Memorializing Referrat Memorializing Governor Kathy Hochul to Withdraw Plans to House Migrants on Taxpayer-Funded SUNY Campuses and President Joe Biden to Properly Address

Honorable Legislators:

The United States of America and New York State is currently in an immigration crisis, with record number of illegal entries on our borders. According to the New York Post, over 72.000 migrants have arrived since last spring with more than 60% living in 160 taxpayer-funded emergency shelters and hotels. As a result, New York City has become overwhelmed by the number of migrants located to our largest city. Now, New York City Mayor Adams and Governor Kathy Hochul seek to use even more taxpayer dollars and facilities to bail them out of this crisis that their policies, combined with those of federal allies like President Biden, helped create.

To bail them out, Governor Hochul has issued an Executive Order declaring a State of Emergency in New York in order to leverage state-controlled taxpayer-funded SUNY campuses to house the influx of migrants. This has been met with widespread pushback that we, the undersigned, do strongly echo.

First, this is insulting to this community who are already experiencing our own, preexisting housing crisis to support our underserved community including homeless mothers, fathers, veterans and more. The forced importation of migrants would exacerbate an existing crisis which could jeopardize the health, safety, security, and welfare of not only our vulnerable population, but also the migrants aimed to be placed here.

To further insult our community, this plan would provide the same room and board to migrants free of charge that many of our families work and save for years or in debt themselves thousands of dollars to afford. The same students who, when they return in fall, would need to utilize the rooms and thus creating a second self-imposed crisis since there is no guarantee that placed migrants will have found a long-term place to live, a logistical nightmare that will overwhelm local communities.

However, this second crisis is almost guaranteed to come regardless as local communities already seeking ways to provide for our vulnerable residents facing higher costs from the grocery store to the gas station. The influx would add thousands to our vulnerable population and could

take resources from our residents already fighting here. The Governor cannot simply just drop off buses of migrants and say 'welcome home.' Our small local towns with SUNY campuses like Brockport, Geneseo, and elsewhere, are not designed or have the capacity to handle this unprecedented increase in population. To this point, people need more than just a home to provide, and without the means to do so, the means to provide food, clothes, and other essentials will fall to taxpayers already experiencing the high taxes and inflation of New York State. As even New York City Mayor Adams has said, "New Yorkers are angry...we have not asked for this...there was never any agreement to take on the job of supporting thousands of asylum seekers."

The failure of our federal government to properly enforce our immigration laws and to address the immigration crisis facing our country should not and cannot fall on the backs of Upstate New York taxpayers and families. As Congresswoman Elise Stefanik stated, "Upstate New York is not a sanctuary city to clean up Joe Biden's catastrophic border crisis...this decision does nothing to address the Biden Border Crisis." The chaos at America's borders must be addressed for the betterment of both residents and those seeking to come here legally.

Therefore, we urge you to join us in calling upon Governor Kathy Hochul to reverse plans to house migrants on taxpayer-funded SUNY campuses and call upon President Joe Biden to enforce our immigration laws, properly address our border crisis and put our communities first.

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Re: Memorializing Governor Kathy Hochul to Veto A.4282B/S.3505B "An Act to Amend the Town Law, the Village Law, the County Law, and the Municipal Home Rule Law, in Relation to Moving Certain Elections to Even-Numbered Years"

Honorable Legislators:

During a time of record voter engagement, rapidly changing and growing information streams, and universal and expanded voting access, New York State seeks to move local elections to even-numbered years under the guise of "voter participation and improving democracy." For years, members of the New York State Legislature have attempted to usurp the local authority of Counties across New York State but have, prior to last Friday, held off following widespread pushback from municipalities and voters across the state. Unfortunately, as stated, New York State Legislator's ignored this near universal years-long opposition and rammed through the bill to passage in the 11th hour of this year's Legislative Session.

The reasoning behind the legislation is flawed for many reasons. First off, the proponents of this unconstitutional change state that having odd-year elections "confuses" voters. This is insulting to the millions of voters in New York who turn out to vote year in and year out across the state and to County Boards of Elections who work hard to inform voters when and where they have elections. Voters choosing to only vote in local elections are not confused, they are focused, and choose to engage on the elected officials closed to them – these voters are focused on the governments most impactful to their daily lives.

Adding in local elections for County Executive, County Legislator and more, to the list of elections held on even-years including President, Congress, Senate and/or Governor, Attorney General, State Senate and Assembly will only further lessen voter engagement, not increase it. Local elections have been held on odd-number years for this very reason – it allows important local issues to receive the attention and complexities they deserve. These issues are community-driven and fought for by candidates supported by neighbors, not the multi-million dollar campaigns of the federal government. This means that a County Legislator hoping to share their platform on important local issues from property taxes and sales taxes to local parks improvements will have their voice drowned out by the million dollar advertisements of Presidents and Congressman., local elections being in separate years from state and federal ones allows for voters to be able to separate local issues from national ones. Instead of our residents getting to hear a

platform on how they can keep more money in their pockets to raise a family, the airwaves will be consumed by the divisive politics of the federal government.

The last remaining talking point of supporters is that this shift will 'save money.' While this would be a new but welcomed priority from Albany, this is not the case. As the same proponents provide carve-outs for certain elected positions to still be held in even years, they claim this will mean Board of Elections will reduce the number of elections it holds. This is simply incorrect, and even in the event that all local elections were moved, would not result in any meaningful cost savings to taxpayers.

On top of all this, State-lawmakers could be doing all this just to protect themselves from the threat of local government officials making the ascent to Albany. When State incumbents are challenged, it is oftentimes by a local elected official, such as a Town Supervisor or County Legislator. Now, for example, if a County Legislator wanted to run for a State or Federal Office, they would need to relinquish their seat in order to run thus creating a barrier of protection for State elected from effective and popular local leaders. This could deprive constituents of a quality representative or even cause some to not want to risk leaving their current position to effect greater change.

In summation, while the stated purpose of this legislation (namely, increased voter turnout and participation in local elections) may be noble, the reasons 'behind the scene' and likely consequences are harmful, including the drowning out of local issues, lack of cost-saving, and incumbency protection. For these reasons, I ask that you join me in urging Governor Kathy Hochul to veto A.4282B/S.3505B so that the essential reasons of odd-year local elections may be retained.



Re: Memorializing Governor Kathy Hochul and the New York State Legislature to Oppose Allowing a Casino in Monroe County as Part of the Seneca Gaming Compact

Honorable Legislators:

This is an urgent resolution opposing the siting of a casino in Monroe County as part of a Seneca Gaming Compact, currently under negotiation between Governor Kathy Hochul and the Seneca Nation.

The evidence is clear - casinos do not create new wealth, employment, or tourism. Rather, a casino would cannibalize existing dollars spent in our community. Casinos have a long track record in other communities of hurting retail sales, serving as a drain on the local economy. Tax revenue from casinos is not new money because these are dollars that would be spent in other ways. Since there are so many casinos around the country and in New York State, one here would likely not serve as a draw for out-of-towners.

Casinos hurt people and communities. The 2020 New York State Problem Gambling Prevalence Survey found that among adults who gamble, 15% met the criteria for problem gambling. Young adults and people with lower incomes experience a far greater risk of problem gambling. In addition, problem gambling is seen at higher rates in Black and Brown communities.

At the very least, we should conduct an independent study of a casino's potential impacts on Rochester and Monroe County. This should not be a decision made in haste and behind closed doors.

Government must not be complicit in harming families and local businesses. We can and should put constraints on where these facilities are located.

RE: Memorializing the United States Congress to Pass the Affordable Housing Credit Improvement Act of 2023

Honorable Legislators:

The affordable housing crisis continues to burden families and individuals across the nation – inflation has only exacerbated the cost of housing to people currently renting their homes. Under the current Low-Income Housing Tax Credit (the Housing Credit), which was passed in 1986 and most recently updated in 2018, the federal government issues tax credits to state governments to incentivize providing low-income housing. The tax credits are administered by the respective state housing agencies and are distributed to developers of affordable rental housing projects.

For nearly 40 years, the Housing Credit has been a model public-private partnership program, bringing together private-sector resources, market forces, and state-level administration. This demonstrates the ability to effectively help Americans and help American businesses while providing solutions for the housing crisis that the United States is currently experiencing. We must continue to advance solutions that help our population through tough economic times in the same way we have supported the American people when in good economic times.

The Affordable Housing Credit Improvement Act of 2023 (AHCIA) will make the Housing Credit effectively permanent and expand tax credits to all states by 50 percent over the next two years. AHCIA, United States Senate Bill S.1557 and House of Representatives Bill H.R.3238, is comprehensive legislation to expand and strengthen the Housing Credit. Many Americans face housing insecurity and many more adults live with their parents because the cost of housing is too high. This legislation will incentivize building more affordable housing units in every state, which will reduce the affordable housing shortage and the number of homeless people or people on the verge of homelessness. Passing the AHCIA will improve this situation for many Americans, especially those with low-to-moderate incomes. The AHCIA has the full support of the National Association of Counties, which passed a resolution to that effect in 2022. Previous versions of AHCIA has had broad bipartisan support in both chambers of Congress - in the 117th Congress, nearly two-thirds of the combined membership of the Senate Finance and the House Ways and Means Committees co-sponsored the bill.

AHCIA will also make the Housing Credit a more effective tool for preserving the existing affordable housing inventory by simplifying current rules and regulations. The legislation will align current program rules with other affordable housing programs, while removing administrative inefficiencies. The legislation includes new provisions including a mandatory number of units reserved for extremely low-income persons. Tax credits are included to reflect the new laws for energy efficiency, which will make utilities more affordable for residents. The bill would also codify protections for veterans and will help domestic violence victims by adopting provisions in the Violence Against Women Act.

AHCIA will improve the affordable housing market in all states. Rural communities, Native American lands, high-cost urban markets, and extremely low-income communities will all be better served by this legislation. It will help finance nearly 2 million additional affordable housing units. It is also estimated that this legislation will produce 3 million new jobs, will yield \$333 billion in wages and business income, and will expand tax revenue by \$115 billion.

We encourage the members of the Senate and the House of Representatives to pass this legislation to help improve the lives of all Americans. We also urge President Biden to follow suit and sign this into law.

RE: Memorializing the New York State Legislature to pass the Modification of Restrictive Covenants Prior to the sale of Real Property.

Honorable Legislators:

The 1948 United States Supreme Court case *Shelly V. Kraemer* unanimously held that private parties may not seek judicial enforcement of a racially discriminatory covenant, as that would be a violation of the Equal Protection Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment of the U.S. Constitution. The Civil Rights Act of 1968, Title VIII, known as the Fair Housing Act of 1968 (the "Act"), prohibited discrimination concerning the sale, rental, and financing of housing based on race, religion, national origin, and sex, and was later amended to include disabilities and familial status. Although these restrictive covenants were banned, the Act did not require the restrictive language to be eliminated from existing real property deeds and the discriminatory language remains on many deeds in New York.

This bill would require sellers to remove illegal restrictive covenants prior to the sale of real property which discriminate on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, familial status, marital status, disability, national origin, source of income, or ancestry. The bill also eliminates the cost to sellers.

Eliminating the costs associated with removal of the language will encourage more sellers to ask for the deed to be altered. Removing this fee assists in lowering the costs at closing for both parties in the sale of real property. The modification document will be indexed with a reference page referring to the original document.

New York Senate Bill S1728 and Assembly Bill A4428: will help remove the discriminatory text from real property deeds.

We encourage the New York State Legislature to pass and Governor Hochul to sign this important legislation that show our commitment to inclusion and evolution of societal acceptance and practice in Monroe County and New York State.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.



Authorize Implementation of a Project Labor Agreement for the Monroe Community College Applied Technology Center - S.T.E.M. Addition Project

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize the implementation of a Project Labor Agreement ("PLA") for the Monroe Community College Applied Technology Center - S.T.E.M. Addition Project.

Your Honorable Body approved funding for the project by Resolution 227 of 2022 and the contract for professional design services by Resolution 9 of 2023. The 2021 Monroe Community College ("MCC") Facilities Master Plan included a recommendation to relocate the existing Applied Technology Center ("ATC") on W. Henrietta Road to the Brighton Campus in order to better integrate its technical programs with academic and S.T.E.M. programs currently available at the Brighton Campus. In addition, there are significant deferred maintenance costs at the existing ATC site. Avoiding these costs, as well as placing the ATC on the Brighton Campus, provides an opportunity to improve efficiency of campus staffing and facility maintenance efforts. Finally, locating the ATC on the Brighton Campus enables growth in emerging highly technical fields such as optics.

A PLA will provide uniform work conditions, cost savings, maximum labor-management harmony, and comprehensive protection against work disruptions arising out of labor disputes. An economic benefits analysis performed by Seeler Engineering, P.C. indicates that the PLA for the Project may result in an estimated cost savings of \$2,187,100. The benefits of such an agreement are outlined in the Benefits Analysis Report, which is on file in the Office of the Clerk of the Monroe County Legislature.

The terms of the PLA have been negotiated with the trade unions by Monroe County, Seeler Engineering, P.C. and the project construction manager, The Pike Company. The PLA will be executed between The Pike Company as construction manager, and the trade unions.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Authorize the implementation of a Project Labor Agreement for the benefit of the Monroe Community College Applied Technology Center - S.T.E.M. Addition Project.

2. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to take such necessary action as is required to insure that the work on the Monroe Community College Applied Technology Center - S.T.E.M. Addition Project is carried out in accordance with the terms of the Project Labor Agreement and, in the event of a court order prohibiting the implementation of the Project Labor Agreement, to take such action as is necessary to progress the work without delay, including the letting of further or additional contracts necessary to complete the Project.

This action is a Type I Action under the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA"). Pursuant to Resolution 226 of 2022, the Monroe County Legislature issued a Negative Declaration for this action. No further action under SEQRA is required.

This PLA will have no impact on the revenues or expenditures of the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committees for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.

Section 1 – Executive Summary

1.1 Background

Project Labor Agreements (PLAs), utilized in the private sector for many years, are recognized as a tool used to facilitate the cost effective and timely completion of major construction projects. The PLAs serve these objectives by providing cost savings, uniform working conditions, a stable labor environment, and comprehensive protection against work disruptions arising from labor disputes.

In March of 1993, the U.S. Supreme Court held that a governmental entity, when it is acting in its proprietary capacity as owner or manager of property and is participating in the construction industry marketplace much as a private employer, can utilize a PLA without conflicting with federal law. On March 28, 1996 the New York State Court of Appeals determined State Law allows the use of PLAs on publicly owned projects. In that case, involving the repair and refurbishing of the Tappan Zee Bridge, the Court emphasized the need for the PLA to foster the dual purposes underlying the State's various competitive bidding laws: (1) protecting public fisc and (2) avoiding favoritism, fraud or corruption. For additional details, see New York State Chapter, Inc. v. New York State Thruway Auth., 88 N.Y.2d 56, 643 N.Y.S.2d 480 (1996) (sometimes referred to as the "Tappan Zee" case).

The Courts place great emphasis on the importance of potential cost savings to the public through the use of a PLA. This was clearly the message when the Court rejected employing a PLA in a companion case involving the Roswell Park Cancer Institute in Buffalo. In that case, the Courts prohibited the use of a PLA because of insufficient evidence that the Dormitory Authority intended it as a cost saving device.

As set forth in Section 222 of New York State Labor Law, a state agency or any political subdivision thereof having jurisdiction over a public works project may require a contractor to enter into a PLA when the agency determines that its interest is best met with application of a PLA that:

- 1) obtains the best work at the lowest price in the construction process;
- 2) prevents favoritism, fraud and corruption; and
- 3) is based on other factors such as the impact of delays, the possibility of cost savings advantages and history of labor unrest in the area.

Monroe County (the County) is in the process of procuring construction contracts for the Monroe Community College (MCC) Applied Technologies Center (ATC) Building Project (the Project). The Project has an estimated construction cost of approximately \$52.6 million. Based upon the scope and schedule for this Project and consistent with New York State Labor Law Section 222, the County is considering the use of a PLA.

LaBella Associates, on behalf of Monroe County retained Seeler Engineering, P.C. (Seeler), an independent consultant experienced in the development and implementation of PLAs, to conduct a thorough analysis of the costs/benefits of a PLA for this Project. In preparing this report, Seeler evaluated the key aspects of the Project scope to assess areas of potential costs/benefits against PLA terms and conditions successfully

negotiated in previous agreements in the area. The results of this independent study will serve as the basis for the final decision regarding the use of a PLA for this Project.

1.2 The MCC ATC Building Project

Monroe Community College, a public community college in Monroe County, currently has an undergraduate enrollment exceeding 9,000 students spread across two campuses; the main campus located in Brighton, and the downtown campus in the City of Rochester. The Monroe Community College Applied Technologies Center Building Project will include the demolition of existing Building 9a, the construction of a new 80,000 square-foot (SF) building space and the renovation of 15,000 SF of existing building space to provide for new general automotive labs, heating, ventilation and air condition (HVAC) labs, fabrication labs, refrigeration and solar thermal labs, machining labs, a CNC lab, a metrology lab, a computer lab, associate offices and conference rooms. The new building space will replace an outdated existing ATC facility which is currently separated from the main campus and more effectively connect ATC students with the college's existing Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) programs. The Project also calls for renovations and new construction of approximately 25,000 SF to house laboratories that will safely accommodate the precision equipment and instructional classrooms meeting new State University of New York (SUNY) requirements for the Optical Technologies Program. The Project will also include site work, parking reconfiguration, modifications to the existing drop-off loop, and courtyard renovations, and the construction of a new 10,000-SF pole barn for general storage. The scope of the Project also includes the relocation and re-installation of equipment (tools and machinery, large and small) currently housed in the teaching labs in the existing ATC facility.

1.3 Our Study

This study includes an assessment of the economic and non-economic considerations of a PLA. Seeler analyzed the existing applicable area Collective Bargaining Agreements (CBAs) of 17 labor craft unions (with 22 agreements). The labor craft union bargaining agreements would govern construction on the Project in the absence of a PLA. Seeler's study identifies Project components where the use of a PLA can result in a reduced total Project labor cost.

Given the nature and size of this Project, as well as the make-up of the market, we would expect, in the absence of a PLA, on a dollar basis, the percent of successful unionized contractors and sub-contractors covered by one or more of the applicable CBAs to be a minimum of 65 percent. This projection is based upon the author's review of projects recently executed in the Rochester Region (the Region), as well as an understanding of the construction labor supply and demand in the Region, the size of the Project, the nature and makeup of contractors in the Region who routinely execute this type of work, and previous projects constructed in the Region with and without PLAs. We do not anticipate that a project of this size and nature would draw the interest of contractors from outside the Rochester Region.

1.4 Summary

Project cost savings estimated for the Project were prepared based upon contract provisions routinely negotiated into PLAs in the Region and are summarized below.

1.4.1 Project Cost Savings: Labor

We estimate that a PLA could result in savings of \$391,500 or approximately 2.9 percent of the projected cost of labor for the entire Project (estimated at \$13,673,900). Cost savings attributed to each potential change in current CBAs are presented below.

1.4.2 Project Cost Savings: Wicks Law Exemption

Use of a PLA exempts the Project from the requirements of the Wicks Law. While not directly related to labor cost reductions, the ability to implement the Project without the requirement to follow the Wicks Law has shown significant Project cost reduction from improved coordination during scoping prior to bid and corresponding reduction in additional specific claims for missing scope and unanticipated schedule delays. We anticipate that the benefits of exemption from the Wicks Law are definable and would be effective when applied to this Project. Project cost savings are estimated to be approximately \$1,795,600. The benefits of Wicks Law Exemption and the savings related are discussed further in Section 5 of this report.

1.4.3 Project Cost Savings: Total

We estimate, therefore, that total savings from labor cost reductions and the Wicks exemption could exceed \$2,187,100 for a total Project construction cost of \$52.6 Million, which is approximately a 4.2 percent savings on overall construction cost.

1.4.4 Non-Economic Considerations

Labor Harmony

PLAs can help avoid the costly delays of potential strikes and other disruptions arising from work disputes to ensure a timely project completion with a prohibition on strikes and other forms of job actions. PLAs can also expand worker harmony through the use of uniform work rules that reduce

conflicts, uniform rules for settlements of disputes, and clear procedures for resolution of jurisdictional claims and disputes. During the planned construction period, 17 of the 22 craft agreements are set to expire. Long, disruptive job actions have not been noted in recent history, however, recent activity indicates that labor attitudes are beginning to change. We therefore assess risk of job actions that would significantly impact the planned Project to be moving from low to moderate.

Equal Opportunity and Workforce Training Objectives

Other benefits not easily translated into economic savings include enhanced workforce diversity and training objectives. Project specific objectives consistent with countywide policies and objectives are anticipated for this Project, although numerical goals relating to workforce diversity have not been established. Recent County projects implemented using a PLA have established a contribution to Rochester Careers in Construction, Inc., a New York not-for-profit corporation. The program, funded by this contribution, is directed at recruitment, development and training of minorities and women to enter the construction trades as a career as well as for more immediate employment on each project. Participation in this program is consistent with the long-term County objectives of enhancing diversity in the construction industry and providing long-term employment opportunities for minorities and women and is complementary to the apprentice training pilot program recently announced by the County. This feature adds \$33,900, the equivalent of \$0.15/hour for each projected hour to be worked, to the cost of the Project. Use of a PLA would also provide access to qualified contractor apprentices who would otherwise have none. This access is considered a cost saving benefit and is addressed further in the cost savings section of this report.

Minority/Women Business Enterprise participation

Minority/Women Business Enterprise (M/WBE) participation in the Project is also an important objective. Project specific M/WBE goals of 12 percent minority and three precent women are anticipated for this Project. Union affiliation in the M/WBE business sector in the Rochester Region is not uniform for all crafts or trades. A PLA could incorporate language addressing the unique challenges and needs faced by M/WBE contractors and, therefore, could be considered a benefit if such terms are incorporated into an agreement.

Section 2 – Project Description

2.1 Scope

The Monroe Community College Applied Technologies Center Building Project will construct a new stateof-the-art ATC Building at the Brighton campus as well as renovate/expand existing campus Building 9 to provide additional space for the programs. The new building will replace an outdated facility and more effectively connect ATC students with the college's existing STEM programs.

The Project will include the demolition of existing Building 9a, the construction of a new 80,000 squarefoot (SF) building space and the renovation of 15,000 SF of existing building space to provide for new general automotive labs, heating, ventilation and air condition (HVAC) labs, fabrication labs, refrigeration and solar thermal labs, machining labs, a CNC lab, a metrology lab, a computer lab, associate offices and conference rooms. Relocation and re-installation of equipment (tools and machinery, large and small) currently housed in the teaching labs in the existing ATC facility is within the scope of the Project. The Project also calls for renovations and new construction of approximately 25,000 SF to house laboratories that will safely accommodate the precision equipment and instructional classrooms to meet new State University of New York (SUNY) requirements for the Optical Technologies Program and will include site work, parking reconfiguration, modifications to the existing drop-off loop, and courtyard renovations. The construction of a new 10,000-SF pole barn for general storage is also part of the project scope.

It is anticipated that the Project will be divided into two contracts. The first contract will be the demolition contract and will focus on the demolition of the existing Building 9a. The second contract will contain the remaining scope of the Project.

2.2 Schedule

A preliminary construction schedule has been established for the Project and is included as Appendix A. While the overall Project construction duration is projected to be 34 months, the Project will be separated into two contracts. The Demolition contract will begin in October of 2023 with all work substantially completed by the end of January 2024. The construction of the ATC building and all other Project work is anticipated to start in late-July 2024 with all work to be substantially completed by mid-July 2026 for a duration of approximately 24 months.

As this is a new campus building, it is anticipated that the contractor will have complete control of the Project and schedule. The contractor will also have complete control over the demolition of the existing building as it its currently vacant. The renovation of the existing Building 9 space will have limited need for second or third shift work, effectively limited to some utility interconnection between the new and existing building. It is also anticipated that there will be no limits on construction activities so long as students and faculty are not impacted. Regardless, construction activities conducted in and around the area will require careful planning and scheduling to provide a safe working environment as well as avoid unintended consequences or disruptions. The 24-month scheduled construction period for the construction of the new ATC building allows construction to proceed with two summer seasons and is considered sufficient time to complete construction activities without significant use of unique work schedules requiring labor premiums.

2.3 Construction Costs

The Project team has prepared a preliminary Project cost estimate. The total construction cost for the Project is estimated at \$52.6 million. A copy of the estimate is included in Appendix B.



Section 3 – Estimate of Craft Labor Needs

3.1 Craft Labor Breakdown

Nineteen craft labor unions would represent the construction industry in the Region. A complete listing of the unions is presented on Table 1. Of this number, 18 craft labor unions with 23 agreements would have active involvement in the work planned for the Project, and includes the Carpenters (separate agreements covering Building and Heavy & Highway work), Bricklayers (separate agreements covering Building and Heavy & Highway work), Cement Masons, Electrical Workers, Glaziers, Heat & Frost Insulators, Iron Workers, Laborers (separate agreements covering Building and Heavy & Highway work), Millwrights, Operating Engineers (separate agreements covering Building, Heavy & Highway and Technical work), Painters, Plasterers, Plumbers & Steamfitters, Roofers, Sheet Metal Workers, Sprinkler Fitters, Teamsters (Heavy & Highway only) and Elevator Constructors. The work included in this study is subject to both Building and Heavy & Highway agreements for those trades where separate agreements for Building and Heavy & Highway work have been established. Trades which have separate agreements for Building and Heavy & Highway work include the Carpenters, Bricklayers, Laborers, Operating Engineers and Teamsters. It is important to note that the Elevator Constructers are expected to have involvement on this Project. The Elevator Constructors typically do not participate in PLA agreements with the exception of the No Strike, Jurisdictional Dispute, and Dispute Resolution Clauses. Therefore, no savings associated with the Elevator Constructors have been reflected in this analysis. As such, there are effectively 17 applicable crafts with 22 agreements that would have involvement in a PLA on this Project.

