Subject: Authorize Grant Contracts and Appropriation Transfers Pursuant the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize grant contracts with the agencies listed in Attachment A in a total amount not to exceed \$99,956,551 pursuant to the American Rescue Plan Act ("ARPA") for terms to commence on or after January 1, 2023 and terminate on or before December 31, 2026, and to authorize appropriation transfers.

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 was signed into law on March 11, 2021. ARPA allocated \$1.9 trillion in emergency relief and recovery, of which \$350 billion was designated to support state, local, territorial, and Tribal governments. Monroe County is the recipient of \$144,080,127 in State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds through ARPA.

On October 18, 2021, Monroe County launched a robust public outreach effort for Bring Monroe Back, Monroe County's Recovery Agenda. Bring Monroe Back is a plan to invest the \$144 million in ARPA funds that builds on a dozen community and government-led plans, assessments and reports that have engaged citizens, business owners and experts in their field. Using those reports, the County identified three focus areas where funding would be invested: workforce development and economic recovery; public health and public safety; and infrastructure and sustainability. A communitywide survey, testimony from community organizations and three inperson community forums and one virtual public forum were used to help the Department of Planning and Development refine a strategic vision for investing the ARPA funding.

On June 3, 2022, Monroe County issued a Request for Proposals seeking respondents who would use ARPA funding to affect positive change in the community in the three high-priority areas: workforce development and economic recovery; public health and public safety; and infrastructure and sustainability. These critical dollars will fund priorities and lay the foundation for a long-term, collaborative recovery that makes deliberate, thoughtful investments in our community and inspires transformative change.

One hundred eighty one (181) proposals were submitted for consideration and selected for the first round of ARPA funding.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute grant contracts, and any amendments thereto, with the agencies listed in Attachment A in a total amount not to exceed \$71,644,551 for terms to commence on or after January 1, 2023 and terminate on or before December 31, 2026.

 Authorize appropriation transfers in the amount of \$99,956,551 from the Monroe County Legislature, general fund 9301, funds center 1001030000, Local Recovery Fund to the departments of:

Planning, general fund 9301, funds center 1403930101 ARPA-Economic Development, in the amount of \$35,754,967;

Planning, general fund 9301, funds center 1403930102 ARPA-General Government, in the amount of \$2,000,000;

Planning, general fund 9301, funds center 1403930103 ARPA-Public Safety, in the amount of \$4,297,221;

Planning, general fund 9301, funds center 1403930104 ARPA-Health & Welfare, in the amount of \$40,592,363;

Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, general fund 9301, funds center 2201010000 Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, in the amount of \$1,000,000;

Human Services, general fund 9301, funds center 5103060000 Employment Services, in the amount of \$1,400,000;

- 3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of these funds, any returned contractor funds, or any deferred revenue, in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments.
- 4. Should funding of these programs be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program(s) and where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program(s). Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with the New York State Civil Service Law, and when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

The grant contracts and appropriation transfers pursuant to ARPA includes Type II Actions pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(1) ("maintenance or repair involving no substantial changes in an existing structure or facility"); (2) ("replacement, rehabilitation or reconstruction of a structure or facility, in kind, on the same site, including upgrading buildings to meet building, energy, or fire codes unless such action meets or exceeds any of the thresholds in section 617.4 of this Part"); (21) ("minor temporary uses of land having negligible or no permanent impact on the environment"); (26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment"); (27) ("conducting concurrent environmental, engineering, economic, feasibility and other studies and preliminary planning and budgetary processes necessary to the formulation of a proposal for action, provided those activities do not commit the agency to commence, engage in

or approve such action"); (31) ("purchase or sale of furnishings, equipment or supplies, including surplus government property, other than the following: land, radioactive material, pesticides, herbicides, or other hazardous materials"); and (32) ("license, lease and permit renewals, or transfers of ownership thereof, where there will be no material change in permit conditions or the scope of permitted activities") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

The grant contracts and appropriation transfers pursuant to ARPA includes four (4) Unlisted Actions (MAPP/PROJECT PHOENIX; Deaf Refugee Advocacy Community Connection; Youth Mentoring and Family Support in Monroe County; and VOA's Hydroponic Farm). The provisions of the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act shall be complied with prior to Your Honorable Body undertaking, funding, or approving these actions.

Funding for these grant contracts will be included in the 2022 operating budget of the Department of Planning and Development once the appropriation transfers are authorized. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Each of these contractors has been reviewed for not-for-profit corporate status and the records in the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that none of these agencies owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept grants from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation ("NYSDEC") in the total amount of \$248,360 for the Municipal Zero-Emission Vehicle Infrastructure Project.

Monroe County was awarded these grants as part of an initiative by the NYSDEC to increase the number of Zero Emission Vehicles ("ZEV") on the road by installing charging stations throughout the State.

The program, led by the Monroe County Department of Environmental Services, will involve installing ZEV Charging Stations at various County facilities for use by both the County and the public. The grants require that the stations be Level 2 Charging Stations, which equate to a full-vehicle charge in eight (8) hours. Dual charging stations will be installed at up to four (4) of the following sites: MCC Brighton Campus, MCC Downtown Campus, Webster Park, and Churchville Park. This is the second time the County has received these grants.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept grants in the total amount of \$248,360 from, and to execute contracts and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation for the Municipal Zero-Emission Vehicle Infrastructure Project.
- 2. Amend the 2022 operating budget of the Department of Environmental Services by appropriating the sum of \$248,360 into internal services fund 9020, funds center 8675010000 Fleet Maintenance.

- 3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant awards in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments.
- 4. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(3) ("retrofit of an existing structure and its appurtenant areas to incorporate green infrastructure"); (9) ("construction or expansion of a primary or accessory/appurtenant, non-residential structure or facility involving less than 4,000 square feet of gross floor area and not involving a change in zoning or a use variance and consistent with local land use controls, but not radio communication or microwave transmission facilities"); and (31) ("purchase or sale of furnishings, equipment or supplies, including surplus government property, other than the following: land, radioactive material, pesticides, herbicides, or other hazardous materials"), and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

These grants require a 20% local match. Funding for this match is included in the 2022 operating budget of the Department of Environmental Services, internal services fund 9020, funds center 8675010000, Fleet Maintenance. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept furniture and equipment from the University of Rochester with an estimated value of \$8,000 for Creating Breastfeeding Friendly Communities.

The University of Rochester is administering a New York State Department of Health ("NYSDOH") grant entitled Creating Breastfeeding Friendly Communities. Through this grant the University of Rochester has funded breastfeeding support groups throughout the County, and has worked with many health care providers to enable them to become Breastfeeding Friendly Designated providers. The program is especially focused on the City of Rochester and Town of Greece, per state mandate, as residents that reside in these communities have the lowest breastfeeding rates in Monroe County.

The furniture and equipment will assist the County to become recognized as a Breastfeeding Friendly Worksite. To date, several private and public employers have either received recognition or are in the final stages of the process. Monroe County initially discussed working on the recognition a few years ago, but the efforts were delayed by the pandemic. The County has resumed efforts to achieve the recognition as a Breastfeeding Friendly Worksite through the development of good policies and practices for all employees.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept furniture and equipment with an estimated value of \$8,000 from the University of Rochester for Creating Breastfeeding Friendly Communities.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 425 of 2020 to increase the contract with Bergmann Associates, Architects, Engineers, Landscape Architects & Surveyors, D.P.C. ("Bergmann") from the amount of \$97,820 to the amount of \$380,520 for additional professional design services for the Monroe County Climate Action Plan ("CAP"), and to extend the contract through December 31, 2022, with the option to extend for two (2) years at no additional cost.

On March 10, 2020, Your Honorable Body authorized the creation of a CAP Advisory Committee for the express purpose of creating the Monroe County CAP (Resolution 76 of 2020). This was followed by further related actions taken by Your Honorable Body to appoint members of the Committee (Resolution No. 167 of 2020), authorizing the execution of the referenced contract with Bergmann, adoption of the New York State Climate Smart Communities Resolution (Resolution 260 of 2020), and acceptance of a grant from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation under the Climate Smart Communities program to support the development of the CAP (Resolution 111 of 2022).

Resolution 425 of 2022 authorized Bergmann to provide professional design services for Phase I of the CAP, which focuses on internal Monroe County operations. Phase II of the CAP will focus on community-wide actions and is anticipated to be completed by the end of 2023.

