RE: Memorializing the United States Congress to Pass the Honoring Our Fallen Heroes Act.

Honorable Legislators:

The Public Safety Officers' Benefits (PSOB) program provides benefits to the survivors of fire fighters, federal, state, and local law enforcement officers, and other first responders who are killed by injuries sustained in the line of duty. The program also provides disability benefits for first responders who become permanently or totally disabled. The Public Safety Officers' Educational Assistance (PSOEA) program, a component of the PSOB program, provides higher-education assistance to the children and spouses of public safety officers killed or permanently disabled in the line of duty. The PSOB and PSOEA programs are administered by the Department of Justice's Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA).

Emergency personnel provide many services including, education to children during fire safety week, providing lifesaving care, and providing extrication from motor vehicle accidents. First responders also make many sacrifices, including giving up time with their families and risking their lives, in addressing emergencies. Firefighters are particularly at risk due to consistent exposure to carcinogens.

The bipartisan legislation Honoring Our Fallen Heroes Act, was introduced in the Senate by Sen. Amy Klobuchar of Minnesota and Sen. Kevin Cramer of North Dakota and in the House of Representatives by Rep. Bill Pascrell of New Jersey and Rep. Carlos Gimenez of Florida. The bill contains language to include first responders who die as a result of cancer caused by exposure to carcinogens during their service. The bill would also extend disability benefits in cases where first responders become permanently and totally disabled due to cancer.

This legislation was brought forth through the advocacy of the family of Michael J. Paidar, a St. Paul, Minnesota fire Captain who passed away from Acute Myeloid Leukemia. Captain Paidar's widow Julie was awarded line-of-duty benefits from the PSOB. This instance was the first time a family had received benefits for cancer incurred in the line of duty under the Minnesota PSOB.

The legislation is endorsed by the International Association of Fire Fighters, as well as the Fraternal Order of Police, International Association of Fire Chiefs, National Association of Police Organizations, National Volunteer Fire Council, Federal Law Enforcement Officers Association, National Fallen Firefighters Foundation, Congressional Fire Services Institute, and Sergeants Benevolent Association of New York City. Representative Gimenez of Florida is quoted as saying, "As the only career firefighter paramedic serving in Congress and as the City of Miami's very first Cuban-American Fire Chief, it's an honor and a duty to introduce the bipartisan Honoring Our Fallen Heroes Act. Our first responders go above and beyond the line of duty to protect the communities they serve and this legislation would guarantee that they have access to the life-saving care they rightfully deserve."

Senate Bill S.930 and the House of Representatives companion bill H.R.1719: would help many firefighters and other first responders and their families in the event of an occurrence of cancer.

We encourage the members of the Senate and the House of Representatives to pass this legislation to help improve the lives of all Emergency Services Professionals who serve communities throughout the United States and their families. We also urge President Biden to follow suit and sign this into law.

RE: Memorializing the United States Congress to Pass Ethan's Law

Honorable Legislators:

Each year, the levels of gun violence and accidental shootings are all-too high. With continued manufacturing and distributing of firearms, the accessibility and reliability is incomparable. Firearms are as easily obtainable as cellphones, and provides the same quick thrill to teenagers. Our expectations have been warped indefinitely by this, and now when a 15 year old boy, such as Ethan Song, is accidentally shot by an unsecured firearm in his neighbor's home, it is greeted with inaction or worse – indifference.

Purposeful and premeditated crimes aside, over 75 percent of firearms used in youth suicide attempts and unintentional firearm injuries were stored in the residence of the victim, a relative, or a friend. Controlling the ease of access to these firearms by requiring owners to properly store their guns will help to reduce these incidents. Helping to reduce the loss of loved ones due to accidents, and guaranteeing children the right to be kept safe by their caregivers. Adding one protective barrier between firearms and people who should not lawfully be in possession of one, guarantees all of US citizens the right to be protected.

Ethan's Law would require firearms that have affected interstate or foreign commerce to be properly stored on residential premises and prohibited from unsafe storage that may result in a minor or ineligible resident being injured or killed. This bill would allow owners of firearms to be charged for improper storage resulting in a fine, for a minor obtaining the firearm and causing injury or death to oneself or another, and allow for seizure and forfeit of improperly stored firearms. Ethan's Law would assist states and tribes with implementing secure gun storage laws, helping resolve the negative economic impact of gun violence in communities is tied directly to the national economy and interstate commerce.

S173: Ethan's Law will help to regulate the storage of firearms on residential premises at the federal, state, and tribal levels if a minor is likely to gain access without permission or if a resident is ineligible to possess a firearm.

We encourage the United States Senate to pass this legislation to help improve the lives of children and families in Monroe County and New York State. We also urge the House of Representatives to follow suit and President Biden to sign this into law.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 215 of 2019, as amended by Resolution 315 of 2022, to accept additional funding from the New York State Department of Health ("NYSDOH") in the amount of \$118,949 for the Tuberculosis Prevention and Control Program (formerly known as the Public Health Campaign – County Tuberculosis Program) for the period of April 1, 2019 through March 31, 2024.

By Resolution 215 of 2019, Your Honorable Body authorized the acceptance of a grant from the NYSDOH for the Tuberculosis Prevention and Control Program. The purpose of this grant is to provide enhanced tuberculosis prevention, control, and elimination services to Monroe County residents. Funds will be used to cover partial salaries and benefits for staff nurses who perform case management, screening, diagnosis, and treatment of infected and at-risk clients. Additionally, staff outreach workers will provide directly observed therapy and assist with screening and contact investigations. This additional funding will be used to support services to Ukrainian newcomers under the Uniting for Ukraine initiative and to enhance the overall services provided by the County's Tuberculosis Prevention and Control Program program. #### Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a five-year grant from Health Research, Inc. in the amount of \$1,325,735 for the Strengthening Public Health Workforce and Foundational Capabilities Program for the period of December 1, 2022 through November 30, 2027.

The purpose of this grant is to invest in the local public health workforce and foundational capabilities to address health inequities and disparities more effectively across populations and regions throughout their jurisdiction and better meet the ongoing and future health needs of New Yorkers. Funds will be used to strengthen the public health workforce through hiring of public health positions, supporting retention of current staff, making upgrades to the workplace to increase employee satisfaction, providing public health training, and providing public health support services to the Department of Public Health. This will be the first year the County has received this grant.

#### The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$1,325,735 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, Health Research, Inc., for the Strengthening Public Health Workforce and Foundational Capabilities Program, for the period of December 1, 2022 through November 30, 2027.
- 2. Amend the 2023 operating budget of the Department of Public Health by appropriating the sum of \$265,147 into general fund 9300, funds center 5801010000, Public Health Commissioner.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant contract.

4. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

#### Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services in the amount of \$50,000 for implementation of components of a plan to address racial and ethnic disparities in the youth justice system for the period of June 1, 2022 through May 31, 2024.

The New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services, Office of Youth Justice, the Center for Children's Law and Policy, and the New York State Youth Justice Institute have partnered to create a new training, technical assistance, and skill-building opportunity for youth justice professionals throughout the state known as the Policy Equity Academy. It is designed to support localities in their efforts to implement policies and reforms that target areas of significant racial and ethnic disparity in the youth justice system. The Policy Equity Academy consists of virtual skill-building and planning opportunities for local professionals that are designed to equip participants with the knowledge base and leadership skills to promote effective efforts to reduce racial and ethnic disparities in their local jurisdictions. The Academy assists with the development of a local level action plan, and provides technical assistance and funding up to \$50,000 to support implementation of action plans.

In order to achieve the objectives of the Policy Equity Academy, the Monroe County Office of Probation and Community Corrections has developed a plan that utilizes support services, juvenile justice education, and group facilitation services to at-risk, juvenile justice-involved, and probation-involved youth in Monroe County. The plan's objectives are to increase the number of youth of color who are offered, engage with, and successfully complete adjustment services, and decrease the number of youth of color referred to the presentment agency for petitions. This is the first time the County has received this grant.



