Parolee Treyquan Davis Sentenced to 20 Years to Life for his Participation in the Murder of Jorge Luis Bonilla

Rochester, NY- Wednesday, August 31, 2022, New York State Supreme Court Justice Renzi sentenced 26-year-old Treyquan Davis to 20 years to Life in the New York State Department of Corrections after being convicted of Murder in the 2nd Degree, and two counts of Criminal Possession of a Weapon in the Second Degree for the murder of Jorge Luis Bonilla on June 8, 2020.

In the early morning hours of June 9, 2020, Rochester Police Department Officers responded to Strong Memorial Hospital for reports of a deceased individual with a gunshot wound to the face who was transported by a private vehicle. Officers identified the victim as 22-year-old Jorge Luis Bonilla.

After a detailed investigation by the Rochester Police Department and the New York State Division of Parole, Treyquan Davis was identified as a participant in the homicide. At the time of the killing, Davis was on parole for a prior conviction of Manslaughter in the 1st Degree.

The case was prosecuted by Assistant District Attorney Jennifer Hyatt, Deputy Chief of the Special Investigations Bureau and Assistant District Attorney Brandon Gonzalez, of the Special Investigations Bureau.

"I want to thank the Rochester Police Department Major Crimes Unit and the New York State Division of Parole for their extensive investigation," said Assistant District Attorney Jennifer Hyatt. "This collaborative nature of this investigation is one reason that the Monroe County District Attorney's Office was able to secure a conviction and life sentence for Treyquan Davis."

"While on parole for a homicide, Treyquan Davis participated in the murder of Jorge Luis Bonilla," said District Attorney Sandra Doorley. "Trequan Davis had an opportunity to live in our community once again as a law-abiding citizen. Instead, he was released to parole and less than a year later, participated in taking another life. It is our hope that Mr. Bonilla's family can find justice in today's sentence."