The specific legislative action required is to amend Resolution 425 of 2020 to increase the contract with Bergmann Associates, Architects, Engineers, Landscape Architects & Surveyors, D.P.C., 280 East Broad Street, Suite 200, Rochester, New York 14604, from the amount of \$97,820 to the amount of \$380,520 for additional professional design services for the Monroe County Climate Action Plan, and to extend the contract through December 31, 2022, with the option to extend for two (2) years at no additional cost.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 215 of 2019 to accept additional funding from the New York State Department of Health in the amount of \$54,761 for the Tuberculosis Prevention and Control Program (formerly known as the Public Health Campaign – County Tuberculosis Program) for the period of April 1, 2019 through March 31, 2024.

By Resolution 215 of 2019, Your Honorable Body authorized the acceptance of a grant from the New York State Department of Health for the Tuberculosis Prevention and Control Program. The purpose of this grant is to provide enhanced tuberculosis prevention, control, and elimination services to Monroe County residents. Funds will be used to cover partial salaries and benefits for staff nurses who perform case management, screening, diagnosis, and treatment of infected and at-risk clients. Additionally, staff outreach workers will provide directly observed therapy and assist with screening and contact investigations. This additional funding will be used to support services to Ukrainian newcomers under the Uniting for Ukraine (UKU) initiative. The additional funding will bring the grant total to \$1,032,731.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend Resolution 215 of 2019 to accept an additional \$54,761 from, and to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Department of Health, for the Tuberculosis Prevention and Control Program, bringing the total program award to \$1,032,731 for the period of April 1, 2019 through March 31, 2024.
- 2. Amend the 2022 operating budget of the Department of Public Health by appropriating the sum of \$54,761 into general fund 9300, funds center 5802020000, Tuberculosis Control Programs.

Council, Inc.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services in the amount of \$334,064, and authorize a contract with Delphi Drug and Alcohol Council, Inc. ("Delphi") in the amount of \$334,064 for the County Reentry Task Force Program for the period of October 1, 2022 through September 30, 2023.

The County Reentry Task Force ("Task Force"), which is co-chaired by the County's Deputy Chief Probation Officer and includes members from over 40 local law enforcement agencies and human services providers, has a goal of reducing recidivism through improved coordination among criminal justice, social services, educational, health, and mental health systems. The Task Force is addressing the following four reintegration issues of parolees: basic education, employment, sobriety support, and housing. This grant will fund a contract with Delphi for a Local Reentry Coordinator and also the provision of services related to these reintegration issues.

This is the seventeenth year of grant funding for this program. This year's funding represents the same amount as last year.

Delphi is a community-based behavioral health agency serving the Finger Lakes community. Delphi provides a drug and alcohol outpatient program, two domestic violence programs, and case management to clients in specialized courts and Health Home initiatives. With its capacity and experience, Delphi will provide a Local Reentry Coordinator and case managers to facilitate obtaining services for approximately 418 parole re-entry participants. Delphi will also obtain temporary housing for these participants as needed.

A request for qualifications was issued and Delphi Drug and Alcohol Council, Inc. was rated the most qualified to provide this service.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$334,064 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services for the County Reentry Task Force Program for the period of October 1, 2022 through September 30, 2023.

- Amend the 2022 operating budget of the Department of Public Safety, Office of Probation and Community Corrections, by appropriating the sum of \$334,064 into general fund 9300, funds center 2403010000, Probation/Community Corrections Administration.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract, and any amendments thereto, with Delphi Drug and Alcohol Council, Inc., 835 West Main Street, Rochester, New York 14611, for coordination and provision of the County Reentry Task Force services in the amount of \$334,064 for the period of October 1, 2022 through September 30, 2023.
- 4. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments.
- 5. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This action is a Type II action pursuant to 6 NYCRR §617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not included new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

This grant is 100% funded by the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Delphi Drug and Alcohol Council, Inc. is a not-for-profit agency, and the records in the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that it does not owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services in the amount of \$2,329,133 for the Raise the Age Legislation for the period of April 1, 2021 through March 31, 2022.

Raise the Age legislation was enacted with a number of objectives. It aims to reduce crime victimization; provide meaningful opportunity for a life without the stigma of a criminal record for adolescents who turn away from crime; eliminate the disproportionate incarceration of 16- and 17-year-olds of color in adult jails and prisons; reserve the juvenile placement system for only those young people who present a risk to public safety; and create therapeutic out-of-home placement settings for young people who do not present a risk to public safety.

In order to achieve these objectives, the Monroe County Office of Probation – Community Corrections has developed a Comprehensive Plan that utilizes a combination of increased staff resources, specialized training, and expanded community programs and services.

Implementation of the Comprehensive Plan will reduce the reliance on out-of-home placement, reduce the reliance on detention, reduce the need for family court adjudication, increase the adjustment rate of diversion cases, reduce the rate of probation violations, reduce the rate of long-term recidivism, and arrange for community-based services to improve outcomes for youth.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$2,329,133 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services for the Raise the Age Legislation for the period of April 1, 2021 through March 31, 2022.
- 2. Amend the 2022 operating budget of the Department of Public Safety, Office of Probation and Community Corrections, by appropriating the sum of \$1,777,568 into general fund 9300, funds center 2403020100, Juvenile Services Family Division.

- 3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments.
- 4. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This action is a Type II action pursuant to 6 NYCRR §617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not included new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Partial funding for grant is included in the 2022 operating budget of the Department of Public Safety, Office of Probation and Community Corrections, general fund 9300, funds center 2403020100, Juvenile Services Family Division. The appropriated amount will adjust the current funding to that established by the grant.

This grant is 100% funded by the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Honorable Legislators:

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Sheriff Todd K. Baxter.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a contract with Stop Abuse Campaign, Inc. for Phase I of a multi-year project to reduce recidivism in the Monroe County Jail in an amount not to exceed \$130,000 for the period of November 20, 2022 through November 19, 2023.

Under this agreement, Stop Abuse Campaign, Inc., in partnership with the Columbia University Medical Center and the Trauma Institute, shall implement Phase I of a multi-year project to develop a recidivism reduction program in the Monroe County Jail. The program will involve the delivery of therapeutic services to incarcerated individuals recovering from trauma.

A request for proposals was issued and Stop Abuse Campaign, Inc. was selected as the most qualified to provide the services.

Honorable Legislators:

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Sheriff Todd K. Baxter.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2022-2027 Capital Improvement Program and the 2022 Capital Budget to add a project entitled "Sheriff's Body Worn Camera and Less Lethal Weapon Project" in the amount of \$800,000 and authorize financing for the project in the amount of \$800,000.

Currently the Sheriff's Office has 90 body worn cameras assigned to the road patrol and 40 assigned in the jail. The cameras have proven effective to demonstrate transparency to the community, improve evidentiary outcomes and enhance the safety of interactions between deputies and the public. The new capital project will allow the Sheriff's Office to deploy additional cameras and sustain their continued use across all bureaus of the agency, as well as dash cameras for the road patrol vehicles. The Sheriff's Office would also like to deploy additional less than lethal devices across all bureaus; currently the Sheriff's Office has 199 units deployed. Each of these pieces of technology have a life expectancy of up to five (5) years. Going forward the Sheriff's Office would schedule to replace 20% of this equipment every year as they age out, allowing them to maintain consistent and effective deployment.

This project is scheduled to be considered by the Monroe County Planning Board on October 27, 2022.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend the 2022-2027 Capital Improvement Program to add a project entitled "Sheriff's Body Worn Camera and Less Lethal Weapon Project" in the amount of \$800,000.

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body as a joint request of County Executive Adam J. Bello and Sheriff Todd K. Baxter.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize the transfer of the contingency appropriation, in the amount of \$100,000, from the Department of Finance-Unallocated to the Office of the Sheriff for additional law enforcement activities overtime costs.

Because of the continuing and unprecedented level of violence our community is experiencing, the Office of the Sheriff has been dedicating additional operational resources for collaborative efforts with the Rochester Police Department. Such efforts have included assigning deputies to provide support for proactive details targeting the most violent offenders and the most violent areas of the City of Rochester as well as augmenting related operational requirements as requested by the Rochester Police Department.