This action is for the sale of 55 parcels totaling approximately 30+/- acres. This property sale is adjacent to, or substantially contiguous to, the Lehigh Valley Trail Ext. running north/south from the Erie Canal to the Monroe County owned Lehigh Valley Trail running east/west and the Town of Brighton's Lynch Woods Nature Park. Additionally, the Monroe County owned and managed Genesee Valley Park and Genesee Valley Golf Course is approximately 466+/- feet from this action.


On Part 2 of the FEAF, guestion #7 indicated that the proposed action may result in a loss of flora or fauna. Currently, these parcels are largely undeveloped. The sale of the parcels may result in development which may cause a loss of flora and fauna on site as the property "will potentially support future substation and transmission upgrades that are in development at this time." Substation and Transmission upgrades may result in clear cutting, filling, and ongoing maintenance to vegetation to the site. The site is not known to host: rare, threatened, or endangered species as listed by New York State or the federal government; any species of special concern or conservation need or any habitat used by the same, as listed by New York State or the federal government. Accordingly, it is not anticipated that any loss of flora or fauna will have no or small impact to the environment.

Question #7(d), Impact on Transportation indicated the proposed action may result in a change to existing transportation systems. The Lehigh Valley Trail Ext, is a non-motorized trail that connects cyclists, pedestrians, and hikers to portions of the City of Rochester and the Town's of Brighton and Henrietta. By connections to other existing trails or mixed use paths, users can connect with many Monroe County communities via the Erie Canal Trail, Lehigh Valley Trail, Auburn Trail, Lake Ontario State Parkway Trail, the Genesee Riverway Trail, the Genesee Greenway Trail, and others. Accordingly, "future substation and transmission upgrades that are in development at this time" may impact the user experience, due to temporary construction debris, delay, or permanent change due to land use changes from forested and early-successional vegetation to developed or commercial land uses. Although, this sale may lead to potential substation and transmission upgrades that may impact the Lehigh Valley Trail the impact is expected to be small and/or temporary in nature.

Question #17, Consistency with Community Plans indicated that the potential development of these parcels for commercial or industrial use is not consistent with the adopted land use plans of the Town of Brighton. The majority of parcels are currently zoned Residential Large Lot (RLL) and future land use maps from "Envision Brighton 2028 - Comprehensive Plan" identify that this area, potentially parcels a part of this sale are identified as Town Parks and Open Space. Specifically, question 17(g) indicates that the proposed action may induce secondary impacts such as clearing of trees and vegetation, access roads, and commercial development in an area currently zoned residential large lot and proposed in a future land use map as Town Parks and Open Space. Although the area is envisioned as Town Park and Open Space, substations and transmission lines for utilities are ubiquitous in Monroe County and the Town of Brighton and are often intermixed into residential, rural, suburban, and commercial land uses. The development of such, may have small impacts to the community and be inconsistent with community plans, however these impacts may be further ameliorated by buffers, barriers, and site design that allow utilities or industrial uses to fit in to existing land uses or be in close proximity to dissimilar land uses.

Acceptance of Two Grants from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation for Climate Smart Communities for the Climate Vulnerability Assessment and Climate Adaptation

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept two (2) grants from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation ("NYSDEC") in the amounts of \$75,000 for the Climate Vulnerability Assessment and \$100,000 for the Climate Adaptation Plan.

Monroe County was awarded two (2) grants as part of an initiative by the NYSDEC to provide resources for projects aimed at addressing climate change and its effects. This project complements the goals established in the Monroe County Climate Action Plan, Phase I of which was approved by Your Honorable Body under Resolution 276 of 2022, and the Climate Smart Communities Program, which Your Honorable Body approved under Resolution 260 of 2020. As part of the Climate Smart Communities program, completion of these projects will further Monroe County's goal of achieving Silver Certification in the Climate Smart Communities Program, the highest level in the program.

The grants for the Climate Vulnerability Assessment and the Climate Adaptation Plan will support the development of a Monroe County Climate Adaptation and Resiliency Plan ("CARP"). The CARP will identify, analyze, and prioritize the effects of climate hazards and risks (such as flooding, heat stress, or drought), on specific population segments and the entire community, specific areas, assets, and entire systems. It will consider diversity, equity, inclusion, and justice issues since vulnerabilities will likely lead to varying risks across the diverse populations in our community.

This grant was submitted through the New York State Consolidated Funding Application program in 2022, and the award was announced in January 2023. The Monroe County Department of Environmental Services will lead the project funded by this grant and administer the grant requirements.

#### The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$75,000 grant from, and execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation for the Climate Vulnerability Assessment.
- 2. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$100,000 grant from, and execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation for the Climate Adaptation Plan.

- 3. Amend the 2023 operating budget of the Department of Environmental Services by appropriating the sum of \$175,000 into general fund 9300, funds center 8301020000 Climate Initiatives.
- 4. Amend the 2023 operating budget of the Department of Environmental Services by appropriating the sum of \$175,000 of general fund committed fund balance into general fund 9001, funds center 8301020000 Climate Initiatives.
- 5. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments.
- 6. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(27) ("conducting concurrent environmental, engineering, economic, feasibility and other studies and preliminary planning and budgetary processes necessary to the formulation of a proposal for action, provided those activities do not commit the agency to commence, engage in or approve such action") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

These grants require equal local funding matches, in the amounts of \$75,000 for the Climate Vulnerability Assessment and \$100,000 for the Climate Adaptation Plan. The local matches will require additional net County support, for which the appropriation of general fund committed fund balance is requested.

Extension of Provisions of Section 89-p of the New York State Retirement and Social

Security Law to Members Employed as Deputy Sheriff-Civil in the County of Monroe

#### Honorable Legislators:

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Sheriff Todd K. Baxter.

On April 11, 2023, Your Honorable Body adopted Resolutions 129 and 130 of 2023 requesting that the New York State Legislature enact legislation to amend the New York State Retirement and Social Security Law to change the retirement classification for deputy sheriffs-civil to allow for their retirement after twenty-five years of creditable service.

In response to Resolutions 129 and 130, the New York State Legislature enacted and Governor Kathy Hochul signed into law Section 89-x of the New York State Retirement and Social Security Law entitled "Retirement of deputy sheriffs-civil in Monroe county." The new State law became effective May 3, 2023 and will allow for the change in retirement classification for deputy sheriffs-civil in Monroe County under Section 89-p of the Retirement and Social Security Law and permit their retirement after twenty-five years of creditable service.

Section 89-x of the New York State Retirement and Social Security Law authorizes Monroe County to adopt a resolution on or before December 31, 2024 to extend the provisions of Section 89-p to members employed as deputy sheriff-civil.

The New York State and Local Retirement System estimates that the extension of the provisions of Section 89-p to members employed as deputy sheriff-civil will increase Monroe County's annual contribution to New York State for fiscal year ending March 31, 2024 by approximately \$24,000 and cause Monroe County to incur a past service cost of approximately \$147,000. In future years, the annual contributions will vary as the billing rates and salary of the affected members change.

The specific legislative action required is pursuant to Section 89-x of the New York State Retirement and Social Security Law, authorize the extension of the provisions of Section 89-p of the New York State Retirement and Social Security Law to those members employed as deputy sheriff-civil in Monroe County.

#### Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2023-2028 Capital Improvement Program and the 2023 Capital Budget to add a project entitled "CDC Annex - Mod B Renovation," in the amount of \$1,000,000, and authorize financing for the project in the amount of \$1,000,000.

Pursuant to Resolution 62 of 2023, Your Honorable Body authorized a contract for the construction of new facilities at the Children's Detention Center in the Town of Rush. A notice-to-proceed was issued and the work began in May of this year. The project's estimated completion date is December 2024. In the interim, the Courts have increased the number of juveniles assigned to the Children's Detention Center and the occupancy limit at the Detention Center has been exceeded on various occasions. In response to the increased number of youths assigned to the Detention Center, the New York State Office of Children and Family Services ("OCFS") has permitted Monroe County to use the former Monroe County Correctional Facility located at 750 East Henrietta Road in the Town of Brighton for the supplemental placement of juveniles.

