WHEREAS, Victor was raised in Rochester, graduated from Bishop Kearney High School, overcame personal struggles in his early adulthood, and returned to serve the very community he once walked through in hardship; and

WHEREAS, Victor was an advocate who was known to always put the youth first. During his time at the Center for Youth, he worked with Roberto Clemente School No. 8 to bring an innovative and restorative approach to crisis prevention through the implementation of the Cool Down Zone; and

WHEREAS, Victor was instrumental in founding and expanding the Pathways to Peace program, advising youth, supporting community organizations, and serving most recently as the Mayor's Advisor on Violence Prevention; and

WHEREAS, His work included launching the Rochester Peace Collective, overseeing school-based intervention initiatives, and championing programs to engage former gang members as credible messengers in their communities; and

WHEREAS, Victor's influence was always deeply personal, as he offered support, guidance, and love to countless individuals; and

WHEREAS, He believed in meeting people where they are, whether standing beside the mayor in a suit or cooking at a community peace barbecue, always showing up with humility and strength; and

WHEREAS, Mayor Malik Evans described him as a trusted advisor and friend, whose life embodied the hymn, "May the works I've done speak for me"; and

WHEREAS, He is survived by his wife, Sharon Saunders, children Victor II and Betty, mother Claudia Brown, and a city forever shaped by his example.



This proposed project is the construction of a 104 unit 5 building multi-family residential development by Providence housing. The subject property is a 9.2 acre site along Culver Rd. The site is a former landfill, is vacant and enrolled in the Brownfield Cleanup Program (BCP). Comprehensive investigative and remediation plans are in place to address contamination and site cleanup including a Remedial Action Work Plan (RAWP) pursuant to the BCP in New York State DEC regulations. As part of the BCP the applicant adheres to the RAWP protocols for the removal of contaminated soil in the design of a vapor medication system is part of the remediation process. Site remediation will be conducted under state regulations, ensuring that the contamination is addressed prior to site occupancy. The Monroe County Division of Community Development is providing CDBG funding to promote affordable rental housing options throughout Monroe County.

The 9.2 acre site is accessible through Culver Road and is in an area with a mix of residential and commercial uses. Rezoned from R1 to R5 residential it is currently vacant but was previously a landfill and agricultural market. The site contains undocumented film material including construction debris up to 20 feet deep, primarily in former ravine. It was accepted into the Brownfield Cleanup Program in November 2023 as site number C828226. Hobby Creek lies 500 feet north with groundwater generally flowing northeast. A 2024 study found no wetlands, streams, or habitats for endangered species on the site. Based on review of the site, the project does not impact wetlands, the 100 year floodplain or any structures more than 50 years old. The project will not impact existing natural resources, wetlands, historical or cultural resources and will not alter the existing community character. The proposed action is consistent with existing land use. Accordingly, the proposed action will not result in any significant adverse environmental impacts.

Rochester Housing Development Fund Corp (RHDFC) - \$1,000,000: Acquisition Rehabilitation Resale – RHDFC will utilize funding to support the Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resale of 20 properties throughout Monroe County, benefiting first-time homebuyers making under 80% Area Median Income (AMI.) They will administer these funds under the framework of their existing programs, Home Rochester (within the city) and Make Monroe Home (throughout suburban Monroe County.)

Rochester Roots - \$789,250: Acquisition Rehabilitation Resale - Rochester Roots will utilize funding to support the Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resale of 8 vacant properties within JOSANA Neighborhood of the City of Rochester benefiting first-time homebuyers making under 60% AMI. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.
- Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Director of Finance Chief Financial Officer, the chief fiscal officer of the County under the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance Chief Financial Officer may sell such bonds or notes at public or private sale, at a discount or premium, at fixed or variable rates of interest or at no interest whatsoever, or as capital appreciation bonds, and with such amortization of principal as the Director of Finance Chief Financial Officer shall determine is most favorable to the County, and in compliance with any rules of the State Comptroller applicable thereto. Such bonds or notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be

prescribed by said Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may, in the event it is determined to issue variable rate bonds or notes, enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance, sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds or notes, as authorized under Section 54.90 of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer is also authorized to enter into such agreements and take such other action as may be necessary or appropriate and lawful to assure that, to the extent possible, (i) interest on the bonds and notes authorized hereby will not be includable in the gross income, for federal income tax purposes, of the recipients thereof, and (ii) to enable the purchaser thereof to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12. The Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer is hereby further delegated all powers of this County Legislature with respect to agreements for credit enhancement, derived from and pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, for such bonds or notes, including, but not limited to the determination of the provider of such credit enhancement facility or facilities and the terms and contents of any agreement or agreements related thereto.

Section 5. All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds or notes, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds or notes, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds or notes, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds or notes, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds or notes (and if said bonds or notes are to be executed in the name of the County by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the County), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds or notes, or may contract on behalf of the County for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds or notes shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals, in addition to those required by Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes, as authorized by this resolution, may be contested only if:

- such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or
- 3) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This resolution shall supersede Resolution No. 330 of 2023, being a bond resolution dated November 14, 2023, except to the extent that any indebtedness shall have been contracted or encumbrances made thereunder. The purpose of this superseding bond resolution is to effect the following: to increase the maximum estimated cost of the purpose to \$350,000, and to provide \$350,000 bonds therefor, an increase of \$100,000 over the \$250,000 bonds authorized under Resolution No. 330 of 2023.

Section 8. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the objects or purposes described herein.

Section 9. This resolution shall take effect in accordance with Section C2-7 of the Monroe County Charter and the Clerk of the Legislature is hereby authorized and directed to publish this resolution or a summary hereof to be published, together with a notice attached in substantially the form and in the manner prescribed by Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

BOND RESOLUTION DATED JUNE 10, 2025

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$200,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, NEW YORK, TO FINANCE THE COST OF THE ONTARIO BEACH PARK - MASTER PLAN IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT, IN AND FOR SAID COUNTY, AT AN ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST OF \$200,000

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE AFFIRMATIVE VOTE OF **NOT LESS THAN TWO-THIRDS OF THE TOTAL VOTING STRENGTH** OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. For the object or purpose of financing the cost of the Ontario Beach Park - Master Plan Improvements Project, in and for the County of Monroe, New York (the "County"), consisting of entry and exit gates, there are hereby authorized to be issued \$200,000 bonds of the County, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The duly adopted current Capital Budget of the County, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is hereby amended to provide for the appropriation of the amount hereby authorized to pay the cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose. The period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is fifteen (15) years, pursuant to subdivision 19(c) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost thereof is \$200,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$200,000 bonds of said County herein authorized; provided, however, that to the extent any state and/or federal aid and/or grant and/or gift is received for the aforesaid purpose, the County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to accept and shall use such funds to redeem any outstanding indebtedness incurred for such purpose or apply it, dollar for dollar, to reduce the amount of bonds to be issued for such purpose.

Section 3. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, the chief fiscal officer of the County under the Local Finance Law.