To ensure that the Office of the Sheriff can provide the enhanced support for violent felony enforcement in the City of Rochester through the end of the year, the County Executive and Sheriff are requesting addition appropriations for deputy overtime.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the transfer of the contingency appropriation, in the amount of \$100,000, from the Department of Finance-Unallocated, general fund 9001, funds center 1209020000 County General to the Office of the Sheriff, general fund 9001, funds center 3803050100 Criminal Investigations, for additional criminal investigation overtime costs.

ENACT A LOCAL LAW ENTITLED "WAIVER OF RESIDENCY REQUIREMENT FOR MONROE COUNTY JAIL DEPUTIES"
BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:
Section 1. A new chapter shall be added as Chapter 390 of the Monroe County Code entitled "Waiver of Residency Requirement for Monroe County Jail Deputies" and shall read as follows:
§ 1 Definitions. Defined terms used in this local law shall have the same meaning as ascribed to them below:
COUNTY shall mean Monroe County.
JAIL DEPUTY shall mean an individual employed by the Monroe County Sheriff's Department as a Deputy Sheriff Jailor or Corrections Officer in the Monroe County Jail.
§ 2 Residency Requirement. Public Officers Law § 3, as amended or changed, is hereby amended and superseded in its application to the County as follows: provisions of Public Officers Law § 3, as amended or changed, requiring a person to be a resident of the political subdivision or municipal corporation of the state for which he or she shall be chosen or which his or her official functions are required to be exercised, shall not prevent a person from holding the position of Jail Deputy, provided that such person resides within New York State.
Section 2. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law or the application thereof to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this law, or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such order or judgment shall be rendered.
Section 3. This local law shall take effect in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Home Rule Law and the Monroe County Charter.



RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$9,500,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, NEW YORK, TO FINANCE THE COST OF REPLACEMENT OF VOTING MACHINES IN AND FOR SAID COUNTY, AT AN ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST OF \$9,500,000 AND SUPERSEDING THE BOND RESOLUTION ADOPTED ON DECEMBER 15, 2020 (RESOLUTION NO. 388 OF 2020, AS AMENDED)

SUPERSEDING BOND RESOLUTION DATED OCTOBER 11, 2022

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE AFFIRMATIVE VOTE OF **NOT LESS THAN TWO-THIRDS OF THE TOTAL VOTING STRENGTH** OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. For the object or purpose of financing the cost of the replacement of voting machines in and for the County of Monroe, New York (the "County"), there are hereby authorized to be issued \$9,500,000 bonds of the County, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The duly adopted current Capital Budget of the County, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is hereby amended to provide for the appropriation of an additional \$3,000,000 to pay the cost of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes (\$6,500,000 having been heretofore appropriated from one or more Capital Budgets). The period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes is ten (10) years, pursuant to subdivision 31 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost thereof is \$9,500,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$9,500,000 bonds of said County herein authorized, provided, however, that to the extent any state and/or federal aid and/or grant and/or gift is received for the aforesaid purpose, the County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to accept and shall use such funds to redeem any outstanding indebtedness incurred for such purpose or apply it, dollar for dollar, to reduce the amount of bonds to be issued for such purpose.

Section 3. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, the chief fiscal officer of the County under the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may sell such bonds or notes at public or private sale, at a discount or premium, at fixed or variable rates of interest or at no interest whatsoever, or as capital appreciation bonds, and with such amortization of principal as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine is most favorable to the County, and in compliance with any rules of the State Comptroller applicable thereto.

Such bonds or notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may, in the event it is determined to issue variable rate bonds or notes, enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance, sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds or notes, as authorized under Section 54.90 of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer is also authorized to enter into such agreements and take such other action as may be necessary or appropriate and lawful to assure that, to the extent possible, (i) interest on the bonds and notes authorized hereby will not be includable in the gross income, for federal income tax purposes, of the recipients thereof, and (ii) to enable the purchaser thereof to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12. The Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer is hereby further delegated all powers of this County Legislature with respect to agreements for credit enhancement, derived from and pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, for such bonds or notes, including, but not limited to the determination of the provider of such credit enhancement facility or facilities and the terms and contents of any agreement or agreements related thereto.

Section 5. All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds or notes, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds or notes, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds or notes, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds or notes, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds or notes (and if said bonds or notes are to be executed in the name of the County by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the County), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds or notes, or may contract on behalf of the County for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds or notes shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals, in addition to those required by Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes, as authorized by this resolution, may be contested only if:

- such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this
 resolution are not substantially complied with, and
 - an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or
- 3) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This resolution shall supersede Resolution No. 388 of 2020, being a bond resolution dated December 15, 2020, except to the extent that any indebtedness shall have been contracted or encumbrances made thereunder. The purpose of this superseding bond resolution is to effect the following to increase the maximum estimated cost of the purpose to \$9,500,000, and to provide \$9,500,000 bonds therefor, an increase of \$3,000,000 over the \$6,500,000 bonds authorized under Resolution No. 388 of 2020.

Section 8. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably

expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the objects or purposes described herein.

MUNICIPALITIES CONTRACTS 2022

Town of Brighton

\$7,085

This program works with teens in the community to develop and implement the Brighton asset building Initiative. A Youth Board will work throughout the community in promoting awareness, support and opportunities for asset building in Brighton. The Youth Board, under the direction of the recreation supervisor, will work closely with Brighton Asset Network in developing and achieving this initiative.

2. Town of Chili

\$6,118

This program is designed to promote the constructive use of leisure time to address youth problems in our community. Opportunities for youth, ages 10-19, to participate in leisure and social activities are provided throughout the year.

3. Village of East Rochester

\$1,409

To provide homework assistance, tutoring, and education presentations. Youth are provided opportunities to become involved in community service projects and leadership development through the East Rochester Youth Activity Center. .

4. Town of Greece

\$38,345

The programs provide youth under 21 years of age with recreational, social, educational, physical, and selfhelp opportunities to help mold them into responsible young adults, including diversion program to divert youth from Family Court and a counseling program for the general youth population.

5. Town of Hamlin

\$2,101

To serve youth from ages 18 months to 16 years on how to get along and work with others of all ages through play group, playground and youth groups. These programs offer social, education, leisure and community service opportunities.

6. Town of Henrietta

\$23,413

Services for youth, age 20 and under (and their families), who are experiencing problems in the areas of relationships, communication, personal, career planning, and substance abuse. ATTACHMENT A PRIVATE AGENCY CONTRACTS 2022

- 1. Center for Youth Services, Inc.-Prevention Education & Prevention Counseling Program The Prevention Education and Prevention Counseling Program bring comprehensive youth services to youth and their families throughout Monroe County and the City of Rochester as well as at school-based sites. Prevention/education groups and workshops, crisis intervention, counseling, case coordination, access to runaway/nomeless youth housing and follow-up services are provided.
- 2. Compeer Rochester Inc.- Youth and Family Mentoring Program \$23,274 This program provides support and guidance to disadvantaged youth and their families who are struggling with poverty, mental illness and/or parental incarceration. They do this by matching youth with adult community volunteers who develop a one-on-one, trusting relationship and become a positive role model for youth...
- 3. The Urban League of Rochester, Inc. -- Youth Intervention Program \$27.078 The youth intervention program provides mentoring support following the research based Bry Behavioral Monitoring and Reinforcement Program to students at risk of being suspended or dropping out of school. The Bry model involves regular monitoring and mentoring and student, teacher and parent contacts. The mentoring program will provide youth achievement mentoring services and support to improve their academic, social and emotional behavior both within the school setting and their community.
- 4. Coordinated Care Services, Inc. Programming & Events \$30,437 This program combines support from the New York State Office for Children and Family Services with Rochester Area Community Foundation match support to provide skills training, effective program models training, best practices, organizational capacity building and consultation services to youth services. Youth Bureau funded programs and municipalities that provide services to youth and families participate in practice skills enhancement, program model improvements and explore organizational change processes to more effectively provide youth development and reach outcomes.
- 5. The Community Place of Greater Rochester Beacon Centers for Excellence \$46,531 This program provides neighborhood-based after-school and summer programs to youth, ages 5-20 years and their families residing in Northeast Rochester. The program encourages the development of social and emotional competencies, assets, and the increase of protective factors with youth. Services include youth development activities such as homework assistance, leadership skills, community service and interpersonal skill building as well as intervention services within the home and school to address school or family behavioral management problems. Two evidence-based program curriculums, PATHS (Promoting Alternative Thinking Strategies and TOP (Teen Outreach Program) are used with the programming.
- 6. Charles Settlement House-READY by 21 \$10,454 The program provides a teen club using the evidence-based Teen Outreach Program (TOP) with mentoring and engagement in community service and service-learning opportunities for NW city youth. Curricula/programming includes media literacy, employment readiness, social and emotional skill development and intergenerational programming with Charles' Senior Center.
- 7. Coordinated Care Services, Inc.-Youth as Resources \$51,174 Youth as Resources (YAR) is a community-based youth philanthropy program. YAR provides small grants (up to \$1000) to young people to design and carry out community service projects that address social issues or problems in the Monroe County community. YAR seeks to empower and engage youth as partners with adults in creating positive community change and development. Youth and adult members govern the YAR board that provides grants to local organizations that are overseen by youth. Youth as Resources assists in increasing participant's connectedness to their community through participation in the planning, implementation, and evaluation of their own projects.