This project will create ten additional bedrooms and associated program space for the placement of juveniles at times when the Rush facility is at capacity. Modular Unit B at the former Monroe County Correctional Facility will be renovated to meet secure detention criteria to permit its potential use as a secure facility for juveniles. OCFS provided approval for design of this project on July 12, 2023. Over time OCFS will reimburse the County for forty-nine percent of the cost of constructing the secure detention beds.

This project will be considered by the Monroe County Planning Board on August 24, 2023.

- Amend the 2023-2028 Capital Improvement Program to add a project entitled "CDC Annex Mod B Renovation," in the amount of \$1,000,000.

# ENACT A LOCAL LAW ENTITLED "MONROE COUNTY FAIR CHANCE EMPLOYMENT ACT"

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. Title. This local law shall be known as the "Monroe County Fair Chance Employment Act."

#### Section 2. Legislative Intent.

- A. The Legislature finds that those with a criminal history regularly face discrimination in many areas of life, including employment.
- B. The Legislature further finds that studies indicate that stable employment is one of the best predictors of post-conviction success.
- C. The Legislature further finds that the ability of individuals with a criminal history to successfully reintegrate into their communities and find employment improves public safety and benefits local taxpayers, as less crime leads to safer communities, strengthens families, and saves taxpayers money on costs associated with law enforcement and incarceration.
- D. The Legislature determines that those who have been incarcerated have paid their debt to society and should be afforded a fair opportunity to reenter the workplace. Individuals with a criminal history should not be discriminated against once they are released from prison and should be evaluated for employment based upon their qualifications to perform a job, rather than their criminal history.
- E. The Legislature determines that individuals with a criminal history represent a workforce with skills to contribute and a desire to add value to their communities.
- F. The Legislature determines that the main goal of a criminal justice system should be rehabilitation and that once individuals reenter society, they should be treated fairly and without discrimination based on a prior conviction.
- G. The Legislature finds that employment discrimination based on criminal history can affect anyone regardless of race, religion, national origin, gender, or sexual orientation. However, African Americans are disproportionately hurt by discrimination based on criminal history due to a long history of policies that have led to African Americans being incarcerated at rates more than five times that of Whites, and more than two and a half times that of Hispanics.
- H. The Legislature determines that due to a criminal justice system in which minorities are incarcerated at much higher rates than Whites, African Americans and Hispanics bear the brunt of employment discrimination based on criminal history.
- The Legislature finds that nine municipalities and three counties in the state of New York have implemented policies to protect job applicants against potential discrimination, including New York City, Buffalo, and Rochester.

- J. The Legislature further finds that over twenty states and more than one hundred municipalities and counties throughout the United States across all political lines have implemented policies to protect job applicants from potential discrimination.
- K. The Legislature further finds that New York Correction Law does not prohibit employers from inquiring about criminal history on employment applications. Because the vast majority of applications are discarded during an initial review for a variety of reasons, it makes it extremely difficult for an applicant to prove that he or she was not hired due to his or her criminal history. In addition, many applicants simply will not apply for a position if they are required to disclose their criminal history on an employment application.
- L. Therefore, the purpose of this local law is to ensure that everyone receives a fair chance in seeking employment with Monroe County, regardless of one's arrest record or criminal history.

**Section 3. Purpose.** The purpose of this section is to ensure that applicants for positions with Monroe County are not unfairly discriminated against because of prior criminal history during the application process.

#### **Section 4. Definitions.** As used in this section:

"Adverse Action" means to refuse to hire or promote, to discharge an individual from his or her employment, or revoke an applicant's conditional offer of employment.

"Applicant" means any person considered or who requests to be considered for employment by the County.

"Application Process" means the period of time beginning when an applicant inquires about employment with the County or submits an employment application to the County, and ends when the applicant is provided a conditional offer of employment or the County chooses not to offer the applicant a conditional offer of employment.

"Arrest" means a record or action by any jurisdiction that does not result in a conviction, or any encounter with a law enforcement agency that does not result in a conviction. This includes information indicating that a person has been questioned, apprehended, taken into custody or detained, or held for an investigation by a law enforcement, police, or prosecutorial agency.

"Conviction" means any sentence arising from a plea or verdict of guilty, including a sentence of incarceration, a suspended sentence, a sentence of probation, an unconditional discharge, or a diversion program.

"County" means the County of Monroe, its departments, administrative units, public officers, and employees.

"Criminal History" means an individual's prior criminal conviction and/or sentencing in New York State or any other jurisdiction.

#### Section 5. Prohibition Against Unfair Discrimination. The County shall not:

- A. Inquire about an applicant's criminal history during the application process.
- B. Inquire about an applicant's arrest record at any point in the application process or during any inquiry relating to criminal history; however the County shall not be prohibited from inquiring about pending criminal charges.
- C. Conduct a criminal history check of an applicant until after a conditional offer of employment is

made, unless otherwise required because of the nature of the position or by law.

#### Section 6. Regulations Relating to Background Checks.

- A. All County job announcements shall contain the following disclosure: "This position is subject to a background check for criminal convictions. Convictions will be considered but will not automatically disqualify the candidate. No criminal background check will occur until after a conditional offer of employment has been made, unless required prior to a conditional offer because of the nature of the position or otherwise required by law."
- B. The County shall not use the following criminal records in relation to a criminal background check: records of arrest not followed by a valid conviction, or records which reflect dismissed or expunged convictions, violations, and infractions; however the County shall not be prohibited from considering pending criminal charges.

#### Section 7. Guidelines for Consideration of Criminal History and Revocation of Offer of Employment.

- A. Unless a background check is required before a conditional offer of employment because of the nature of the position or otherwise required by law, the County shall send the applicant the following documents prior to conducting a background check or inquiring about an applicant's criminal history:

  (1) a conditional offer of employment, and (2) notice that a criminal history check will be conducted prior to the start of employment.
- B. The County shall not take adverse action against an individual due to the individual's criminal history unless such action is in conformance with Article 23-A of New York Correction Law, New York Human Rights Law, and the New York Family Court Act.
- C. Nothing in this local law shall be construed to prevent the County from taking adverse action against any applicant or denying employment for reasons other than such applicant's criminal history.

#### Section 8. Exceptions.

- A. The prohibitions in this local law shall not apply to the Monroe County Sheriff's Office, the Monroe County Department of Public Safety, the Monroe County Department of Aviation, the Monroe County District Attorney's Office, the Monroe County Children's Detention Center, and positions for which it is otherwise required by law to access criminal history information before a conditional offer is made.
- B. The prohibitions of this local law shall not apply if the inquiries or adverse actions prohibited herein are specifically authorized by any other applicable law. Additionally, nothing in this local law shall diminish the County's rights or responsibilities under Article 23-A of New York Correction Law.

#### Section 9. Enforcement.

- A. The Monroe County Department of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion is authorized to enforce this local law, to promulgate additional rules and regulations, and take any and all other reasonable actions necessary to implement and enforce this local law. Any rules and regulations set forth in this local law and/or promulgated by the Monroe County Department of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion shall be made available online in a manner approved by the Department of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion.
- B. The Monroe County Department of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion shall be responsible for

conducting proper outreach about this local law.

Section 10. Reverse Preemption. This local law shall be null and void on the day that federal or statewide legislation goes into effect incorporating either the same or substantially similar provisions as are contained in this law, or in the event that a pertinent state or federal administrative agency issues and promulgates regulations preempting such action by the County of Monroe. The County Legislature may determine via resolution whether or not identical or substantially similar federal or statewide legislation, or pertinent preempting state or federal regulations have been enacted for the purposes of triggering the provisions of this section.

Section 11. Severability. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, subdivision, or other part of this local law or its application shall be inconsistent with any federal or state statute, law, regulation or rule then the federal or state statute, law, regulation, or rule shall prevail. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, subdivision, or other part of this local law or its application shall be adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of this local law which shall remain in full force and effect except as limited by such order or judgment.

Section 12. Effective Date and Applicability. This local law shall be effective immediately upon filing in the Office of the Secretary of State.