Table 2 includes work area labor breakdowns for the Project. This analysis estimates that just over 225,800 craft labor hours will be required to complete construction work for the Project. Demand for craft labor will be immediate upon initiation of the construction activities.

In the absence of a PLA, we would expect, on a dollar basis, the percent of successful unionized contractors and sub-contractors covered by one or more of the applicable CBAs to be a minimum of 65 percent. These projections are based upon the author's in-depth knowledge of construction labor supply and demand in the Rochester Region, as well as the size of the Project, and the nature and makeup of contractors in the Region who routinely execute this type of project. We do not anticipate that a project of this size and nature would draw the interest of contractors from outside the Rochester Region.

As such, our Detailed Cost Savings Calculations (Appendix C) contained in this report are based on the projections that 65 percent of the Project would be executed by unionized contractors.

3.2 Projected Labor Costs

Seeler projected labor costs for the Project utilizing applicable journeyman wage and benefit rates. The craft labor cost for the Project is estimated at \$13,673,900 or 26.0 percent of the anticipated construction cost, with the actual percentage varying on individual components from 20 to 50 percent.

Section 4 – Summary of Existing Agreements

4.1 Existing Agreements

Seeler has developed a comparative analysis of the 17 applicable crafts with 22 agreements. The crafts analyzed are the Carpenters (separate agreements covering Building and Heavy & Highway work), Bricklayers (separate agreements covering Building and Heavy & Highway work), Cement Masons, Electrical Workers, Glaziers, Heat & Frost Insulators, Iron Workers, Laborers (separate agreements covering Building and Heavy & Highway work), Millwrights, Operating Engineers (separate agreements covering Building, Heavy & Highway and Technical work), Painters, Plasterers, Plumbers & Steamfitters, Roofers, Sheet Metal Workers, Sprinkler Fitters, and Teamsters (Heavy & Highway only). The work included in this study is subject to both Building and Heavy & Highway agreements for those trades where separate agreements for Building and Heavy & Highway work have been established. Trades which have separate agreements for Building and Heavy & Highway work include the Carpenters, Bricklayers, Laborers, Operating Engineers and Teamsters. Significant aspects of each of the 22 agreements are summarized in Table 3. The intent of the review is to identify areas of improvement that may be realized through the use of a PLA to achieve potential Project labor cost reductions. A brief synopsis of the terms of the existing agreements is presented below.

4.1.1 Contract Duration/Expiration Date

Contract durations range from one to five years, with nearly half of the agreements established at a five-year duration. Seventeen of the 22 applicable agreements are set to expire at the start or during the planned Project construction period and will require renewal. Those agreements are:

- Bricklayers (Building) 4/30/2025
- Carpenters (Building) 5/31/2026
- Carpenters (Heavy & Highway) 4/30/2025
- Cement Masons 6/30/2026
- Electrical Workers 5/25/2025
- Glaziers 4/30/2025
- Heat & Frost Insulators 5/31/2025
- Iron Workers 6/30/2024
- Laborers (Building) 4/30/2024
- Laborers (Heavy & Highway) 6/30/2026
- Operating Engineers (Technical) 3/31/2026
- Plasterers 3/31/2026
- Plumbers & Steamfitters 4/30/2025
- Roofers 6/1/2024
- Sheet Metal Workers 4/28/2024
- Sprinkler Fitters 3/31/2025
- Teamsters (Heavy & Highway) 3/31/2024

Should there be any significant disruption during contract renewal negotiations, the objective of completing all Project components on time could be jeopardized.



4.1.2 Regular Work Hours/Regular Work Day

Regular work hours/work day designations are not consistent between agreements. Although all agreements standardize on a five-day, 40-hour work week, many agreements allow four 10-hour days as an alternative to the extent permitted by law and/or with notification to the union. Specific start and quitting times are not consistent between the unions; however, they do state that the hours must be consecutive with a one-half hour lunch.

4.1.3 Overtime

All agreements provide time and a half pay for overtime work on weekdays and Saturdays, and two times pay for Sundays and holidays.

4.1.4 Guaranteed Pay

All of the agreements except the Heat & Frost Insulators and Ironworkers require two or more hours pay for reporting in at their designated hourly rate. Ironworkers require \$35 per hour for the first two hours if the employee shows up and no work is provided due to weather or other means not controlled by the employer and the Heat & Frost Insulators do not address the issue at all. Some agreements require payment only if the event is not controlled by the employer, while others require it regardless. The Operating Engineers essentially guarantee a minimum of three full days of pay once the work week begins regardless of the hours actually worked. In some instances, these guarantees can be as much as 40 hours. All of the unions allow Saturdays as a make-up day at straight time pay for weather related delays.

4.1.5 Shift Work/Single Irregular Shifts

The agreements vary regarding shift work. Haft of the agreements shorten the hours worked for the second and third shift (7.5 hours for the second shift and 7 hours for the third shift) but require eight hours of pay when three shifts are worked. Other agreements carry hourly premiums ranging from seven to 17.3 percent for second shift and ten to 31.4 percent for third shift but require the full eight hours of work. The Plasterers and Roofers CBAs do not specify shift premiums. The Glaziers and Painters specify a \$2.00 premium for all shifts that start prior to 6:00 am or after 12:00 pm. Additionally, the Carpenters (Heavy & Highway), Glaziers, Heat & Frost Insulators, Iron Workers, Laborers (Heavy & Highway), Operating Engineers (Heavy & Highway), Painters and Sprinkler Fitters specify a night shift, or single irregular shift premium for any shift that has a starting time outside the normal working hours. These premiums range from \$1.75 to \$5.72 above the applicable rate.

4.1.6 Holidays

The agreements vary on holiday pay. All unions standardize on six recognized holidays: Christmas, New Years, Thanksgiving, Labor Day, Memorial Day and Independence Day. Current agreements do not address Martin Luther King Day or Juneteenth, however as agreements are renegotiated it is anticipated that these holidays will be added. The Carpenters (Heavy & Highway), Laborers (Heavy & Highway) and Operating Engineers (all) receive a paid day off of work, however the requirements vary by agreement. The Laborers (Heavy & Highway) and Operating Engineers (Heavy & Highway) and Operating Engineers (Heavy & Highway) and Operating Engineers (Heavy & Highway and Technical) must work one day before and one day after the designated holiday. The Carpenters (Heavy & Highway) must also work one day before and one day after, however they only receive holiday pay for the 4th of July and Labor Day. The Operating Engineers (Building) must work five days before and one day after the designated holiday.

4.1.7 Apprentice Ratios

The ratios vary and change with the number of Journeymen at the site. For example, many unions allow the first Apprentice with the first Journeyman. While one Apprentice is usually allowed initially, once staffing grows beyond a small labor force, the following ratios have been established:

4.1.8 Mileage and Parking

Most agreements do not address mileage reimbursement. Some agreements, such as the Bricklayers (Building) require mileage to be paid at the current IRS rate when traveling from job to job using a personal vehicle. Other agreements, such at the Electrical Workers have similar requirements.

4.1.9 Off-Site Fabrication

Off-site fabrication rules vary from agreement to agreement. Some do not address the issue at all. Other crafts, such as the Carpenters, require that any form work which could be done on the job site, or adjacent to the job site, be done there and the terms of their agreement shall apply. Other crafts, such as the Plumbers & Steamfitters, have similar language that could restrict flexibility in the use and selection of off-site fabricators.

4.1.10 Management Rights

Most existing agreements do not contain a "Management's Rights" clause which would give contractors greater flexibility to control and manage the Project work, including control of the level of staffing and control/selection of key personnel such as the Foreman.

4.2 Labor Unrest

In accordance with Section 222 of New York Labor Law, we reviewed the general labor climate in upstate New York State (excluding New York City and Long Island). While construction trade unions have generally avoided participation in work stoppages, they have been active in organizing picketing activities across the state to raise awareness of construction labor issues in the area. Our review revealed a mixed picture.

4.2.1 Labor Unrest Statewide

- In March of 2022, the Carpenters Local 277 picketed in Johnson City during an announcement for a \$30 million mixed-use E-J Victory conversion project over a subcontractor allegedly conducting illegal activities including falsely classifying workers and paying workers in cash.
- In 2019 over 70 demonstrations took place by the Operating Engineers alone across New York. The demonstrations included the use of banners and other visuals.

- In October 2019, the Upstate New York Operating Engineers Local 158 picketed with "Scabby the Rat" to protest a subcontractor on the North Campus Residential Expansion Project at Cornell University for paying its workers substandard wages. Demonstrations in the town of Schodack over the use of a non-local contractor for site preparations for the new Amazon warehouse also included the use of three large inflatable rats.
- In August of 2019, the Greater Capital Region Building & Construction Trades Council held a rally
 outside the construction site for the Hyatt Place Hotel in downtown Albany over the use of nonunionized laborers, despite the developer receiving millions of dollars in tax incentives. The local
 unions had been protesting for 50 days straight at the time of the rally.
- In August 2018, Tompkins-Cortland Building & Construction Trades Council union members picketed to draw public attention to the lack of local building trades involved in construction of the Maplewood student housing complex at Cornell University.
- In May of 2018, the Carpenters picketed at the \$20 million state-subsidized Electric City Apartments construction project over the use of non-union labor being paid far less than the prevailing wage.
- In January of 2018, a dispute lasting over one year was settled between the Capital Region construction trades and the Albany Hilton Hotel over the use of non-union contractors and payment of substandard wages.
- Several years ago, the Buffalo Building and Construction Trades Council received a favorable ruling
 from the courts establishing a "two-minute" rule that sets a precedent for the amount of time
 picketers could take to cross a project site entrance. The ruling delays entry to the project site by
 two minutes for every vehicle entering or leaving. Such actions could have significant impact on
 project productivity as demonstrated in January of 2018 by members of the Carpenters Union and
 Laborers Union who picketed outside the Ellicott Development Company site in Buffalo because
 contractors from Buffalo and Rochester did not pay the area standard wage. The dispute was
 settled after three weeks of project slowdown and delay. Cost impacts to the project have not
 yet been determined.

4.2.2 Regional Labor Unrest

There have been no significant strikes in the Rochester Region in recent years. Labor unrest has been somewhat rare over the past few years due to an uptick in demand for labor although periodic lulls in have been met by increased picketing activities, primarily due to the issue of contractors using non-local labor when locals are out of work in sizeable numbers. There have only been three notable incidences of labor unrest among the construction trades going back to 2015.

 In September of 2022, a bargaining unit of the International Union of Operating Engineers Local 158 representing the Plumbers, Electricians and Carpenters at the University of Rochester engaged in difficult, protracted contract negotiations. A contract settlement was reached on October 24th but not without the threat of strike, with notice being filed with the National Labor Relations Board (NLRB).

- In May of 2021, labor unions protested outside a Monroe County Economic Development Agency meeting against Amazon's proposed blanket waiver for the construction of the Amazon facility in Gates which would wave part of a local labor requirement for building the multi-million square foot facility.
- In 2018 there were picketing activities organized by the Carpenters including an event in April where members of the Northeast Regional Council of Carpenters Local 276 picketed against Hewitt Young Electric in Rochester for using an out of the area non-union carpentry contractor for their office renovations.

4.2.3 Labor Employment/Unemployment Statistics

Current overall unemployment in the Region, as reported by the NYSDOL's Local Area Unemployment Statistics Program (LAUS), is around four percent, with the current rate of construction unemployment slightly higher, at eight percent or approximately 1,850 unemployed workers in a construction labor force of 23,000 persons. Historically, the rate of construction unemployment in the Rochester Region has remained roughly double the rate of overall unemployment. According to the US Census Bureau's 1-year American Community Survey, the unemployment rate among construction industry workers within the Region stood at 9.6 percent in 2021, similar to numbers seen in 2020 when construction stoppages associated with restrictions in response to the COVID-19 pandemic where in effect. The COVID-19 pandemic and associated economic shutdown in New York State contributed to the largest employment decline in recent history, however, a strong stimulusinduced recovery has been underway for several months. Data for 2022 are not yet available, but it is expected that these numbers will reflect the recovery underway.

The Region, like most areas of New York State and the United States, has looming labor shortages in most of the skilled trades due to aging of the workforce and lack of new skilled laborers entering the workforce. The share of older workers 55 and over in the Region has more than doubled in recent years, from 12.0 percent in 2007 to 24.2 percent in 2022. The aging construction labor force is a concern for future projects. Currently, there are not enough graduates of local job training and apprenticeship programs to offset retirements.

An examination of the Dodge Data & Analytics database for projects currently in the bidding or construction stage in the Rochester region, including Livingston, Monroe, Ontario, Orleans, Wayne and Yates County shows that there are approximately 108 educational building projects reported over the last three months with a total value of \$574 million, reflecting the current economic development efforts in the Region.

Given the recent post-COVID increase in construction spending in the Region and the labor requirement associated with pending projects that have intentions to award work, construction unemployment has the potential to be reduced significantly. It is also important to note many upcoming large-scale projects in nearby regions, including the \$1.4 Billion Buffalo Bills Stadium, the \$100 Billion Micron chip plant and the \$2.3 Billion I-81 Viaduct Project in Syracuse, and the \$600 Million Albany Port Project will require heavy demand for construction labor and will likely draw from the surrounding regions including Rochester. Demands for specialty or skilled trades are already high within the Region. Current economic growth in the Region will continue to increase demand on the overall labor force.

4.2.4 Summary

The Rochester Region trades are noted to be advocates for the use of local union labor as evidenced by recent job site demonstrations. The trades will continue to actively advocate for the employment of local, union labor. Various types of project site demonstrations such as bannering, hand billing, and picketing are likely to become more common occurrences as the labor market tightens. Strikes of any significant duration, however, are not yet expected in the near term. Given the regional recent labor unrest in the past year, however, the potential for disruption over the life of this Project is increasing. We therefore assess risk of job actions that would significantly impact the planned Project to be moving from low to moderate.

Section 5 – Economic Considerations

5.1 General

We conducted an analysis of potential cost savings for the Project utilizing the projected labor craft hours, wage rates currently in effect, and contract provisions routinely negotiated into other PLAs in the Rochester Region. Given the nature and size of this Project, and the make-up of the market, in the absence of a PLA, we would expect, on a dollar basis, the percentage of successful unionized contractors and subcontractors covered by one or more of the applicable CBAs to be a minimum of 65 percent. These projections are based upon the author's review of projects recently executed in the Rochester Region, as well as an understanding of the construction labor supply and demand in the Region, the size of the Project, the nature and makeup of contractors in the Region who routinely execute this type of project, and previous projects constructed in the Region with and without PLAs.

As mentioned in the previous section, the Elevator Constructers are expected to have involvement on this Project. The Elevator Constructors typically do not participate in PLA agreements with the exception of the No Strike, Jurisdictional Dispute, and Dispute Resolution Clauses. Therefore, no savings associated with the Elevator Constructors has been reflected in this analysis.

5.2 Labor Cost Savings Attributed to the Use of a PLA

Labor cost savings estimated for the Project were prepared based upon contract provisions routinely negotiated into PLAs in the Region. The potential for economic savings for each contract provision is discussed below.

5.2.1 Flexible Shift Start Times

A PLA could provide flexibility for the contractors/subcontractors to set start times between the hours of 6 a.m. and 9 a.m. and use special shift start and finish times to fit the needs of the assignment, phase of the Project and requirements/schedule of campus operations. This would give the contractor the ability to schedule the workday to maximize productivity. Increased productivity with the flexibility of start times is estimated to translate into approximately one hour per week per person productivity gained. This analysis assumes that the productivity gained through the coordination of start times would only be needed for work elements of the Electrical Workers, Plumbers & Steamfitters, Sheet Metal Workers and Sprinkler Fitters related to the Plumbing, Fire Protection, HVAC, and Electrical components of the Project. Savings resulting from the implementation of flexible shift start times is therefore estimated to be approximately \$25,100.

5.2.2 Industry Fund Payments

A PLA could limit the workers' pay to base wages and fringe benefit payments as published in the prevailing wage schedules. This, in turn, would avoid collectively bargained payments, such as Industry Promotion Funds, which are in excess of those required by/for public works projects. The applicable trades specify an Industry Fund payment ranging from \$0.00 to \$0.29 per hour worked. Based on anticipated labor loadings, it is projected that savings from this provision would be approximately \$11,400.

5.2.3 Union Apprentice Ratios

A PLA could agree to apprentice ratios equal to or better than those set by the New York State Department of Labor. PLAs in other regions of upstate New York have set apprentice ratios of 2 to 1 or better. A reduction in labor cost would be realized by moving several of the crafts to this ratio. We have applied this projection only to union employers (65 percent) and assumed apprentices on average would be in the second or third year of their apprentice program, representing approximately 70 percent of the wages earned by journeymen. We have projected that crew sizes large enough to utilize apprentice ratios to their fullest without impacting worker safety or Project quality would represent approximately 20 percent of the projected union labor hours for all crafts. Based on anticipated labor loadings, it is projected that savings from this provision would be approximately \$37,900.

5.2.4 Non-Union Apprentice Program Participation

A PLA could provide access to a qualified pool of apprentices for non-union contractors otherwise not available. This provision allows non-union contractors (who do not have state approved apprentice programs) to obtain qualified apprentices through the referral process and thus lower overall crew labor cost. We have applied this projection only to non-union employers (35 percent) and assumed apprentices on average would be in the second or third year of their apprentice program, representing approximately 70 percent of the wages earned by journeymen. We have projected that crew sizes large enough to utilize apprentice ratios to their fullest without impacting worker safety or Project quality would represent approximately 20 percent of the projected non-union labor hours for all crafts and would also implement an apprentice ratio of 2 to 1 or better. Based on anticipated labor loadings, it is projected that savings from this provision would be approximately \$86,200.

5.2.5 Guaranteed Pay

A PLA could eliminate guaranteed pay in its entirety and replace it with a travel allowance equivalent to one hour's pay. Standardizing on this provision for all trades and assuming one event per year for a total of two events during the Project results in an estimated savings of \$32,800.

5.2.6 Holiday Pay

A PLA could eliminate the requirement of holiday pay for the Carpenters, Laborers, and Operating Engineers. Our analysis assumes eight applicable holidays for the duration of the Project. Our analysis also assumes Project shutdown over Christmas and New Year's Day; therefore, they were excluded from the savings calculations. It should also be noted that current agreements do not identify either Martin Luther King Day or Juneteenth and thus do not impact savings estimates, however, as agreements evolve these could be included and therefore subject to no pay terms. The total estimated savings is \$39,900.

5.2.7 Shift Work

A PLA could reduce applicable shift premiums by standardizing on a five percent premium for second shift and a 10 percent premium for third shift with no reduction in the hours worked (i.e. eight hours of work for eight hours of pay) when premiums are required by applicable CBAs. Based on the anticipated scope and schedule, it is anticipated that a contractor will have limited use of a multiple shift operation throughout the Project to facilitate any work that may need to be conducted during off-campus hours to limit interference with the students and faculty. We anticipate these efforts to

represent a relatively small portion of the work. Our analysis assumes ten percent of the total hours related to this work would be performed on a multiple shift schedule. Of that, 40 percent would be conducted on a second shift. As such, standardizing on shift premiums would result in savings of approximately \$5,900.

5.2.8 Off-Site Fabrication

A PLA could limit off-site work subject to prevailing wage and union agreements to that work defined by Section 222 or that specifically covered by a CBA. This would allow for some work to be performed off-site and not be subject to prevailing wage rate requirements. Our analysis projects that this offsite work would be applicable to two percent of the total craft hours for the Electrical Workers, Iron Workers and Plumbers & Steamfitters, and five percent of the total craft hours for the Carpenters and Sheet Metal Workers. The offsite work performed by these crafts is estimated to reduce costs by 20 percent. The estimated savings by limiting restrictions on offsite fabrication is projected to be \$30,000.

5.2.9 Work Break Time Reduction

A PLA could eliminate the daily ritual of an organized work break to which Union workers are entitled. While each worker would be allowed to have a coffee container near their work area and take a brief break, an increase in productivity would be realized when workers do not leave the work area. We estimate that this practice would increase productivity for each worker each day by five minutes. Our analysis projects that reducing the duration of downtime every day for every worker on site by five minutes would result in a savings of approximately \$51,900.

5.2.10 Wage Concessions

A PLA could allow for a wage concession through the reclassification of site/utility work outside of the new ATC building from Heavy & Highway to Building rate. Successful negotiations for past projects included an agreement to eliminate premiums associated with the Heavy & Highway rate structure by reclassifying the work as subject to Building agreements only. This type of concession could result in wage and benefit rate reductions for the Bricklayers, Carpenters, Laborers, and Operating Engineers. As this savings provision is applicable to all workers at the site regardless of union affiliation, the estimated savings by reclassifying the work is projected to be \$18,800.

5.2.11 Management Rights/Jurisdictional Requirements

A PLA could contain very strong Management Rights language. Management can realize distinct efficiencies by controlling the level and scheduling of staffing and with the selection and employment of a Foreman as Contractor's staff. For large or complex projects with high labor loadings, savings of two percent of the labor costs from these clearly established management rights are typically realized. For smaller or less complex projects with moderate schedules and less intense labor loadings, these advantages are reduced.

Further adjustments are made to small projects when considering the effect of jurisdictional restrictions. In an open shop environment, workers would be allowed to perform the work of more than one trade over the work day. While prevailing wage requirements would dictate that they must be compensated for the work of each trade in accordance with the applicable schedule in effect for that trade, they would still be allowed to perform the differing tasks. Union agreements and, by their

nature, PLAs would restrict the work of the governing trade, thereby prohibiting crossover to take place. The crossover of individual workers from one trade activity to another in a single day's work is more frequent on smaller, less intense projects. This practice also occurs more frequently in the general building construction trades than in other crafts.

A strong management rights clause in a PLA could provide additional value given the need to coordinate the efforts of multiple labor crafts in a very efficient manner. We anticipate a 0.25 percent cost advantage for enhanced management rights language offered by the use of a PLA. Savings are projected to be \$85,500.

5.2.12 Workforce Development - Rochester Careers in Construction

Recent County projects implemented using a PLA have established a contribution to Rochester Careers in Construction, Inc., a New York not-for-profit corporation. The program, funded by this contribution, is directed at recruitment, development and training of minorities and women to enter the construction trades as a career as well as for more immediate employment on each project. Participation in this program is consistent with the long-term County objectives of enhancing diversity in the construction industry and providing long-term employment opportunities for minorities and women and is complementary to the apprentice training pilot program recently announced by the County. This feature adds \$33,900, the equivalent of \$0.15/hour for each projected hour to be worked, to the cost of the Project.

5.2.13 Productivity Gain 10-Hour Days

A PLA could provide flexibility in the regular work week by allowing a contractor to use a four 10-hour day schedule or a regular day without requiring permission or consent from the union or formal waiver from the Department of Labor. This would eliminate the setup and breakdown time for one work day each week. However, based on the current Project scope and schedule, it is not anticipated that the contractor would implement a four 10-hour day schedule for this Project. As such, we are not projecting any savings from this provision. However, should there be any scheduling changes requiring the use of a four 10-hour day schedule, this term would provide measurable benefit to the Project, and therefore would be beneficial to include in a PLA.

5.2.14 Night Work

A PLA could reduce applicable night or governmentally mandated single irregular shift premiums by \$0.75 when premiums are required by applicable CBAs. However, based on the current Project scope and schedule, it is not anticipated that a mandated single irregular shift schedule will be utilized. As such, we are not projecting any savings from reducing the applicable governmentally mandated single irregular shift premiums. However, should there be any scheduling changes requiring the governmentally mandated single irregular shift, this term would provide measurable benefit to the Project, and therefore would be beneficial to include in a PLA.

5.2.15 Contract Duration/Expiration Date

A PLA could prohibit strikes and lock-outs or other job actions for the duration of the agreement. This would avoid the potential for work stoppages or picketing that would trigger the two-minute ruling resulting from wage and benefit negotiation at the end of each craft's local area agreement. It would

also ensure uninterrupted project completion. While there is value implied by the security this term would provide, no explicit calculation of savings is made for this report.

5.3 Other Economic Savings Attributable to a PLA

Additional savings not directly related to labor are projected for the Project based upon negotiated contract provisions. These other economic savings are discussed in detail below.

5.3.1 Wicks Law Exemption

Projects implemented by governmental agencies subject to Section 222 of the NYS Labor Law can be exempt from the requirements of the Wicks Law if a Project Labor Agreement is used. The Wicks Law requires that public works projects of a certain nature use multiple prime contractors, in a designated fashion, rather than allowing a single contractor on construction projects. In the absence of a PLA, the Wicks Law would be applicable to this Project. Various studies have reported added cost to construction from Wicks Law compliance ranging between 10% and 30% of the total construction costs. See, for example, the reports prepared by the New York State Division of Budget (May 1987) and New York State School Boards Association (March 1991) indicating that elimination of the requirements for applicable components of the project to comply with Wicks Law would reduce construction costs by 24 to 30 percent and 20 to 30 percent respectively. The Project team is currently considering application of an exemption for the Project. Assessing savings on aspects related to electrical, HVAC, and plumbing work for the new ATC building (construction cost estimated to be approximately \$10.1 million) would result in a range of savings from \$3.6 to nearly \$5.4 million. Assuming the Wicks Law exemption would be applicable to the above-mentioned work and using a modest ten percent reduction in cost, the savings to the Project would represent \$1,795,600. Because a PLA is the only way to exempt a project Wicks Law application under Section 222, the savings from that avoidance should be considered itself related to the PLA.