- 8. Champion Academy Extreme Mentoring and Empowerment Initiative \$27,969

 The Champion Academy Extreme Mentoring and Empowerment Initiative seeks to solve Rochester's teen crisis by providing participants with the much-needed accountability, consistency and support necessary to overcome past obstacles and maximize their human potential. The Extreme Mentoring & Empowerment Model (EME Model) is an innovative, impactful, cost-effective and scalable solution to help teens in poverty maximize their potential. This model combines firsthand knowledge of the nuances of poverty along with an in-depth understanding of the strategic opportunities available to maximize academic and professional success. The EME Model is built largely upon eleven programmatic principles that provide an unmatched ecosystem of collective support for each of its participants.
- 9. Consumer Credit Counseling Service of Rochester "Go for Gold"

 The "Go for Gold" peer financial education program is focused on achieving self-sufficiency for at-risk youth and their families through an asset-based curriculum. The experience of working with vulnerable populations positions CCCS to make a deep and measurable impact in the Rochester community. "Go for Gold" peer educator trainings are conducted on-site at partner program locations (host sites) in conjunction with their normal program operations. Four (4) separate workshops are presented in one-hour segments using interactive, hands-on activities and demonstrations including role-play and problem-solving. Handouts and resource materials are provided at each session. Each class features education in four key areas in order to equip participants to deliver a 10-minute, financial workshop.
- 10. Villa of Hope Work Based Learning Program

 The Villa of Hope's Work Based Learning (WBL) Program is designed to build assets by increasing personal and professional skills and preparing these youth with the knowledge and skills needed in order to sustain economic self-sufficiency. The WBL Program prepares youth, ages 16-20, with the skills that are necessary to obtain a sustainable wage. We will work to prepare youth to succeed in today's economy, by exposing them to high-growth middle-skill occupations in promising fields such, as manufacturing and information technology.
- 11. Center For Community Alternatives

 Center for Community Alternatives is in the initial stages of developing a program that would pair youth charged with crimes (and/or coming home from detention or incarceration) to a "justice peer." Peer services are widely used in the mental health/substance use arenas and are effective. There is some movement recently to get a "justice peer" certification off the ground, for folks who, in addition to being certified as a recovery or other already-existing professional peer, happen also to have a lived experience of arrest, incarceration, etc. This will be piloted in Rochester, NY.
- 12. TBD-Pending Final Allocations \$25,000

 Provide opportunities for healthy youth development. A wide range of pursuits are offered during afterschool, weekend and evening hours. Engage youth in a variety of activities, programs, special events impact
 life skills training in a safe and healthy environment. Prevention/education, counseling intervention, access to

OUTCOME ASSESSMEN METHODOLOGY:

All program activities are designed to promote goal achievement and be quantified, measured and tracked. Routine (monthly, quarterly, annually) reviews of progress activities and outcomes allow modifications to be made as needed to support successful outcomes and goal achievement. Measurement tools are developed, and data is collected, reviewed and analyzed by program administrators and the agency Board of Directors, and is used to mark progress toward program goals and to make quality improvements. Measuring program performance is accomplished by querying the agency's Management Information System (which has been maintained for over 23 years) to generate utilization, outcome and impact reports no less than quarterly which is essential to planning updating revising and developing new procedures, prolocols and services.

Reports compare actual outcomes to the projected outcomes and are used to inform service methodology or program objective modifications needed. These reports also identify emerging trends, changes in client demographics, geographic distribution and service utilization. Program goals are quantified so that data can be collected and progress evaluated. The efficacy of services/activities is reflected in the impact (i.e., knowledge galned, skills developed, and behavior change) on the participant and by their direct feedback as to its relevancy. Service methodology is modified as needed to improve efficacy. In this way, services remain client-centered and directed, current and meaningful and successful services/activities are noted and replicated.

Compeer Rochester is unique in our community because we provide the services of a bilingual (Spanish) Family Peer Advocate whose role is to assist families through challenges that arise that might have an offsetting impact on an otherwise effective mentoring relationship.



The facility will be a maximum of .5 acres and will be located at the rear of the parcel, with no frontage along Lake Ave. The brownfield site has been previously disturbed at the time a prior building was constructed and again when the parcel was remediated. The eastern edge of the property is more than 200 feet from the Genesee River and separated from the river by other developed parcels. It is not on, or adjacent to, a NYS Critical Environmental Area designated by the City of Rochester along the Genesee River, floodplain, wetland or archaeological site. The site is not adjacent to any properties on, or eligible for, the state or federal register of historic sites. This site, and neighboring parcels are a mix of former industrial and commercial properties and is now zoned for light industrial, commercial, retail, and regional/community amenities. All construction and development will need to be in accordance with City of Rochester zoning and building codes.



RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$850,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, NEW YORK, TO FINANCE THE COST OF THE REPLACEMENT OF THE SHERIFF'S INCIDENT COMMAND POST VEHICLE IN AND FOR SAID COUNTY, AT AN ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST OF \$850,000 AND SUPERSEDING THE BOND RESOLUTION ADOPTED ON DECEMBER 14, 2021 (RESOLUTION NO. 502 OF 2021)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE AFFIRMATIVE VOTE OF **NOT LESS THAN TWO-THIRDS OF THE TOTAL VOTING STRENGTH** OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. For the object or purpose of financing the cost of the replacement of the Sheriff's Incident Command Post Vehicle in and for the County of Monroe, New York (the "County"), there are hereby authorized to be issued \$850,000 bonds of the County, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The duly adopted current Capital Budget of the County, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is hereby amended to provide for the appropriation of an additional \$100,000 to pay the cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose (\$750,000 having been heretofore appropriated from one or more Capital Budgets). The period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is five (5) years, pursuant to subdivision 29 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost thereof is \$850,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$850,000 bonds of said County herein authorized, provided, however, that to the extent any state and/or federal aid and/or grant and/or gift is received for the aforesaid purpose, the County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to accept and shall use such funds to redeem any outstanding indebtedness incurred for such purpose or apply it, dollar for dollar, to reduce the amount of bonds to be issued for such purpose.

Section 3. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, the chief fiscal officer of the County under the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may sell such bonds or notes at public or private sale, at a discount or premium, at fixed or variable rates of interest or at no interest whatsoever, or as capital appreciation bonds, and with such amortization of principal as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine is most favorable to the County, and in compliance with any rules of the State Comptroller applicable thereto. Such bonds or notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, consistent with the provisions of the Local

Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may, in the event it is determined to issue variable rate bonds or notes, enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance, sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds or notes, as authorized under Section 54.90 of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer is also authorized to enter into such agreements and take such other action as may be necessary or appropriate and lawful to assure that, to the extent possible, (i) interest on the bonds and notes authorized hereby will not be includable in the gross income, for federal income tax purposes, of the recipients thereof, and (ii) to enable the purchaser thereof to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12. The Director of Finance — Chief Financial Officer is hereby further delegated all powers of this County Legislature with respect to agreements for credit enhancement, derived from and pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, for such bonds or notes, including, but not limited to the determination of the provider of such credit enhancement facility or facilities and the terms and contents of any agreement or agreements related thereto.