Such easements do not limit the parcel owners use beyond that which is necessary to effectuate the above construction, maintenance, and drainage.

Part 1 indicated that a remediation site is on or adjacent to the project area. The site is adjacent to, but not involved in this proposed action. The site is part of the Brownfield Cleanup Program (BCP C828185) and has numerous contaminants of concern. New York State Department of Environmental Conservation ("DEC") has determined that the site is a significant threat. A significant threat determination indicates that the site poses a significant threat to public health and/or the environment. With the significant threat determination at this site, the State shall select the remedy to be implemented to address the contamination.

Although BCP C828185 has been determined to be a significant threat, it will not be impacted by easements for road maintenance on nearby properties. The remediation site is removed from the proposed action. The proposed action, easements, are limited to roadway and roadway drainage maintenance. Roadway drainage ensures that runoff flows to appropriate channels, thus reducing runoff that overflows or spills on to roads or nearby properties. Accordingly, after review of retevant materials and consideration the proposed action will not result in any significant adverse environmental impacts.



This action is for the acquisition of permanent easements at 786 North Goodman Street and Central Park for traffic signal repair and maintenance. The physical action undertaken is a Type II action (617.5(c)(22) that would ordinally be classified as a Type II action. However, the acquisition of interests in real property such as permanenent or temporary easements elevate this action to an Unlisted Action and therefore a thorough environmental review and the necessary hard look required by the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act.

The Environmental Mapper indicates the site is located in an archaeologically sensitive area, but after review and consultation through the NYS Culturally Resource Information System (CRIS) and NYS Office of Park, Recreation, and Historic Preservation (NYSORiHP) the review is closed and will not impact any archaeologically sensitive areas. Accordingly, the proposed action will not result in any significant adverse environmental impacts.







Impacts to Northrup Creek from the proposed easement is minimal to non-existent as this easement is limited to the use and access for utilities.

The proposed easement is along the road in an area previously disturbed from roadway construction and containing a drainage ditch, residential driveways and lawn. The permanent easement does not contemplate additional changes to the area.

The Environmental Resource Mapper Indicates that there may be threatened or endangered species, bald eagle and black tern in the area. This is likely due to the proximity to Northrup Creek which likely has suitable marsh and welland habitat for both species. The turf grass and drainage ditch located along the highway boundary would not be expected to support any threatened or endangered species. Minimal to no change to the existing property is expected. Due to the nature of the project, the previous disturbance and nature of the area the temporary disturbance is not expected to have any significant impact on the natural resources in the area.

The anticipated impacts from this project are minimal. The sites, Monroe Community Hospital, the Monroe County Jall, and the Pittsford Dog Park are solely serving as drop off and collection points in closed containers. No form or organic recycling such as composting will take place on site. The selected hauler will provide 64 gallon totes (similar to residential garbage and recycling total) at a location suitable for the site and hauler.

The Pittsford Dog Park may see a slight increase in traffic. However, that Increase represents less than 2% of the Town's population. Of which, some are anticipated to already be current dog park users and will consolidate trips to visit the dog park and food scraps drop off site, thereby not adding any new traffic on site.

Additionally, to mitigate any peak traffic issues to the Park or surrounding areas, the location of the carts will be coordinated with the Town's Parks' Officers to minimize disturbances to the park operations and existing circulation patterns. It is also anticipated that carts will be accessible for disposal throughout the week enabling participants to drop off their food scraps at a time of their choosing. This will reduce concerns related to peak traffic as trips can be spread out. Accordingly, traffic impacts are expected to be small.

To ameliorate any disturbances to the Park or surrounding area occur from debris, smell, etc. Town Park staff will monitor the totes and notify necessary parties of any potential nulsance issues. Lastly, the Town and Monroe County will support an education and outreach program to inform participants on how to properly participate in the food scraps collection program and reduce the potential for issues that may impact sites or the surrounding area.

in the event the County and the Town identify a second location for coffection, the second location will be required to have a parking area of at least 18,000 square feet; provide at least 60 parking spots; offer room for off-street queuing for at least five vehicles; and provide sufficient space for securing the carts. RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$460,500 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, NEW YORK, TO FINANCE THE COST OF WOUND CARE EQUIPMENT AT MONROE COMMUNITY HOSPITAL, IN AND FOR SAID COUNTY, AT AN ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST OF \$460,500

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE AFFIRMATIVE VOTE OF **NOT LESS THAN TWO-THIRDS OF THE TOTAL VOTING STRENGTH** OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. For the object or purpose of financing the cost of Wound Care Equipment at Monroe Community Hospital in and for the County of Monroe, New York (the "County"), there are hereby authorized to be issued \$460,500 bonds of the County, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The duly adopted current Capital Budget of the County, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is hereby amended to provide for the appropriation of the amount hereby authorized to pay the cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose. The period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is five (5) years, pursuant to subdivision 32 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost thereof is \$460,500, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$460,500 bonds of said County herein authorized; provided, however, that to the extent any state and/or federal aid and/or grant and/or gift is received for the aforesaid purpose, the County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to accept and shall use such funds to redeem any outstanding indebtedness incurred for such purpose or apply it, dollar for dollar, to reduce the amount of bonds to be issued for such purpose.

Section 3. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, the chief fiscal officer of the County under the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may sell such bonds or notes at public or private sale, at a discount or premium, at fixed or variable rates of interest or at no interest whatsoever, or as capital appreciation bonds, and with such amortization of principal as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine is most favorable to the County, and in compliance with any rules of the State Comptroller applicable thereto. Such bonds or notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may, in the event it is determined to issue variable rate bonds or notes, enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance,

sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds or notes, as authorized under Section 54.90 of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer is also authorized to enter into such agreements and take such other action as may be necessary or appropriate and lawful to assure that, to the extent possible, (i) interest on the bonds and notes authorized hereby will not be includable in the gross income, for federal income tax purposes, of the recipients thereof, and (ii) to enable the purchaser thereof to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12. The Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer is hereby further delegated all powers of this County Legislature with respect to agreements for credit enhancement, derived from and pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, for such bonds or notes, including, but not limited to the determination of the provider of such credit enhancement facility or facilities and the terms and contents of any agreement or agreements related thereto.

Section 5. All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds or notes, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds or notes, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds or notes, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds or notes, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds or notes (and if said bonds or notes are to be executed in the name of the County by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the County), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds or notes, or may contract on behalf of the County for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds or notes shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals, in addition to those required by Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes, as authorized by this resolution, may be contested only if:

- such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and
  - an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or
- 3) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the objects or purposes described herein.

Section 8. This resolution shall take effect in accordance with Section C2-7 of the Monroe County Charter and the Clerk of the Legislature is hereby authorized and directed to publish this resolution or a summary hereof to be published, together with a notice attached in substantially the form and in the manner prescribed by Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

#### Monroe County Fund Balance Policy

#### Purpose

The County of Monroe desires to establish a fund balance policy for the general fund to better manage its financial resources. Maintaining an adequate fund balance consistent with adopted policy can provide financial stability for both County government and property taxpayers by safeguarding against revenue shortfalls, emergencies, disasters, and other catastrophic one-time expenditures.

#### Background

In accordance with Government Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement 54, governmental fund balances will be classified into the specifically defined categories of non-spendable, restricted, committed, assigned, and unassigned. The last two categories – assigned and unassigned – are generally regarded as comprising "available" fund balance.

Non-spendable fund balance consists of amounts that are not in a spendable form (such as inventory and prepaid expenses) or are legally or contractually required to be maintained intact.

Restricted fund balance consists of amounts that are constrained to a specific purpose by debt covenants, by state or federal statute, or by other enabling legislation.

Committed fund balance consists of amounts constrained to a specific purpose by the County Legislature through adopted resolution. Amounts cannot be used for any other purpose unless the County Legislature takes the same action to remove or change the original constraint.

Assigned fund balance consists of amounts to be used for a specific intent, as identified by the Director of Finance-Chief Financial Officer, to whom the assignment of fund balance has been delegated.

Unassigned fund balance is the least restrictive of all categories of fund balance and consists of amounts that are not reportable in any other category.