5.4 Summary

On the basis of the projections above, we estimate that using a PLA could result in an estimated in savings of \$391,500 in direct labor costs or approximately 2.9 percent of the projected total cost of labor for the Project (estimated at \$13,673,900). Total savings from labor cost reductions and the Wicks Law exemption could exceed \$2,187,100 for a total Project construction cost of \$52.6 Million, which is approximately a 4.2 percent savings on overall construction cost.

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Section 6 – Additional Considerations

Use of a PLA can offer additional non-economic benefits. These are difficult to precisely quantify in monetary terms at this time but could nonetheless be significant factors in the overall success of the Project.

6.1 Labor Stability

The overall Project construction schedule is anticipated to occur over a 34-month period. As this is a new campus building, it is anticipated that the contractor will have complete control of the Project and schedule so long as there are no disruptions to the students or faculty. Regardless, construction activities conducted in and around the project site will require careful planning, coordination, and scheduling to provide a safe working environment for the students and faculty on an active campus as well as to ensure there are no delays to the Project schedule.

Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, the construction spending within the Rochester Region had the potential for creating an increasingly strained labor market. Given the current levels of unemployment within the regional construction industry, we view the current market as stable. Assuming a return to normalcy by beginning of 2023, we would anticipate the labor market to begin tightening again over the life of the Project. Any disruption, while difficult to precisely quantify, would have an impact to the Project and the ability to complete the Project on time. For projects with multiple crafts working under multiple subcontracts, disruptions can result in claims of delay by individual sub-contractors working on the site who are dependent upon the performance of other sub-contractors subject to the action. Further, Project financing would be incurred. At a minimum, an estimated \$18,000 to \$25,000/month in Project administration and engineering oversight costs would be expected.

6.2 The "Tag Along Provision"

Key provisions of any Project Labor Agreement include the "Union Recognition and Employment" provisions, specifically the Union Referral requirement. Commonly referred to as the "Tag Along" requirement, this provision governs the process of bringing craft workers to the Project. All craft workers are required to pass through the job referral systems and hiring halls established by the unions. The "Tag Along" provision specifically allows a contractor who is not signatory to a collective bargaining agreement to bring his/her own core employees to the Project. The number of core employees brought to the job is limited by the agreement on the basis of a percentage of the workforce on the Project, thus typically increasing the number of workers delivered to the Project by the signatory unions. Historically regional PLAs have established a "Tag Along" requirement of 25 percent with special considerations sometimes provided for M/WBEs working under an approved plan. These special considerations offer significant opportunity for these M/WBEs by allowing a greater percentage of their own staff to participate. The "Tag Along" requirements are often the subject of much debate when considering the application of a PLA. The increased number of workers delivered to the Project as described in Section 5 is, however, the core element of every negotiation.

6.3 Workforce Enhancement, Recruiting & Training Programs, and M/WBE Programs

Enhanced workforce diversity and training objectives are other benefits not easily translated into economic savings. Project specific objectives consistent with countywide policies and objectives are anticipated for this Project, although numerical goals relating to workforce diversity have not been established. Recent County projects implemented using a PLA have established a contribution to Rochester Careers in Construction, Inc., a New York not-for-profit corporation. The program, funded by this contribution, is directed at recruitment, development and training of minorities and women to enter the construction trades as a career as well as for more immediate employment on each project. Participation in this program is consistent with the long-term County objectives of enhancing diversity in the construction industry and providing long-term employment opportunities for minorities and women and is complementary to the apprentice training pilot program recently announced by the County. This feature adds \$33,900, the equivalent of \$0.15/hour for each projected hour to be worked, to the cost of the Project. Use of a PLA would also provide access to qualified contractor apprentices who would otherwise have none. This access is considered a cost saving benefit and is addressed further in the cost savings section of this report.

Minority/Women Business Enterprise participation in the Project is also an important objective. Project specific M/WBE goals of 12 percent minority and three precent women are anticipated for this Project. Union affiliation in the M/WBE business sector in the Rochester Region is not uniform for all crafts or trades. A PLA could incorporate language addressing the unique challenges and needs faced by M/WBE contractors and, therefore, could be considered a benefit if such terms are incorporated into an agreement.

Section 7 - Conclusions

7.1 Conclusions

Based upon the size and scope of the Project, the proposed schedule and the anticipated mix of craft labor, we conclude that a PLA could provide Monroe County with measurable economic benefit. We estimate that using a PLA could result in a savings of \$391,500 in direct labor costs or approximately 2.9 percent of the projected total cost of labor for the Project (estimated at \$13,673,900). Total savings from labor cost reductions and the Wicks Law exemption could exceed \$2,187,100 for a total Project construction cost of \$52.6 Million, which is approximately a 4.2 percent savings on overall construction cost.

Non-quantifiable benefits would also be available through the use of a PLA and include:

- avoiding the costly delays of potential strikes, slowdowns, walkouts, picketing and other disruptions arising from work disputes and promoting labor harmony and peace for the duration of the Project;
- 2) standardizing the terms and conditions governing the employment of labor on the Project;
- 3) providing comprehensive and standardized mechanisms for the settlement of work disputes, including those relating to jurisdiction;
- 4) ensuring a reliable source of skilled and experienced labor in an increasingly tightening labor market potentially enhancing the ability to meet required workforce participation goals;
- 5) enhancing minority and women workforce participation in the Project;
- 6) potentially enhancing M/WBE participation; and
- 7) avoiding favoritism, fraud and/or corruption by ensuring availability of the benefits of the PLA to all successful bidders regardless of union/non-union status or the status of their employees.

In summary, based upon our experience, the use of a PLA would promote a number of Monroe County's stated objectives, including the prudent use of public funds and avoiding favoritism, fraud and/or corruption. Seeler Engineering, P.C. recommends that the County proceed with negotiations for a PLA on the Monroe Community College Applied Technologies Center Building Project.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a License Agreement with Rochester A.B.O.V.E. for the 2023 Pan Afrikan Festival to be held at the Highland Bowl on August 5, 2023.

Rochester A.B.O.V.E. (Achieving and Bringing Our Vision to Excellence) seeks to use the Highland Park Bowl for the 2023 Pan Afrikan Festival. This will be the 15th iteration of the festival, however, it is the first time it is being organized as a ticketed, paid admission event in a County park.

The Pan Afrikan Festival, until recently known as the Afrikan American Festival, celebrates the heritage and culture of all people from the Afrikan Diaspora through music, dance, art, spoken word, and educational literature. Prior festivals have included live music and entertainment, a children's play area, a health tent, and food and beverages available to purchase from vendors.

As part of this licensing process, Rochester A.B.O.V.E. would be required to remit a payment of \$500 for the use of the Highland Bowl for the day, a Special Use Event Permit fee of \$350, bounce house fees of \$50, and Single Day Special Sales Permit fees of \$50 per vendor selling food or goods at the event.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize a license agreement with Rochester A.B.O.V.E. for the 2023 Pan Afrikan Festival to be held at the Highland Bowl on August 5, 2023.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR 617.5(c)(21) ("minor temporary uses of land having negligible or no permanent impact on the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.





Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 325 of 2021 to extend the time period of the Institute of Museum and Library Services ("IMLS") grant to update the Guest Experience at Seneca Park Zoo's Animal Hospital through September 30, 2024.

This grant relates to improvements to the visitor experience at the Animal Hospital at Seneca Park Zoo, primarily to replace outdated signage in the publically accessible portion of the hospital and to add new video exhibits, featuring recordings of past animal healthcare procedures to help showcase veterinary medical care at the hospital even when the examination rooms are not in active use at a given time.

Significant supporting work related to the grant, including upgrades to the doors used by the public to access the building and the installation of a monitoring system to conduct visitor counts, have been completed. However, Seneca Park Zoo and the Parks Department have requested and been granted additional time from IMLS to complete the purchase and configuration of the video recording system that will be used by the veterinarian to capture procedures, edit the footage into a coherent narrative for visitors to view, and complete the design and installation of updated information signage in public-facing areas.

The specific legislative action required is to amend Resolution 325 of 2021 to extend the time period of the Institute of Museum and Library Services grant to update the Guest Experience at Seneca Park Zoo's Animal Hospital through September 30, 2024.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a five-year grant from the New York State Department of Health in the amount of \$1,510,000 for the Immunization Action Plan Program for the period of April 1, 2023 through March 31, 2028.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from Health Research, Inc. in the amount of \$1,299,494 for the Public Health Emergency Preparedness Program for the period of July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024.

The purpose of this grant is to assist local health departments to develop emergency-ready public health departments in accordance with the National Preparedness Goals and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Preparedness Goals. Program objectives are: continued COVID-19 response support, enhanced public health emergency preparedness including training, planning, equipment acquisition and response readiness; enhanced point of dispensing clinic readiness to include bioterrorism response (e.g. anthrax); expansion of a volunteer medical reserve corps; enhanced communicable disease planning (e.g. pandemic influenza); and enhanced disease surveillance. Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body appropriate general fund committed fund balance for the Climate Action Plan Phase I in the amount of \$45,000 and authorize a contract with Rochester Gas & Electric for Off-Expressway Lighting LED Conversions.

By Resolution 343 of 2022, Monroe County committed \$1,000,000 of fund balance for the specific purpose of funding climate action initiatives recommended in the adopted Climate Action Plan – Phase I. Consistent with those recommendations, we are seeking to appropriate \$45,000 of committed fund balance to support a contract with RG&E to convert off-expressway lighting fixtures to LEDs.

Over the past two years, the Department of Transportation has used operating funds to reimburse RG&E for off-expressway lighting conversions in the towns of Irondequoit and Gates. That process, however, is dependent on budget availability and only allows for the conversion of one town per year. The requested appropriation herein is to secure reimbursement to finish off-expressway lighting conversions in the remaining towns.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Appropriate general fund committed fund balance for the Climate Action Plan – Phase I in the amount of \$45,000 into the Department of Transportation, road fund 9002, funds center 8004040000 Highway Lighting.

2. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract with Rochester Gas & Electric in an amount not to exceed \$45,000 for Off-Expressway Lighting LED Conversions.

The work involves milling and repaving, spot pavement repairs, cleaning adjusting drainage basins and pipes, lining of storm sewer pipes, traffic signal loops, minor pedestrian signal improvements, new pavement markings, and replacement of sidewalk ramps to meet the current ADA standards. This project was completed in 2022. The increase is due to the large escalation in the costs of fuel and asphalt during the term of this project. Costs for construction inspection were also higher than originally anticipated.



This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Sheriff Todd K Baxter.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services in an amount not to exceed \$93,980 for the Operation Stonegarden Program for the period of September 1, 2022 through August 31, 2025, and authorize intermunicipal agreements with the Town of Greece in the amount of \$28,000 for the reimbursement of overtime, fringe, and equipment; the Town of Irondequoit in the amount of \$9,340.55 for the reimbursement of overtime, fringe, and mileage; and the Town of Webster in the amount \$8,332.50 for the reimbursement of overtime, fringe, equipment, and mileage for the Operation Stonegarden Program for the period of September 1, 2022 through August 31, 2025.





AMENDING LOCAL LAW NO. 3 OF 2016, ENTITLED "AUTHORIZING A LEASE WITH GALLINA DEVELOPMENT CORP. TO USE AND OCCUPY SPACE AT PANORAMA LANDING, TOWN OF PITTSFORD, NEW YORK"

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. Section 1 of Local Law No. 3 of 2016 is hereby amended as follows:

The County Executive, or her<u>his</u> designee, is hereby authorized to enter into a lease, and any <u>amendments thereto</u>, with Gallina Development Corp. or its successor-in-interest, Panorama <u>Landing, LLC</u>, for a term of fifteen twenty (1520) years, for the purpose of providing approximately 14,000 square feet of office space at Panorama Landing, Town of Pittsford, at a cost of \$15.35 per square foot for years one (1) through five (5), \$16.50 per square foot for years six (6) through ten (10), and \$17.75 per square foot for years eleven (11) through fifteen (15), plus common area charges \$16.50 per square foot for the period from March 1, 2022 to December 31, 2023, \$17.19 per square foot for the period from January 1, 2024 to February 28, 2027, \$18.44 per square foot for the period from March 1, 2032 to February 28, 2037, on a triple net basis each year, with any requested alterations or improvements, requested by the County paid as additional rent to Panorama Landing, LLC, and renewable for one (1) additional five (5) year term upon mutual consent of the parties.

Section 2. Funding for this lease is included in the 2020 operating budget of the Monroe County Sheriff's Department, fund 9001, funds center 3803020000, Road Patrol Zone A, and will be included in future years' budgets.

Section 3. This local law shall take effect in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Home Rule Law and the Monroe County Charter.



Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a contract with Roy Teitsworth, Inc. ("Teitsworth") to provide auctioneer services for the period of September 1, 2023 through August 31, 2024, with the option to renew for four (4) additional one-year periods, with Teitsworth receiving a 12% buyer's fee on all auctioned items for credit card purchases and a 10% buyer's fee for other forms of payment, and the County receiving the entirety of the bid price, with no cost to the County.

Teitsworth will provide auction services for the Department of Engineering Services, Division of Fleet Maintenance, the Sheriff's Office, and any other County departments that wish to sell excess or surplus equipment at auction. Teitsworth will be responsible for all aspects of the County auction at the Monroe County Fleet Center, held annually in the fall, as well as the unclaimed items auction conducted by the Sheriff's Office. This includes, but is not limited to, preparation of items for auction, publicizing the auctions, conducting the auctions, and ensuring the removal of items after the auctions. Teitsworth may also auction items at regional auctions, such as the Palmyra auction, and through periodic online auctions using their website.

A request for proposals was issued for this contract and Roy Teitsworth, Inc. was selected as the most qualified to provide this service.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract, and any amendments thereto, with Roy Teitsworth, Inc., 6502 Barber Hill Road, Geneseo, New York 14454, to provide auctioneer services for the period of September 1, 2023 through August 31, 2024 with the option to renew for four (4) additional one-year periods, with Roy Teitsworth, Inc. receiving a 12% buyer's fee on all auctioned items for credit card purchases and a 10% buyer's fee for other forms of payment, and the County receiving the entirety of the bid price, with no cost to the County.

This contract is revenue generating and no net County support is required in the current Monroe County Budget.



Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept funding from the New York State Office of Addiction Services and Supports ("OASAS") in the amount of \$80,170 and amend Resolution 393 of 2022 as amended by Resolution 142 of 2023, for the provision of Mental Health, Developmental Disability, and Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services in 2023 from an amount not to exceed \$45,706,055 to an amount not to exceed \$45,786,225 for the period of January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2023.

This one-time funding, as designated by the New York State Office of Addiction Services and Supports, will be used to repair Catholic Charities Family and Community Services Heating Ventilating Air Conditioning unit at its 79 North Clinton Avenue building. This will serve as a temporary repair while the process for longer-term capital project occurs.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 2. Amend the 2023 operating budget of the Department of Human Services, Office of Mental Health, by appropriating the sums of \$80,170 into general fund 9001, funds center 5702030000, Alcohol and Other Substance Abuse Services.
- 3. Amend Resolution 393 of 2022, as amended by Resolution 142 of 2023, authorizing contracts for the provision of Mental Health, Developmental Disability, and Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services in 2023 from an amount not to exceed \$45,706,055 to an amount not to exceed \$45,786,225 for the period of January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2023 and replace Exhibit A with the Exhibit A attached hereto.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a contract with Coordinated Care Services, Inc., in an amount not to exceed \$205,000, to operate a Multicultural Teen Prevention and Support Program for the period of March 1, 2023 through February 29, 2024.

This is a culturally responsive youth and family mentoring program that serves adolescents with mental health and/or social emotional challenges and their families. As proposed, the program will target its service delivery to youth aged 13 to 17 years, with an emphasis on serving youth of color.

Multicultural Teen Prevention and Support Program services are designed to work with teens and family members to develop the resources needed to maintain healthy lives, using an innovative, strengthsbased, and trauma-informed curriculum. Fostering self-help, empowerment, advocacy, support, and education are just some of the goals of this program. Junior and Adult mentors are vital to this service, with ongoing supervision and support. This service will be available to teenagers with mental health and social/emotional challenges. Participating teens may also have parents or guardians who struggle with mental health concerns. This service will be based on a highly structured curriculum and utilize a mentoring model of services. The curriculum identifies and understands all expectations and boundaries, reviews information on family support networks in the community, and receives presentations from healthcare professionals around the system of care and systems relating to teens' emotional challenges. This program will help to empower support, a system of care advocacy, and resources to help youth and families who struggle with mental health and social/emotional challenges.

A Request for Proposals was issued with Coordinated Care Services, Inc. selected as the most qualified to provide these services.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract, and any amendments thereto, with Coordinated Care Services, Inc., in an amount not to exceed \$205,000, to operate a Multicultural Teen Prevention and Support Program for the period of March 1, 2023 to February 29, 2024.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for this contract is included in the 2023 operating budget of the Department of Human Services, Office of Mental Health, general funds 9001, fund center 5702010000, Mental Health Services. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County Budget.

Coordinated Care Services, Inc.is a not-for-profit behavioral health and human services agency. The records in the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that it does not owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize the implementation of a Project Labor Agreement ("PLA") for the Airport Terminal Area Revitalization Airport/Campus Innovations at Frederick Douglass-Greater Rochester International Airport Project ("Project").

The Project involves the construction of the Frederick Douglass Legacy Area, restoration of the Veterans Area, renovation of the Arrivals area to include updates to the ceiling system and replacement of furniture, modernize baggage claim area, construct new visitor's center, install enhanced wayfinding system, and provide curbside enhancements. The Project also includes renovations/modernizations to the ticket lobby including new furniture and plug-in capabilities, upgrades to the security checkpoint with digital signage, additional services to hearing loop system, a new parking guidance system, upgrades to three passenger elevators and one freight elevator, construction of canopy additions for the rental car area and short-term parking, refurbishment/modernization of the baggage belt system, and upgrades to the terminal fire alarm system, firehouse HVAC system, windows, and doors.

A PLA will provide uniform work conditions, cost savings, maximum labor-management harmony, and comprehensive protection against work disruptions arising out of labor disputes. An economic benefits analysis performed by Seeler Engineering, P.C. indicates that the PLA for the Project may result in an estimated cost savings of \$964,500. The benefits of such an agreement are outlined in the Benefits Analysis Report, which is on file in the Office of the Clerk of the Monroe County Legislature.

The terms of the PLA have been negotiated with the union trades by Monroe County, Seeler Engineering, P.C. and the project construction manager, LeChase Construction Services. The PLA will be executed between LeChase Construction Services as construction manager and the union trades.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the implementation of a Project Labor Agreement for the benefit of Monroe County for the Airport Terminal Area Revitalization Airport/Campus Innovations at Frederick Douglass-Greater Rochester International Airport Project.
- 2. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to take such necessary action as is required to ensure that the work on the Airport Terminal Area Revitalization Airport/Campus Innovations at Frederick Douglass-Greater Rochester International Airport Project is carried out in accordance with the terms of the Project Labor Agreement and, in the event of a court order prohibiting the implementation of the Project Labor Agreement, to take such action as is necessary to progress the work without delay, including the letting of further or additional contracts necessary to complete the Project.

These actions are Type II Actions pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(2) ("replacement, rehabilitation or reconstruction of a structure or facility, in kind, on the same site, including upgrading buildings to meet building, energy, or fire codes unless such action meets or exceeds any of the thresholds in section 617.4 of this Part"); (22) ("installation of traffic control devices on existing streets, roads and highways"); and (31) purchase or sale of furnishings, equipment or supplies, including surplus government property, other than the following: land, radioactive material, pesticides, herbicides, or other hazardous materials") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

This PLA will have no impact on the revenues or expenditures of the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committees for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.

ENACTING A LOCAL LAW ENTITLED "AMENDING CHAPTER 25 OF THE MONROE COUNTY ADMINISTRATIVE CODE TO ALLOW PROCUREMENT ON THE BASIS OF BEST VALUE"

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. Section 25-2(B)(1) of the Monroe County Administrative Code is amended to read as follows:

(1) Act to procure for the county the highest quality supplies and services at the least expense <u>or on</u> the basis of best value to the county.

Section 2. Section 25-2(E) of the Monroe County Administrative Code is amended to read as follows:

E. Award of purchase contracts and public works contracts which result from public bids shall be made, and purchase contracts which result from public bids may be made, to the lowest responsive and responsible bidder in accordance with the requirements of the General Municipal Law. In cases where two or more responsible bidders submit identical bids as to price, and all other terms and conditions are identical, preference may be given to a bidder whose place of business is within Monroe County. Otherwise, award may be made by drawing lots, or by whatever other method is deemed appropriate by the Purchasing Manager, or all bids may be rejected and new bids sought by readvertisement.

Section 3. Section 25-2 of the Monroe County Administrative Code is amended to read as follows:

F. Award of purchase contracts (including contracts for service work, but excluding any purchase contracts necessary for the completion of public works contracts) which result from public bids may also be awarded by the Purchasing Manager to responsive and responsible bidders on the basis of best value.

G. Best value procurement shall be subject to the following requirements:

- <u>The County Purchasing Manager shall determine when best value shall be the basis of an</u> award. The County Purchasing Manager shall document the criteria used to rate proposals and evaluation results, or if not practicable, such other justification which demonstrates how best value was achieved for the County.
- (2) Whenever practicable, the evaluation of best value shall be based upon objective and quantifiable factors which optimize quality, cost, and efficiency, but shall not be based solely on cost, in accordance with New York State Finance Law § 163.
- (3) <u>The evaluation criteria and process for awarding procurements based upon best value</u> shall be identified in the County's procurement policy.

- (4) <u>The County's solicitation documents shall prescribe the minimum specifications or requirements that must be met in order for bidders and offerors to be considered responsive, and describe the general manner in which the evaluation and selection shall be conducted.</u>
- (5) <u>In accordance with Article 8 of the Labor Law, best value may not be used for purchase</u> <u>contracts necessary for the completion of public works contracts.</u>

FH. In the absence of public bidding requirements, all purchase contracts and public works contracts shall, wherever feasible and cost effective, be based on at least three competitive quotations and shall be awarded to the lowest responsive and responsible bidder. The Purchasing Manager may solicit quotations by such method or methods, including direct mail and telephone, as he/she shall deem suitable.

GI. In the case of a public emergency arising out of an accident or other unforescen occurrence or condition whereby circumstances affecting public buildings, public property or the life, health, safety or property of the inhabitants of the county require immediate action which cannot await competitive bidding, purchase contracts or public works contracts may be let without such competitive bidding upon certification by the county official requesting the emergency purchase or public work contract using procedures promulgated by the Purchasing Manager and approved by the County Attorney.

HJ. In accordance with the General Municipal Law, the Purchasing Manager may enter into a purchase contract with a single supplier without carrying out public bidding procedures if the supplier receives designation as a sole source vendor under procedures promulgated by the Purchasing Manager and approved by the County Attorney.

IK. In accordance with § 408-a of the County Law, the Purchasing Manager is authorized to include a provision in any county contract which permits purchases under such contract by any political subdivision, fire company or district located in whole or in part in Monroe County; provided, however, that the political subdivision, fire company or district accepts sole responsibility for any payment to the vendor.

Section 4. Section 25-5 of the Monroe County Administrative Code is amended to read as follows:

§ 25-5 Definitions; applicability.

A. As used in this chapter, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

BEST VALUE

Means the basis for awarding contracts for materials, supplies, equipment, apparatus, or services, except public works under Article 8 of the New York Labor Law, to the offerer which optimizes quality, cost, and efficiency, among responsive and responsible offerers. Such basis shall reflect, wherever possible, objective and quantifiable analysis. Such basis may also identify quantitative factors to be used for awarding purchase contracts and service, including but not limited to: small businesses; certified minority- or women-owned business enterprises as defined in subdivisions one, seven, fifteen and twenty of section three hundred ten of the Executive Law; a minority- or women-owned business enterprise certified by Monroe County in accordance with Section 26-5 of the Monroe County Code; certified service-disabled veteran-owned business enterprises as defined in subdivision one of section forty of the Veterans' Services Law; and/or or green procurement specifications approved by New York State.

PUBLIC WORK CONTRACT

Encompasses a contract for services, labor or construction public works under Article 8 of the New York Labor Law.

PURCHASE CONTRACT

Pertains to purchases of materials, supplies, equipment or apparatus and related services, except any contract necessary for the completion of public works pursuant to Article 8 of the New York Labor Law.

Section 5. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section or article of this local law shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such determination shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, section or article thereof directly involved in the proceeding in which such adjudication shall have been rendered.

Section 6. This local law shall take effect upon filing with the Secretary of State pursuant to Section 27 of the New York Municipal Home Rule Law and the Monroe County Charter.

LOCAL LAW NO. ____ OF 2023

ENACT A LOCAL LAW ENTITLED "MONROE COUNTY FAIR CHANCE EMPLOYMENT ACT"

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. Title. This local law shall be known as the "Monroe County Fair Chance Employment Act."

Section 2. Legislative Intent.

