RE: Memorializing the United States Congress to Pass the Improving Small Business Administration (SBA) Engagement on Employee Ownership Act

Honorable Legislators:

Employee ownership is a powerful tool for building stronger, more resilient businesses. Studies have shown businesses with employee ownership models experience higher productivity, increased employee retention, and greater financial stability. Yet, many small business owners and employees are unaware of the opportunities available to them for shared ownership or cooperative structures. Expanding knowledge and access to these programs is critical for fostering equitable growth and supporting local economies.

In Monroe County, we offer several support options for small businesses, including technical assistance, networking, entrepreneur workshops, financial counseling, and outreach programs. While these programs currently serve a broad range of small business needs, H.R. 5778 provides an opportunity to expand these proven strategies to include education and resources specifically for employee ownership and cooperative models.

H.R. 5778: Improving SBA Engagement on Employee Ownership Act, introduced by Representative McIver, seeks to strengthen outreach and education on employee ownership through the Small Business Administration (SBA). This legislation recognizes the importance of cooperative business models and encourages federal coordination to promote them.

Specifically, the bill requires the SBA Administrator to participate in working groups, meetings, and other engagements hosted by federal agencies to discuss employee ownership and cooperative business models. This ensures the SBA remains actively involved in initiatives to advance shared ownership and learns best practices across the nation.

Further, H.R. 5778 amends the Small Business Investment Company (SBIC) program to expand outreach to investors and limited partners, ensuring potential stakeholders are informed of opportunities to support employee-owned businesses. The legislation also mandates the SBA implement outreach and assistance programs under the Small Business Employee Ownership and Cooperatives Promotion Program, within 180 days of enactment. These steps will provide tangible support for small businesses exploring employee ownership and cooperative models.

By improving awareness and access to these programs, H.R. 5778 empowers employees to take an active stake in their workplaces, strengthens regional economies, and encourages long-term business sustainability. We urge the members of the House of Representatives and the Senate to pass H.R. 5778 and call on the President to sign it into law and ensure more American workers have the opportunity to share in the success of their companies.

RE: Memorializing the United States Congress to Pass the Better Care for Domestic Violence Survivors Act

Honorable Legislators:

Domestic violence remains a pervasive public safety issue in the United States. Nearly one in four women, and one in nine men, experience physical violence, sexual violence, or stalking at the hands of an intimate partner. Domestic violence survivors often interact with healthcare providers in the aftermath of trauma, making these professionals critical first points of contact. Yet, studies indicate a significant portion of healthcare providers lack the training to recognize and respond effectively to domestic violence cases. The absence of standardized trauma-informed and victim-centered training limits providers' ability to intervene effectively, leaving survivors without the care they need.

H.R. 5702: Better Care for Domestic Violence Survivors Act seeks to address this critical gap by establishing a federal demonstration program to train healthcare providers in trauma-informed and victim-centered approaches. This legislation ensures medical professionals who interact with survivors are equipped to identify and treat cases of domestic violence with sensitivity, expertise, and cultural competence.

Specifically, the bill authorizes the Attorney General to award grants to support national, regional, and local victim-services organizations, enabling them to implement trauma-informed, victim-centered practices. Trainings will include strategies for complex cases involving drugs and alcohol, strangulation, disabilities, and LGBTQ+ survivors. Further, grant recipients will partner with local research institutions to assess the effectiveness of training programs, collect data on outcomes, and ensure only best practices are shared broadly.

By equipping healthcare providers with the knowledge and resources to respond effectively to survivors, H.R. 5702 strengthens immediate care, enhances long-term recovery, and fosters safer communities. We urge Congress to pass H.R. 5702 and call on President Trump to sign the bill into law.

Memorializing the Ohio House of Representatives and Governor Mike

DeWine to Pass and Sign Senate Bill 295, "Regards the Timeline for Restoring

Competency in Criminal Cases"

Honorable Legislators:

Cleveland Police Officer Jamieson Ritter, a native of Webster, New York, a 2015 graduate of McQuaid Jesuit High School, and a Syracuse University alumnus, was tragically murdered in July 2024 while responding to a warrant involving De'Lewante Hardy. Hardy had reportedly killed his grandmother days earlier. He had been declared incompetent to stand trial in the fall of 2024 and ordered into in-patient psychiatric treatment for schizophrenia.