When fund balances of more than one category are available for a specific purpose, it is the County's practice to use the most restrictive fund balance first, in the following order: restricted, committed, assigned, and unassigned as they are needed.

#### Policy Statement

Monroe County will maintain an available general fund balance (the combined assigned and unassigned fund balance categories) to be within ten million dollars (\$10 million), plus or minus, of ten percent (10%) of the all-funds expenditures in the currently adopted operating budget.

The Director of Finance-Chief Financial Officer shall calculate annually, at the time audited financial statements are filed with the Clerk of the Legislature, compliance with this policy.

Available fund balance in excess of the maximum requirement may be used in subsequent budgets to provide property tax stability, capital project funding, and/or debt reduction, or for any other lawful purpose approved by the County Legislature.

In the event available fund balance falls below the minimum requirement, the Director of Finance-Chief Financial Officer shall prepare a plan to restore the available fund balance to the minimum requirement in the next budget year or other appropriate period of time.

Section 1. The first sentence of Section 2 of Resolution No. 265, as enacted in nineteen hundred sixty-five, as amended, is amended to read as follows:

SECTION 2. Imposition of sales tax.

On and after August 1, 1965, there is hereby imposed and there shall be paid a tax of 3 percent upon, and for the period commencing December 1, 1993, and ending November 30, [2023] 2025 there is hereby imposed and there shall be paid an additional tax of one percent upon:

- Section 2. Subdivision (h) of Section 3 of Resolution No. 265, as enacted in nineteen hundred sixty-five, as amended, is amended to read as follows:
  - (h) With respect to the additional tax of one percent imposed for the period commencing December 1, 1993, and ending November 30, [2023]2025, the provisions of subdivisions (a), (b), (c), (d) and (e) of this section shall apply, except that for the purposes of this subdivision, all references in said subdivisions (a), (b), (c), and (d) to an effective date shall be read as referring to December 1, 1993, all references in said subdivision (a) to the date four months prior to the effective date shall be read as referring to August 1, 1993, and the reference in subdivision (b) to the date immediately preceding the effective date shall be read as referring to November 30, 1993. Nothing herein shall be deemed to exempt from tax at the rate in effect prior to December 1, 1993, any transaction which may not be subject to the additional one percent rate of tax imposed effective on that date.
- Section 3. Section 4 of Resolution No. 265, as enacted in nineteen hundred sixty-five, as amended, is amended to read as follows:
  - SECTION 4. Imposition of compensating use tax.
  - (a) Except to the extent that property or services have already been or will be subject to the sales tax under this enactment, there is hereby imposed on every person a use tax for the use within this taxing jurisdiction on and after March 1, 1993, except as otherwise exempted under this enactment,
    - (A) of any tangible personal property purchased at retail,
    - (B) of any tangible personal property (other than computer software used by the author or other creator) manufactured, processed or assembled by the user,

- (i) if items of the same kind of tangible personal property are offered for sale by him in the regular course of business or
- (ii) if items are used as such or incorporated into a structure, building, or real property, by a contractor, subcontractor or repairman in erecting structures or buildings, or buildings on, or otherwise adding to, altering, improving, maintaining, servicing or repairing real property, property or land, as the terms real property, property or land are defined in the real property tax law, if items of the same kind are not offered for sale as such by such contractor, subcontractor or repairman or other user in the regular course of business,
- (C) of any of the services described in paragraphs (1), (7) and (8) of subdivision (c) of section two,
- (D) of any tangible personal property, however, acquired, where not acquired for purposes of resale, upon which any of the services described under paragraphs (2), (3) and (7) of subdivision (c) of section two have been performed,
- (E) of any telephone answering service described in subdivision (b) of section two, and
- (F) of any computer software written or otherwise created by the user if the user offers software of a similar kind for sale as such or as a component part of other property in the regular course of business.
- (b) For purposes of clause (A) of subdivision (a) of this section, for the period commencing March 1, 1993 and ending November 30, [2023]2025, the tax shall be at the rate of four percent, and on and after December 1, [2023]2025, the tax shall be at the rate of three percent, of the consideration given or contracted to be given for such property, or for the use of such property, including any charges for shipping or delivery as described in paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of section one, but excluding any credit for tangible personal property accepted in part payment and intended for resale.
- (c) For purposes of subclause (i) of clause (B) of subdivision (a) of this section, for the period commencing March 1, 1993, and ending November 30, [2023]2025, the tax shall be at the rate of four percent, and on and after December 1, [2023]2025, the tax shall be at the rate of three percent, of the price at which items of the same kind of tangible personal property are offered for sale by the user, and the mere storage, keeping, retention or withdrawal from storage of tangible personal property by the person who manufactured, processed or assembled such property shall not be deemed a taxable use by him.
- (d) For purposes of subclause (ii) of clause (B) of subdivision (a) of this section, for the period commencing March 1, 1993, and ending November 30, [2023]2025, the tax shall be at the rate of four percent, and on and after December 1, [2023]2025, the tax shall be at the rate of three percent, of the consideration given or contracted to be given for the tangible personal property manufactured, processed or assembled into the tangible personal property the use of which is subject to tax, including any charges for shipping or delivery as described in paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of section one.
- (e) Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this section, for purposes of clause (B) of subdivision (a) of this section, there shall be no tax on any portion of such price

which represents the value added by the user to tangible personal property which he fabricates and installs to the specifications of an addition or capital improvement to real property, property or land, as the terms real property, property or land are defined in the real property tax law, over and above the prevailing normal purchase price prior to such fabrication of such tangible personal property which a manufacturer, producer or assembler would charge an unrelated contractor who similarly fabricated and installed such tangible personal property to the specifications of an addition or capital improvement to such real property, property or land.

- (f) For purposes of clauses (C), (D) and (E) of subdivision (a) of this section, for the period commencing March 1, 1993, and ending November 30, [2023]2025, the tax shall be a the rate of four percent, and on and after December 1, [2023]2025, the tax shall be at the rate of three percent, of the consideration given or contracted to be given for the service, including the consideration for any tangible personal property transferred in conjunction with the performance of the service and also including any charges for shipping and delivery of the property so transferred and of the tangible personal property upon which the service was performed as such charges are described in paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of section one.
- (g) For purposes of clause (F) of subdivision (a) of this section, for the period commencing March 1, 1993, and ending November 30, [2023]2025, the tax shall be at the rate of four percent, and on and after December 1, [2023]2025 the tax shall be at the rate of three percent, of the consideration given or contracted to be given for the tangible personal property which constitutes the blank medium, such as disks or tapes used in conjunction with the software, or for the use of such property, and the mere storage, keeping, retention or withdrawal from storage of computer software described in such clause (F) by its author or other creator shall not be deemed a taxable use by such person.
- Section 4. Paragraph (D) of subdivision (1) of Section 11 of Resolution No. 265, as enacted in nineteen hundred sixty-five, as amended, is amended to read as follows:
  - (D) With respect to the additional tax of one percent imposed for the period beginning December 1, 1993 and ending November 30, [2023]2025, in respect to the use of property used by the purchaser in this County prior to December 1, 1993.
- Section 5. Subdivision (i) of Section 14 of Resolution No. 265, as enacted in nineteen hundred sixty-five, as amended, is amended to read as follows:
  - (i) Notwithstanding any provision of this resolution to the contrary, net collections from the additional one percent rate of sales and compensating use taxes imposed, respectively, by sections two and four of this resolution, for the period commencing December 1, [2020]2023, and ending November 30, [2023]2025, shall be distributed and allocated by the County as follows: for the period of December 1, [2020]2023 through November 30, [2023]2025 in cash, five percent to the school districts in the area of the county outside the city of Rochester, three percent to the towns located within the county, one and one-quarter percent to the villages located within the county, and ninety and three-quarter percent to the city of Rochester and county of Monroe. The amount of the ninety and three-quarters percent to be distributed and allocated to the city of Rochester and county of Monroe shall be distributed and allocated to each so that the combined total distribution and allocation to each from the sales tax revenues pursuant to sections 1262 and 1262-g of the New York Tax Law and section two of Chapter [58]251 of the Laws of [2020]2023 shall

result in the same total amount being distributed and allocated to the city of Rochester and county of Monroe. The amount so distributed and allocated to the county shall be used for county purposes. The foregoing cash payments to the school districts shall be allocated on the basis of the enrolled public school pupils, thereof, as such term is used in subdivision (b) of section 1262 of the New York Tax Law, residing in the county of Monroe. The cash payments to the towns located within the county of Monroe shall be allocated on the basis of the ratio which the population of each town, exclusive of the population of any village or portion thereof located within a town, bears to the total population of the towns, exclusive of the population of the villages located within such towns. The cash payments to the villages located within the county shall be allocated on the basis of the ratio which the population of each village bears to the total population of the villages located within the county. The term population as used in this section shall have the same meaning as used in subdivision (b) of section 1262 of the New York Tax Law.