- A. The Legislature finds that those with a criminal history regularly face discrimination in many areas of life, including employment.
- B. The Legislature further finds that studies indicate that stable employment is one of the best predictors of post-conviction success.
- C. The Legislature further finds that the ability of individuals with a criminal history to successfully reintegrate into their communities and find employment improves public safety and benefits local taxpayers, as less crime leads to safer communities, strengthens families, and saves taxpayers money on costs associated with law enforcement and incarceration.
- **D**. The Legislature determines that those who have been incarcerated have paid their debt to society and should be afforded a fair opportunity to reenter the workplace. Individuals with a criminal history should not be discriminated against once they are released from prison and should be evaluated for employment based upon their qualifications to perform a job, rather than their criminal history.
- E. The Legislature determines that individuals with a criminal history represent a workforce with skills to contribute and a desire to add value to their communities.
- F. The Legislature determines that the main goal of a criminal justice system should be rehabilitation and that once individuals reenter society, they should be treated fairly and without discrimination based on a prior conviction.
- G. The Legislature finds that employment discrimination based on criminal history can affect anyone regardless of race, religion, national origin, gender, or sexual orientation. However, African Americans are disproportionately hurt by discrimination based on criminal history due to a long history of policies that have led to African Americans being incarcerated at rates more than five times that of Whites, and more than two and a half times that of Hispanics.
- H. The Legislature determines that due to a criminal justice system in which minorities are incarcerated at much higher rates than Whites, African Americans and Hispanics bear the brunt of employment discrimination based on criminal history.
- The Legislature finds that nine municipalities and three counties in the state of New York have implemented policies to protect job applicants against potential discrimination, including New York City, Buffalo, and Rochester.

- J. The Legislature further finds that over twenty states and more than one hundred municipalities and counties throughout the United States across all political lines have implemented policies to protect job applicants from potential discrimination.
- K. The Legislature further finds that New York Correction Law does not prohibit employers from inquiring about criminal history on employment applications. Because the vast majority of applications are discarded during an initial review for a variety of reasons, it makes it extremely difficult for an applicant to prove that he or she was not hired due to his or her criminal history. In addition, many applicants simply will not apply for a position if they are required to disclose their criminal history on an employment application.
- L. Therefore, the purpose of this local law is to ensure that everyone receives a fair chance in seeking employment with Monroe County, regardless of one's arrest record or criminal history.

Section 3. Purpose. The purpose of this section is to ensure that applicants for positions with Monroe County are not unfairly discriminated against because of prior criminal history during the application process.

Section 4. Definitions. As used in this section:

"Adverse Action" means to refuse to hire or promote, to discharge an individual from his or her employment, or revoke an applicant's conditional offer of employment.

"Applicant" means any person considered or who requests to be considered for employment by the County.

"Application Process" means the period of time beginning when an applicant inquires about employment with the County or submits an employment application to the County, and ends when the applicant is provided a conditional offer of employment or the County chooses not to offer the applicant a conditional offer of employment.

"Arrest" means a record or action by any jurisdiction that does not result in a conviction, or any encounter with a law enforcement agency that does not result in a conviction. This includes information indicating that a person has been questioned, apprehended, taken into custody or detained, or held for an investigation by a law enforcement, police, or prosecutorial agency.

"Conviction" means any sentence arising from a plea or verdict of guilty, including a sentence of incarceration, a suspended sentence, a sentence of probation, an unconditional discharge, or a diversion program.

"County" means the County of Monroe, its departments, administrative units, public officers, and employees.

"Criminal History" means an individual's prior criminal conviction and/or sentencing in New York State or any other jurisdiction.

Section 5. Prohibition Against Unfair Discrimination. The County shall not:

- A. Inquire about an applicant's criminal history during the application process.
- B. Inquire about an applicant's arrest record at any point in the application process or during any inquiry relating to criminal history; however the County shall not be prohibited from inquiring about pending criminal charges.
- C. Conduct a criminal history check of an applicant until after a conditional offer of employment is

made, unless otherwise required because of the nature of the position or by law.

Section 6. Regulations Relating to Background Checks.

- A. All County job announcements shall contain the following disclosure: "This position is subject to a background check for criminal convictions. Convictions will be considered but will not automatically disqualify the candidate. No criminal background check will occur until after a conditional offer of employment has been made, unless required prior to a conditional offer because of the nature of the position or otherwise required by law."
- B. The County shall not use the following criminal records in relation to a criminal background check: records of arrest not followed by a valid conviction, or records which reflect dismissed or expunged convictions, violations, and infractions; however the County shall not be prohibited from considering pending criminal charges.

Section 7. Guidelines for Consideration of Criminal History and Revocation of Offer of Employment.

- A. Unless a background check is required before a conditional offer of employment because of the nature of the position or otherwise required by law, the County shall send the applicant the following documents prior to conducting a background check or inquiring about an applicant's criminal history:

 (1) a conditional offer of employment, and
 (2) notice that a criminal history check will be conducted prior to the start of employment.
- B. The County shall not take adverse action against an individual due to the individual's criminal history unless such action is in conformance with Article 23-A of New York Correction Law, New York Human Rights Law, and the New York Family Court Act.
- C. Nothing in this local law shall be construed to prevent the County from taking adverse action against any applicant or denying employment for reasons other than such applicant's criminal history.

Section 8. Exceptions.

- A. The prohibitions in this local law shall not apply to the Monroe County Sheriff's Office, the Monroe County Department of Public Safety, the Monroe County Department of Aviation, the Monroe County District Attorney's Office, the Monroe County Children's Detention Center, and positions for which it is otherwise required by law to access criminal history information before a conditional offer is made.
- B. The prohibitions of this local law shall not apply if the inquiries or adverse actions prohibited herein are specifically authorized by any other applicable law. Additionally, nothing in this local law shall diminish the County's rights or responsibilities under Article 23-A of New York Correction Law.

Section 9. Enforcement.

- A. The Monroe County Department of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion is authorized to enforce this local law, to promulgate additional rules and regulations, and take any and all other reasonable actions necessary to implement and enforce this local law. Any rules and regulations set forth in this local law and/or promulgated by the Monroe County Department of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion shall be made available online in a manner approved by the Department of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion.
- B. The Monroe County Department of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion shall be responsible for

conducting proper outreach about this local law.

Section 10. Reverse Preemption. This local law shall be null and void on the day that federal or statewide legislation goes into effect incorporating either the same or substantially similar provisions as are contained in this law, or in the event that a pertinent state or federal administrative agency issues and promulgates regulations preempting such action by the County of Monroe. The County Legislature may determine via resolution whether or not identical or substantially similar federal or statewide legislation, or pertinent preempting state or federal regulations have been enacted for the purposes of triggering the provisions of this section.

Section 11. Severability. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, subdivision, or other part of this local law or its application shall be inconsistent with any federal or state statute, law, regulation or rule then the federal or state statute, law, regulation, or rule shall prevail. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, subdivision, or other part of this local law or its application shall be adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of this local law which shall remain in full force and effect except as limited by such order or judgment.

Section 12. Effective Date and Applicability. This local law shall be effective immediately upon filing in the Office of the Secretary of State.







RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$450,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, NEW YORK, TO FINANCE THE COST OF THE RECONSTRUCTION OF PHILLIPS ROAD (NYS ROUTE 104 TO SCHLEGEL ROAD), IN AND FOR SAID COUNTY, AT AN ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST OF \$450,000 AND SUPERSEDING THE BOND RESOLUTION ADOPTED ON DECEMBER 13, 2022 (RESOLUTION NO. 443 OF 2022)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE AFFIRMATIVE VOTE OF NOT LESS THAN TWO-THIRDS OF THE TOTAL VOTING STRENGTH OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. For the object or purpose of financing the cost of the reconstruction of Phillips Road (NYS Route 104 to Schlegel Road), in and for the County of Monroe, New York (the "County"), there are hereby authorized to be issued \$450,000 bonds of the County, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The duly adopted current Capital Budget of the County, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is hereby amended to provide for the appropriation of an additional \$25,000 to pay the cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose (\$425,000 having been heretofore appropriated from one or more Capital Budgets). The period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is fifteen (15) years, pursuant to subdivision 20(c) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost thereof is \$450,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$450,000 bonds of said County herein authorized, provided, however, that to the extent any state and/or federal aid and/or grant and/or gift is received for the aforesaid purpose, the County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to accept and shall use such funds to redeem any outstanding indebtedness incurred for such purpose or apply it, dollar for dollar, to reduce the amount of bonds to be issued for such purpose.

Section 3. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

<u>Section 4.</u> Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer, the chief fiscal officer of the County under the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may sell such bonds or notes at public or private sale, at a discount or premium, at fixed or variable rates of interest or at no interest whatsoever, or as capital appreciation bonds, and with such amortization of principal as the Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer shall determine is most favorable to the County, and in compliance with any rules of the State Comptroller applicable thereto. Such bonds or notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer, consistent with the provisions of the Local

Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may, in the event it is determined to issue variable rate bonds or notes, enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance, sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds or notes, as authorized under Section 54.90 of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer is also authorized to enter into such agreements and take such other action as may be necessary or appropriate and lawful to assure that, to the extent possible, (i) interest on the bonds and notes authorized hereby will not be includable in the gross income, for federal income tax purposes, of the recipients thereof, and (ii) to enable the purchaser thereof to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12. The Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer is hereby further delegated all powers of this County Legislature with respect to agreements for credit enhancement, derived from and pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, for such bonds or notes, including, but not limited to the determination of the provider of such credit enhancement facility or facilities and the terms and contents of any agreement or agreements related thereto.

Section 5. All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds or notes, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds or notes, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds or notes, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds or notes, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds or notes (and if said bonds or notes are to be executed in the name of the County by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the County), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds or notes, or may contract on behalf of the County for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds or notes shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes, as authorized by this resolution, may be contested only if:

- 1) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and

an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or

3) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This resolution shall supersede Resolution No. 443 of 2022, being a bond resolution dated December 13, 2022, except to the extent that any indebtedness shall have been contracted or encumbrances made thereunder. The purpose of this superseding bond resolution is to effect the following: to increase the maximum estimated cost of the purpose to \$450,000, and to provide \$450,000 bonds therefor, an increase of \$25,000 over the \$425,000 bonds authorized under Resolution No. 443 of 2022.

Section 8. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. SUPERSEDING BOND RESOLUTION DATED JUNE 13, 2023

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$1,360,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, NEW YORK, TO FINANCE THE COST OF THE PURCHASE OF A HAZARDOUS MATERIAL FIRE TRUCK, IN AND FOR SAID COUNTY, AT AN ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST OF \$1,360,000 AND SUPERSEDING THE BOND RESOLUTION ADOPTED ON JANUARY 10, 2023 (RESOLUTION NO. 23 OF 2023)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE AFFIRMATIVE VOTE OF **NOT LESS THAN TWO-THIRDS OF THE TOTAL VOTING STRENGTH** OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. For the object or purpose of financing the cost of the purchase of a Hazardous Material Fire Truck, in and for the County of Monroe, New York (the "County"), there are hereby authorized to be issued \$1,360,000 bonds of the County, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The duly adopted current Capital Budget of the County, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is hereby amended to provide for the appropriation of an additional \$60,000 to pay the cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose (\$1,300,000 having been heretofore appropriated from one or more Capital Budgets). The period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is twenty (20) years, pursuant to subdivision 27 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost thereof is \$1,360,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$1,360,000 bonds of said County herein authorized, provided, however, that to the extent any state and/or federal aid and/or grant and/or gift is received for the aforesaid purpose, the County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to accept and shall use such funds to redeem any outstanding indebtedness incurred for such purpose or apply it, dollar for dollar, to reduce the amount of bonds to be issued for such purpose.

<u>Section 3.</u> The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, the chief fiscal officer of the County under the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may sell such bonds or notes at public or private sale, at a discount or premium, at fixed or variable rates of interest or at no interest whatsoever, or as capital appreciation bonds, and with such amortization of principal as the Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer shall determine is most favorable to the County, and in compliance with any rules of the State Comptroller applicable thereto. Such bonds or notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, consistent with the provisions of the Local

Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may, in the event it is determined to issue variable rate bonds or notes, enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance, sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds or notes, as authorized under Section 54.90 of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer is also authorized to enter into such agreements and take such other action as may be necessary or appropriate and lawful to assure that, to the extent possible, (i) interest on the bonds and notes authorized hereby will not be includable in the gross income, for federal income tax purposes, of the recipients thereof, and (ii) to enable the purchaser thereof to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12. The Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer is hereby further delegated all powers of this County Legislature with respect to agreements for credit enhancement, derived from and pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, for such bonds or notes, including, but not limited to the determination of the provider of such credit enhancement facility or facilities and the terms and contents of any agreement or agreements related thereto.

<u>Section 5.</u> All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds or notes, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds or notes, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds or notes, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds or notes, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds or notes (and if said bonds or notes are to be executed in the name of the County by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the County), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds or notes, or may contract on behalf of the County for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds or notes shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine.

<u>Section 6.</u> The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes, as authorized by this resolution, may be contested only if:

- 1) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and

an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or

3) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This resolution shall supersede Resolution No. 23 of 2023, being a bond resolution dated January 10, 2023, except to the extent that any indebtedness shall have been contracted or encumbrances made thereunder. The purpose of this superseding bond resolution is to effect the following: to increase the maximum estimated cost of the purpose to \$1,360,000, and to provide \$1,360,000 bonds therefor, an increase of \$60,000 over the \$1,300,000 bonds authorized under Resolution No. 23 of 2023.

Section 8. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the objects or purposes described herein.

Subject: Enact a Local Law Amending the Monroe County Purchasing Law to Allow Procurement on the Basis of Best Value

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body enact a local law amending Chapter 25 of the Administrative Code known as the "Monroe County Purchasing Law" to allow for the use of "best value" procurement for the County's purchase contracts.

New York State General Municipal Law Section 103(1) provides that purchase contracts for materials, supplies, equipment, apparatus or services, but excluding contracts necessary for public works, may be awarded on the basis of best value to a responsive and responsible bidder. Section 163 of the State Finance Law defines best value as the basis for awarding contracts "which optimizes quality, cost and efficiency, among responsive and responsible offerers." Under the State Finance Law, such basis should reflect, wherever possible, objective and quantifiable analysis. Best value may also include quantitative factors for offerers, such as small businesses and certified minority or women-owned business enterprises.

The best materials, supplies, equipment, apparatus and services required are not always the lowest cost. In addition to price, the proposed Local Law will allow the County to consider factors such as product and service quality and efficiency, small businesses, certified minority or women-owned business enterprises, certified service-disabled veteran-owned business enterprises, and State-approved green specifications when evaluating responsive and responsible bidders. The proposed Local Law will also permit the County to purchase materials, supplies, equipment, apparatus or services on the basis of best value from contracts let by the Federal Government or another state, political subdivision, or district.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Schedule and hold a public hearing on the proposed Local Law.
- 2. Enact a Local Law to amend the Chapter 25 of the Administrative Code known as the "Monroe County Purchasing Law" to allow for the use of "best value" procurement for purchase contracts.

LOCAL LAW NO. ____ OF 2023

ENACTING A LOCAL LAW AMENDING CHAPTER 25 OF THE MONROE COUNTY ADMINISTRATIVE CODE TO ALLOW PROCUREMENT ON THE BASIS OF BEST VALUE

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. Section 25-2(B)(1) of the Monroe County Administrative Code is amended to read as follows:

(1) Act to procure for the county the highest quality supplies and services at the least expense or on the basis of best value to the county.

Section 2. Section 25-2(E) of the Monroe County Administrative Code is amended to read as follows:

E. Award of purchase contracts and public works contracts which result from public bids shall be made, and purchase contracts which result from public bids may be made, to the lowest responsive and responsible bidder in accordance with the requirements of the General Municipal Law. In cases where two or more responsible bidders submit identical bids as to price, and all other terms and conditions are identical, preference may be given to a bidder whose place of business is within Monroe County. Otherwise, award may be made by drawing lots, or by whatever other method is deemed appropriate by the Purchasing Manager, or all bids may be rejected and new bids sought by readvertisement.

Section 3. Section 25-2 of the Monroe County Administrative Code is amended to read as follows:

F. Award of purchase contracts (including contracts for service work, but excluding any purchase contracts necessary for the completion of public works contracts) which result from public bids may also be awarded by the Purchasing Manager to responsive and responsible bidders on the basis of best value.

G. Best value procurement shall be subject to the following requirements:

- <u>The County Purchasing Manager shall determine when best value shall be the basis of an</u> award. The County Purchasing Manager shall document the criteria used to rate proposals and evaluation results, or if not practicable, such other justification which demonstrates how best value was achieved for the County.
- (2) Whenever practicable, the evaluation of best value shall be based upon objective and quantifiable factors which optimize quality, cost, and efficiency, but shall not be based solely on cost, in accordance with New York State Finance Law § 163.
- (3) <u>The evaluation criteria and process for awarding procurements based upon best value</u> <u>shall be identified in the County's procurement policy.</u>

- (4) <u>The County's solicitation documents shall prescribe the minimum specifications or requirements that must be met in order for bidders and offerors to be considered responsive, and describe the general manner in which the evaluation and selection shall be conducted.</u>
- (5) <u>In accordance with Article 8 of the Labor Law, best value may not be used for purchase</u> <u>contracts necessary for the completion of public works contracts.</u>

FH. In the absence of public bidding requirements, all purchase contracts and public works contracts shall, wherever feasible and cost effective, be based on at least three competitive quotations and shall be awarded to the lowest responsive and responsible bidder. The Purchasing Manager may solicit quotations by such method or methods, including direct mail and telephone, as he/she shall deem suitable.

GI. In the case of a public emergency arising out of an accident or other unforeseen occurrence or condition whereby circumstances affecting public buildings, public property or the life, health, safety or property of the inhabitants of the county require immediate action which cannot await competitive bidding, purchase contracts or public works contracts may be let without such competitive bidding upon certification by the county official requesting the emergency purchase or public work contract using procedures promulgated by the Purchasing Manager and approved by the County Attorney.

HJ. In accordance with the General Municipal Law, the Purchasing Manager may enter into a purchase contract with a single supplier without carrying out public bidding procedures if the supplier receives designation as a sole source vendor under procedures promulgated by the Purchasing Manager and approved by the County Attorney.

IK. In accordance with § 408-a of the County Law, the Purchasing Manager is authorized to include a provision in any county contract which permits purchases under such contract by any political subdivision, fire company or district located in whole or in part in Monroe County; provided, however, that the political subdivision, fire company or district accepts sole responsibility for any payment to the vendor.

Section 4. Section 25-5 of the Monroe County Administrative Code is amended to read as follows:

§ 25-5 Definitions; applicability.

A. As used in this chapter, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

BEST VALUE

Means the basis for awarding contracts for materials, supplies, equipment, apparatus, or services, except public works under Article 8 of the New York Labor Law, to the offerer which optimizes quality, cost, and efficiency, among responsive and responsible offerers. HJ. In accordance with the General Municipal Law, the Purchasing Manager may enter into a purchase contract with a single supplier without carrying out public bidding procedures if the supplier receives designation as a sole source vendor under procedures promulgated by the Purchasing Manager and approved by the County Attorney.

IK. Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body enact a local law amending Chapter 25 of the Administrative Code known as the "Monroe County Purchasing Law" to allow for the use of "best value" procurement for the County's purchase contracts.

New York State General Municipal Law Section 103(1) provides that purchase contracts for materials, supplies, equipment, apparatus or services, but excluding contracts necessary for public works, may be awarded on the basis of best value to a responsive and responsible bidder. Section 163 of the State Finance Law defines best value as the basis for awarding contracts "which optimizes quality, cost and efficiency, among responsive and responsible offerers." Under the State Finance Law, such basis should reflect, wherever possible, objective and quantifiable analysis. Best value may also include quantitative factors for offerers, such as small businesses and certified minority or women-owned business enterprises.

The best materials, supplies, equipment, apparatus and services required are not always the lowest cost. In addition to price, the proposed Local Law will allow the County to consider factors such as product and service quality and efficiency, small businesses, certified minority or women-owned business enterprises, certified service-disabled veteran-owned business enterprises, and State-approved green specifications when evaluating responsive and responsible bidders. The proposed Local Law will also permit the County to purchase materials, supplies, equipment, apparatus or services on the basis of best value from contracts let by the Federal Government or another state, political subdivision, or district.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Schedule and hold a public hearing on the proposed Local Law.
- 2. Enact a Local Law to amend the Chapter 25 of the Administrative Code known as the "Monroe County Purchasing Law" to allow for the use of "best value" procurement for purchase contracts.

LOCAL LAW NO. ____ OF 2023

ENACTING A LOCAL LAW AMENDING CHAPTER 25 OF THE MONROE COUNTY ADMINISTRATIVE CODE TO ALLOW PROCUREMENT ON THE BASIS OF BEST VALUE

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. Section 25-2(B)(1) of the Monroe County Administrative Code is amended to read as follows:

(1) Act to procure for the county the highest quality supplies and services at the least expense or on the basis of best value to the county.

Section 2. Section 25-2(E) of the Monroe County Administrative Code is amended to read as follows:

E. Award of purchase contracts and public works contracts which result from public bids shall be made, and purchase contracts which result from public bids may be made, to the lowest responsive and responsible bidder in accordance with the requirements of the General Municipal Law. In cases where two or more responsible bidders submit identical bids as to price, and all other terms and conditions are identical, preference may be given to a bidder whose place of business is within Monroe County. Otherwise, award may be made by drawing lots, or by whatever other method is deemed appropriate by the Purchasing Manager, or all bids may be rejected and new bids sought by readvertisement.

Section 3. Section 25-2 of the Monroe County Administrative Code is amended to read as follows:

F. Award of purchase contracts (including contracts for service work, but excluding any purchase contracts necessary for the completion of public works contracts) which result from public bids may also be awarded by the Purchasing Manager to responsive and responsible bidders on the basis of best value.

G. Best value procurement shall be subject to the following requirements:

- <u>The County Purchasing Manager shall determine when best value shall be the basis of an</u> award. The County Purchasing Manager shall document the criteria used to rate proposals and evaluation results, or if not practicable, such other justification which demonstrates how best value was achieved for the County.
- (2) Whenever practicable, the evaluation of best value shall be based upon objective and quantifiable factors which optimize quality, cost, and efficiency, but shall not be based solely on cost, in accordance with New York State Finance Law § 163.
- (3) <u>The evaluation criteria and process for awarding procurements based upon best value</u> <u>shall be identified in the County's procurement policy.</u>

- (4) <u>The County's solicitation documents shall prescribe the minimum specifications or requirements that must be met in order for bidders and offerors to be considered responsive, and describe the general manner in which the evaluation and selection shall be conducted.</u>
- (5) <u>In accordance with Article 8 of the Labor Law, best value may not be used for purchase</u> <u>contracts necessary for the completion of public works contracts.</u>

FH. In the absence of public bidding requirements, all purchase contracts and public works contracts shall, wherever feasible and cost effective, be based on at least three competitive quotations and shall be awarded to the lowest responsive and responsible bidder. The Purchasing Manager may solicit quotations by such method or methods, including direct mail and telephone, as he/she shall deem suitable.

GI. In the case of a public emergency arising out of an accident or other unforeseen occurrence or condition whereby circumstances affecting public buildings, public property or the life, health, safety or property of the inhabitants of the county require immediate action which cannot await competitive bidding, purchase contracts or public works contracts may be let without such competitive bidding upon certification by the county official requesting the emergency purchase or public work contract using procedures promulgated by the Purchasing Manager and approved by the County Attorney.

HJ. In accordance with the General Municipal Law, the Purchasing Manager may enter into a purchase contract with a single supplier without carrying out public bidding procedures if the supplier receives designation as a sole source vendor under procedures promulgated by the Purchasing Manager and approved by the County Attorney.

IK. In accordance with § 408-a of the County Law, the Purchasing Manager is authorized to include a provision in any county contract which permits purchases under such contract by any political subdivision, fire company or district located in whole or in part in Monroe County; provided, however, that the political subdivision, fire company or district accepts sole responsibility for any payment to the vendor.

Section 4. Section 25-5 of the Monroe County Administrative Code is amended to read as follows:

§ 25-5 Definitions; applicability.

A. As used in this chapter, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

BEST VALUE

Means the basis for awarding contracts for materials, supplies, equipment, apparatus, or services, except public works under Article 8 of the New York Labor Law, to the offerer which optimizes quality, cost, and efficiency, among responsive and responsible offerers. Such basis shall reflect, wherever possible, objective and quantifiable analysis. Such basis may also identify quantitative factors to be used for awarding purchase contracts and service, including but not limited to: small businesses; certified minority- or women-owned business enterprises as defined in subdivisions one, seven, fifteen and twenty of section three hundred ten of the Executive Law; a minority- or women-owned business enterprise certified by Monroe County in accordance with Section 26-5 of the Monroe County Code; certified service-disabled veteran-owned business enterprises as defined in subdivision one of section forty of the Veterans' Services Law; and/or or green procurement specifications approved by New York State.

PUBLIC WORK CONTRACT

Encompasses a contract for services, labor or construction <u>public works under Article 8 of</u> the New York Labor Law.

PURCHASE CONTRACT

Pertains to purchases of materials, supplies, equipment or apparatus and related services, except any contract necessary for the completion of public works pursuant to Article 8 of the New York Labor Law.

Section 5. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section or article of this local law shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such determination shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, section or article thereof directly involved in the proceeding in which such adjudication shall have been rendered.