Section 5. All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds or notes, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds or notes, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds or notes, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds or notes, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds or notes (and if said bonds or notes are to be executed in the name of the County by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the County), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds or notes, or may contract on behalf of the County for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds or notes shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals, in addition to those required by Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes, as authorized by this resolution, may be contested only if:

- such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this
 resolution are not substantially complied with, and

an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or

3) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This resolution shall supersede Resolution No. 502 of 2021, being a bond resolution dated December 14, 2021, except to the extent that any indebtedness shall have been contracted or encumbrances made thereunder. The purpose of this superseding bond resolution is to effect the following: to increase the maximum estimated cost of the purpose to \$850,000, and to provide \$850,000 bonds therefor, an increase of \$100,000 over the \$750,000 bonds authorized under Resolution No. 502 of 2021, as amended.

Section 8. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the objects or purposes described herein.

Section 9. This resolution shall take effect in accordance with Section C2-7 of the Monroe County Charter and the Clerk of the Legislature is hereby authorized and directed to publish this resolution or a summary hereof to be published, together with a notice attached in substantially the form and in the manner prescribed by Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Honorable Legislators:

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Republican Commissioner Lisa P. Nicolay and Democratic Commissioner Jackie Ortiz of the Board of Elections

I recommend that Your Honorable Body enact a Local Law authorizing a lease by negotiation with 400 WEST AVENUE LLC to a total term of ten (10) years for office and warehouse space and operation of the Monroe County Board of Elections.

The space will be located at 400 West Avenue, City of Rochester, New York and will consist of approximately 51,344 square feet located on an 18.28 acre parcel. Monroe County will pay rent of \$9.50 per square foot for years one (1) through ten (10). The lease may be renewed for two (2) additional five (5) year terms upon mutual consent of the parties.

A lease of space at 400 West Avenue, would enable the Board of Elections to be centrally located in the City of Rochester while moving three (3) separate locations to one common space. The current locations are outdated and would to be more costly as we move forward and would require significant improvement. This also allows for fixed rent for the entire ten (10) years of the term at a single digit rent, which includes all expenses except utilities and janitorial expenses.

The specific legislative actions required are:





The Victim and Witness Assistance Grant Program funds a portion of the salary of three (3) existing full-time Crime Victim Specialist positions, two (2) existing full-time Victim Witness Advocate positions and one (1) new full-time Bilingual Clerk in the District Attorney's Office. In addition, the funding covers the costs of five (5) cell phones and grant-mandated travel for training. Crime Victim Specialists and Victim Witness Advocates provide support services to felony and misdemeanor crime victims who find the judicial process a bewildering and often traumatic experience. Advocates orient victims and witnesses to procedures, assist in arranging court appearances, and help victims obtain victim compensation, among other services. This will be the forty-second year the County has received this grant. This grant is for a three-year period and represents an increase of \$281,351 from the last three-year award.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services in the amount of \$1,211,675 for the District Attorney's Office, the Office of the Sheriff, and the Department of Public Safety, Office of Probation and Community Corrections for the Gun Involved Violence Elimination ("GIVE") Partnership for the period of July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023.

This project provides resources enabling the Monroe County law enforcement community to target violent criminals and those possessing weapons in a coordinated effort to reduce violent crime in Monroe County. The ultimate goal of this partnership is to support targeted firearm and violent crime reduction efforts within Monroe County. This is the ninth year the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents an increase of \$98,066 from last year.

Funds will be used specifically to help support the following programs in the following departments:

District Attorney's Office: Partially supports eight (8) existing Assistant District Attorney
positions assigned to prosecute violent felons and criminals possessing illegal weapons and
provides the Boys and Girls Clubs of Rochester, Inc. with an \$8,000 sub-grant to continue its
Street SMART Program.

- Sheriff's Office: Supports an existing Sheriff's Criminal Investigator (50%) and a Jail Deputy (100%), and underwrites part of the overtime costs of the Office of the Sheriff's participation in joint anti-crime efforts with the other GIVE agency partners.
- Office of Probation and Community Corrections: Supports the cost of an existing Senior Probation Officer (95%), a Probation Officer for Nightwatch/Gun Part (95%), supports

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Monroe County Board of Elections Commissioners Jackie Ortiz and Lisa Nicolay.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2022 Capital Budget and Bond Resolution 388 of 2020 to provide an increase in funding for the Replacement of Voting Machines project.

The Replacement of Voting Machines project was approved by Resolution 388 of 2020 in anticipation of the New York State Board of Elections certifying new voting machines to replace the County's existing machines, which are now close to fourteen years old. New York State has narrowed down its list of potential replacement voting machines, and is close to making its certification decision.

Based on the narrowed list of potential machines and cost quotes obtained by the Monroe County Board of Elections, the total cost of the project is now estimated to be \$10,000,000. Offsetting this increase in cost, however, is an award from the New York State Board of Elections (TIER Grant) in the amount of \$757,621.02.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Amend the 2022 Capital Budget to increase funding for the Replacement of Voting Machines Project, in the amount of \$3,000,000, from \$6,500,000 to \$9,500,000, for a total project authorization of \$9,500,000.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$9,500,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, NEW YORK, TO FINANCE THE COST OF REPLACEMENT OF VOTING MACHINES IN AND FOR SAID COUNTY, AT AN ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST OF \$9,500,000 AND SUPERSEDING THE BOND RESOLUTION ADOPTED ON DECEMBER 15, 2020 (RESOLUTION NO. 388 OF 2020, AS AMENDED)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE AFFIRMATIVE VOTE OF **NOT LESS THAN TWO-THIRDS OF THE TOTAL VOTING STRENGTH** OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. For the object or purpose of financing the cost of the replacement of voting machines in and for the County of Monroe, New York (the "County"), there are hereby authorized to be issued \$9,500,000 bonds of the County, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The duly adopted current Capital Budget of the County, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is hereby amended to provide for the appropriation of an additional \$3,000,000 to pay the cost of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes (\$6,500,000 having been heretofore appropriated from one or more Capital Budgets). The period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes is ten (10) years, pursuant to subdivision 31 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost thereof is \$9,500,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$9,500,000 bonds of said County herein authorized, provided, however, that to the extent any state and/or federal aid and/or grant and/or gift is received for the aforesaid purpose, the County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to accept and shall use such funds to redeem any outstanding indebtedness incurred for such purpose or apply it, dollar for dollar, to reduce the amount of bonds to be issued for such purpose.

Section 3. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, the chief fiscal officer of the County under the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may sell such bonds or notes at public or private sale, at a discount or premium, at fixed or variable rates of interest or at no interest whatsoever, or as capital appreciation bonds, and with such amortization of principal as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine is most favorable to the County, and in compliance with any rules of the State Comptroller applicable thereto.

Such bonds or notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may, in the event it is determined to issue variable rate bonds or notes, enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance, sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds or notes, as authorized under Section 54.90 of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer is also authorized to enter into such agreements and take such other action as may be necessary or appropriate and lawful to assure that, to the extent possible, (i) interest on the bonds and notes authorized hereby will not be includable in the gross income, for federal income tax purposes, of the recipients thereof, and (ii) to enable the purchaser thereof to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12. The Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer is hereby further delegated all powers of this County Legislature with respect to agreements for credit enhancement, derived from and pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, for such bonds or notes, including, but not limited to the determination of the provider of such credit enhancement facility or facilities and the terms and contents of any agreement or agreements related thereto.

Section 5. All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds or notes, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds or notes, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds or notes, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds or notes, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds or notes (and if said bonds or notes are to be executed in the name of the County by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the County), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds or notes, or may contract on behalf of the County for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds or notes shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals, in addition to those required by Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes, as authorized by this resolution, may be contested only if:

- such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this
 resolution are not substantially complied with, and
 - an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or
- 3) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This resolution shall supersede Resolution No. 388 of 2020, being a bond resolution dated December 15, 2020, except to the extent that any indebtedness shall have been contracted or encumbrances made thereunder. The purpose of this superseding bond resolution is to effect the following to increase the maximum estimated cost of the purpose to \$9,500,000, and to provide \$9,500,000 bonds therefor, an increase of \$3,000,000 over the \$6,500,000 bonds authorized under Resolution No. 388 of 2020.

Section 8. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably

expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the objects or purposes described herein.

Section 9. This resolution shall take effect in accordance with Section C2-7 of the Monroe County Charter and the Clerk of the Legislature is hereby authorized and directed to publish this resolution or a summary hereof to be published, together with a notice attached in substantially the form and in the manner prescribed by Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize intermunicipal agreements with municipalities for Rochester-Monroe County Youth Bureau Programs related to the currently approved Child and Family Services Plan in a total amount not to exceed \$184,056 for the period of January 1, 2022 through December 31, 2022. The list of municipalities, along with a description of the youth services each will provide and the breakdown of funding to each, is in Attachment A.