It was later revealed that Hardy had been refusing his psychiatric medication for months and that the behavioral health facility responsible for his treatment failed to report this noncompliance for five months. Under current Ohio law, the competency-restoration timeline does not pause when a defendant refuses required medication. As a result, prosecutors lacked the ability to ensure that Hardy's competency could be restored within the mandated one-year period. Prosecutors have warned that this loophole allows defendants to intentionally run down the clock to avoid prosecution.

This devastating tragedy highlights the serious flaws within Ohio's current competency-restoration framework. Under existing law, when a defendant charged with a felony or a misdemeanor offense of violence is found incompetent to stand trial, and the court determines that competency can be restored within one year, the court must order treatment for up to one year. However, because the law does not stop the timeline when a defendant refuses medication, individuals can deliberately decline treatment until the statutory period expires. Once that occurs, courts may be forced to dismiss charges entirely. This structure allows violent offenders to evade accountability simply by refusing their prescribed medication.

Senate Bill 295 provides a necessary and responsible solution to this problem. The bill extends the competency-restoration period from one year to five years, giving courts the time needed to restore competency in defendants charged with serious or violent offenses. It also

requires mental health facilities to notify the court within fourteen days if a defendant refuses to comply with a treatment plan. If a defendant declines medication, the restoration timeline is paused and does not resume until treatment restarts. The bill further provides that if a defendant regains competency but is later found incompetent again, the restoration period resets and must be treated as a separate determination.

Senate Bill 295 closes a dangerous loophole that allows violent offenders to manipulate the justice system. Permitting defendants to avoid prosecution by refusing treatment is unacceptable and poses a clear threat to public safety. For these reasons, we urge you to join us in calling upon the Ohio House of Representatives and Governor Mike DeWine to pass and sign Senate Bill 295.

Memorializing the New York State Legislature to Reintroduce and Pass S.2282-A, "Pretrial Risk Overview for Threat Evaluation, Custody, and Treatment

(PROTECT) Act"

Honorable Legislators:

In May of this year, the Codes Committee of the New York State Senate voted down S.2282-A, known as the "Pretrial Risk Overview for Threat Evaluation, Custody, and Treatment (PROTECT) Act," on a party-line vote of 8-4 with one Democrat voting "aye with reservations." This important legislation, sponsored by Senator Pam Helming and co-sponsored by almost the entire Republican Conference of the Senate, would provide courts with an evidence-based tool to assess a defendant's risk of reoffending, threat to public safety, and likelihood of appearing for trial. By introducing a structured and data-driven approach, the PROTECT Act strengthens the fairness and consistency of pretrial determinations while maintaining the integrity of the justice system.

The PROTECT Act would direct the Division of Criminal Justice Services to develop a validated risk assessment instrument for use by judges in pretrial proceedings. This framework would support informed decisions on whether to release or detain a defendant and under what conditions, ensuring that each case is evaluated based on objective criteria rather than solely on the charged offense. The legislation seeks to balance the rights of defendants with the community's need for safety and confidence in judicial outcomes.

Under the proposal, courts would be required to conduct risk assessments for individuals arrested for new felony or Class A misdemeanor offenses while already on pretrial release. This provision addresses a growing concern about repeat offenders committing additional crimes while awaiting trial. By incorporating a structured review process, the PROTECT Act would help prevent unnecessary risks to the public and provide courts with the tools needed to respond effectively when patterns of reoffending emerge.

The legislation also recognizes the importance of mental health intervention. It affirms that individuals who present an immediate danger to themselves or others may be referred for psychiatric

evaluation and treatment in accordance with state law. This approach reflects a broader commitment to addressing underlying behavioral health issues within the justice system, promoting both rehabilitation and community safety.

Reintroducing and passing the PROTECT Act would represent a meaningful step toward restoring public trust in New York's criminal justice system. It offers a fair, research-based alternative to blanket policies that may overlook individual circumstances or community impact. By equipping judges with the tools necessary to make informed, responsible decisions, the State can enhance both safety and justice for all New Yorkers. Therefore, we ask that you join us in urging the New York State Legislature to take back up the PROTECT Act to defend our communities from potentially dangerous reoffenders.