Section 6. This local law shall take effect upon filing with the Secretary of State pursuant to Section 27 of the New York Municipal Home Rule Law and the Monroe County Charter.

LOCAL LAW NO. ____ OF 2023

ENACT A LOCAL LAW ENTITLED "MONROE COUNTY FAIR CHANCE EMPLOYMENT ACT"

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. Title. This local law shall be known as the "Monroe County Fair Chance Employment Act."

Section 2. Legislative Intent.

- A. The Legislature finds that those with a criminal history regularly face discrimination in many areas of life, including employment.
- B. The Legislature further finds that studies indicate that stable employment is one of the best predictors of post-conviction success.
- C. The Legislature further finds that the ability of individuals with a criminal history to successfully reintegrate into their communities and find employment improves public safety and benefits local taxpayers, as less crime leads to safer communities, strengthens families, and saves taxpayers money on costs associated with law enforcement and incarceration.
- D. The Legislature determines that those who have been incarcerated have paid their debt to society and should be afforded a fair opportunity to reenter the workplace. Individuals with a criminal history should not be discriminated against once they are released from prison and should be evaluated for employment based upon their qualifications to perform a job, rather than their criminal history.
- E. The Legislature determines that individuals with a criminal history represent a workforce with skills to contribute and a desire to add value to their communities.
- F. The Legislature determines that the main goal of a criminal justice system should be rehabilitation and that once individuals reenter society, they should be treated fairly and without discrimination based on a prior conviction.
- G. The Legislature finds that employment discrimination based on criminal history can affect anyone regardless of race, religion, national origin, gender, or sexual orientation. However, African Americans are disproportionately hurt by discrimination based on criminal history due to a long history of policies that have led to African Americans being incarcerated at rates more than five times that of Whites, and more than two and a half times that of Hispanics.
- H. The Legislature determines that due to a criminal justice system in which minorities are incarcerated at much higher rates than Whites, African Americans and Hispanics bear the brunt of employment discrimination based on criminal history.
- I. The Legislature finds that nine municipalities and three counties in the state of New York have implemented policies to protect job applicants against potential discrimination, including New York City, Buffalo, and Rochester.

- J. The Legislature further finds that over twenty states and more than one hundred municipalities and counties throughout the United States across all political lines have implemented policies to protect job applicants from potential discrimination.
- K. The Legislature further finds that New York Correction Law does not prohibit employers from inquiring about criminal history on employment applications. Because the vast majority of applications are discarded during an initial review for a variety of reasons, it makes it extremely difficult for an applicant to prove that he or she was not hired due to his or her criminal history. In addition, many applicants simply will not apply for a position if they are required to disclose their criminal history on an employment application.
- L. Therefore, the purpose of this local law is to ensure that everyone receives a fair chance in seeking employment with Monroe County, regardless of one's arrest record or criminal history.

Section 3. Purpose. The purpose of this section is to ensure that applicants for positions with Monroe County are not unfairly discriminated against because of prior criminal history during the application process.

Section 4. Definitions. As used in this section:

"Adverse Action" means to refuse to hire or promote, to discharge an individual from his or her employment, or revoke an applicant's conditional offer of employment.

"Applicant" means any person considered or who requests to be considered for employment by the County.

"Application Process" means the period of time beginning when an applicant inquires about employment with the County or submits an employment application to the County, and ends when the applicant is provided a conditional offer of employment or the County chooses not to offer the applicant a conditional offer of employment.

"Arrest" means a record or action by any jurisdiction that does not result in a conviction, or any encounter with a law enforcement agency that does not result in a conviction. This includes information indicating that a person has been questioned, apprehended, taken into custody or detained, or held for an investigation by a law enforcement, police, or prosecutorial agency.

"Conviction" means any sentence arising from a plea or verdict of guilty, including a sentence of incarceration, a suspended sentence, a sentence of probation, an unconditional discharge, or a diversion program.

"County" means the County of Monroe, its departments, administrative units, public officers, and employees.

"Criminal History" means an individual's prior criminal conviction and/or sentencing in New York State or any other jurisdiction.

Section 5. Prohibition Against Unfair Discrimination. The County shall not:

- A. Inquire about an applicant's criminal history during the application process.
- B. Inquire about an applicant's arrest record at any point in the application process or during any inquiry relating to criminal history; however the County shall not be prohibited from inquiring about pending criminal charges.
- C. Conduct a criminal history check of an applicant until after a conditional offer of employment is

made, unless otherwise required because of the nature of the position or by law.

Section 6. Regulations Relating to Background Checks.

- A. All County job announcements shall contain the following disclosure: "This position is subject to a background check for criminal convictions. Convictions will be considered but will not automatically disqualify the candidate. No criminal background check will occur until after a conditional offer of employment has been made, unless required prior to a conditional offer because of the nature of the position or otherwise required by law."
- B. The County shall not use the following criminal records in relation to a criminal background check: records of arrest not followed by a valid conviction, or records which reflect dismissed or expunged convictions, violations, and infractions; however the County shall not be prohibited from considering pending criminal charges.

Section 7. Guidelines for Consideration of Criminal History and Revocation of Offer of Employment.

- A. Unless a background check is required before a conditional offer of employment because of the nature of the position or otherwise required by law, the County shall send the applicant the following documents prior to conducting a background check or inquiring about an applicant's criminal history:

 (1) a conditional offer of employment, and
 (2) notice that a criminal history check will be conducted prior to the start of employment.
- B. The County shall not take adverse action against an individual due to the individual's criminal history unless such action is in conformance with Article 23-A of New York Correction Law, New York Human Rights Law, and the New York Family Court Act.
- C. Nothing in this local law shall be construed to prevent the County from taking adverse action against any applicant or denying employment for reasons other than such applicant's criminal history.

Section 8. Exceptions.

- A. The prohibitions in this local law shall not apply to the Monroe County Sheriff's Office, the Monroe County Department of Public Safety, the Monroe County Department of Aviation, the Monroe County District Attorney's Office, the Monroe County Children's Detention Center, and positions for which it is otherwise required by law to access criminal history information before a conditional offer is made.
- B. The prohibitions of this local law shall not apply if the inquiries or adverse actions prohibited herein are specifically authorized by any other applicable law. Additionally, nothing in this local law shall diminish the County's rights or responsibilities under Article 23-A of New York Correction Law.

Section 9. Enforcement.

- A. The Monroe County Department of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion is authorized to enforce this local law, to promulgate additional rules and regulations, and take any and all other reasonable actions necessary to implement and enforce this local law. Any rules and regulations set forth in this local law and/or promulgated by the Monroe County Department of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion shall be made available online in a manner approved by the Department of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion.
- B. The Monroe County Department of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion shall be responsible for

conducting proper outreach about this local law.

Section 10. Reverse Preemption. This local law shall be null and void on the day that federal or statewide legislation goes into effect incorporating either the same or substantially similar provisions as are contained in this law, or in the event that a pertinent state or federal administrative agency issues and promulgates regulations preempting such action by the County of Monroe. The County Legislature may determine via resolution whether or not identical or substantially similar federal or statewide legislation, or pertinent preempting state or federal regulations have been enacted for the purposes of triggering the provisions of this section.

Section 11. Severability. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, subdivision, or other part of this local law or its application shall be inconsistent with any federal or state statute, law, regulation or rule then the federal or state statute, law, regulation, or rule shall prevail. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, subdivision, or other part of this local law or its application shall be adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of this local law which shall remain in full force and effect except as limited by such order or judgment.

Section 12. Effective Date and Applicability. This local law shall be effective immediately upon filing in the Office of the Secretary of State.

Enact a Local Law Entitled "Monroe County Fair Chance Employment Act" Subject:

Honorable Legislators:

Over ninety percent of human resource professionals conduct some sort of criminal background check during the hiring process. Applicants who indicate their criminal record on the initial job application are less likely to receive a callback interview. Researchers have found that among white applicants, 34% of applicants without a criminal record and 17% of those with criminal records were later contacted about a callback interview.

Among African Americans applicants, 14% of applicants without a criminal record and only 4% of those with criminal records were later contacted about a callback interview. The fact that a higher percentage of white applicants with a criminal record were contacted about a callback interview than black applicants without criminal records illustrates the extreme structural disadvantages that black applicants with criminal records face in the employment market.

There are an estimated 65 million adults in the United States with a criminal history. It has been well-documented that African Americans and Latinos are disproportionately represented at every stage of the criminal justice system. Application questions about criminal records guarantee that these Americans will have difficulty finding employment, especially members of minority communities.

The inability to find employment has a marked effect on these community members and their families. One study found that in the year after an incarcerated father is released, the total family income drops by approximately 15% from what it was before incarceration. Because of the stunted upward mobility of people with criminal records, they must often rely on family members and communities for support. Research has shown that 83% of the families of formerly incarcerated men had recently provided financial support to their family member, with half of those families reporting that this support was a financial challenge and 30% of these families reporting that this support was a "financial hardship." In sum, these studies and statistics illustrate the structural barriers faced by people with criminal records a need that birthed the Ban the Box Movement.

Hiring people with criminal records facilitates public safety by reducing recidivism rates. Studies show that gainful employment is the most successful intervention in decreasing recidivism. One study showed that two years after release, employed people were more than twice as likely to have not committed any additional crimes when compared to formerly incarcerated people who were unable to secure employment.

Statistical and anecdotal evidence illustrate that Ban the Box policies help dismantle the structural discrimination faced by people with records in the employment market. Formerly incarcerated people who were consistently employed throughout the year had a 16% recidivism rate compared to a 52.3% recidivism rate for all other Department of Correction releases. Fair hiring policies also benefit our communities in the form of increased tax revenue and public safety.

More than 150 cities and counties as well as 25 states have adopted Ban the Box policies to help the estimated 70 million people in the United States with a prior arrest or conviction record have a fair chance at employment. Albany County, Dutchess County, Suffolk County and New York City have all passed "ban-the-box legislation. Locally, the City of Rochester and the City of Buffalo have enacted similar legislation.

The RASE Commission report, in its section on job creation, recommended that Monroe County join the City of Rochester and Ban the Box. The report states: "Having stable employment is essential to reintegrating those who have been involved with the justice system back into society. However, these individuals often report believing that they are automatically excluded from most jobs (including Civil Service), or that employers will not even consider them, based on a past criminal record. While this is often untrue, requirements and rules are typically vague around issues like a criminal record."

The proposed local law will help Monroe County fill an estimated 800 vacant positions while ensuring that prospective applicants are not stigmatized and are not discouraged from applying for County positions simply because of a question on the front page of the application. It should also help in diversifying the County's workforce.

Removing the question from the application does not mean that a background check will not be conducted or that an employer cannot exercise appropriate due diligence, but just that it is delayed until later in the process. The legislation also provides exceptions for the Monroe County Sheriff's Department, the Monroe County Department of Public Safety, and positions for which it is already required by law to access criminal history information before the conditional offer stage.

This reform to the County's hiring policy is long overdue.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Schedule and hold a public hearing.
- 2. Adopt the local law as attached.

Section 7. Guidelines for Consideration of Criminal History and Revocation of Offer of Employment.

Unless a background check is required before a conditional offer of employment because of the nature of the position or otherwise required by law, the County shall send the applicant the following documents prior to conducting a background check or inquiring about an applicant's criminal history: (1) a conditional offer of employment, and (2) notice that a criminal history check will be conducted prior to the start of employment.

The prohibitions in this local law shall not apply to the Monroe County Sheriff's Office, the Monroe County Department of Public Safety, the Monroe County Department of Aviation, the Monroe County District Attorney's Office, the Monroe County Children's Detention Center, and positions for which it is otherwise required by law to access criminal history information before a conditional offer is made.
- B. The prohibitions of this local law shall not apply if the inquiries or adverse actions prohibited herein are specifically authorized by any other applicable law. Additionally, nothing in this local law shall diminish the County's rights or responsibilities under Article 23-A of New York Correction Law.

This local law shall be null and void on the day that federal or statewide legislation goes into effect incorporating either the same or substantially similar provisions as are contained in this law, or in the event that a pertinent state or federal administrative agency issues and promulgates regulations preempting such action by the County of Monroe. The County Legislature may determine via resolution whether or not identical or substantially similar federal or statewide legislation, or pertinent preempting state or federal regulations have been enacted for the purposes of triggering the provisions of this section.

Section 11. Severability. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, subdivision, or other part of this local law or its application shall be inconsistent with any federal or state statute, law, regulation or rule then the federal or state statute, law, regulation, or rule shall prevail. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, subdivision, or other part of this local law or its application shall be adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of this local law which shall remain in full force and effect except as limited by such order or judgment.

Enact a Local Law Entitled "Monroe County Fair Chance Employment Act" Subject:

Honorable Legislators:

Over ninety percent of human resource professionals conduct some sort of criminal background check during the hiring process. Applicants who indicate their criminal record on the initial job application are less likely to receive a callback interview. Researchers have found that among white applicants, 34% of applicants without a criminal record and 17% of those with criminal records were later contacted about a callback interview.

Among African Americans applicants, 14% of applicants without a criminal record and only 4% of those with criminal records were later contacted about a callback interview. The fact that a higher percentage of white applicants with a criminal record were contacted about a callback interview than black applicants without criminal records illustrates the extreme structural disadvantages that black applicants with criminal records face in the employment market.

There are an estimated 65 million adults in the United States with a criminal history. It has been well-documented that African Americans and Latinos are disproportionately represented at every stage of the criminal justice system. Application questions about criminal records guarantee that these Americans will have difficulty finding employment, especially members of minority communities.

The inability to find employment has a marked effect on these community members and their families. One study found that in the year after an incarcerated father is released, the total family income drops by approximately 15% from what it was before incarceration. Because of the stunted upward mobility of people with criminal records, they must often rely on family members and communities for support. Research has shown that 83% of the families of formerly incarcerated men had recently provided financial support to their family member, with half of those families reporting that this support was a financial challenge and 30% of these families reporting that this support was a "financial hardship." In sum, these studies and statistics illustrate the structural barriers faced by people with criminal records a need that birthed the Ban the Box Movement.

Hiring people with criminal records facilitates public safety by reducing recidivism rates. Studies show that gainful employment is the most successful intervention in decreasing recidivism. One study showed that two years after release, employed people were more than twice as likely to have not committed any additional crimes when compared to formerly incarcerated people who were unable to secure employment.

Statistical and anecdotal evidence illustrate that Ban the Box policies help dismantle the structural discrimination faced by people with records in the employment market. Formerly incarcerated people who were consistently employed throughout the year had a 16% recidivism rate compared to a 52.3% recidivism rate for all other Department of Correction releases. Fair hiring policies also benefit our communities in the form of increased tax revenue and public safety.

More than 150 cities and counties as well as 25 states have adopted Ban the Box policies to help the estimated 70 million people in the United States with a prior arrest or conviction record have a fair chance at employment. Albany County, Dutchess County, Suffolk County and New York City have all passed "ban-the-box legislation. Locally, the City of Rochester and the City of Buffalo have enacted similar legislation.

The RASE Commission report, in its section on job creation, recommended that Monroe County join the City of Rochester and Ban the Box. The report states: "Having stable employment is essential to reintegrating those who have been involved with the justice system back into society. However, these individuals often report believing that they are automatically excluded from most jobs (including Civil Service), or that employers will not even consider them, based on a past criminal record. While this is often untrue, requirements and rules are typically vague around issues like a criminal record."

The proposed local law will help Monroe County fill an estimated 800 vacant positions while ensuring that prospective applicants are not stigmatized and are not discouraged from applying for County positions simply because of a question on the front page of the application. It should also help in diversifying the County's workforce.

Removing the question from the application does not mean that a background check will not be conducted or that an employer cannot exercise appropriate due diligence, but just that it is delayed until later in the process. The legislation also provides exceptions for the Monroe County Sheriff's Department, the Monroe County Department of Public Safety, and positions for which it is already required by law to access criminal history information before the conditional offer stage.

This reform to the County's hiring policy is long overdue.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Schedule and hold a public hearing.
- 2. Adopt the local law as attached.

This action is a Type II Action Pursuant to 6 NYCRR §617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

ENACT A LOCAL LAW ENTITLED "MONROE COUNTY FAIR CHANCE EMPLOYMENT ACT"

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. Title. This local law shall be known as the "Monroe County Fair Chance Employment Act."

Section 2. Legislative Intent.

- A. The Legislature finds that those with a criminal history regularly face discrimination in many areas of life, including employment.
- B. The Legislature further finds that studies indicate that stable employment is one of the best predictors of post-conviction success.
- C. The Legislature further finds that the ability of individuals with a criminal history to successfully reintegrate into their communities and find employment improves public safety and benefits local taxpayers, as less crime leads to safer communities, strengthens families, and saves taxpayers money on costs associated with law enforcement and incarceration.
- D. The Legislature determines that those who have been incarcerated have paid their debt to society and should be afforded a fair opportunity to reenter the workplace. Individuals with a criminal history should not be discriminated against once they are released from prison and should be evaluated for employment based upon their qualifications to perform a job, rather than their criminal history.
- E. The Legislature determines that individuals with a criminal history represent a workforce with skills to contribute and a desire to add value to their communities.
- F. The Legislature determines that the main goal of a criminal justice system should be rehabilitation and that once individuals reenter society, they should be treated fairly and without discrimination based on a prior conviction.
- G. The Legislature finds that employment discrimination based on criminal history can affect anyone regardless of race, religion, national origin, gender, or sexual orientation. However, African Americans are disproportionately hurt by discrimination based on criminal history due to a long history of policies that have led to African Americans being incarcerated at rates more than five times that of Whites, and more than two and a half times that of Hispanics.
- H. The Legislature determines that due to a criminal justice system in which minorities are

incarcerated at much higher rates than Whites, African Americans and Hispanics bear the brunt of employment discrimination based on criminal history.

- 1. The Legislature finds that nine municipalities and three counties in the state of New York have implemented policies to protect job applicants against potential discrimination, including New York City, Buffalo, and Rochester.
- J. The Legislature further finds that over twenty states and more than one hundred municipalities and counties throughout the United States across all political lines have implemented policies to protect job applicants from potential discrimination.
- K. The Legislature further finds that New York Correction Law does not prohibit employers from inquiring about criminal history on employment applications. Because the vast majority of applications are discarded during an initial review for a variety of reasons, it makes it extremely difficult for an applicant to prove that he or she was not hired due to his or her criminal history. In addition, many applicants simply will not apply for a position if they are required to disclose their criminal history on an employment application.
- L. Therefore, the purpose of this local law is to ensure that everyone receives a fair chance in seeking employment with Monroe County, regardless of one's arrest record or criminal history.

Section 3. Purpose. The purpose of this section is to ensure that applicants for positions with Monroe County are not unfairly discriminated against because of prior criminal history during the application process.

Section 4. Definitions. As used in this section:

"Adverse Action" means to refuse to hire or promote, to discharge an individual from his or her employment, or revoke an applicant's conditional offer of employment.

"Applicant" means any person considered or who requests to be considered for employment by the County.

"Application Process" means the period of time beginning when an applicant inquires about employment with the County or submits an employment application to the County, and ends when the applicant is provided a conditional offer of employment or the County chooses not to offer the applicant a conditional offer of employment.

"Arrest" means a record or action by any jurisdiction that does not result in a conviction, or any encounter with a law enforcement agency that does not result in a conviction. This includes information indicating that a person has been questioned, apprehended, taken into custody or detained, or held for an investigation by a law enforcement, police, or prosecutorial agency.

"Conviction" means any sentence arising from a plea or verdict of guilty, including a sentence of incarceration, a suspended sentence, a sentence of probation, an unconditional discharge, or a diversion program.

"County" means the County of Monroe, its departments, administrative units, public officers, and employees.

"Criminal History" means an individual's prior criminal conviction and/or sentencing in New York State or any other jurisdiction.

Section 5. Prohibition Against Unfair Discrimination. The County shall not:

- A. Inquire about an applicant's criminal history during the application process.
- B. Inquire about an applicant's arrest record at any point in the application process or during any inquiry relating to criminal history; however the County shall not be prohibited from inquiring about pending criminal charges.

The County Legislature may determine via resolution whether or not identical or substantially similar federal or statewide legislation, or pertinent preempting state or federal regulations have been enacted for the purposes of triggering the provisions of this section.

Section 11. Severability. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, subdivision, or other part of this local law or its application shall be inconsistent with any federal or state statute, law, regulation or rule then the federal or state statute, law, regulation, or rule shall prevail. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, subdivision, or other part of this local law or its application shall be adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of this local law which shall remain in full force and effect except as limited by such order or judgment.

Section 12. Effective Date and Applicability. This local law shall be effective immediately upon filing in the Office of the Secretary of State.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body determine whether the Lifetime Assistance Brick Schoolhouse Road Project funded through the Monroe County Home Investment Partnerships ("HOME") Program may have a significant adverse impact on the environment pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA").

The project involves renovating the existing one story, slab-on-grade wood framed Individualized Residential Alternative (IRA) group home facility for six developmentally disabled occupants. The intent of these proposed renovations is to increase the residence from four bedrooms to six bedrooms. Each of the bedrooms will be 135 square feet, allowing additional maneuvering space for residents using wheelchairs.





Subject: 2023 Annual Action Plan for Housing and Community Development in Suburban Monroe County and Grant Submission to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body approve Monroe County's 2023 Annual Action Plan for Housing and Community Development in Suburban Monroe County and Grant Submission to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development ("HUD") for the Community Development Block Grant ("CDBG"), Home Investment Partnerships Program ("HOME") and Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG) programs.

Approval of this submission by HUD will provide the County with funding in the amount of \$3,444,380 for the period of August 1, 2023 to July 31, 2024. This represents the combined total of funds for the CDBG Program in the amount of \$1,872,408; the HOME Program in the amount of \$1,410,985; and the ESG Program in the amount of \$160,987. This year's allocations represent a \$312,745 increase in funding received from HUD last year. This is the 48th year the County will receive this funding.

The CDBG, HOME and ESG programs have been designed to carry out neighborhood projects, Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) improvements to public facilities, community services, economic development activities, housing activities, and homeless services. Pursuant to HUD regulations, these programs must principally benefit low to moderate-income persons, the elderly, and persons with special needs who live in the towns and villages that participate in the Monroe County Community Development Consortium.

Members of the Consortium and community services agencies apply to the County to receive grants for projects, which are listed in the 2023 Annual Action Plan.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to submit the 2023 Annual Action Plan to the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and to provide such additional information as may be required by HUD for the Community Development Block Grant, Home Investment Partnerships Program, and Emergency Solutions Grants programs.
- 2. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept the grant funds in the amount of \$3,444,380 or such other amount as determined by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), subject to HUD approval of the submission.

- 3. Appropriate the sum of \$3,444,380 for grant funds, or such other amount as determined by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development "(HU"D), and the sum of \$241,424, which is the estimated Program Income expected to be generated during the program year, into fund 9005; funds center 1501010000, Community Development Grants, contingent on HUD approval.
- 4. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute all contracts, including intermunicipal agreements, and any amendments thereto, that are necessary to carry out the administration of the Community Development Block Grant, Home Investment Partnerships Program and Emergency Solutions Grants programs.
- 5. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute all agreements, debt instruments, and other documents for each loan, grant, relending project or activity which may be approved under HUD Section 108 Loan Guarantee Assistance program, pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, and to accept, receive and reappropriate funds which are borrowed from HUD or any other party, and relend the same to qualified borrowers.
- 6. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to approve the use of contingency funds or funds reprogrammed from current or prior years pursuant to the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development regulations.
- 7. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept, receive and appropriate or reappropriate any funds which accrue to the Community Development Office in the form of program income for use in connection with programs offered or funded by the Community Development Office, which administers the grants. All such income shall be utilized in accordance with the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development regulations governing the use of program income.
- 8. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments.
- 9. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify such program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law, and when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

The 2023 Annual Action Plan includes Type II actions pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(1) ("maintenance or repair involving no substantial changes in an existing structure or facility"); (2) ("replacement, rehabilitation or reconstruction of a structure or facility, in kind, on the same site, including upgrading buildings to meet building, energy, or fire codes unless such action meets or exceeds any of the thresholds in section 617.4 of this Part"); (5) ("repaving of existing highways not involving the addition of new travel lanes"); (6) ("street openings and right-of-way openings for the purpose of repair or maintenance of existing utility facilities"); (13) ("extension of utility distribution facilities, including gas, electric, telephone, cable, water and sewer connections to render service in approved subdivisions or in connection with any action on this list"); (26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment); and (31) (" purchase or sale of furnishings, equipment or supplies, including surplus government property, other than the following: land, radioactive material, pesticides, herbicides, or other hazardous materials") that are not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Monroe County served as Lead Agency for Annual Action Plan Item 13, Volunteers of America Farm Fresh Hydroponic Farm, which it determined to be an Unlisted Action and issued a Negative Declaration per Resolution 301 of 2022. No further action under SEQRA is required for this project.

2023 Annual Action Plan Item 3, Willow Pond Way Sidewalk Project, is an Unlisted Action for which another agency served as Lead Agency. The Town of Penfield served as Lead Agency for the Willow Pond Way Sidewalk project, which it determined to be an Unlisted Action. The Town of Penfield is scheduled to make a Determination of Significance at their May 3rd Town Board Meeting. The provisions of the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act shall be complied with prior to Your Honorable Body undertaking, funding, or approving these projects.

Last, Monroe County will serve as Lead Agency for three (3) actions, Items 25, 26, and 27 titled First Time Home Buyers Program, the Lifetime Assistance Brick Schoolhouse Road project, and the Acquisition Rehab and Resale Program. These three (3) projects have all been preliminarily classified as Unlisted Actions. The provisions of the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act shall be complied with prior to Your Honorable Body undertaking, funding, or approving these projects.