The Rochester-Monroe County Youth Bureau enters into fifteen (15) intermunicipal agreements each year. New York State Office of Children and Family Services makes available recreation and youth services funds for all towns and villages via a pass through to local counties. Allocation ceilings are determined through a formula, based on the youth population of each town or village provided by the state. The recreation and youth services programs to be provided are available to all youth that reside in the respective towns and villages. Recreational programs include a variety of athletic, social, artistic, and cultural events. Youth services programs include youth and family counseling, after-school programs, leadership development, and employment readiness workshops. This year's funding remains unchanged from last year's funding.

Programs will be evaluated consistently and continually through three methods utilized by the Youth Bureau, documented in its Monitoring and Evaluation Systems Procedures Manual. These methods include: 1) self-report, requiring agency submission of three (3) different self-report instruments; 2) yearly outcome evaluation assessment of contract outcomes; and 3) expenditure review. These contracts will allow for the provision of a comprehensive range of youth services and programs by the municipalities specified in Attachment A.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute intermunicipal agreements, and any amendments thereto, with each municipality listed in Attachment A for Rochester-Monroe County Youth Bureau Programs related to the currently approved Child and Family Services Plan in a total amount not to exceed \$184,056 for the period of January 1, 2022 through December 31, 2022.
- Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute any applications, contracts, agreements
 and amendments thereto, with New York State and/or the municipalities listed in Attachment A to
 increase or decrease the agreement amount and to extend the length of the agreement(s) in order to
 maximize state reimbursements for these purposes.

- 3. Funding for these agreements is 100% reimbursable by the Office of Children and Family Services. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize contracts with the agencies listed in Attachment A, in a total amount not to exceed \$479,071 for Rochester-Monroe County Youth Bureau programs for the period of January 1, 2022 through December 31, 2022.

The Rochester Monroe County Youth Bureau enters into approximately ten (10) contracts each year in amounts over \$20,000, with matching funds required for Runaway and Homeless Youth providers only. Contracted services directly correspond to the assessed needs and service objectives of the Rochester-Monroe County Youth Bureau and as required and approved by the New York State Office of Children and Family Services. This year's funding is unchanged from last year's funding.

The agencies were selected through a competitive request for qualifications process, based on the New York State required County Child and Family Services Plan, in which services to be contracted must directly correspond to the assessed needs, priority focus areas, and outcomes of the plan; State Executive Law procedures and criteria for selecting programs; and State certification requirements for runaway and homeless shelter programs.

Contract programs will be evaluated consistently and continually through three methods utilized by the Youth Bureau, documented in its Monitoring and Evaluation Systems Procedures Manual. These methods include: 1) self-report, requiring agency submission of three (3) different self-report instruments; 2) yearly outcome evaluation assessment of contract outcomes; and 3) expenditure review. These contracts will allow for the provision of a comprehensive range of youth services and programs by the not-for-profit agencies specified in Attachment A.

ATTACHMENT A PRIVATE AGENCY CONTRACTS 2022

- Center for Youth Services, Inc.-Prevention Education & Prevention Counseling Program \$ 112,738
 The Prevention Education and Prevention Counseling Program bring comprehensive youth services to youth and their families throughout Monroe County and the City of Rochester as well as at school-based sites.

 Prevention/education groups and workshops, crisis intervention, counseling, case coordination, access to runaway/homeless youth housing and follow-up services are provided.
- 2. Compeer Rochester Inc.- Youth and Family Mentoring Program
 This program provides support and guidance to disadvantaged youth and their families who are struggling with poverty, mental illness and/or parental incarceration. They do this by matching youth with adult community volunteers who develop a one-on-one, trusting relationship and become a positive role model for youth.
- 3. The Urban League of Rochester, Inc. Youth Intervention Program

 \$27,078

 The youth intervention program provides mentoring support following the research based Bry Behavioral Monitoring and Reinforcement Program to students at risk of being suspended or dropping out of school. The Bry model involves regular monitoring and mentoring and student, teacher and parent contacts. The mentoring program will provide youth achievement mentoring services and support to improve their academic, social and emotional behavior both within the school setting and their community.
- 4. Coordinated Care Services, Inc. Programming & Events \$30,437

 This program combines support from the New York State Office for Children and Family Services with Rochester Area Community Foundation match support to provide skills training, effective program models training, best practices, organizational capacity building and consultation services to youth services. Youth Bureau funded programs and municipalities that provide services to youth and families participate in practice skills enhancement, program model improvements and explore organizational change processes to more effectively provide youth development and reach outcomes.
- 5. The Community Place of Greater Rochester Beacon Centers for Excellence \$46,531

 This program provides neighborhood-based after-school and summer programs to youth, ages 5-20 years and their families residing in Northeast Rochester. The program encourages the development of social and emotional competencies, assets, and the increase of protective factors with youth. Services include youth development activities such as homework assistance, leadership skills, community service and interpersonal skill building as well as intervention services within the home and school to address school or family behavioral management problems. Two evidence-based program curriculums, PATHS (Promoting Alternative Thinking Strategies and TOP (Teen Outreach Program) are used with the programming.
- 6. Charles Settlement House-READY by 21 \$10,464

 The program provides a teen club using the evidence-based Teen Outreach Program (TOP) with mentoring and engagement in community service and service-learning opportunities for NW city youth. Curricula/programming includes media literacy, employment readiness, social and emotional skill development and intergenerational programming with Charles' Senior Center.
- 7. Coordinated Care Services, Inc.-Youth as Resources
 Youth as Resources (YAR) is a community-based youth philanthropy program. YAR provides small grants (up to \$1000) to young people to design and carry out community service projects that address social issues or problems in the Monroe County community. YAR seeks to empower and engage youth as partners with adults in creating positive community change and development. Youth and adult members govern the YAR board that provides grants to local organizations that are overseen by youth. Youth as Resources assists in increasing participant's connectedness to their community through participation in the planning, implementation, and evaluation of their own projects.

8. Champion Academy Extreme Mentoring and Empowerment Initiative

\$27,969

The Champion Academy Extreme Mentoring and Empowerment Initiative seeks to solve Rochester's teen crisis by providing participants with the much-needed accountability, consistency and support necessary to overcome past obstacles and maximize their human potential. The Extreme Mentoring & Empowerment Model (EME Model) is an innovative, impactful, cost- effective and scalable solution to help teens in poverty maximize their potential. This model combines firsthand knowledge of the nuances of poverty along with an in-depth understanding of the strategic opportunities available to maximize academic and professional success. The EME Model is built largely upon eleven programmatic principles that provide an unmatched ecosystem of collective support for each of its participants.

9. Consumer Credit Counseling Service of Rochester "Go for Gold"

\$27,970

The "Go for Gold" peer financial education program is focused on achieving self-sufficiency for at-risk youth and their families through an asset-based curriculum. The experience of working with vulnerable populations positions CCCS to make a deep and measurable impact in the Rochester community. "Go for Gold" peer educator trainings are conducted on-site at partner program locations (host sites) in conjunction with their normal program operations. Four (4) separate workshops are presented in one-hour segments using interactive, hands-on activities and demonstrations including role-play and problem-solving. Handouts and resource materials are provided at each session. Each class features education in four key areas in order to equip participants to deliver a 10-minute, financial workshop.

10. Villa of Hope Work Based Learning Program

\$27,970

The Villa of Hope's Work Based Learning (WBL) Program is designed to build assets by increasing personal and professional skills and preparing these youth with the knowledge and skills needed in order to sustain economic self-sufficiency. The WBL Program prepares youth, ages 16-20, with the skills that are necessary to obtain a sustainable wage. We will work to prepare youth to succeed in today's economy, by exposing them to high-growth middle-skill occupations in promising fields such, as manufacturing and information technology.