Memorializing the New York State Legislature to Pass And Governor Kathy Hochul To Sign Assembly Bill A00179 "Authorizes the Commissioner of Environmental Conservation to Establish a Stream Maintenance and Flood Control Program; Allows for the Local Governing Body of a County to Elect a Local Law Providing For a Local Option Into Such Program; Provides For the County to be Responsible For Performing the Work Outlined In an Approved Stream Maintenance and Flood Control Plan"

Honorable Legislators:

In New York State, flash flooding is responsible for the single highest amount of weather-related property damage. According to NOAA, more than 2.5 billion dollars in property damage occurred from flash flooding between 2020 and 2024. From 1996 through 2024, flooding was the third leading cause of severe-weather-related deaths in New York State. Earlier this year, two individuals in New York City lost their lives due to flash flooding caused by intense rainfall. Among the five categories of severe weather tracked since 1996, flash flooding has increased the most, with the first, second, and sixth highest annual incidents occurring within the last four years. This 2.5 billion dollar total also does not include the additional 1.2 billion dollars in damage caused by regular (non-flash) flooding.

Despite this escalating threat, federal flood control plans developed in coordination with New York State primarily focus on major rivers. Smaller local streams and creeks have been largely overlooked, even though they pose significant risks to surrounding communities. Data shows that thousands of properties across New York are at risk of flooding. In Monroe County alone, 28,121 properties are projected to be at risk of flooding over the next 30 years, representing 10.6 percent of all properties in the county. Localized communication and coordination between State agencies and County Departments of Environmental Services are essential to identify and address vulnerabilities in smaller waterways so they can be better maintained and strengthened to protect at-risk properties. Assembly Bill A00179 is necessary to advance this work.

Assembly Bill A00179 would authorize the Commissioner of the Department of Environmental Conservation, in consultation with SEMO and local Soil and Water Conservation Districts, to establish a Stream Maintenance and Flood Control Program that any county may opt into by local law. Counties choosing to participate would work with DEC, SEMO, and local Soil and Water Conservation Districts to develop a Stream Maintenance and Flood Control Plan. This plan would evaluate weather patterns, analyze existing conditions, and incorporate necessary hydrological data to create a schedule of short- and long-term stream maintenance and reclamation activities designed to prevent flooding while also improving aquatic habitat within county waterways.

Once DEC approves a county's plan, the county would oversee implementation of the scheduled maintenance and flood control activities. When maintenance activities need to occur on private property, the entity performing the work, whether it be the county, town, village, or local Soil and Water Conservation District, would notify the property owner and request permission to enter and perform the required work. The bill also adds a new Section 120-dd to the General Municipal Law to permit necessary work to proceed without owner permission if the local governing body determines that failure to perform the repairs poses an unwarranted risk to the health, safety, or welfare of local residents.

Therefore, we respectfully urge the New York State Legislature to pass, and Governor Kathy Hochul to sign, Assembly Bill A00179. This legislation will provide the State and counties with the tools, structure, and authority needed to better understand and manage localized flooding, strengthen and maintain critical waterways, protect aquatic and fishing habitats, and create a safer environment for the homeowners and taxpayers we serve.

Missing Military Members

Honorable Legislators:

Often times, our nation's heroes return home from military service carrying heavy burdens – including various mental illnesses, post-traumatic stress disorder, or suffer from a traumatic brain injury. These illnesses can overlap with each other, creating the perfect storm for military members and veterans to experience trauma, change their behavior, and avoidance of others; leading to many having difficulty readjusting to civilian life. Through this difficult change, veterans and military members across the United States can go missing. In order to better support our military members and veterans, the New York State Legislature has introduced a bill focused on searching for missing military members who suffer from mental illness, post-traumatic stress disorder, or a traumatic brain injury.

New York State Senate Bill S.1866 and Assembly Bill A.4799 would amend the veteran's services law in order to establish a "Green Alert System" for eligible military members. Through these bills, the State would develop and implement a statewide system for military members who have elected to join the system, suffering from mental illness, post-traumatic stress disorder, or traumatic brain injury. Similar to the current Amber Alert system, the Green Alert System would work through a collaborative effort between the Department of Transportation, law enforcement agencies, radio and television broadcasters, and the general public to safely recover missing military members across the State. However, for military members to be eligible for this system, they must opt-in to the system by providing legal documentation of their mental illness through a family member or legal guardian to prove their eligibility, ensuring accuracy for issuing Green Alerts.

Please join me in calling upon the New York State Legislature to pass, and Governor Kathy Hochul to sign Senate Bill S.1866. and Assembly Bill A.4799, Establishing the Green Alert System for Missing Military Members. Our military members suffering from mental illness, post-traumatic stress disorder, or traumatic brain injury deserve support to ensure their safety and well-being. By passing these bills, we can ensure that when a military member goes missing, law enforcement and the community will use all available resources to safely return our heroes.