This grant is funded by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.

Executive Summary

1. Introduction

Monroe County's Annual Action Plan (Plan) goals are administered utilizing CDBG, HOME, and ESG funds made available by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). 2023 is the fourth year of the 2020-24 Five-Year Consolidated Plan and marks the forty-eighth year that Monroe County has received an allocation from the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program, the thirty -second year for Home Investment Partnerships Program (HOME), and it also marks the seventeenth year with the Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG) program. Combined, these program funds channel more than three million dollars annually through the Department of Planning and Development, Community Development division, for suburban towns and villages that comprise Monroe County's consortium in support of housing, public works, economic development, and community services programs that primarily benefit low to moderate-income households, seniors, and persons with special needs. This Plan addresses both projects funded on an annual basis and new program initiatives that focuses on accomplishing the following primary program goals and objectives: • Develop affordable and accessible housing and home ownership opportunities for all low to moderate income residents, with a priority focus on the development of housing in the towns and villages that do not currently provide affordable units that have been financed, in part, through the CDBG and/or HOME programs • Repair and conserve existing housing stock • Improve essential infrastructure in lower income areas • Provide job training and economic development for low- and moderate- income persons and persons with special needs • Provide essential public services, particularly those that promote home ownership, fair housing, and housing stability • Revitalize deteriorated neighborhoods.

2. Summarize the objectives and outcomes identified in the Plan

Monroe County intends to continue our mission, which was identified in the Needs Assessment of Monroe County's 2020-2024 Strategic Plan in promoting community development, in addition to Monroe County's Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice in order to accomplish the following primary program goals and objectives during the 2023-2024 program year:

a) Develop affordable and accessible rental and home ownership opportunities for all low to moderateincome residents with a priority focus on the development of housing in towns and villages that do not currently provide affordable units that have been financed, in part, through the County's CDBG and/or HOME Program; b) Repair and conserve existing housing stock; c) Increase energy efficiency of existing housing stock; d) Improve access to and the quality of public facilities; e) Provide essential infrastructure in lower income areas; f) Provide job training and economic development opportunities for low to moderate-income persons and person with special needs; g) Provide essential public services, particularly those that promote home ownership, fair housing ad housing stability; h) Revitalize deteriorated neighborhoods.

3. Evaluation of past performance

This is an evaluation of past performance that helped lead the grantee to choose its goals or projects.

Projects funded with CDBG, HOME, and ESG grants have had a positive effect on the individuals and communities served. These projects were carried out to meet our primary program goals and objectives in housing, economic development, community services, and public works/facilities improvement projects. The Home Improvement Program (HIP) annually helps between 60 to 70 low to moderate-income homeowners make necessary home repairs. The repairs made under the HIP allow homeowners to make essential repairs that allow them to stay in their homes. This program is all the more critical in our community due to the lack of available housing stock/options for relocation. Neighborhood and utility improvements are a high priority for Monroe County because of their importance in preserving neighborhoods. A large number of communities throughout suburban Monroe County have deteriorated infrastructure due to age. Monroe County uses CDBG funding to improve roads, sidewalks, and sewers in low to moderate- income neighborhoods. This funding helps local governments undertake projects they would not otherwise be able to do because of funding limitations. Public services projects and programs have been essential in maintaining safe and affordable housing for the community and providing services that benefit underserved populations including seniors and those with special needs.

Monroe County has continued to monitor housing and economic metrics relating to potential impediments to fair housing choice that were identified in the 2020 Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice (AI). Between 2018 (the data available at the time of the AI development) and 2021, the overall poverty rate in Monroe County has declined 1% (from 13.8% to 12.8%). When comparing 2016 poverty rates by municipality to 2021 poverty rates by municipality, Monroe County has observed that there has been a growth in rural poverty in Brockport, Scottsville, Hamlin, and Hilton. The percentage of the population living in poverty has decreased in Henrietta, Greece, and Spencerport.

Additional statistics that Monroe County has been monitoring since the 2020 AI includes the unemployment rate across Monroe County. The most recent data available from the American Community Survey compared to the 2018 American Community Survey data used for the AI shows that the unemployment rate in Monroe County has gone from 6% to 5% during this time.

Monroe County has acted on recommendations from its Analysis of Impediments in its partnerships and support of local senior and special needs populations. This includes utilizing community development funding to provide more than 300 senior households with minor home repairs and installation of fall safety features.

4. Summary of Citizen Participation Process and consultation process

Summary from citizen participation section of plan.

Monroe County holds two (2) public hearings annually at convenient, fully accessible locations. For the 2023 program year, Monroe County continued a hybrid in-person/virtual public meeting in January to inform and announce the opening of the 2023-24 application round, which was attended by 11 individuals in person and 32 individuals virtually. The Steering Committee meeting, which is comprised of town and village officials who are members of the County's Consortium, was held immediately following the public hearing and attended by both virtually and in-person by 26 individuals. Meetings are fully accessible with bilingual and/or sign language interpreters and other accommodations provided upon request to interpret policies and program requirements. In addition, Monroe County conducted a brief survey to gather feedback on the various programs and project priorities, which was extended through January 31, 2023. Fifteen community members responded to the survey, which asked community members if they were attending the public hearing as a representative of a municipality, representing non-profit, a member of the general public, or other. 53% of respondents were representing non-profit organizations, while 40% were representing municipalities and one county legislator was in attendance and responded to the survey. Respondents were asked what they believe should be the highest priority for Monroe County's Community Development. 46.7% of respondents believe that the highest priority should be investment in public facilities and infrastructure, while 40% of respondents believe that the highest priority should be the development of affordable housing. Several individuals indicated that they believe emergency services and public services should be the biggest priority for Monroe County. The survey also provided community members with an opportunity to provide comments, suggestions, and recommendations in a narrative format. Monroe County accepted these responses as part of the collection of public comments. See Summary of Public Comments section of this Plan.

The May public hearing was held on May 4, 2023 @ 9:45a with the Steering Committee @ 10:00a, which was also held in-person and via Zoom. 13 individuals attended the public hearing and 18 participants attending the Steering committee meeting. This meeting encourages the public to review and comment on the Draft Annual Action Plan. The 30-day public comment period was available from May 4 – June 12, 2023. The public hearing notice and availability of the Draft Action Plan for public comment was posted in the Daily Record and the Rochester Business Journal newspapers, as well as the County's website - Community Development page, and upon request.

The Plan addresses the goals by providing affordable housing and home ownership opportunities, repairing and conserving existing housing stock, financing public infrastructure and infrastructure improvements, creating and retaining jobs, and funding public services that stabilize and enhance living conditions.

1. Introduction

Monroe County Department of Planning and Development consists of the Community Development, Economic Development, Planning, and Procurement Technical Assistance divisions. These four (4) divisions coordinate and collaborate on many efforts. CD works with local town and village governments, the City of Rochester, as well as many agencies, organizations, and groups to address the needs of the community. Monroe County is fortunate to be home to many agencies, organizations, and groups that focus on the wellbeing of the community as a whole.

Provide a concise summary of the jurisdiction's activities to enhance coordination between public and assisted housing providers and private and governmental health, mental health and service agencies (91.215(I)).

The Department of Planning and Development and the CD staff periodically meets with local developers, Fairport Urban Renewal Agency (FURA) to coordinate the planning of housing projects and federal grant applications. The County, City of Rochester, and RHA continue to explore ways to enhance our Section 3 efforts. Planning and Development coordinates, collaborates, and consults with other departments throughout Monroe County, including Human Services, Public Health, and Office of the Aging, in the planning process as often as possible and to maximize resources. Monroe County will continue to meet and coordinate with public and assisted housing providers within the Monroe County service area. These housing providers keep Monroe County informed about upcoming projects. Monroe County staff members are engaged with the Continuum of Care on initiatives for and in support of community members experiencing and at risk of homelessness.

Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness.

The County actively participates in the Rochester/Monroe County Homeless Continuum of Care (CoC) locally known as Partners Ending Homelessness (PEH). The CoC coordinates the allocation of HUD CoC federal funding to facilities and programs within the CoC's service area. County staff consult on a regular basis with the organizations that participate in the CoC and the Homeless Services Network (HSN). County staff serve on the CoC Board and on the Steering Committee of HSN. County staff also serve on the Chronically Homeless Work Group that plans, coordinates, and implements activities and strategies for servicing the chronically homeless and sit on the CoC Project Selection and Monitoring Committee. CoC staff participate in reviewing applications for Emergency Solution Grant applications submitted annually to Monroe County.

Describe consultation with the Continuum(s) of Care that serves the jurisdiction's area in determining how to allocate ESG funds, develop performance standards for and evaluate outcomes of projects and activities assisted by ESG funds, and develop funding, policies and procedures for the operation and administration of HMIS

County staff work closely with the CoC and other agencies to develop funding applications and determine the best use of ESG funds. By working with the CoC, County staff are involved in improving coordination among agencies, facilitating data collection through HMIS and allocating funds. The CoC Executive Director serves on the County ESG proposal review team along with staff from Monroe County Department of Human Services (DHS), City of Rochester, and community representatives. The County and the City release a joint RFP for ESG funding which has increased the efficiency and coordination of ESG funding in the community. The CoC Board has 21 ex-officio members representing public and private organizations deemed necessary to develop, maintain, monitor, and continuously improve a comprehensive, coordinated, and flexible system of homeless housing and support services. They represent Monroe County, City, RHA, Homeless Services Network (HSN - the CoC's Stakeholder Group), formerly homeless community members, a domestic violence advocacy organization member, and a health services representative. In addition, there are elected general members from both public and private groups from the community (business sector, legal field, faith-based organizations, veteran organizations, schools, law enforcement, criminal justice, advocacy groups). This diverse team is the primary planning and coordinating body for homeless housing and services in this community. The CoC is now a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit organization and is the Collaborative Applicant for HUD CoC funding and the HMIS Lead Agency. Long term goals include becoming a Unified Funding agency and continually striving to achieve the status of a High Performing Community. The CoC has been a long-time participant in the ESG planning process for the County and City, and are represented on the Rating and Ranking Committee of the CoC to review applications submitted annually for HUD CoC Homeless Program funding. ESG community priorities and planning have been discussed at both CoC and HSN meetings, especially in terms of policy priorities, the efficient use of resources and community objectives. The CoC staff also reviews the ESG proposals for fidelity to the ESG requirements and additional information set forth by HUD via policy briefs. ESG funding continues to be a critical issue for local homeless service providers. Facilitated discussions of ESG community priorities are held at the HSN meetings; CoC members and community stakeholders are strongly encouraged to participate. The County staff members participate on the Coordinated Entry (CE) Oversight workgroup. CE is the portal for all referrals to Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) and Rapid Re-Housing (RR) programs and prioritizes those who are the most vulnerable when openings occur. CE is fully implemented in Monroe County and is continually being improved. CE is working and is successful in ensuring that homeless persons are directed to the programs that will best meet their needs; and that homeless persons with the highest vulnerability are prioritized for placement. CE is exploring options for a new vulnerability assessment tool. The current tool, the Vulnerability Index-Services Prioritization Decision Assistance Tool (VI-SPDAT) is no longer being supported. CE will look at other existing tools or develop a community tool. CE has created a new position and since hired a Housing Resource Specialist who recruits landlords to provide units for PSH and RRH programs; and is a liaison between programs and

landlords. The Housing Recruitment Specialist will also be centralizing information on permanent housing resources and unit availability in the CE website, www.FrontdoorNY.org.

Rationale for the priorities for allocating investments geographically

Funding was provided to municipalities for infrastructure improvements, met program priorities and if the projects are in low-mod census areas. Public services activities were funded at a rate not to exceed 15% of the annual CDBG allocation, including program income. The funds proposed for Planning and Administration, including program income will not exceed 20% of the annual CDBG amount, 10% of the annual HOME amount, and 7.5% of the ESG amount.

Affordable Housing

Introduction

Through the CDBG HOME, and ESG funds, Monroe County administers programs to preserve and increase access to affordable housing. The Home Improvement Program (HIP), funded with both CDBG and HOME provides income eligible homeowners with grants and/or loans for needed repairs, thereby maintaining affordability. Home funds are utilized to provide gap financing for the development of affordable rental housing development, acquisition rehabilitation and resale as well as down payment and closing cost assistance for homeownership opportunities to low-mod income individuals, families, seniors, and individuals with developmental and intellectual disabilities. ESG funds provide rental assistance for homelessness prevention and rapid rehousing.

Discussion

The Acquisition Rehab Resale program in suburban Monroe County makes available single family residential homes for homebuyers purchasing their first home. This is especially critical in our community with the competitive housing market. The homes sold through the Acquisition Rehab Resale program are only available to those who have completed homebuyer education and are low- to moderate- income first-time homebuyers who are often outbid by market rate homebuyers with less restrictions. Homes sold through the Acquisition Rehab Resale program are completed to code with updated major systems.

The Home Improvement Program allows our older adults to age in place because the decision to remain in the home due to market conditions is ever increasing with demand on single family homes at an all-

time high. However the challenges and financial decision of making major necessary improvements remains difficult to age in place without assistance of the HIP program to make the necessary improvements such as walk-in showers allows our older adults to age in place.

Monroe County designates the Community Liaison as Community Development's Fair Housing Officer. Any Fair Housing complaints must be in writing and must contain such information as the Community Liaison requires. Upon receipt of such complaint, the Community Liaison must furnish a copy of the same to the person or persons who allegedly committed or about to commit the alleged discriminatory housing practice. Within thirty (30) days after receiving a complaint, the Community Liaison must investigate the complaint and give notice in writing to the person aggrieved whether he/she/they intends to resolve it.

AP-60 Public Housing - 91.420, 91.220(h)

Introduction

The Rochester Housing Authority (RHA) and the Village of Fairport Urban Renewal Agency (FURA) manages the two publicly administered Section 8 Programs in Monroe County. RHA has developed its Annual, Five Year and Strategic Plans. The Strategic Plan action items have become part of the overall Annual and 5-Year Plan. RHA has submitted its Annual/5-Year Plan to HUD and will be updating its Strategic Plan. Once complete, it will be included in RHA's Annual/5-year Plan. Established in 1955 as an independent public corporation by New York State Public Housing Law, RHA serves more than 27,000 lower-income residents and program participants in the five-county Greater Rochester area, by providing quality comfortable living and services for people with limited incomes. Approximately 20% of total residents served reside in the 2,200+ RHA public housing units. Public Housing Units available for: Over 50 & Disabled: Danforth Tower East/West, Glenwood Gardens, Hudson Ridge Tower, Kennedy Tower, and Parliament Arms. Disabled & Over/Under 50: Lake Tower, Lena Gantt Estates, Lexington Court, and University Tower. Family Housing: Bay-Zimmer Townhouses, Bronson Court, Federal Street Townhouses, Harriet Tubman Estates, Holland Townhouses, Lena Gantt Estates, Lexington Court, and Parkside Apartments. Enriched Housing: Danforth Tower East, Hudson Ridge Tower, Johnathan Child. Single, Double, and Multiple Unit Scattered Site Homes. Resident Services: Family Self-Sufficiency (FSS) is a voluntary employment and savings incentive program designed to assist families in becoming economically independent and self-sufficient. Supportive services in the program include homeownership, training for jobs, education, and life skills to help families reach their goals in 5 years. Service Coordination for RHA Elderly and Disabled Residents, including health and wellness, money and employment, transportation and more. The FURA Section 8 program territory encompasses the town of Macedon within Wayne County and the eastern part of Monroe County including the town and villages therein, of Irondequoit, Webster, Penfield, East Rochester, Brighton, Henrietta, Pittsford, Perinton, Mendon, and Rush. Currently, FURA administers eighteen (18) Section 8 Project-Based units, ten (10) at Crosman Senior Apartments and eight (8) at Fairport Apartments. Current program demographics through FURA's Section 8 program reflect a total of 218 elderly and disabled families, and 200 other eligible households (i.e.: non-disabled families and 2-adult households). The average annual total household income of participants in FURA's program is \$18,245. The average Housing Assistance Payment is \$537 and the average tenant payment for rent and utilities is \$413. FURA is authorized to administer 497 vouchers.

Actions planned during the next year to address the needs to public housing

RHA is continuing its initiative to "Change the Face of Public Housing" by renovating and constructing new units that residents will be proud to call home. Current projects are RHA's Bond-Hamilton, Edinburgh St., Thomas St., and Bronson Court Apartments located in the city of Rochester. RHA will continue its "Beautification Initiative" for all its public housing developments that will not only enhance curb appeal but the rest of the property as well. RHA will continue to provide quality affordable housing and services for its residents. RHA meets with resident councils, resident Commissioners, staff and neighborhood associations to address needs and discuss upcoming projects. RHA has established a Resident Relations Committee which reports out to the Board of Commissioners. The Committee is comprised of RHA staff, resident commissioners, and resident council presidents who bring ideas and discussion items to each meeting. RHA takes all suggestions and recommendations from these sources into consideration when preparing the five-year Capital Improvement plan. Due to ever changing conditions, items are prioritized and can fluctuate within the plan from year to year. There are currently multiple projects in various stages, and more are being planned for the upcoming year. RHA will typically undertake roof replacement, driveway resurfacing, and porch restoration/replacement projects at several scattered site properties throughout the year. Focused investment of capital funds will occur at RHA's Bronson Court Apartments, Atlantic Townhouses, and Lexington Court Apartments. RHA was awarded a NYS Preservation Opportunity Program grant to develop plans for the preservation of public housing, which resulted in physical needs assessments (PNA) and environmental testing performed at most Public Housing locations. All the data is currently under review and will be categorized for each site which will enable RHA to create a pipeline of preservation/renovation/development strategies for sites like Harriett Tubman Estates, Lena Gantt, Holland Townhouses, Lexington Court, various high-rises, Bay-Zimmer Apts., and scattered sites RHA is advancing the redevelopment of its public housing sites; Federal Street Townhouses/Scattered Sites Rental Assistance Demonstration (RAD) project that is scheduled to close in Spring 2023, Parliament Arms-Fairfield Village which is scheduled to close Fall of 2023, Fernwood Phase I with financing applications submitted and Glenwood Gardens redevelopment project is in the design phase. These redevelopment projects may increase or decrease the number of available public housing units with the goal of increasing the number of quality affordable housing units. RHA has room in its Faircloth limit to add public housing units to its portfolio. RHA was awarded Low Income Housing Tax Credits (LIHTC) and other sources of funding to redevelop Federal St. Townhouses/Scattered Sites and has applied for LIHTC's for other projects. RHA may also issue its own bonds for development activities and acquiring property. RHA intends to apply for NYS funding opportunities for development and capital improvement activities and acquiring property. RHA intends to apply for NYS funding opportunities for development and capital improvement activities. RHA will be applying to New York State Housing and Community Renewal's Public Housing Preservation Program (PHP) when the NOFA is available. PHP is a partnership among HCR, HUD, Federal Public Housing Authorities (PHAs) outside New York City, and collaborating with private for profit and non-profit developers to address the needs of these properties and assist RHA in completing their plans to ensure the long-term sustainability of existing public housing units.

Actions to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

RHA is committed to continuously improving communication between management and its residents and program participants and continues to work with area partners to provide services. RHA has created a new position, Public Participation Coordinator, to increase resident participation in self- sufficiency program offerings. RHA will continue to develop and promote its Section 3 program, resident councils and advisory board. RHA has established a Resident Relations Committee which reports out to the Board of Commissioners. The Committee is comprised of RHA staff, resident commissioners and resident council presidents who bring ideas, discussion items to each meeting. RHA's Resident Services will continue to assist with resident needs and actively engage in homeownership opportunities and selfsufficiency program development. RHA intends to perform physical needs and environmental assessment of its public housing scattered site units and determine which single-family units will be designated for homeownership. Current residents will be given first option to purchase the home. RHA may use capital funds and/or operating reserves to renovate designated public housing scattered site homes prior to being offered for homeownership. RHA has implemented a homeownership plan that will include HUD's Section 32 Homeownership. This comprehensive plan outlines the requirements and guidelines of the program. RHA has 7 public housing residents to purchase their public housing home. RHA is submitting its Special Application Center submission to continue the process. RHA has surveyed additional public housing residents in an effort to create a pipeline of Section 32 homeowners. Thus far, 41 responses have been submitted and the Resident Services department will meet one on one with each resident who wishes to purchase their home and create a path to successful homeownership. In addition to the Plan, RHA has developed a post homeownership program to assist families in maintaining their homes and ensuring homeowners that they have somewhere to go for assistance when they need it. RHA intends to increase utilization of homeownership vouchers through increased outreach. RHA intends to seek partners who will grow and assist family self-sufficiency initiatives. RHA continues to improve use of its community-based Computer Labs with faster service, new equipment, and utilize Community Service hours to monitor computer labs. RHA may utilize unused (Tenant Participation Funds) Per Unit Monies (PUM) of developments without an active Resident Council to create a Youth Employment and Education Program (YEEP) for public housing residents. RHA has started an annual scholarship for youth and adults to promote self-sufficiency. RHA plans to promote other scholarship opportunities for public housing residents and HCVP Participants utilizing partnerships and sponsoring various activities to obtain funds, including grants, and unused resident participation funds. RHA plans to create a building trades pre-apprenticeship program by partnering with various groups who will provide hands-on training for public housing residents and HCVP Participants. RHA will explore and create new partnerships and seek funding opportunities to create a Youth, Sports, and Fine Arts Chapter to enhance the outreach opportunities for youth to participate in routine and non-traditional leisure activities including but not limited to golf, swimming, basketball, dance, performing arts, scuba diving, football, tennis, writing, and much more. RHA will partner with the Boy Scouts and work together to bring scouting opportunities to its families. RHA intends to create business opportunities for resident councils and/or the Jurisdiction-wide Resident Council or individual residents.

Discussion

(con't) HCR, RHA and HUD will coordinate to develop and implement a five-year strategy to preserve public housing units, address their need for capital improvements, and ensure their continued affordability. RHA intends on using Capital Funds to further its mission of "Changing the Face of Public Housing" and make needed repairs to its Public Housing stock. RHA will identify sites based on physical needs assessment and environmental testing reports, prioritize the most strategic use of its funds to preserve its housing stock. RHA will participate in task forces and initiatives to address the housing quality, homelessness, and emergency housing needs in the community. RHA completed a comprehensive physical needs assessment on all of its public housing properties. There was an emphasis on prioritizing single family units for homeownership. Work performed will include landscaping, paving, HVAC upgrades, and interior and exterior improvements. RHA will continue to reduce unit turnaround time for vacated housing units so that they can be filled with applicants from the waiting list. RHA will engage in energy saving projects such as lighting, water conservation, and more efficient HVAC systems that will improve the quality of life for residents. RHA Resident Services also works to partner with other agencies that can assist residents in self-sufficiency initiatives and goals. Homeownership, training, employment, life skills, and financial education continue to be a focus in the upcoming year. RHA has been awarded HUD Family Self-Sufficiency (FSS) and Resident Opportunity & Self Sufficiency (ROSS) grants and contributes additional funds to further its mission of assisting residents and participants in becoming self-sufficient.

FURA awarded 28 additional Project Based Vouchers (PBV) through an RFP process in 2021. 20 PBVs were awarded to Rochester's Cornerstone Group for a 150 new construction supportive senior housing development at Marketplace Mall. Financing includes HFA bonds, Supportive Housing Opportunity Program funds, NYSERDA, ESSHI, Monroe County HOME. FURA has executed an agreement for Housing Assistance Payment with Cornerstone. Construction has begun with completion by June 2024. The remaining 8 PBVs were awarded to PathStone Development Corp for new construction of a 74-unit senior housing development on Baird Road in Fairport. Financing for the project includes LIHTC HTF, NYS HCR HOME, and NYSERDA. This project is currently under AHAP and FURA. Construction will begin soon. The project is expected to be completed in October 2024. FURA will be opening its Section 8 and Project Based Waiting list in May 2023. The list has been closed for nearly 3 years. Typically, FURA's Section 8 waiting list will remain open until there is a 2 year wait time for rental assistance. For the first time, FURA will be accepting applications electronically through a wait list portal. Applicants will be encouraged to apply online through the portal, however, paper applications will also be available to those who wish to apply in person or by mail.

Effective July 2023, FURA will be implementing a new landlord outreach and incentive program to improve low-income housing opportunities to program participants. FURA will engage in proactive

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outreach to recruit landlords and will offer financial incentives to new landlords who lease units to program participants. Other financial incentives will be available to mitigate concerns over financial loss due to action or inaction of a tenant. This will help to retain existing landlords and recruit new landlords who are reluctant to participate in the program. Semi-annual landlord forums will be held to facilitate positive relationships with new and existing landlords. Section 8 staff will provide current and upcoming program information and discussions will be encouraged to allow landlords to discuss concerns or questions.