11. Center For Community Alternatives

\$68,466

Center for Community Alternatives is in the initial stages of developing a program that would pair youth charged with crimes (and/or coming home from detention or incarceration) to a "justice peer." Peer services are widely used in the mental health/substance use arenas and are effective. Youth Intervention Program \$27,078 The youth intervention program provides mentoring support following the research based Bry Behavioral Monitoring and Reinforcement Program to students at risk of being suspended or dropping out of school. The Bry model involves regular monitoring and mentoring and student, teacher and parent contacts. The mentoring program will provide youth achievement mentoring services and support to improve their academic, social and emotional behavior both within the school setting and their community.
- 4. Coordinated Care Services, Inc. Programming & Events \$30,437 This program combines support from the New York State Office for Children and Family Services with Rochester Area Community Foundation match support to provide skills training, effective program models training, best practices, organizational capacity building and consultation services to youth services. Youth Bureau funded programs and municipalities that provide services to youth and families participate in practice skills enhancement, program model improvements and explore organizational change processes to more effectively provide youth development and reach outcomes.
- 5. The Community Place of Greater Rochester Beacon Centers for Excellence \$46,531 This program provides neighborhood-based after-school and summer programs to youth, ages 5-20 years and their families residing in Northeast Rochester. The program encourages the development of social and emotional competencies, assets, and the increase of protective factors with youth. Services include youth development activities such as homework assistance, leadership skills, community service and interpersonal skill building as well as intervention services within the home and school to address school or family behavioral management problems. Two evidence-based program curriculums, PATHS (Promoting Alternative Thinking Strategies and TOP (Teen Outreach Program) are used with the programming.
- 6. Charles Settlement House-READY by 21 The program provides a teen club using the evidence-based Teen Outreach Program (TOP) with mentoring and engagement in community service and service-learning opportunities for NW city youth. - Coordinated Care Services, Inc.-Youth as Resources \$51,174 Youth as Resources (YAR) is a community-based youth philanthropy program. YAR provides small grants (up to \$1000) to young people to design and carry out community service projects that address social issues or problems in the Monroe County community. YAR seeks to empower and engage youth as partners with adults in creating positive community change and development. Youth and adult members govern the YAR board that provides grants to local organizations that are overseen by youth. Youth as Resources assists in increasing participant's connectedness to their community through participation in the planning, Monroe County Legislature - October 11, 2022

- 8. Champion Academy Extreme Mentoring and Empowerment Initiative \$27,969 The Champion Academy Extreme Mentoring and Empowerment Initiative seeks to solve Rochester's teen crisis by providing participants with the much-needed accountability, consistency and support necessary to overcome past obstacles and maximize their human potential. The Extreme Mentoring & Empowerment Model (EME Model) is an innovative, impactful, cost- effective and scalable solution to help teens in poverty maximize their potential. This model combines firsthand knowledge of the nuances of poverty along with an in-depth understanding of the strategic opportunities available to maximize academic and professional success. The EME Model is built largely upon eleven programmatic principles that provide an unmatched ecosystem of collective support for each of its participants.
- 9. Consumer Credit Counseling Service of Rochester "Go for Gold"

 The "Go for Gold" peer financial education program is focused on achieving self-sufficiency for at-risk youth and their families through an asset-based curriculum. The experience of working with vulnerable populations positions CCCS to make a deep and measurable impact in the Rochester community. "Go for Gold" peer educator trainings are conducted on-site at partner program locations (host sites) in conjunction with their normal program operations. Four (4) separate workshops are presented in one-hour segments using interactive, hands-on activities and demonstrations including role-play and problem-solving. Handouts and resource materials are provided at each session. Each class features education in four key areas in order to equip participants to deliver a 10-minute, financial workshop.
- to. Villa of Hope Work Based Learning Program

All program activities are designed to promote goal achievement and be quantified, measured and tracked. Routine (monthly, quarterly, annually) reviews of progress activities and outcomes allow modifications to be made as needed to support successful outcomes and goal achievement. Measurement tools are developed, and data is collected, reviewed and analyzed by program administrators and the agency Board of Directors, and is used to mark progress toward program goals and to make quality improvements. Measuring program performance is accomplished by querying the agency's Management Information System (which has been maintained for over 23 years) to generate utilization, outcome and impact reports no less than quarterly which is essential to planning updating revising and developing new procedures, protocols and services.

The efficacy of services/activities is reflected in the impact (i.e., knowledge gained, skills developed, and behavior change) on the participant and by their direct feedback as to its relevancy. Service methodology is modified as needed to improve efficacy. In this way, services remain client-centered and directed, current and meaningful and successful services/activities are noted and replicated.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body determine whether leasing commercial space for Youth Mentoring and Family Support in Monroe County may have a significant adverse impact on the environment pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA").

The mentoring center will be an enhancement of Big Brothers Big Sisters of Greater Rochester NY's ("BBS") program. The mentoring center will be located at 214 Alexander Park in the City of Rochester and will enable BBBS to serve and host more youth and their mentors and provide office space for staff.

Leasing commercial space for the Youth Mentoring and Family Support in Monroe County has been preliminarily classified as an Unlisted action. The SEQRA regulations found at 6 NYCRR Part 617 requires that no agency shall carry out or approve an Action until it has complied with the requirements of SEQRA.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Determine that leasing commercial space for Youth Mentoring and Family Support in Monroe County is an Unlisted action.
- 2. Make a determination of significance regarding leasing commercial space for Youth Mentoring and Family Support in Monroe County pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.7.
- 3. Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body determine whether the Volunteers of America of Western New York, Inc.'s ("VOA") Hydroponic Farm may have a significant adverse impact on the environment pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA").

The VOA Hydroponic Farm will be built at VOA's facility at 214 Lake Avenue in the City Rochester to provide healthy food for homeless, formerly homeless, and impoverished households. The farm, which will be built as a replicable model for future hydroponic farms throughout the city and county, will provide fresh produce for people in the Northwest Quadrant of Rochester and for vulnerable populations throughout the county, including frail seniors and families experiencing homelessness. The farm will generate more than 300,000 units of fresh produce annually.

The VOA's Hydroponic Farm has been preliminarily classified as an Unlisted action. The SEQRA regulations found at 6 NYCRR Part 617 requires that no agency shall carry out or approve an Action until it has complied with the requirements of SEQRA.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Determine that the VOA's Hydroponic Farm is an Unlisted action.
- 2. Make a determination of significance regarding the VOA's Hydroponic Farm pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.7.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to take such actions to comply with the requirements of the State Environmental Quality Review Act, including without limitation, the execution of documents and the filing, distribution and publication of the documents required under the State Environmental Quality Review Act, and any other actions to implement the intent of this resolution.





The facility will be used to grow fresh produce. The facility will be a maximum of .5 acres and will be located at the rear of the parcel, with no frontage along Lake Ave. The brownfield site has been previously disturbed at the time a prior building was constructed and again when the parcel was remediated. The eastern edge of the property is more than 200 feet from the Genesee River and separated from the river by other developed parcels. It is not on, or adjacent to, a NYS Critical Environmental Area designated by the City of Rochester along the Genesee River, floodplain, wetland or archaeological site. The site is not adjacent to any properties on, or eligible for, the state or federal register of historic sites. This site, and neighboring parcels are a mix of former industrial and commercial properties and is now zoned for light industrial, commercial, retail, and regional/community amenities. All construction and development will need to be in accordance with City of Rochester zoning and building codes.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body determine whether leasing commercial space for the Deaf Refugee Advocacy Community Connections and Youth Mentoring and Family Support in Monroe County may have a significant adverse impact on the environment pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA").

The Deaf Refugee Advocacy Community Connections will provide ASL and English workshops, soft skills education, financial literacy courses, independent living skills programs, technical competencies coaching and workforce development training to refugees, immigrants, and asylees living in Monroe County who are deaf, deafblind, and/or hard of hearing. A portion of the American Rescue Plan Act funds allocated to the Deaf Refugee Advocacy Community Connections will be used to lease an approximately 2,500 square foot commercial space to provide these services.

Leasing commercial space for the Deaf Refugee Advocacy Community Connections has been preliminarily classified as an Unlisted action. The SEQRA regulations found at 6 NYCRR Part 617 requires that no agency shall carry out or approve an Action until it has complied with the requirements of SEQRA.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Determine that leasing commercial space for the Deaf Refugee Advocacy Community Connections is an Unlisted action.
- 2. Make a determination of significance regarding leasing commercial space for the Deaf Refugee Advocacy Community Connections and Youth Mentoring pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.7.

3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to take such actions to comply with the requirements of the State Environmental Quality Review Act, including without limitation, the execution of documents and the filing, distribution and publication of the documents required under the State Environmental Quality Review Act, and any other actions to implement the intent of this resolution.