Amend the 2026-2031 Capital Improvement Program and the 2026 Capital Budget to Add a Project Entitled "Baggage System Improvements" at the Frederick Douglass - Greater Rochester International Airport; Authorize Financing for the Project; and Authorize a Contract with C&S Engineers, Inc. for Design Services

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2026-2031 Capital Improvement Program and the 2026 Capital Budget to add a project entitled "Baggage System Improvements" at the Frederick Douglass - Greater Rochester International Airport; authorize financing for the project in the amount of \$6,500,000; and authorize a contract with C&S Engineers, Inc. in the amount of \$480,850 for design services.

This project will complete improvements to the existing flat baggage plate carousels in the baggage makeup area and the replacement of the slope plate in-bound baggage carousels located in the baggage claim. The project will include the removal of the existing flat and sloped plate carousel units in their entirety and replace them with new units that are longer and will have wider plates. Also included in the project are upgrades to the controls to tie the 1989 vintage carousels into the newly upgraded controls for the remainder of the baggage handling system. Finally, isolated patching and repairs to flooring and finished areas that are associated with the retrofit work will be completed.

The project will provide passengers flying to and from the Frederick Douglass - Greater Rochester International Airport with an improved and more efficient baggage handling system that will help to make their flight and travel experience easier. The nine airlines currently serving the Airport are fully in support of this project.

This project will be funded by a Federal Aviation Administration grant of 90%, a New York State Department of Transportation grant of 5%, and a local share of 5%.

The Department of Aviation recommends authorization of a contract with C&S Engineers, Inc., a designated airport consultant per Resolution 365 of 2023, to provide design services for the Baggage System Improvements Project in the amount of \$480,850.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Amend the 2026-2031 Capital Improvement Program and the 2026 Capital Budget to add a project entitled "Baggage System Improvements" in the amount of \$6,500,000.

- 2. Authorize financing for the project entitled "Baggage System Improvements" in the amount of \$6,500,000.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract with C&S Engineers, Inc., 100 S. Clinton Avenue, Suite 2700, Rochester, New York 14604, for design services for the Baggage System Improvements Project at the Frederick Douglass-Greater Rochester International Airport in the amount of \$480,850, and any amendments necessary to complete the project within the total capital fund(s) appropriation.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5 (c)(1) ("maintenance or repair involving no substantial changes in an existing structure or facility"), and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for this project, consistent with authorized uses, will be included in the capital fund(s) to be created for this intended purpose. The local funding for this project will ultimately be provided by the Monroe County Airport Authority from Airport generated revenues. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

The records in the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that neither C&S Engineers, Inc., nor any of its principal officers, owe any delinquent Monroe County Property taxes. The principal officers of the firm are:







The total Increase and Improvements of Facilities in the District is comprised of the "NWQPWD - General Pump Station, Interceptor and Treatment Plant Improvements" project (\$950,000); "NWQPWD - NWQ WRRF Electrical Improvements" project (\$7,200,000); the "NWQPWD - Aeration Improvements" project (\$3,000,000); and the "NWQPWD - Preliminary Treatment Improvements" project (\$800,000), for a total estimated cost of the Increase and Improvement in the amount of \$11,950,000. The "NWQPWD - General Pump Station, Interceptor and Treatment Plant Improvements;" "NWQPWD - Aeration Improvements;" and "NWQPWD - Preliminary Treatment Improvements" projects are under consideration by Your Honorable Body as companion referrals.

The Increase and Improvement of Facilities is necessary to provide funding for the "NWQPWD - NWQ WRRF Electrical Improvements" project. This project includes phased replacement of the facility's primary electrical system building, transformers, switchgear, and busses along with distribution cabling to all major processes. This project is necessary to maintain reliability and continuity of services to District customers.

The estimated cost of the improvements is \$7,200,000. The actual debt service obligation for the additional cost of the project, as projected in future years, could potentially result in an increase of \$2.88 to the future annual charges of the average District ratepayer. However, the actual impact is typically reduced through retirement of previous debt and other offsets to the District's capital charge levy. Based on an average water consumption of 60,000 gallons, the total annual charge for both operation & maintenance and capital to the District ratepayer in 2025 is \$151.36.

The specific legislative actions required are:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a five-year grant from the New York State Department of Health in an amount not to exceed \$978,710 for the Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs Program ("CYSHCN") for the period of October 1, 2025 through September 30, 2030, and accept a one-year grant from the New York State Department of health in an amount not to exceed \$138,230 for the Community Accessibility and Inclusion for the CYSHCN Program for the period of October 1, 2025 through September 30, 2026.

