Wartime Veteran

Applicants for Wartime Veteran's Credits must complete this form (VC-1) for each examination and provide a copy of their DD-214 separation papers within 30 days after exam date. Candidates who have previously submitted a copy of their DD-214 to the Monroe County Department of Human Resources on or after January 1, 2013 do not need to resubmit them, but a new VC-1 form must be filed for each examination. DD-214 separation papers establishes proof the veteran:

- Served on active duty in wartime, as defined in §85 of the State Civil Service Law (see back),
- Was honorably discharged or released under honorable circumstances from such services, and
- Is a resident of New York State at the time of the establishment of the eligible list.

Disabled Wartime Veteran

In addition to the proof above, applicants for Disabled Wartime Veteran's Credits must also submit a "Veterans Disability Records Release" form (VC-4), to a Veteran's Affairs office or the Monroe County Veterans Services Agency to show that they have a war-incurred disability of at least 10% which is certified to be in existence at the time of application for additional credits. This form should be forwarded in sufficient time so that the Commission will receive verification of the disability within 30 days after exam date.

Active Duty Military

Wartime Veteran's Credits will be applied after you are discharged and provide your DD-214.

THE USE OF VETERAN'S CREDITS

New York State Civil Service Law allows additional credits in examinations to successful candidates who have filed for and established their status as wartime veterans or disabled wartime veterans. These credits are granted at the time of establishment of the eligible list on the following basis:

	Open-Competitive Exams	Promotional Exams
Wartime Veteran	5 points	2.5 points
Disabled Wartime Veteran	10 points	5 points

In most cases candidates may use their wartime veteran's or disabled wartime veteran's credits to gain appointment only once to a civil serviced position in New York State or local government, but effective January 1, 2014, veterans who previously used credits for appointment to a position in New York State or local government AND, after his or her appointment, are subsequently classified by the Veterans Administration as disabled during time of war, are eligible for an award of additional veteran credits. Such candidates are entitled to 10 additional credits on civil service examinations, minus the number of credits already used for the prior appointment.

The mere application for wartime veteran's credits does not obligate an applicant to use such credits. Candidates who pass the examination will be notified of their standing on the eligible list with or without these additional credits. At the time of appointment eligible candidates will be asked to sign forms using or relinquishing these additional credits.

DEFINITION OF TIME OF WAR

As defined by Section 85 of Civil Service Law

All service in the United States armed forces during:

World War I	April 6, 1917 - November 11, 1918
World War II	December 7, 1941 - December 31, 1946
Korean Conflict	June 27, 1950 - January 31, 1955
Viet Nam Conflict	February 28, 1961 - May 7, 1975
Persian Gulf Conflict	August 2, 1990 - the date upon which such hostilities end

Service for which a veteran received the armed forces expeditionary medal, the Navy expeditionary medal, or the Marine Corps expeditionary medal for:

Hostilities in Lebanon	June 1, 1983 - December 1, 1987
Hostilities in Grenada	October 23, 1983 - November 21, 1983
Hostilities in Panama	December 20, 1989 - January 31, 1990
