## Notable Court Appearances

A Monroe County jury convicted 25-year-old **Jermaine Williams** of two counts of Murder in the 1<sup>st</sup> Degree and two counts of Murder in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Degree for the murders of Santina Jones and Timothy Chealey. On May 6, 2024, at approximately 1:00AM, Rochester Police Officers responded to an address on Rialto Street for a report of shots fired. Upon arrival, 43-year-old Timothy Chealey was found deceased on the porch from gunshot wounds. A second shooting victim, 46-year-old Shatina Jones, was located and immediately rushed to Strong Memorial Hospital, where she died from her injuries. Jermaine Williams, who was involved in the earlier conflict, drove to the house on Rialto Street and opened fire on a porch with multiple people, killing Timothy Chealey and Shatina Jones. The case was prosecuted by Assistant District Attorney Adam VanHeyst, Deputy Chief of the Major Felony Bureau, and Special Assistant District Attorney Emily Chisholm, of the Non-Fatal Shooting Taskforce. Jermaine Williams will be sentenced on April 14, in front of Monroe County Court Judge Michael Dollinger.

51-year-old **Edwin Narvaez** was convicted by a Monroe County jury of Sexual Abuse in the 1<sup>st</sup> Degree for a sexual assault of a 14-year-old child on April 5, 2021. This case was investigated by the Rochester Police Department and prosecuted by Assistant District Attorney Courtney Kleiman, of the Special Victims Unit. Edwin Narvaez will be sentenced on May 6, in front of Monroe County Court Judge Caroline Morrison.

42-year-old **David Robinson** was indicted on Assault in the 1<sup>st</sup> Degree, Criminal Possession of a Weapon in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Degree, Assault in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Degree, Assault in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Degree, and two counts of Unlawful Fleeing Police Officer in Motor Vehicle in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Degree. This case is being prosecuted by Assistant District Attorney Merrick Sadler, of the Vehicular Crimes Bureau. Robinson has an active warrant and there is a Crime Stoppers reward for information leading to his arrest.

18-year-old **Zyren Drumgoole**, 19-year-old **Kemaurie Welch** and 16-year-old **Aiyden Welch** were charged with Robbery in the 1<sup>st</sup> Degree, Robbery in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Degree, two counts of Criminal Possession of a Weapon in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Degree, and Criminal Possession of a Firearm. Zyren Drumgoole and Aiyden Welch were also charged with two counts of Rape in the 1<sup>st</sup> Degree. This case is being prosecuted by ADA Janna Jehlen, of the Special Victims Unit.