Enact a Local Law Entitled "Monroe County Fair Chance Employment Act" Subject:

Honorable Legislators:

Over ninety percent of human resource professionals conduct some sort of criminal background check during the hiring process. Applicants who indicate their criminal record on the initial job application are less likely to receive a callback interview. Researchers have found that among white applicants, 34% of applicants without a criminal record and 17% of those with criminal records were later contacted about a callback interview.

Among African Americans applicants, 14% of applicants without a criminal record and only 4% of those with criminal records were later contacted about a callback interview. The fact that a higher percentage of white applicants with a criminal record were contacted about a callback interview than black applicants without criminal records illustrates the extreme structural disadvantages that black applicants with criminal records face in the employment market.

There are an estimated 65 million adults in the United States with a criminal history. It has been well-documented that African Americans and Latinos are disproportionately represented at every stage of the criminal justice system. Application questions about criminal records guarantee that these Americans will have difficulty finding employment, especially members of minority communities.

The inability to find employment has a marked effect on these community members and their families. One study found that in the year after an incarcerated father is released, the total family income drops by approximately 15% from what it was before incarceration. Because of the stunted upward mobility of people with criminal records, they must often rely on family members and communities for support. Research has shown that 83% of the families of formerly incarcerated men had recently provided financial support to their family member, with half of those families reporting that this support was a financial challenge and 30% of these families reporting that this support was a "financial hardship." In sum, these studies and statistics illustrate the structural barriers faced by people with criminal records – a need that birthed the Ban the Box Movement.

Hiring people with criminal records facilitates public safety by reducing recidivism rates. Studies show that gainful employment is the most successful intervention in decreasing recidivism. One study showed that two years after release, employed people were more than twice as likely to have not committed any additional crimes when compared to formerly incarcerated people who were unable to secure employment.

Statistical and anecdotal evidence illustrate that Ban the Box policies help dismantle the structural discrimination faced by people with records in the employment market. Formerly incarcerated people who were consistently employed throughout the year had a 16% recidivism rate compared to a 52.3% recidivism rate for all other Department of Correction releases. Fair hiring policies also benefit our communities in the form of increased tax revenue and public safety.

More than 150 cities and counties as well as 25 states have adopted Ban the Box policies to help the estimated 70 million people in the United States with a prior arrest or conviction record have a fair chance at employment. Albany County, Dutchess County, Suffolk County and New York City have all passed "ban-the-box legislation. Locally, the City of Rochester and the City of Buffalo have enacted similar legislation.

The RASE Commission report, in its section on job creation, recommended that Monroe County join the City of Rochester and Ban the Box. The report states: "Having stable employment is essential to reintegrating those who have been involved with the justice system back into society. However, these individuals often report believing that they are automatically excluded from most jobs (including Civil Service), or that employers will not even consider them, based on a past criminal record. While this is often untrue, requirements and rules are typically vague around issues like a criminal record."

The proposed local law will help Monroe County fill an estimated 800 vacant positions while ensuring that prospective applicants are not stigmatized and are not discouraged from applying for County positions simply because of a question on the front page of the application. It should also help in diversifying the County's workforce.

Removing the question from the application does not mean that a background check will not be conducted or that an employer cannot exercise appropriate due diligence, but just that it is delayed until later in the process. The legislation also provides exceptions for the Monroe County Sheriff's Department, the Monroe County Department of Public Safety, and positions for which it is already required by law to access criminal history information before the conditional offer stage.

This reform to the County's hiring policy is long overdue.

### The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Schedule and hold a public hearing.
- 2. Adopt the local law as attached.

# ENACT A LOCAL LAW ENTITLED "MONROE COUNTY FAIR CHANCE EMPLOYMENT ACT"

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. Title. This local law shall be known as the "Monroe County Fair Chance Employment Act."

### Section 2. Legislative Intent.

- A. The Legislature finds that those with a criminal history regularly face discrimination in many areas of life, including employment.
- B. The Legislature further finds that studies indicate that stable employment is one of the best predictors of post-conviction success.
- C. The Legislature further finds that the ability of individuals with a criminal history to successfully reintegrate into their communities and find employment improves public safety and benefits local taxpayers, as less crime leads to safer communities, strengthens families, and saves taxpayers money on costs associated with law enforcement and incarceration.
- D. The Legislature determines that those who have been incarcerated have paid their debt to society and should be afforded a fair opportunity to reenter the workplace. Individuals with a criminal history should not be discriminated against once they are released from prison and should be evaluated for employment based upon their qualifications to perform a job, rather than their criminal history.
- E. The Legislature determines that individuals with a criminal history represent a workforce with skills to contribute and a desire to add value to their communities.
- F. The Legislature determines that the main goal of a criminal justice system should be rehabilitation and that once individuals reenter society, they should be treated fairly and without discrimination based on a prior conviction.
- G. The Legislature finds that employment discrimination based on criminal history can affect anyone regardless of race, religion, national origin, gender, or sexual orientation. However, African Americans are disproportionately hurt by discrimination based on criminal history due to a long history of policies that have led to African Americans being incarcerated at rates more than five times that of Whites, and more than two and a half times that of Hispanics.
- H. The Legislature determines that due to a criminal justice system in which minorities are

- incarcerated at much higher rates than Whites, African Americans and Hispanics bear the brunt of employment discrimination based on criminal history.
- I. The Legislature finds that nine municipalities and three counties in the state of New York have implemented policies to protect job applicants against potential discrimination, including New York City, Buffalo, and Rochester.
- J. The Legislature further finds that over twenty states and more than one hundred municipalities and counties throughout the United States across all political lines have implemented policies to protect job applicants from potential discrimination.
- K. The Legislature further finds that New York Correction Law does not prohibit employers from inquiring about criminal history on employment applications. Because the vast majority of applications are discarded during an initial review for a variety of reasons, it makes it extremely difficult for an applicant to prove that he or she was not hired due to his or her criminal history. In addition, many applicants simply will not apply for a position if they are required to disclose their criminal history on an employment application.
- L. Therefore, the purpose of this local law is to ensure that everyone receives a fair chance in seeking employment with Monroe County, regardless of one's arrest record or criminal history.

**Section 3. Purpose.** The purpose of this section is to ensure that applicants for positions with Monroe County are not unfairly discriminated against because of prior criminal history during the application process.

### **Section 4. Definitions.** As used in this section:

"Adverse Action" means to refuse to hire or promote, to discharge an individual from his or her employment, or revoke an applicant's conditional offer of employment.

"Applicant" means any person considered or who requests to be considered for employment by the County.

"Application Process" means the period of time beginning when an applicant inquires about employment with the County or submits an employment application to the County, and ends when the applicant is provided a conditional offer of employment or the County chooses not to offer the applicant a conditional offer of employment.

"Arrest" means a record or action by any jurisdiction that does not result in a conviction, or any encounter with a law enforcement agency that does not result in a conviction. This includes information indicating that a person has been questioned, apprehended, taken into custody or detained, or held for an investigation by a law enforcement, police, or prosecutorial agency.

"Conviction" means any sentence arising from a plea or verdict of guilty, including a sentence of incarceration, a suspended sentence, a sentence of probation, an unconditional discharge, or a diversion program.

