 for the days of September 1 through September 7, 2025.
- 2. Amend the 2025 Operating Budget, Parks Fees, Golf Cart Fees to reduce 9 Holes Only to \$6.00 and 18 Holes Only to \$13.00 for the days of September 1 through September 7, 2025.
- 3. Amend the 2025 Operating Budget, Parks Fees, Golf Club Rentals to reduce Junior Clubs to \$2.00/\$5.00 and Men's and Women's Clubs to \$5.00/\$11.00 for the days of September 1 through September 7, 2025.

- 4. Amend the 2025 Operating Budget, Parks Fees, Seneca Park Zoo Fees to reduce April-October Adults to \$11.00/person; Senior Citizens to \$10.00/person; and Youth to \$9.00/person for the days of September 1 through September 7, 2025.
- 5.