This designation will have no impact on the revenues or expenditures of the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 93 of 2021 as amended by Resolutions 4, 104 and 232 of 2022, Emergency Rental Assistance program, Monroe County Eviction Prevention Pilot Initiative 2.0, to extend the time period through December 29, 2022.

Monroe County established its Eviction Prevention Pilot Initiative 2.0 after an initial award of \$15,900,965.70 from the Treasury under its Emergency Rental Assistance (ERA 1) program. Subsequently, the Treasury awarded Monroe County three reallocations of unspent ERA 1 awards made to other governments for a total ERA 1 funding award of \$18,055,212.49.

Monroe County's Eviction Prevention Pilot Initiative 2.0 program currently expires September 30, 2022, but Monroe County has requested and received an extension from the Treasury to utilize ERA 1 reallocated funds through December 29, 2022.

The specific legislative action required is to amend Resolution 93 of 2021 as amended by Resolutions 4, 104 and 232 of 2022, Emergency Rental Assistance program, Monroe County Eviction Prevention Pilot Initiative 2.0, to extend the time period through December 29, 2022

This action is a Type II action pursuant to 6 NYCRR §617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

This grant has been 100% funded by United States Department of the Treasury. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.





Honorable Legislators:

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Sheriff Todd K. Baxter.

I am requesting that Your Honorable Body amend the 2022 Capital Budget and Bond Resolution 502 of 2021 to provide an increase of funding for the Sheriff's Incident Command Post Vehicle Project, from \$750,000 to \$850,000.

The Sheriff's Office sent out to public bid their Sheriff's Command Post Vehicle on August 24, 2022, with only one sole vendor responding, Emergency Vehicle, Inc. ("EVI"). The EVI base bid value was \$799,911. The Sheriff's Office is requesting an increase up to \$850,000 to cover the overage and any unforeseen expenses with the new vehicle.

This project is scheduled to be considered by the Monroe County Planning Board on September 29, 2022.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Amend the 2022 Capital Budget to increase funding for the Sheriff's Incident Command Post Vehicle Project, in the amount of \$100,000, from \$750,000 to \$850,000, for a total project authorization of \$850,000.

2. Amend Bond Resolution 502 of 2021 to increase financing for the Sheriff's Incident Command Post Vehicle Project, capital fund 2037, in the amount of \$100,000, from \$750,000 to \$850,000, for a total project authorization of \$850,000.

This is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR §617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for this project, consistent with authorized uses, will be available in capital fund 2037 once the additional financing authorization requested herein is approved, and in any capital fund(s) created for the same intended purpose.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$850,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, NEW YORK, TO FINANCE THE COST OF THE REPLACEMENT OF THE SHERIFF'S INCIDENT COMMAND POST VEHICLE IN AND FOR SAID COUNTY, AT AN ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST OF \$850,000 AND SUPERSEDING THE BOND RESOLUTION ADOPTED ON DECEMBER 14, 2021 (RESOLUTION NO. 502 OF 2021)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE AFFIRMATIVE VOTE OF **NOT LESS THAN TWO-THIRDS OF THE TOTAL VOTING STRENGTH** OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. For the object or purpose of financing the cost of the replacement of the Sheriff's Incident Command Post Vehicle in and for the County of Monroe, New York (the "County"), there are hereby authorized to be issued \$850,000 bonds of the County, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The duly adopted current Capital Budget of the County, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is hereby amended to provide for the appropriation of an additional \$100,000 to pay the cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose (\$750,000 having been heretofore appropriated from one or more Capital Budgets). The period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is five (5) years, pursuant to subdivision 29 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost thereof is \$850,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$850,000 bonds of said County herein authorized, provided, however, that to the extent any state and/or federal aid and/or grant and/or gift is received for the aforesaid purpose, the County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to accept and shall use such funds to redeem any outstanding indebtedness incurred for such purpose or apply it, dollar for dollar, to reduce the amount of bonds to be issued for such purpose.

Section 3. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, the chief fiscal officer of the County under the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may sell such bonds or notes at public or private sale, at a discount or premium, at fixed or variable rates of interest or at no interest whatsoever, or as capital appreciation bonds, and with such amortization of principal as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine is most favorable to the County, and in compliance with any rules of the State Comptroller applicable thereto. Such bonds or notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, consistent with the provisions of the Local

Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may, in the event it is determined to issue variable rate bonds or notes, enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance, sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds or notes, as authorized under Section 54.90 of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer is also authorized to enter into such agreements and take such other action as may be necessary or appropriate and lawful to assure that, to the extent possible, (i) interest on the bonds and notes authorized hereby will not be includable in the gross income, for federal income tax purposes, of the recipients thereof, and (ii) to enable the purchaser thereof to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12. The Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer is hereby further delegated all powers of this County Legislature with respect to agreements for credit enhancement, derived from and pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, for such bonds or notes, including, but not limited to the determination of the provider of such credit enhancement facility or facilities and the terms and contents of any agreement or agreements related thereto.

Section 5. All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds or notes, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds or notes, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds or notes, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds or notes, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds or notes (and if said bonds or notes are to be executed in the name of the County by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the County), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds or notes, or may contract on behalf of the County for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds or notes shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals, in addition to those required by Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes, as authorized by this resolution, may be contested only if:

- such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and

an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or

3) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This resolution shall supersede Resolution No. 502 of 2021, being a bond resolution dated December 14, 2021, except to the extent that any indebtedness shall have been contracted or encumbrances made thereunder. The purpose of this superseding bond resolution is to effect the following to increase the maximum estimated cost of the purpose to \$850,000, and to provide \$850,000 bonds therefor, an increase of \$100,000 over the \$750,000 bonds authorized under Resolution No. 502 of 2021, as amended.

Section 8. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the objects or purposes described herein.

Authorizing the Acceptance and Payment of Health Care and Mental Hygiene

Worker Bonuses to Monroe County Employees

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize the acceptance and payment of Health Care and Mental Hygiene Worker Bonuses to Monroe County employees pursuant to Section 367-w of New York's Social Services Law ("Section 367-w").

On April 9, 2022, as part of the New York State Budget, Section 367-w was enacted to provide Health Care and Mental Hygiene Worker Bonuses to health care and mental hygiene workers. This legislation is an effort to recruit and retain health care and mental hygiene workers and their support staff.

Section 367-w provides for a bonus of up to \$1,500 per employee based upon hours worked during a six-month vesting period. Section 367-w sets forth a schedule of five vesting periods from October of 2021 through May of 2024. Employees are eligible for a maximum of \$3,000 during the five vesting periods. Employee eligibility is solely determined by Section 367-w and based upon an employee's job title as set forth by the New York State Department of Health.

In early August, the New York State Department of Health released guidelines detailing the process required for Monroe County to submit bonus claims on behalf of its eligible employees. Pursuant to these guidelines, claims are to be submitted through an online claims portal. Claims for the first vesting period, which ran from October 1, 2021 through March 31, 2022 were due by September 2, 2022. On September 1, 2022, Monroe County timely submitted claims on behalf of its eligible employees.

Under Section 367-w, once payment is made by the state to an eligible employer, such as Monroe County, an employer must pay bonuses to its eligible employees within 30 days of receipt of the bonus.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept Health Care and Mental Hygiene Worker Bonus payments from the State of New York pursuant to Section 367-w in an amount not to exceed \$700,000.
- 2. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to make payment of Health Care and Mental Hygiene Worker Bonus payments to eligible Monroe County employees pursuant to Section 367-w.
- 3. Amend the 2022 operating budget of Monroe Community Hospital, hospital fund 9012, funds center 6201010000 Administration, in the amount of \$607,300; the Department of Public Health, general fund 9001, funds center 5801010000 Public Health Administration, in the amount of \$49,900; the Department of Aviation, airport fund 9010, funds center 8101010000 Airport Administration, in the amount of \$27,000; the Department of Human Services, general fund 9001, funds center 5701010000 Mental Health Administration, in the amount of \$8,800; and the Office of the Sheriff, general fund 9001, funds center 3801010000 Sheriff Administration, in the amount of \$7,000.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR §617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for the Health Care and Mental Hygiene Worker Bonuses is being provided by the State of New York pursuant to Section 367-w. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that this matter receive favorable action by Your Honorable Body.