"County" means the County of Monroe, its departments, administrative units, public officers, and employees.

"Criminal History" means an individual's prior criminal conviction and/or sentencing in New York State or any other jurisdiction.

### Section 5. Prohibition Against Unfair Discrimination. The County shall not:

- A. Inquire about an applicant's criminal history during the application process.
- B. Inquire about an applicant's arrest record at any point in the application process or during any inquiry relating to criminal history; however the County shall not be prohibited from inquiring about pending criminal charges.
- C. Conduct a criminal history check of an applicant until after a conditional offer of employment is made, unless otherwise required because of the nature of the position or by law.

### Section 6. Regulations Relating to Background Checks.

- A. All County job announcements shall contain the following disclosure: "This position is subject to a background check for criminal convictions. Convictions will be considered but will not automatically disqualify the candidate. No criminal background check will occur until after a conditional offer of employment has been made, unless required prior to a conditional offer because of the nature of the position or otherwise required by law."
- B. The County shall not use the following criminal records in relation to a criminal background check: records of arrest not followed by a valid conviction, or records which reflect dismissed or expunged convictions, violations, and infractions; however the County shall not be prohibited from considering pending criminal charges.

# Section 7. Guidelines for Consideration of Criminal History and Revocation of Offer of Employment.

- A. Unless a background check is required before a conditional offer of employment because of the nature of the position or otherwise required by law, the County shall send the applicant the following documents prior to conducting a background check or inquiring about an applicant's criminal history: (1) a conditional offer of employment, and (2) notice that a criminal history check will be conducted prior to the start of employment.
- B. The County shall not take adverse action against an individual due to the individual's criminal history unless such action is in conformance with Article 23-A of New York Correction Law, New York Human Rights Law, and the New York Family Court Act.
- C. Nothing in this local law shall be construed to prevent the County from taking adverse action against any applicant or denying employment for reasons other than such applicant's criminal history.

### Section 8. Exceptions.

- A. The prohibitions in this local law shall not apply to the Monroe County Sheriff's Office, the Monroe County Department of Public Safety, the Monroe County Department of Aviation, the Monroe County District Attorney's Office, the Monroe County Children's Detention Center, and positions for which it is otherwise required by law to access criminal history information before a conditional offer is made.
- B. The prohibitions of this local law shall not apply if the inquiries or adverse actions prohibited herein are specifically authorized by any other applicable law. Additionally, nothing in this local law shall diminish the County's rights or responsibilities under Article 23-A of New York Correction Law.

### Section 9. Enforcement.

- A. The Monroe County Department of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion is authorized to enforce this local law, to promulgate additional rules and regulations, and take any and all other reasonable actions necessary to implement and enforce this local law. Any rules and regulations set forth in this local law and/or promulgated by the Monroe County Department of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion shall be made available online in a manner approved by the Department of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion.
- B. The Monroe County Department of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion shall be responsible for conducting proper outreach about this local law.

Section 10. Reverse Preemption. This local law shall be null and void on the day that federal or statewide legislation goes into effect incorporating either the same or substantially similar provisions as are contained in this law, or in the event that a pertinent state or federal administrative agency issues and promulgates regulations preempting such action by the County of Monroe. The County Legislature may determine via resolution whether or not identical or substantially similar federal or statewide legislation, or pertinent preempting state or federal regulations have been enacted for the purposes of triggering the provisions of this section.

Section 11. Severability. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, subdivision, or other part of this local law or its application shall be inconsistent with any federal or state statute, law, regulation or rule then the federal or state statute, law, regulation, or rule shall prevail. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, subdivision, or other part of this local law or its application shall be adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of this local law which shall remain in full force and effect except as limited by such order or judgment.

**Section 12. Effective Date and Applicability.** This local law shall be effective immediately upon filing in the Office of the Secretary of State.

# ENACT A LOCAL LAW ENTITLED "MONROE COUNTY FAIR CHANCE EMPLOYMENT ACT"

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. Title. This local law shall be known as the "Monroe County Fair Chance Employment Act."

### Section 2. Legislative Intent.

- A. The Legislature finds that those with a criminal history regularly face discrimination in many areas of life, including employment.
- B. The Legislature further finds that studies indicate that stable employment is one of the best predictors of post-conviction success.
- C. The Legislature further finds that the ability of individuals with a criminal history to successfully reintegrate into their communities and find employment improves public safety and benefits local taxpayers, as less crime leads to safer communities, strengthens families, and saves taxpayers money on costs associated with law enforcement and incarceration.
- D. The Legislature determines that those who have been incarcerated have paid their debt to society and should be afforded a fair opportunity to reenter the workplace. Individuals with a criminal history should not be discriminated against once they are released from prison and should be evaluated for employment based upon their qualifications to perform a job, rather than their criminal history.
- E. The Legislature determines that individuals with a criminal history represent a workforce with skills to contribute and a desire to add value to their communities.
- F. The Legislature determines that the main goal of a criminal justice system should be rehabilitation and that once individuals reenter society, they should be treated fairly and without discrimination based on a prior conviction.
- G. The Legislature finds that employment discrimination based on criminal history can affect anyone regardless of race, religion, national origin, gender, or sexual orientation. However, African Americans are disproportionately hurt by discrimination based on criminal history due to a long history of policies that have led to African Americans being incarcerated at rates more than five times that of Whites, and more than two and a half times that of Hispanics.
- H. The Legislature determines that due to a criminal justice system in which minorities are incarcerated at much higher rates than Whites, African Americans and Hispanics bear the brunt of employment discrimination based on criminal history.
- The Legislature finds that nine municipalities and three counties in the state of New York have implemented policies to protect job applicants against potential discrimination, including New York City, Buffalo, and Rochester.

- J. The Legislature further finds that over twenty states and more than one hundred municipalities and counties throughout the United States across all political lines have implemented policies to protect job applicants from potential discrimination.
- K. The Legislature further finds that New York Correction Law does not prohibit employers from inquiring about criminal history on employment applications. Because the vast majority of applications are discarded during an initial review for a variety of reasons, it makes it extremely difficult for an applicant to prove that he or she was not hired due to his or her criminal history. In addition, many applicants simply will not apply for a position if they are required to disclose their criminal history on an employment application.
- L. Therefore, the purpose of this local law is to ensure that everyone receives a fair chance in seeking employment with Monroe County, regardless of one's arrest record or criminal history.

**Section 3. Purpose.** The purpose of this section is to ensure that applicants for positions with Monroe County are not unfairly discriminated against because of prior criminal history during the application process.

#### **Section 4. Definitions.** As used in this section:

"Adverse Action" means to refuse to hire or promote, to discharge an individual from his or her employment, or revoke an applicant's conditional offer of employment.

"Applicant" means any person considered or who requests to be considered for employment by the County.

"Application Process" means the period of time beginning when an applicant inquires about employment with the County or submits an employment application to the County, and ends when the applicant is provided a conditional offer of employment or the County chooses not to offer the applicant a conditional offer of employment.

"Arrest" means a record or action by any jurisdiction that does not result in a conviction, or any encounter with a law enforcement agency that does not result in a conviction. This includes information indicating that a person has been questioned, apprehended, taken into custody or detained, or held for an investigation by a law enforcement, police, or prosecutorial agency.

"Conviction" means any sentence arising from a plea or verdict of guilty, including a sentence of incarceration, a suspended sentence, a sentence of probation, an unconditional discharge, or a diversion program.

"County" means the County of Monroe, its departments, administrative units, public officers, and employees.

"Criminal History" means an individual's prior criminal conviction and/or sentencing in New York State or any other jurisdiction.

### Section 5. Prohibition Against Unfair Discrimination. The County shall not:

- A. Inquire about an applicant's criminal history during the application process.
- B. Inquire about an applicant's arrest record at any point in the application process or during any inquiry relating to criminal history; however the County shall not be prohibited from inquiring about pending criminal charges.
- C. Conduct a criminal history check of an applicant until after a conditional offer of employment is

made, unless otherwise required because of the nature of the position or by law.