The purpose of the CYSHCN Program is to provide education, referral and outreach services to children and youth with special health care needs. Funds will be used to support contracts, administrative services and existing positions to run the program. This will be the 27th year the County has received this grant. This year's annualized funding represents an increase of \$4,935 from the previous 12-month period.

The purpose of the Community Accessibility and Inclusion for the CYSHCN Program is to support community-based projects by enhancing physical spaces to support CYSHCN and their families and by supporting recreational and support opportunities for CYSHCN. Funds will be used to support contracts and projects to meet the objectives. This is the first year the County has received this grant.

New York State will provide appropriate compensation to Monroe County for the performance of these services.

The Town has submitted a Monroe County Municipal Sidewalk Funding Application to install approximately 980 linear feet of sidewalk along Calkins Road between Tumbleweed Drive and Tinker Nature Park (the "Project"). The total construction costs are anticipated to be approximately \$90,000. Through the intermunicipal agreement, the County will reimburse the Town in an amount not to exceed \$45,000 for construction expenses. The \$45,000 of the County's share will be paid for by the appropriation and transfer of committed fund balance pursuant to Resolution 197 of 2023.

The Project will connect the existing sidewalk network from nearby neighborhoods to the west by extending sidewalk from Tumbleweed Drive to Tinker Nature Park. The sidewalk connection will serve as the only means of pedestrian access from the nearby neighborhoods. The lack of pedestrian access in this area would be addressed by the project. Such a connection would further the goals of the County's Countywide Active Transportation Plan to fill a gap within the existing sidewalk network.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2026-2031 Capital Improvement Program and the 2026 Capital Budget to add a project entitled "Probation Body Worn Cameras & Less Than Lethal Devices" in the amount of \$600,000 and authorize financing for the project in the amount of \$600,000.

The Monroe County Probation Department is the third largest law enforcement agency in the County. It has a unique mission but the same risk and needs as other law enforcement agencies, such as the Monroe County Sheriff's Office. However, they are not equipped similarly. With the proliferation of cameras in society, the public has grown to expect that its law enforcement officers will be equipped with body worn cameras to ensure transparency during community interactions and critical incidents. Additionally, it is an expected practice that officers who carry firearms be equipped with a less than lethal option that they may employ under the appropriate circumstances thereby reducing the likelihood of serious injury or death to a suspect from a gunshot wound. This funding will allow for the equipping of all officers armed with a firearm, a Taser device. It will also provide sufficient body worn cameras to allow all officers in the field to be so equipped through a shared equipment process.

This project will equip the Monroe County Probation Department with essential modern safety equipment: body-worn cameras and less than lethal devices. This initiative will align the department with national best practices for law enforcement, enhance transparency, and provide officers with a critical less-lethal force option. Funding will provide Taser devices for all armed officers and establish a shared pool of body-worn cameras to ensure all officers in the field are equipped during their shifts, thereby increasing safety and accountability for both officers and our community.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 289 of 2022 to accept additional funding from the New York State Office of Victim Services in the amount of \$182,241 for the Sheriff's Victim Assistance Program, and to extend the time period through September 30, 2026.

This grant funds three (3) Crime Victim Specialist positions within the Sheriff's Office. The Crime Victim Specialists provide a comprehensive program that engages victims at the crime scene or immediately thereafter and walks them through the criminal justice system as needed. Services provided include: crisis support service; outreach through the home, workplace and hospital; referral service; case status information and accompaniment; short term counseling for victims and their families; advocacy at court proceedings including the provision of information and accompaniment to court; and assistance with property recovery and reimbursement for lost wages and medical bills through New York State Office of Victim Services compensation claim assistance. The County has been receiving grant funding for this program since 1989. The original award from a competitive RFA was rejected by New York State Comptroller's office, therefore it was decided to provide one-year extensions on current awards.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend Resolution 289 of 2022 to accept an additional \$182,241 from, and to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract and any amendments thereto, with the New York State Office of Victim Services for the Sheriff's Victim Assistance Program bringing the total award to \$728,964, and to extend the time period through September 30, 2026.
- 2. Amend the 2025 operating grant budget of the Office of the Sheriff by appropriating the sum of \$182,241 into general fund 9300, funds center 3803010000, Police Bureau Administration.