AP-65 Homeless and Other Special Needs Activities - 91.420, 91.220(i) Introduction

Monroe County will continue to work with the Continuum of Care to coordinate services to the homeless and to provide outreach and other services, emergency shelter, transitional housing and permanent supportive housing to persons experiencing homelessness and/or with special needs. Coordinated Entry (CE) and the Housing First model are the primary tools that will end chronic homelessness. Through CE, the Chronically Homeless are prioritized for for placement into permanent supportive housing. All CoC and ESG programs incorporate housing first principles into their programs to reduce barriers to accessing housing and to reduce terminations from programs. In 2016, the Rochester/Monroe County CoC reached functional zero toward ending veteran homelessness. Functional zero status does not mean that veterans won't become homeless; but it means that the CoC now has sufficient resources to get veterans into appropriate housing quickly and that veterans remain stably housed. The CoC, City, and County continue to partner with the Veterans Administration, Veterans Outreach Center, and other organizations serving veterans to ensure current resources are maintained and support new housing units targeted to veterans. To end homelessness for families and dependent children, the primary strategies being utilized are diversion and rapid rehousing. Strategies to end homelessness for unaccompanied youth include outreach, transitional housing and a rapid re-housing dedicated to young adults (ages 18 - 23). The CoC will continue to pursue additional resources for homeless youth through HUD's Youth Homelessness Demonstration Grants. Transitional housing, rapid re-housing programs and permanent supportive housing programs serving the re-entry population are proving to be successful in assisting this population with accessing and remaining stable in permanent housing. The Coordinated Entry system fully implemented in January 2018 aids in reaching these goals by employing diversion strategies to prevent entry into the homeless system and vulnerability assessments to ensure that those with the highest needs are prioritized and are referred to the programs that will best meet their needs. Consistent with the 2012 Homelessness Resolution Strategy, Rochester will: Continue to implement diversion as the first response to a housing crisis; Emphasize a rapid rehousing/housing first approach for the entire system; Increase Rapid Rehousing and Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) resources; Use Progressive Engagement in Providing Services; improve practice and capacity in PSH programs by targeting PSH to people with the highest needs based on the vulnerability assessment tool, building PSH provider capacity, integrating employment services into PSH programs, and implementing a "Moving On Strategy" from PSH interventions; Implementing data-driven decision-making and evaluation; and ensuring leadership and accountability.

Describe the jurisdictions one-year goals and actions for reducing and ending homelessness including

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their

individual needs

Person Centered Housing Options (PCHO) and the Rapid Engagement Demonstration (RED) Team will continue to identify and engage the unsheltered homeless. PCHO, RED, MC Collaborative, and the Veteran Administration regularly visit soup kitchens, libraries, and public places that unsheltered homeless adults frequent. Youth street outreach workers will continue to regularly engage homeless and at-risk youth on the street, recreational centers, and other locations that youth frequent. The objective is to engage with the unsheltered homeless and link them with housing, services, and mainstream benefits. Additional outreach is conducted during the Code Blue season, when temperatures fall below 32 degrees. Any person requesting emergency shelter when the temperature is below 32 degrees must be placed in shelter or if there are no shelter beds available, in local hotels. Youth service providers will continue to utilize street outreach workers who use a mobile unit to conduct ongoing, regular outreach efforts with homeless and at-risk youth, including LGBT youth. Services include medical screenings (including HIV testing), condom distribution, and linking youth to community-based services and income streams. Homeless youth who agree to placement are transported to emergency shelters. Veterans outreach workers visit shelters, soup kitchens, and other locations in an effort to identify homeless veterans and link them to the VA and community-based services. Street outreach is conducted to engage the unsheltered homeless in the locations where they are known to congregate (e.g., encampments, parks, etc.). Specialized Office of Mental Health (OMH) outreach workers connect with homeless persons experiencing serious mental and/or substance abuse issues. Outreach workers who speak Spanish and other languages participate in these efforts.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

Monroe County works with the CoC and its partners to carry out outreach and services to homeless persons and to provide emergency shelter for all homeless populations; homeless youth, veterans, victims of domestic violence, persons with chemical dependency and/or mental health issues and other homeless individuals and families. Transitional housing is provided for homeless youth, veterans, and reentry populations many of whom have chemical dependency and/or mental health issues. The emergency shelter system was greatly impacted by COVID-19. Shelters were decompressed (census reduced) in late March of 2020 to ensure social distancing guidelines could be followed by shelters. This was accomplished by placing those who would be most vulnerable to COVID based on age and/or chronic health conditions into hotels where they would have their own rooms. By the end of 2021, most shelters were back at their optimum capacity and shelter occupancy is approaching pre-COVID numbers.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were

recently homeless from becoming homeless again

To end homelessness among households with dependent children, the CoC is utilizing Rapid Rehousing (RRH) programs. RRH provides short term rental assistance and case management services to move families from shelter to permanent housing quickly and ensure housing stability. It is also providing diversion assistance for those who have a viable alternative to a shelter but require some support. The CoC plans to increase the number of homeless households with children assisted through RRH projects by working with TH projects serving families to help them restructure using a RRH model and by soliciting housing organizations without such programs to create new RRH projects. ESG funding supports Coordinated Care Services, Inc.'s Rapid Rehousing program (RRP) that responds quickly to households referred through coordinated entry, secures appropriate PH, and uses an array of mainstream benefits and supports to maximize resources, increase housing stability and reduce repeat episodes of homelessness. RRH projects have sought and been awarded funding from other sources (e.g., NYS OTDA, and HUD CoC Funding), and this effort will continue. The needs of domestic violence victims, including their families, will continue to be broadly addressed. The Rochester/Monroe County Domestic Violence Consortium, with 50-member organizations from human services and the legal system, promotes a coordinated community response to domestic violence. In addition, staff of housing providers who serve domestic violence victims are trained in trauma-informed care and safety planning. Willow DVC serves people who are victims of domestic violence (or at risk) along with their children, offering counseling, education, and a secure shelter, whose location is not publicly identified. A 24-hour hotline provides information on housing and services for domestic violence victims. Willow DVC has stringent policies to ensure the safety and privacy of its clients, and names and other identifying data are not entered into HMIS. YWCA, LAWNY and Willow operate a rapid rehousing project for households experiencing domestic violence. For the past several years, there has been a DV Bonus Project opportunity as part of the annual HUD CoC funding competition. A Rapid Rehousing project was submitted but not selected for an award. The Center for Youth (CFY) Services Center House provided emergency housing and services for unaccompanied homeless youth, ages 12-17. CoC will continue to offer a range of outreach, emergency, and transitional housing and support services available through CoC and other funding resources. The Center for Youth (CFY) operates a RRH program for Transition Age Youth (ages 18 – 24) in our community. Youth providers have a common intake form, work together closely, and meet on a monthly basis to ensure that homeless youth have access to safe housing and services. In all cases, before a youth leaves a program, the youth is linked to a family member or other responsible, supportive adult. Youth providers will continue to work with Monroe County Office of Mental Health (OMH) to ensure access to mental health services and ease transition from the youth to the adult mental health system. Youth ages 16-17 and 18-24 will be targeted separately and offered ageappropriate services, while youth as young as 12 will also be served. Genesis House, an emergency housing program for older homeless youth, ages 17-20, closed its doors due to insufficient funding. This was the only emergency housing program dedicated to this population. Homeless youth who are 18-20 are able to access the adult shelters.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely

low-income individuals and families and those who are: being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); or, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs.

Youth being discharged from foster care or other institutional settings typically return to their family of origin or another responsible family member or adult. When no such adult can be located, the youth is placed in a community program specifically designed to prepare youth for independent living. CoC will continue to educate homeless providers about the importance of ensuring that youth are not discharged into homelessness. Shelters have been instructed to immediately contact MCDHS to report the failed discharge plan if a youth is attempting to access homeless services. The youth is then connected to a caseworker who attempts to re-unite the youth with his/her family or other responsible adult and link him/her to appropriate services. If such a re-uniting is not possible, the youth is referred again to a community program that prepares youth to transition to independent living.

Hospitals have been encouraged to not discharge people with no available housing after hours or weekends so that they can first go to MCDHS for assessment and placement into a shelter that can best meet their needs. When this is not possible or patient leaves against medical advice, hospital social work staff have been provided with information on local emergency shelters (e.g., physical layouts, staffing, hours open) so a referral is made to the shelter that can best meet the person's needs. Hospital staff call the shelter to confirm a bed is available, any required follow-up care is communicated to shelter staff, and the patient is provided with a sufficient supply of medication. Three emergency shelters (12 beds) have beds dedicated for persons who are being discharged from hospitals, due to health or mental health who are homeless which provide additional support through the use of peers and Health Home Care Managers to transition to and stabilize in permanent housing.

Inpatient facilities licensed or operated by NYSOMH and NYSOASAS are encouraged to refer individuals to housing consistent with the level of care required by the patient and to not discharge patients until a comprehensive discharge plan is in place. Prior to discharge, individuals in need of supervised housing, and who agree to a referral are referred to the County Single Point of Access (SPOA). The SPOA facilitates housing assistance for eligible individuals and connects persons to mental health care coordination services. Through HSN, CoC will continue to educate stakeholders about the primary providers of licensed mental health residential beds (DePaul Community Services, East House, Housing Options Made Easy, Rochester Psychiatric Center), intensive case management programs (Strong Memorial Hospital, Rochester General Health System, Unity Health System), and care coordination services (ACT Team, Project Link, MICA Net).

Ex-offenders are most frequently discharged to their families or to independent living under the supervision of parole. NYS Parole has contracts with several community agencies to place ex-offenders when no other housing can be located (e.g., Salvation Army Adult Rehab Center, Grace House, and

DuBois Re-Entry Program). NYS is implementing a pilot project in Monroe County for effectively linking eligible individuals from this population to Health Homes, which will provide enhanced care management, ensuring that enrollees are linked to housing and social services supports. CoC Team and Monroe County Re-Entry Task Force will continue to work closely, utilizing common members, to assist ex-offenders to successfully transition back into the community. Linking ex-offenders to mainstream resources will reduce the number of ex-offenders from entering the homeless system. Delphi, the umbrella agency for Monroe County Re-Entry Task Force operates a very successful RRH program for persons who are released and have no permanent housing identified.

Discussion

Con't from Helping homeless persons Project Anchor, a new project that began operations in late 2022 is a partnership with MCDHS and Catholic Charities Family and Community Services (CCFCS) to provide a rental supplement up to 100% of the metro-Rochester FMR for households with incomes under 50% AMI to 300 households in Monroe County. Up to 50% of the rental supplements will be reserved for homeless individuals or families. Priority will be given to households involved in the Child Welfare System. The ability to pay 100% of FMR will increase the ability of households to remain stable in permanent housing, reducing the number of households entering the homeless system.

The primary strategy to address the needs of the chronically housing population is permanent, supportive housing (PSH). PSH provides a deep rent subsidy (participant pays 30% of income for rent) and on-going case management and support services to participants who have a long term disability and who have been homeless for more than one year, or have had four or more episodes of homelessness totaling at least one year in the past three years. There is no limit on the length of stay in PSH. Housing First principles have been adopted by all of the PSH programs in the CoC to reduce barriers to accessing housing. Chronically homeless persons are prioritized for entry into all PSH programs when openings occur. The CoC Strategic Plan includes a goal of increasing affordable, supportive housing programs for homeless populations using nonCoC funding. Two programs utilizing Empire State Supportive Initiative (ESSHI) funding for the chronically homeless opened in 2021. Two new ESSHI projects, a 24 unit project serving homeless and a 35 unit project for the chronically homeless began renting up in November and December 2022.

The Veterans Administration (VA) and the Veterans Outreach Center (VOC) will continue to exclusively serve homeless veterans in the CoC geography. Both the VA and VOC provide emergency and transitional housing options for veterans. Both also partner with the Rochester Housing Authority (RHA) to provide PSH options for Veterans. Referral to the PSH programs come directly from the VA and/or through Coordinated Entry. VOC and Eagle Star have recently opened affordable, supportive housing for veterans that have been funded through the Empire State Supportive Housing Initiative (ESSHI).

Con't from Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless The Reentry

Annual Action Plan 2023 Association of Western New York (RAWNY) recently began operations of a Reentry One Stop Center to provide services, support, and to make connections to community resources men and women returning home from incarceration from the Monroe County jail, state correctional facilities, and federal detention. Safe, affordable housing is the most requested service by persons who are criminal justice involved and one of the primary reasons for homelessness.

To reduce the time in Emergency Shelter (ES) or Temporary Housing (TH), the CoC has adopted a Housing First approach, which has resulted in eliminating many preconditions (e.g., sobriety, minimum income threshold) that can be barriers to accessing safe, affordable permanent housing. In addition, ESG funds have been used for rapid rehousing efforts, especially for families, to move them quickly to PH and reduce future episodes of homelessness. Data on the length of time that homeless individuals and families spend in CoC and ESG-funded ES, TH, and Supportive Housing (SH) programs are included in HMIS and will be used to track changes over time. Non-HUD funded projects are represented among the over 70 community agencies in the HSN, where members are educated on best practices and tools that can be used to reduce the length of time individuals stay homeless.

AP-75 Barriers to affordable housing -91.420, 91.220(j)

Introduction

Monroe County is working to expand access to and knowledge of County administered community development services, such as the Home Improvement Program, first time homebuyer programs, and HOME funded affordable rental housing units by providing/conducting outreach, and by providing easily accessible information. Communities outside of the City limits struggle with vacant property issues and there are few high quality, homeownership opportunities for low and moderate-income buyers in many Monroe County communities. In addition, the supply of single family residential properties for lower income homebuyers is limited and has been difficult to acquire with the current state of the housing market. Monroe County is continuing to fund the acquisition rehab resale program that will revitalize neighborhoods, increase inventory, and make available more affordable housing properties to first time homebuyers interested in purchasing their first home. Due to the foreclosure moratorium during the COVID-19 pandemic and the increased cost of properties, low-income homebuyers have had to compete for the purchase of homes with those who do not have the same funding or regulatory restrictions in the purchase of their home. Monroe County vacant properties are harder to purchase when competing/bidding with landlords who are purchasing properties for renters with no income restrictions. The need for affordable housing is especially acute for families and seniors in Monroe County. Local housing problems could be solved with more single family or family rental housing.

Monroe County is aware of the fact that nationwide, 61.7% of fair housing complaints were based on disability discrimination in 2019. During the COVID-19 pandemic, 31% of COVID-19 deaths in the US were older adults, staff, and caregivers in institutional settings as of June 2021. Nationwide, less than 1% of housing units are available to people who use a wheelchair full time. The impediments to available housing nationwide are also concerning in Monroe County because the CDC has found that adults with disabilities are twice as likely as those without disabilities to have inadequate transportation.

Monroe County will continue to work with partners in local governments, public housing providers, local developers, as well as community partners to help address housing needs of community members and promote and market affordable housing.

Actions it planned to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment

The Update to the Analysis of Impediments (AI) indicates that discrimination continues to be the major negative factor in locating housing for seniors and families. The Plan is a multi-year plan designed to address barriers to housing in Monroe County for low-income families and individuals and members of protected classes. Monroe County will work with municipal, developers, and community partners

through outreach and engagement to promote and market affordable housing.

Discussion

(con't from AP-65) To reduce the extent to which individuals and families leaving homelessness experience additional homeless episodes, the CoC will utilize prevention, diversion, and short-term rental assistance, and arrears payments. The Monroe County DHS Diversion Unit will continue to assist those at risk of homelessness with payments for such costs as back taxes, mortgage payments, auto repairs, and tools/uniforms for jobs. Returns to homelessness are also decreased as the result of less stringent compliance demands for participants, automatic renewals of leases, and ensuing that discharges are in accordance with fair housing requirements. Data in HMIS is used to determine if and when individuals and families leaving TH, RRH, and PSH experience another episode of homelessness in those cases where either they exit to homelessness or they exit to permanent housing, but subsequently re-enter the homeless system in the CoC geography. To improve the housing stability of persons in permanent supportive housing, the CoC will utilize the local Coordinated Entry System to ensure that households are directed to the housing and services that will best meet the needs of that household. Special attention is given to increasing access to mainstream supportive services and enhancing case/care management options to ensure effective integration of homeless housing & community-based services and supports.

AP-85 Other Actions - 91.420, 91.220(k)

Introduction

Actions planned to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs

Housing costs remain a burden to low-moderate income families as well as availability of units. Demands for resources continue to increase due to funding regulations and restrictions. Monroe County will continue to focus on: 1) creating and maintaining affordable housing stock; 2) continuing the Home Improvement Program to assist low income homeowners maintain their home and pay for necessary repairs; 3) continue to fund programs that assist job creation and retention and business expansion; 4) increase efforts to expand Section 3 new hires by increasing coordination with the City of Rochester, Rochester Housing Authority, RochesterWorks, Monroe County Human Services-Employment Assistance Division to assist contractors in finding and hiring low income individual and contracting with Section 3 businesses; 5) maintaining funding for the acquisition rehab resale program to increase housing stock and making available more affordable housing for first time homebuyers in suburban Monroe County.

Actions planned to foster and maintain affordable housing

Monroe County will: Create, maintain, and rehabilitate affordable housing stock; prioritize projects in communities where there is currently no affordable housing; and continue to fund public works/infrastructure improvement projects in low and moderate income areas. Monroe County's partnership with the Rochester Housing Development Fund Corporation (RHDFC)/Greater Rochester Housing Partnership (GRHP) has worked to expand the acquisition rehab resale program in suburban towns and villages. This program has, and will continue to increase affordable housing inventory and make available more single family units for homeowners interested in purchasing their first home in suburban towns and villages throughout Monroe County where housing stock is low and competitive for First time homebuyers.

This year, the GRHP staff have been awarded additional grant funding from a local bank to make available up to \$40,000 for three (3) properties in the County's acquisition rehabilitation resale program, which will offset the total development cost per project and allow Monroe County to maximize HOME funds to purchase additional properties to rehab and resale to income eligible homebuyers.

Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards

Monroe County will continue to enforce actions specific to its housing programs in lead-based paint hazard identification, disclosure, and reduction. These activities are expected to make up half of the repairs undertaken this year. Federal requirements for lead-safe work practices and contractor certifications have substantially increased the cost of home repairs, making it more difficult to accomplish steps necessary to ensure health and safety related deficiencies are corrected. All properties

purchased through the First-Time Homebuyer Program must have inspections for lead-based paint hazards prior to final approval of applications for assistance. Purchase subsidies are issued only after receipt of inspection reports indicating that no lead-based paint hazards are present at the time of purchase. Proway Management, a NYS Certified Women/Minority Owned Business, Rochester based lead paint testing firm provides *risks assessment, lead based paint inspections, and clearance inspection services for the Home Improvement program participants. The Monroe County Department of Public Health's Lead Poisoning Prevention Program is funded by the NYSDOH. The current grant known as "Childhood Poisoning Prevention Program +" has been approved for a contract period of 10/1/21-9/30/26 with a total of \$5,175,000. The lead program conducts medical case management and environmental inspections for children with a known blood lead level $\geq 5\mu g/dl$. In 2022, the lead program identified 195 children with elevated blood lead levels. Inspections of housing units associated with the children were conducted in 181 units and 97 units were identified with lead hazards. Please refer to attached Monroe County maps which show number of children with confirmed Elevated Blood Lead Levels (EBLLs) above the current NYSDOH reference level of 5ug/dl blood lead level. The city of Rochester boarder is shown in purple. Local data show that children residing outside of the city continue to be at risk for lead poisoning and continue to have elevated blood lead levels above the reference value of 5 ug/dl. This data supports the continued effort to focus on lead hazard identification, remediation, and education when serving the residents of Monroe County. Lead Program Public Health Sanitarians conduct environmental inspections of properties to find lead hazards in homes where children with elevated lead levels reside or spend considerable time. Any hazards found must be remediated using Lead Safe Work practices and be conducted by a Certified Renovator. All properties must achieve lead dust clearance in accordance with current EPA standards. A Lead Program nurse ensures that children receive follow-up testing and care from their pediatric provider. Both sanitarians and nurses provide lead poisoning prevention education to parents and guardians.

Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families

Rochester Monroe Anti-Poverty Initiative (RMAPI) coordinated efforts to access the initial funding to establish two adult mentoring programs. Bridges to Success and Family Independence Initiative (FII). FII completed its first funding cycle and successful program, meeting its target outcomes of increased employment and earned income. Bridges to Success finished Cohort 1 last year and because it had better outcomes than FII was extended into a second cohort which is still in full operation. Bridges to Success in being run in partnership with Action for a Better Community serving 100 participants.

Monroe County Department of Human Services and Rochester Rehabilitation are partnering in a program "Paths to Empowerment." This program will support individuals who are making the transition from public assistance to self-sufficiency. The program will coordinate existing resources and make linkages to community resources to maximize success for persons working toward employment retention.

The CoC is focusing on increasing income for all participants in CoC funded homeless

programs. Activities include ensuring participants are receiving all public benefits that they are eligible for, creating a SOAR program that will assist participants with long term disabilities in securing SSI/SSDI benefits, linking participants to employment and educational services in the community, and providing financial literacy services. While linking people to public benefits may not always lift a household out of poverty, ensuring that all households have a source of income, health insurance and adequate food resources (SNAP, WIC, etc.) is essential.

Actions planned to develop institutional structure

Monroe County Community Development will continue to work collaboratively with the divisions in Planning and Development, other County departments, including the Department of Human Services, Office of Mental Health, Office of the Aging, area service providers, the City of Rochester, the Rochester Housing Authority, the Fairport Urban Renewal Agency, Partners Ending Homelessness (PEH), the local Continuum of Care, and local towns and villages to enhance services and develop a more effective system for service coordination.

Monroe County is updating its Comprehensive Plan, known as Plan Forward. The Plan when completed will address big, global concepts like sustainability, social equity, energy supply & conservation, and climate change adaptation in ways that are appropriate and unique to Monroe County, while at the same time addressing local challenges like accessibility, economic development, recreation, food accessibility, and transportation.

Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies

Community Development staff works collaboratively with the Department of Human Services, the City of Rochester, local towns and villages, local and state public and private housing agencies, including the Rochester Housing Authority and the Fairport Urban Renewal Agency. Coordination with public and private housing and social services agencies are a priority to enhance services and maximize resources.

Monroe County has re-established The Council of Governments (COG), which is an intergovernmental body made up of the chief elected officers of the County, City of Rochester and every town and village in Monroe County. The goal of this bipartisan assemblage is communication and collaboration to enhance government services for our community.

Discussion

(con't from Actions planned to reduce lead-based pain hazards) The MCDOPH is currently executing a Healthy Neighborhoods Grant. The grants run from April 1, 2022 to March 31, 2027. The focus of the grant is primary prevention for Tobacco Control, Fire Safety, Injury Prevention, Lead prevention, Indoor Air Quality, General Housing Conditions, and Asthma Control. Each year, Outreach workers will perform approximately six hundred (600) initial visits in zip codes 14605, 14608, 14609, 14611 and 14621, which have well documented public health and housing issues. Additional zip codes may be added during this grant round. A total of 125 follow-up visits are also anticipated. Topics covered will include lead poisoning prevention (deteriorated paint, dust, cleaning, and nutrition), fire safety issues, carbon monoxide, general sanitation issues, code violations, electrical problems, tobacco cessation, general home safety, and controlling asthma triggers. Referrals will be made to MCDOPH programs and other agencies when problems are identified. During this grant round, the HNP grant manager intends to expand referrals made to outside agencies/programs that can provide additional assistance in home environmental issues, especially in relation to asthma and home repair/improvement.

Monroe County leverages HOME funds with other funding secured by its housing partners to develop affordable homeownership and rental housing. Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDO) and other non-profit housing developers apply for and receive funding from

state and local resources with leveraged support from the County's housing program, to enhance their applications with a final project that supports the goals from all agencies. Monroe County's investment of HOME funds is consistent with the forms of assistance included in 24 CFR 92.205(b).

Monroe County, through the HOME program, provides conditioned grants up to \$10,000 of down payment assistance and closing cost assistance to income eligible applicants below 70% of Area Median Income (AMI), and a maximum of \$5,000 for income eligible applicants between 71-80% of AMI for First Time homebuyers to reduce the cost of purchasing their first home.

3. A description of the guidelines for resale or recapture that ensures the affordability of units acquired with HOME funds? See 24 CFR 92.254(a)(4) are as follows:

Monroe County will provide the CHDO Home Investment Partnership program funds to acquire property in accordance with 24 CFR Part 92. At the time a FTHB applicant enters into a purchase agreement for an eligible property (the "Property"), they accept the amount, terms, and conditions of Buyer's Agreement. Home buyers will execute a Note and Mortgage with a Declaration of Restrictive Covenant. Language for the Declaration of Restrictive Covenant will be as follows: Title of the PROPERTY is conveyed subject to the following restrictions: The Property was acquired with the assistance of funds from Monroe County Home Investment Partnership Funds provided under 24 CFR Part 92. As a condition of the subsidy, the Property must be the Owner's Principal Residence ("Principal Residence" shall mean that the Owner must reside at the Property for any consecutive nine months in each year of the Affordable Housing Period and it must be his/her principal residence) for ten (10) or fifteen (15) years dependent on the Home Investment from the date of this deed. If the Affordable Housing Period has not expired and the Owner sells, rented, title is transferred voluntarily, or in case of bankruptcy, foreclosure, etc., or if the OWNER otherwise fails to occupy the Property as his/her Principal Residence; The Owner agrees to sell the Property to a lowincome family as defined in the Regulations that will use the Property as its Principal Residence for the duration of the ten (10) or fifteen (15) year period. Documentation must be provided to Monroe County verifying the prospective buyer's income eligibility. The price at resale must (1) ensure that the Property will remain affordable to a reasonable range of low-income homebuyers, and (2) provide the Owner a fair return on investment (including the Grantee's investment and any capital improvement). These affordability restrictions and residency requirements shall terminate upon foreclosure or transfer in lieu of foreclosure. The County may use purchase options, rights of first refusal, or other preemptive rights to purchase the housing before foreclosure or deed in lieu of foreclosure to preserve affordability. Nonetheless, these affordability restrictions shall be revived according to the original terms if, during the original Affordable Housing Period, the Owner of record before the foreclosure, or deed in lieu of foreclosure, or any entity that includes the Owner or those

with whom the Owner has or had family or business ties, obtains an ownership interest in the Property.

Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG)

1. Include written standards for providing ESG assistance (may include as attachment)

The County, the City of Rochester, the Continuum of Care (CoC) and HSN (a collaboration of more than 60 local homeless services, legal, primary care, mental health, substance abuse, re-entry providers and community stakeholders) have met throughout each program year to jointly plan for ESG. In keeping with past practice of providing the <u>Emergency Shelter Grants (ESG) Program Desk</u> <u>Guide March 2001</u> to all sub-recipients, the County and City has provided sub-recipients and community providers that coordinate with them the Emergency Solutions Grant Rules and Regulations, and tools available to date including Definition of Homelessness (Criteria for Defining Homeless and Record Keeping Requirements), and Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG) Program Components and Activities. The County and the City provided sub-recipients with information about the new homeless definition and eligibility, documentation and record requirements and HMIS participation. The CoC provides HMIS licenses and training to the County's ESG sub-recipients.

Written standards are attached for Street Outreach, Emergency Shelter, Shelter Operations, Homeless Prevention, and Rapid Rehousing. These programs are eligible for ESG funding.

2. If the Continuum of Care has established centralized or coordinated assessment system that meets HUD requirements, describe that centralized or coordinated assessment system.

Coordinated Entry is defined by HUD as a consistent and streamlined process for accessing the resources available in the homeless crisis response system...ensuring that those with the highest need, most vulnerable households in the community are prioritized for services and that the housing and supportive services in the system are used as efficiently and effectively as possible.

The intended target population for Coordinated Entry is all households or person(s) who are experiencing homelessness or at-risk of experiencing homelessness in Rochester and Monroe County and seeking assistance from the local crisis response system, which includes prevention assistance and homeless system services. This includes single adults without children, adults

accompanied by children, families, unaccompanied youth, parenting youth, person(s) fleeing domestic violence, and veterans.

The community has agreed upon the use of a common assessment tool, known as the VI-SPDAT, to help identify the immediate needs of the household and begin directing them to the appropriate permanent housing intervention based on those needs. Interventions include Rapid Re-Housing for those; who have moderate needs and Permanent Supportive Housing, which will be reserved for those with the highest needs. Households scoring low on the assessment are identified as not needing a housing intervention and are likely able to resolve their homelessness without ongoing assistance. The VI-SPDAT score will be used as one of the determinants in the community-wide prioritization model. While it is important to have an efficient and effective process by which households can access the homeless system, it is equally important for households to be quickly exited into the appropriate permanent housing that will best meet their needs and minimize their likelihood of returning to homelessness. The CE program is currently exploring options for a new assessment tool as the VISPDAT is no longer going to be supported by its developer, Org Code.

Prioritization is a critical component of a Coordinated Entry system to appropriately exit households to permanent housing and to ensure those with the greatest needs have timely access to services. CE has developed a prioritization model based on input from community stakeholders to establish a process to effectively identify those with the highest needs and connect them to the appropriate permanent housing more quickly. CE Workgroup meets regularly to determine how households are prioritized and what information will be used to determine the way in which the list is ordered. A by name prioritization list is now in place and all TH, PSH and RRH housing providers are only permitted to accept households that are referred through the Coordinated Entry prioritization process. The work group continues to meet to make sure CE is functioning efficiently and makes revisions to policies and procedures as needed.

3. Identify the process for making sub-awards and describe how the ESG allocation available to private nonprofit organizations (including community and faith-based organizations).

Awards for the 2023-24 program year were based upon a 2022 Request for Proposal (RFP) process, which was jointly administered by the County and City. The notice was published by legal notice in The Daily Record and distributed via networks including those of the CoC and HSN and respectively on its established website. Awardees were chosen by a committee of County, County Department of Human Services, City, and CoC administrative board, and a formerly homeless community member. Services under this proposal cycle will run from August 1, 2023 – July 31, 2024.

 If the jurisdiction is unable to meet the homeless participation requirement in 24 CFR 576.405(a), the jurisdiction must specify its plan for reaching out to and consulting with homeless or formerly homeless individuals in considering policies and funding decisions regarding facilities and services funded under ESG.

In compliance with Section 576.405(a) of the Interim Rule, the County has engaged persons who are currently or formerly homeless in their planning process. Formerly homeless persons are active members of the Homeless Services Network and are represented on the CoC Board and the HSN Steering Committee. Programs serving the homeless are also required to have homeless or formerly homeless persons involved in policy setting and decision making processes. Both permanent supportive housing and street outreach programs are utilizing persons with lived experience as peers to provide additional support to participants.

5. Describe performance standards for evaluating ESG.

The County utilizes the Integrated Disbursement and Information System (IDIS) to document program progress and monitor program performance on an ongoing basis. The County requires all ESG sub-recipients to submit data to HMIS as required by HUD. A Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER) is prepared annually by the County. Each ESG funded project uses HMIS to run their CAPER and download it directly into SAGE for the County to produce that report. The CoC will assist the projects as needed to do the submission. The CAPER contains a summary of resources and programmatic accomplishments, the status of actions taken in concert with the CoC to implement the strategies contained in the Consolidated Plan, and evaluation of progress made in addressing identified priority needs and objectives.

Performance Standards are in alignment with the new measures implemented with the HEARTH Act including: reducing the duration of homelessness; reducing recidivism; reducing the number of people who become homeless; increasing employment and income; and stability in permanent housing.



Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize the acceptance of a gift from the Greater Rochester Disc Golf Club ("GRDGC") of 18 Disc Golf Association ("DGA") "Mach 7" disc golf baskets with a retail value of approximately \$8,910 for Ellison Park's Disc Golf Course.

The Monroe County Parks Department was approached by David Copp, current president of the GRDGC, regarding improvements to the existing disc golf course at Ellison Park. Mr. Copp has applied to the DGA's "RePlay Course Growth Program" and has received a tentative award of 18 Mach 7 disc golf baskets, which act as the "holes" on a disc golf course, pending his confirmation to the DGA of the approval of this body to accept his donation of the baskets to the County.

Upon acceptance of this gift, the Parks Department intends to donate the 18 older-model baskets being replaced to the Brockport Central, East Rochester Central, and Churchville-Chili Central school districts (six baskets to each district), for the creation of small instructional courses at schools within the district. All three athletic directors involved have been in discussion with the GRDGC and are interested in accepting these baskets if the GRDGC's application to the DGA is a success and this referral is approved. These baskets are DGA "Mach 3" baskets which were purchased by and donated to the County by the GRDGC in 1989, at an original purchase price of \$5,040 and an estimated current value of \$1,800. The transfer of this county property to the three school districts would be completed as per the requirements of the county's disposal policy.



Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a five-year grant from the New York State Department of Health in the amount of \$12,598,000 for the Nutrition Programs, including the Women, Infants & Children (WIC), Enhanced Peer Counselor and Breast Pump Grant components, for the period of October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2028 and amend Resolution 246 of 2020 to extend the term of the contract with Tallavera, LLC, the successor in interest to Reliant Staffing Systems, Inc., D.B.A. Career Start, in connection with the contract, for two (2) additional one-year terms through September 30, 2025, with each additional term in an amount not to exceed \$216,900 annually.

The Nutrition Programs provide: nutrition and health education counseling; supplemental food for low-income infants and children up to age five; supplemental food for low-income pregnant, breastfeeding, and post-partum women; and education, promotion and support for breastfeeding. This funding will be used to support salary, benefits, contracts and other program costs. This will be the forty-third year the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents an increase of \$194,907 from the previous 12-month period.

The contract will continue to provide Nutritionists, Public Health Assistants and Breast Feeding Peer Counselors in order to improve the compliance rates for appointments of existing and new WIC clients, to improve pregnancy and child health outcomes, and to expand and improve WIC outreach.

Amend Resolution 246 of 2020, to extend the term of the contract with Tallavera, LLC, the successor in interest to Reliant Staffing Systems, Inc., D.B.A. Career Start, 19 Cambridge Street, Rochester, New York 14607, in connection with the contract, for support of the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children Program in an amount not to exceed \$216,900 for two (2) additional one-year terms through September 30, 2025, in an amount not to exceed \$216,900 annually.

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- 4. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments.
- 5. 



BE IT RESOLVED BY THE AFFIRMATIVE VOTE OF NOT LESS THAN TWO-THIRDS OF THE TOTAL VOTING STRENGTH OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. For the object or purpose of financing the cost of the reconstruction of Phillips Road (NYS Route 104 to Schlegel Road), in and for the County of Monroe, New York (the "County"), there are hereby authorized to be issued \$450,000 bonds of the County, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The duly adopted current Capital Budget of the County, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is hereby amended to provide for the appropriation of an additional \$25,000 to pay the cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose (\$425,000 having been heretofore appropriated from one or more Capital Budgets). The period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is fifteen (15) years, pursuant to subdivision 20(c) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost thereof is \$450,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$450,000 bonds of said County herein authorized, provided, however, that to the extent any state and/or federal aid and/or grant and/or gift is received for the aforesaid purpose, the County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to accept and shall use such funds to redeem any outstanding indebtedness incurred for such purpose or apply it, dollar for dollar, to reduce the amount of bonds to be issued for such purpose.

<u>Section 3.</u> The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, the chief fiscal officer of the County under the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may sell such bonds or notes at public or private sale, at a discount or premium, at fixed or variable rates of interest or at no interest whatsoever, or as capital appreciation bonds, and with such amortization of principal as the Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer shall determine is most favorable to the County, and in compliance with any rules of the State Comptroller applicable thereto. Such bonds or notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, consistent with the provisions of the Local

Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may, in the event it is determined to issue variable rate bonds or notes, enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance, sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds or notes, as authorized under Section 54.90 of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer is also authorized to enter into such agreements and take such other action as may be necessary or appropriate and lawful to assure that, to the extent possible, (i) interest on the bonds and notes authorized hereby will not be includable in the gross income, for federal income tax purposes, of the recipients thereof, and (ii) to enable the purchaser thereof to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12. The Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer is hereby further delegated all powers of this County Legislature with respect to agreements for credit enhancement, derived from and pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, for such bonds or notes, including, but not limited to the determination of the provider of such credit enhancement facility or facilities and the terms and contents of any agreement or agreements related thereto.

<u>Section 5.</u> All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds or notes, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds or notes, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds or notes, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds or notes, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds or notes (and if said bonds or notes are to be executed in the name of the County by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the County), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds or notes, or may contract on behalf of the County for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds or notes shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes, as authorized by this resolution, may be contested only if:

- 1) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and

an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or

3) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This resolution shall supersede Resolution No. 443 of 2022, being a bond resolution dated December 13, 2022, except to the extent that any indebtedness shall have been contracted or encumbrances made thereunder. The purpose of this superseding bond resolution is to effect the following: to increase the maximum estimated cost of the purpose to \$450,000, and to provide \$450,000 bonds therefor, an increase of \$25,000 over the \$425,000 bonds authorized under Resolution No. 443 of 2022.

Section 8. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the objects or purposes described herein.

Section 9. Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Office of Mental Health in the amount of \$185,000 for the PFC Dwyer Veteran Peer-to-Peer Support Program for the period of April 1, 2023 through March 31, 2024.

The purpose of this grant is to support the design, implementation, and evaluation of peer-to-peer programs for veterans who are experiencing post-traumatic stress symptoms. The goals of the program are to provide outreach and education regarding available peer-to-peer counseling. It should also encourage family, friends, and community connectedness as well as provide access to suicide prevention/intervention measures. This is the ninth year the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents the same amount as last year.

This grant funds a contract with Compeer, Inc., which provides an array of services, including one-on-one peer mentoring, group sessions facilitated by peer mentors, and licensed therapists as consultants; and enhancement of social networking capabilities, virtual meeting spaces, and other technological tools designed to help veterans connect with one another remotely.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept at \$185,000 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Office of Mental Health for the PFC Dwyer Veteran Peer-to-Peer Support Program for the period of April 1, 2023 through March 31, 2024.



Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize contracts with the agencies listed in Attachment A in a total amount not to exceed \$140,000 for 2023 Community Festivals for the period of January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2023 and amend the definition of Mid-Sized Arts Support to include cultural organizations with annual budgets between \$50,000 and \$4,000,000.

This is the first year Monroe County has offered Community Festival Support, as outlined in the 2023 Monroe County Budget. In total, twenty-four (24) festivals will be funded at an amount not to exceed \$296,300, of which three (3) festivals were selected to receive support exceeding \$20,000.

The festivals were selected through a competitive application process. Festivals were required to apply for funding under one or more of the following four (4) categories pursuant to County Law § 224: (1) Events or festivals related to armistice, memorial, or other recognized national patriotic observance; (2) Events or festivals that commemorate historical events of county-wide interest and concern; (3) Events or festivals that provide for the maintenance and operation of a professional symphony or philharmonic orchestra, musical festival, or vocal, dance, drama, or performing arts troupe, group, or activity of any kind or nature; and/or (4) Events or festivals that publicize the advantages of the county. Additional requirements were also established related to event date, location, size, and cost.

Additionally, the definition of Mid-Sized Arts Support will be expanded to include cultural organizations with annual budgets between \$50,000 and \$4,000,000. The current definition only supports organizations with budgets of \$100,000 to \$1,500,000. Expanding this definition will create opportunities that are more equitable and expand eligibility for arts and cultural funding. Applications for mid-sized arts support is expected to launch in summer of 2023.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute contracts, and any amendments thereto, with each approved agency as listed in Attachment A for community festival support in a total amount not to exceed \$140,000 for the period of January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2023.
- 2. Amend the 2023 Monroe County Budget to expand the definition of Mid-Sized Arts Support from contributions for arts and cultural organizations with annual budgets between \$100,000 and \$1.5 million to contributions for arts and cultural organizations with annual budgets between \$50,000 and \$4 million.



Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body commit general fund unassigned fund balance in the amount of \$10,000,000 for the specific purpose of funding town incentives to install sidewalks on County roads.

As the Department of Transportation identifies County road projects appropriate for sidewalk installation, the cost of the installation will be incorporated into the overall cost of the capital project. An intermunicipal agreement will be offered to the Town that includes a partial County subsidy to offset the sidewalk's cost as an incentive to gain the Town's participation.

The specific legislative action required is to commit general fund unassigned fund balance in the amount of \$10,000,000 for the specific purpose of funding town incentives to install sidewalks on County roads.

Honorable Legislators:

This referral is being submitted by County Executive Adam J Bello, Sheriff Todd K. Baxter, and Monroe County Legislators.

We recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2023 operating budget of the Office of the Sheriff to provide adequate staffing for the Police Bureau and establish the Regional Investigative Operations Center (RIOC) by appropriating unassigned fund balance in the amount of \$7,291,000, amend the 2023 capital budget to increase funding for the project entitled "Sheriff's Vehicle Replacement" in the amount of \$1,021,000, authorize the creation of forty-one (41) sworn and two (2) civilian positions within the Office of the Sheriff, and authorize an interfund transfer in the amount of \$1,021,000.

Sheriff Patrol across Monroe County is currently staffed at minimum levels and there is no flexibility for leave, training or proactive details. Specifically, the number of patrol deputies per capita averages 1 per 3,615 residents. This is well below the national average of 2.3 per 1,000 residents. This referral will increase the amount of patrol to improve coverage and safety across Monroe County. The additional deputies will staff the 3 Zones and address increased demand from 10:00 AM to 2:00 AM as well as fully staffing the Traffic Enforcement Unit and Community Engagement Unit.

Multijurisdictional crime patterns and domestic violent extremists are a rapidly growing threat to our community. Consistent with Governor Hocul's Executive Order 18, the Office of the Sheriff is seeking to create a RIOC to provide a formal structure for coordinating interagency law enforcement and other public safety resources to address a wide range of multijurisdictional crime patterns, such as smash-and-grab burglaries, catalytic converter thefts, child abductions, and violent extremist threats.

Under a formal structure, RIOC staff will coordinate law enforcement involvement in the Rochester Threat Advisory Committee (ROCTAC), provide a liaison to state and federal agencies on targeted violence prevention cases, and receive actionable intelligence from the Monroe Crime Analysis Center and the New York State Intelligence Center. Further, the RIOC will take an all-hazards approach, meaning regardless of the type of threat to the community, RIOC staff will assist the Office of Emergency Management with information collection, situational assessment, and strategy recommendations for engaged fire, EMS, and law enforcement agencies.

This referral will allow the Sheriff's Office to meet the demands of 21st century policing.

Subject: Authorize Grant Contracts and Appropriation Transfers Pursuant the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)

Honorable Legislators:

We recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize grant contracts with the agencies listed in Attachment A in a total amount not to exceed \$6,205,421 pursuant to the American Rescue Plan Act ("ARPA") for terms to commence on or after May 1, 2023 and terminate on or before December 31, 2026, and to authorize appropriation transfers.

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 was signed into law on March 11, 2021. ARPA allocated \$1.9 trillion in emergency relief and recovery, of which \$350 billion was designated to support state, local, territorial, and Tribal governments. Monroe County is the recipient of \$144,080,127 in State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds through ARPA. As part of its ARPA response, Monroe County designated a portion of its funds to support entities that provide fire protection services and/or certified ambulance and advanced life support first response services in Monroe County.

On December 16, 2022, Monroe County issued a Request for Proposals for entities that provide fire protection services and/or certified ambulance and advanced life support in Monroe County. Respondents were invited to submit grant proposals that complied with ARPA requirements, which included but were not limited to: improving the efficacy of public health and economic programs through tools like program evaluation, data, and outreach; restoring prepandemic employment in the public sectors; and COVID-19 mitigation and prevention. 25 proposals were submitted for consideration and 13 applications were selected.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute grant contracts, and any amendments thereto, with the agencies listed in Attachment A in a total amount not to exceed \$6,205,421 for terms to commence on or after May 1, 2023 and terminate on or before December 31, 2026.
- 2. Authorize an appropriation transfer in the amount of \$4,000,000 from the Monroe County Legislature, general fund 9301, funds center 1001030000, Local Recovery Fund to the Department of Finance, general fund 9301, funds center 1403930103 ARPA-Public Safety.

- 3. Authorize an appropriation transfer in the amount of \$2,205,421 from the Department of Public Health, general fund 9001, funds center 5801090100 Pandemic Response to the Department of Finance, general fund 9301, funds center 1403930103 ARPA-Public Safety.
- 4. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of these funds, any returned contractor funds, or any deferred revenue, in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments.
- 5. Should funding of these programs be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program(s) and where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program(s). Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with the New York State Civil Service Law, and when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

The grant contracts are Type II Actions pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and (31) ("purchase or sale of furnishings, equipment or supplies, including surplus government property, other than the following: land, radioactive material, pesticides, herbicides, or other hazardous materials") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for these grant contracts is included in fund 9301, funds center 2408020100 once the appropriation transfers are authorized. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Each of these contractors has been reviewed for not-for-profit corporate status and the records in the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that none of these agencies owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a License Agreement with Deaf Events Among Families Circle, Inc. ("the Circle") for the 2023 KODA + Deaf Day Camp, to be held at Powder Mills Park from June 26 through June 29, 2023.

The KODA + Deaf Day Camp is a day camp for children who are deaf along with "kids of deaf adults" (KODA). In addition to typical day camp activities such as games and arts-and-crafts, the camp also features storytellers and presenters focused on educating campers about Deaf culture and ASL.

As part of this licensing process, the organization would be required to remit the normal daily lodge rental fee for Powder Horn Lodge at Powder Mills Park for the four days of the camp and a Special Use Event Permit fee of \$50, based on the number of people expected to participate in the camp.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize a license agreement with Deaf Events Among Families Circle, Inc. for the 2023 KODA + Deaf Day Camp, to be held at Powder Mills Park from June 26 through June 29, 2023.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR 617.5(c)(21) ("minor temporary uses of land having negligible or no permanent impact on the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

This license is revenue generating and no net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

The records of the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that Deaf Events Among Families Circle, Inc. a not-for-profit organization, does not owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes.



- 3. Item 39, "Language Access Program and MWBE Micro Loan Program" should have been "Language Access Program" in the amount of \$200,000.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend Resolution 342 of 2022 to replace Attachment A with the Attachment A attached hereto and to increase funding from an amount not to exceed \$71,644,551 to an amount not to exceed \$77,444,551 pursuant to the American Rescue Plan Act ("ARPA").
- 2. Authorize an appropriation transfer of \$800,000 from Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, general fund 9301, funds center 2201010000, Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, to the Department of Finance, general fund 9301, funds center 1403930101, ARPA-Economic Development.



Referral 23-0085 was substituted on March 23, 2023, to include: (1) an amendment the 2023 Capital Budget to increase funding for the project entitled "Milling/Resurfacing/Recycling" in the amount of \$180,000, from \$1,500,000 to \$1,680,000, for a total project authorization of \$1,680,000; and (2) an authorization for the Controller to transfer \$180,000 from the Department of Transportation, road fund 9002, funds center 8002040000 Road Maintenance to capital fund 2059, Milling/Resurfacing/Recycling. The substituted referral was reported upon favorably by Transportation and Ways and Means at the March 28th committee meetings and approved by the Monroe County Planning Board on April 27th. However, Resolution 113 of 2023 did not include the substituted language.

The 2023 Highway Maintenance Project in the Towns of Brighton and Greece involves the replacement of drainage structures, frames and grates, replacement of damaged curbing, repair/replacement of non-compliant ADA sidewalk ramps, striping of the roadway, including adding bike lanes, eastbound and westbound, to Elmwood Avenue within the project limits, milling and paving of Elmwood Avenue from the City Line (S. Goodman Street) to S. Winton Road in the Town of Brighton and Dewey Avenue from Dorsey Road to Latta Road in the Town of Greece, and installation of traffic detection cameras at select intersections. The current schedule is to start work in Spring 2023 with an anticipated completion by Fall 2023. The total estimated project cost is \$3,475,946.27.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$1,360,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, NEW YORK, TO FINANCE THE COST OF THE PURCHASE OF A HAZARDOUS MATERIAL FIRE TRUCK, IN AND FOR SAID COUNTY, AT AN ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST OF \$1,360,000 AND SUPERSEDING THE BOND RESOLUTION ADOPTED ON JANUARY 10, 2023 (RESOLUTION NO. 23 OF 2023)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE AFFIRMATIVE VOTE OF NOT LESS THAN TWO-THIRDS OF THE TOTAL VOTING STRENGTH OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

<u>Section 1.</u> For the object or purpose of financing the cost of the purchase of a Hazardous Material Fire Truck, in and for the County of Monroe, New York (the "County"), there are hereby authorized to be issued \$1,360,000 bonds of the County, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The duly adopted current Capital Budget of the County, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is hereby amended to provide for the appropriation of an additional \$60,000 to pay the cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose (\$1,300,000 having been heretofore appropriated from one or more Capital Budgets). The period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is twenty (20) years, pursuant to subdivision 27 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost thereof is \$1,360,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$1,360,000 bonds of said County herein authorized, provided, however, that to the extent any state and/or federal aid and/or grant and/or gift is received for the aforesaid purpose, the County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to accept and shall use such funds to redeem any outstanding indebtedness incurred for such purpose or apply it, dollar for dollar, to reduce the amount of bonds to be issued for such purpose.

<u>Section 3.</u> The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

<u>Section 4.</u> Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, the chief fiscal officer of the County under the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may sell such bonds or notes at public or private sale, at a discount or premium, at fixed or variable rates of interest or at no interest whatsoever, or as capital appreciation bonds, and with such amortization of principal as the Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer shall determine is most favorable to the County, and in compliance with any rules of the State Comptroller applicable thereto. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may, in the event it is determined to issue variable rate bonds or notes, enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance, sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds or notes, as authorized under Section 54.90 of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer is also authorized to enter into such agreements and take such other action as may be necessary or appropriate and lawful to assure that, to the extent possible, (i) interest on the bonds and notes authorized hereby will not be includable in the gross income, for federal income tax purposes, of the recipients thereof, and (ii) to enable the purchaser thereof to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12. The Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer is hereby further delegated all powers of this County Legislature with respect to agreements for credit enhancement, derived from and pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, for such bonds or notes, including, but not limited to the determination of the provider of such credit enhancement facility or facilities and the terms and contents of any agreement or agreements related thereto.

<u>Section 5.</u> All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds or notes, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds or notes, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds or notes, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds or notes, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds or notes (and if said bonds or notes are to be executed in the name of the County by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the County), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds or notes, or may contract on behalf of the County for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds or notes shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes, as authorized by this resolution, may be contested only if:

- 1) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and

an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or

3) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This resolution shall supersede Resolution No. 23 of 2023, being a bond resolution dated January 10, 2023, except to the extent that any indebtedness shall have been contracted or encumbrances made thereunder. The purpose of this superseding bond resolution is to effect the following: to increase the maximum estimated cost of the purpose to \$1,360,000, and to provide \$1,360,000 bonds therefor, an increase of \$60,000 over the \$1,300,000 bonds authorized under Resolution No. 23 of 2023.

Section 8. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the objects or purposes described herein.

Section 9. This resolution shall take effect in accordance with Section C2-7 of the Monroe County Charter and the Clerk of the Legislature is hereby authorized and directed to publish this resolution or a summary hereof to be published, together with a notice attached in substantially the form and in the manner prescribed by Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.
