New Cases

Of the 30 confirmed cases, 1 confirmed case is new since our update this morning at 10 a.m. However, the total cases remained steady at 30 because one of the previous lab test results was erroneously sent to Monroe County.

Monroe County continues to ask residents to practice social distancing and follow the guidance of the Monroe County Department of Public Health.