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3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant awards in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any encumbered balances during the grant periods according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications with the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

This grant is 100% funded by New York State Office of Victim Services. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Honorable Legislators:

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of District Attorney Brian P. Green.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 305 of 2022 to accept additional funding from the New York State Office of Victim Services in the amount of \$259,856 for the Victim and Witness Assistance Program in the District Attorney's Office, and to extend the time period for one (1) year through September 30, 2026.

The Victim and Witness Assistance Grant Program funds a portion of the salary of three (3) existing full-time Crime Victim Specialist positions and two (2) existing full-time Victim Witness Advocate positions in the District Attorney's Office. In addition, the funding covers the costs of four (4) cell phones and grant-mandated travel for training. Crime Victim Specialists and Victim Witness Advocates provide support services to felony and misdemeanor crime victims who find the judicial process a bewildering and often traumatic experience. Advocates orient victims and witnesses to procedures, assist in arranging court appearances, and help victims obtain victim compensation, among other services. The additional funding will bring the grant total to \$1,039,424.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Amend Resolution 305 of 2022 to accept an additional \$259,856 from, and to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract and any amendments thereto, with the New York State Office of Victim Services for the Victim and Witness Assistance Grant Program in the District Attorney's Office, bringing the total program award to \$1,039,424, and to extend the time period for one (1) year through September 30, 2026.

- 2. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the District Attorney's Office by appropriating the sum of \$259,856 into general fund 9300, funds center 2501010000, DA Central Administration.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any encumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.

Subject: Authorize an Appropriation Transfer and Resolution and Subaward Grant Amendments pursuant to the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize an ARPA appropriation transfer and the amendment of resolutions and subaward grant agreements for terms to commence on or after December 15, 2025 and terminate on or before December 31, 2026.

As Your Honorable Body is aware, Monroe County received \$144,080,127 in State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds through ARPA. Your Honorable Body previously allocated ARPA funds for a number of projects, including but not limited to a series of grant awards pursuant to Resolutions 342 of 2022 and 199 of 2023.

ARPA requires that all grant dollars be expended by Monroe County by December 31, 2026, and that any unspent grant dollars be returned to the U.S. Department of the Treasury. Pittsford Volunteer Ambulance, Inc., a County subrecipient of ARPA funds, has determined that it will be unable to spend and be reimbursed for all allocated grant funding prior to the December 31, 2026 expenditure deadline, and has agreed to a reduction of the maximum amount of its grant agreement in order to make such funding available to another subrecipient in our community.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize an appropriation transfer and the amendment of Resolution 342 of 2022, Resolution 199 of 2023, and ARPA subaward grant agreements as follows: Pittsford Volunteer Ambulance, Inc., from an amount not to exceed \$4,246,948.50 to an amount not to exceed \$3,371,024.90, and a transfer of \$875,923.60 from Pittsford Volunteer Ambulance, Inc. to Foodlink, Inc., from an amount not to exceed \$1,430,745 to an amount not to exceed \$2,306,668.60 for Foodlink's Expanding Food Access for Monroe County Families Project.

Foodlink's Expanding Food Access for Monroe County Families Project serves quality, nutritious meals to multi-generational families throughout Monroe County through community programs and partnerships. The additional ARPA grant dollars will permit Foodlink to expand its purchase of food and the delivery of food and meals to community partners in Monroe County.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize an appropriation transfer of \$875,923.60 as follows:
 - a. From: Department of Finance, general fund 9301, funds center 1403930103, ARPA Public Safety.
 - To: Department of Finance, general fund 9301, funds center 140393104, ARPA Health & Welfare.
- 2. Authorize an amendment to Resolution 199 of 2023 to decrease the total award amount to Pittsford Volunteer Ambulance, Inc., from an amount not to exceed \$4,246,948.50 to an amount not to exceed \$3,371,024.90.
- 3. Authorize an amendment to Resolution 342 of 2022 to increase the total award amount to Foodlink, Inc., from an amount not to exceed \$1,430,745 to an amount not to exceed \$2,306,668.60 for the Expanding Food Access for Monroe County Families Project.
- 4. Authorize an amendment to the County's Subaward Grant Agreement with Pittsford Volunteer Ambulance, Inc. from an amount not to exceed \$4,246,948.50 to an amount not to exceed \$3,371,024.90.
- 5. Authorize an amendment to the County's Subaward Grant Agreement with Foodlink, Inc. from an amount not to exceed \$1,430,745 to an amount not to exceed \$2,306,668.60 for the Expanding Food Access for Monroe County Families Project.
- 6. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of these funds, any returned contractor funds, or any deferred revenue, in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments.