### Section 6. Regulations Relating to Background Checks.

- A. All County job announcements shall contain the following disclosure: "This position is subject to a background check for criminal convictions. Convictions will be considered but will not automatically disqualify the candidate. No criminal background check will occur until after a conditional offer of employment has been made, unless required prior to a conditional offer because of the nature of the position or otherwise required by law."
- B. The County shall not use the following criminal records in relation to a criminal background check: records of arrest not followed by a valid conviction, or records which reflect dismissed or expunged convictions, violations, and infractions; however the County shall not be prohibited from considering pending criminal charges.

### Section 7. Guidelines for Consideration of Criminal History and Revocation of Offer of Employment.

- A. Unless a background check is required before a conditional offer of employment because of the nature of the position or otherwise required by law, the County shall send the applicant the following documents prior to conducting a background check or inquiring about an applicant's criminal history:

  (1) a conditional offer of employment, and (2) notice that a criminal history check will be conducted prior to the start of employment.
- B. The County shall not take adverse action against an individual due to the individual's criminal history unless such action is in conformance with Article 23-A of New York Correction Law, New York Human Rights Law, and the New York Family Court Act.
- C. Nothing in this local law shall be construed to prevent the County from taking adverse action against any applicant or denying employment for reasons other than such applicant's criminal history.

### Section 8. Exceptions.

- A. The prohibitions in this local law shall not apply to the Monroe County Sheriff's Office, the Monroe County Department of Public Safety, the Monroe County Department of Aviation, the Monroe County District Attorney's Office, the Monroe County Children's Detention Center, and positions for which it is otherwise required by law to access criminal history information before a conditional offer is made.
- B. The prohibitions of this local law shall not apply if the inquiries or adverse actions prohibited herein are specifically authorized by any other applicable law. Additionally, nothing in this local law shall diminish the County's rights or responsibilities under Article 23-A of New York Correction Law.

### Section 9. Enforcement.

- A. The Monroe County Department of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion is authorized to enforce this local law, to promulgate additional rules and regulations, and take any and all other reasonable actions necessary to implement and enforce this local law. Any rules and regulations set forth in this local law and/or promulgated by the Monroe County Department of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion shall be made available online in a manner approved by the Department of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion.
- B. The Monroe County Department of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion shall be responsible for

conducting proper outreach about this local law.

Section 10. Reverse Preemption. This local law shall be null and void on the day that federal or statewide legislation goes into effect incorporating either the same or substantially similar provisions as are contained in this law, or in the event that a pertinent state or federal administrative agency issues and promulgates regulations preempting such action by the County of Monroe. The County Legislature may determine via resolution whether or not identical or substantially similar federal or statewide legislation, or pertinent preempting state or federal regulations have been enacted for the purposes of triggering the provisions of this section.

Section 11. Severability. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, subdivision, or other part of this local law or its application shall be inconsistent with any federal or state statute, law, regulation or rule then the federal or state statute, law, regulation, or rule shall prevail. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, subdivision, or other part of this local law or its application shall be adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of this local law which shall remain in full force and effect except as limited by such order or judgment.

Section 12. Effective Date and Applicability. This local law shall be effective immediately upon filing in the Office of the Secretary of State.

### Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body approve the operating budget of Monroe Community College for the fiscal year September 1, 2023 through August 31, 2024 as submitted by the College.

The proposed 2023 - 2024 Monroe Community College budget has been reviewed by me, as well as the staff of the County's Office of Management and Budget. I concur with the request of the College.

The following resolution was adopted by the Monroe Community College Board of Trustees at their meeting on June 12, 2023:

RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Monroe Community College approves the Operating Budget for the fiscal year, September 1, 2023 through August 31, 2024 in the amount of \$111,500,000.

Approval of this budget will provide funding for 7,000 state-aidable full-time equivalent students during the College fiscal year. Adoption by Your Honorable Body is required before the State University of New York can approve its share of the College budget.

### The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Schedule and hold a public hearing.
- 2. Approve the total Monroe Community College operating budget in the amount of \$111,500,000 and a sponsor contribution by the County of Monroe in the amount of \$20,780,000.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(27) ("conducting concurrent environmental, engineering, economic, feasibility and other studies and preliminary planning and budgetary processes necessary to the formulation of a proposal for action, provided those activities do not commit the agency to commence, engage in or approve such action") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

The approval of this budget will require an appropriation of \$20,780,000 in the County of Monroe budget year 2024 as the County sponsor contribution.

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






Monroe Community College 2023-2024 Operating Budget



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



## Gross Budgeted Expenditures per FTE Student





## **Total Expenditures per FTE**






### Aidable FTE Enrollment

The graph demonstrates the trend in enrollment at Monroe Community College since 2014-2015. Full-time equivalent (FTE) student is the basic measure of workload used by SUNY and the basis for determining the amount of state aid the college will receive.
FTE enrollment is calculated by dividing all credit and credit equivalent units in specified aidable non-credit courses taken by students by 30.
Total aidable enrollment is budgeted at 7,000 FTEs which is 200 FTEs or 2.9% less than the 2022-2023 budget of 7,200.
Aidable enrollment at the Brighton Campus is budgeted at 6,508 FTEs which is 68 FTEs or 1.0% less than the 2022-2023 budget of 6,576.
The Brighton Campus includes enrollment related to the Public Safety Training Facility and the Applied Technologies Center of 440 and 192 FTEs, respectively.
Downtown Campus enrollment is budgeted at 492 FTEs. This reflects a decrease of 132 FTEs or 21.2% below the 2022-2023 budgeted enrollment of 624 FTEs.





#### Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body approve the operating budget of Monroe Community College for the fiscal year September 1, 2023 through August 31, 2024 as submitted by the College.

The proposed 2023 - 2024 Monroe Community College budget has been reviewed by me, as well as the staff of the County's Office of Management and Budget. I concur with the request of the College.

The following resolution was adopted by the Monroe Community College Board of Trustees at their meeting on June 12, 2023:

RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Monroe Community College approves the Operating Budget for the fiscal year, September 1, 2023 through August 31, 2024 in the amount of \$111,500,000.

Approval of this budget will provide funding for 7,000 state-aidable full-time equivalent students during the College fiscal year. Adoption by Your Honorable Body is required before the State University of New York can approve its share of the College budget.

#### The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Schedule and hold a public hearing.
- 2. Approve the total Monroe Community College operating budget in the amount of \$111,500,000 and a sponsor contribution by the County of Monroe in the amount of \$20,780,000.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(27) ("conducting concurrent environmental, engineering, economic, feasibility and other studies and preliminary planning and budgetary processes necessary to the formulation of a proposal for action, provided those activities do not commit the agency to commence, engage in or approve such action") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

The approval of this budget will require an appropriation of \$20,780,000 in the County of Monroe budget year 2024 as the County sponsor contribution.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.







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





The budgeted cost per FTE of \$15,929 is \$958 or 5.7% below the computed SUNY average of \$16,886 for the 2023-24 year. 



## **Total Expenditures per FTE**






## Aidable FTE Enrollment

The graph demonstrates the trend in enrollment at Monroe Community College since 2014-2015. Full-time equivalent (FTE) student is the basic measure of workload used by SUNY and the basis for determining the amount of state aid the college will receive.
FTE enrollment is calculated by dividing all credit and credit equivalent units in specified aidable non-credit courses taken by students by 30.
Total aidable enrollment is budgeted at 7,000 FTEs which is 200 FTEs or 2.9% less than the 2022-2023 budget of 7,200.
Aidable enrollment at the Brighton Campus is budgeted at 6,508 FTEs which is 68 FTEs or 1.0% less than the 2022-2023 budget of 6,576.
The Brighton Campus includes enrollment related to the Public Safety Training Facility and the Applied Technologies Center of 440 and 192 FTEs, respectively.
Downtown Campus enrollment is budgeted at 492 FTEs. This reflects a decrease of 132 FTEs or 21.2% below the 2022-2023 budgeted enrollment of 624 FTEs.





Honorable Legislators:

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Sheriff Todd K. Baxter.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize an intermunicipal agreement with Monroe #1 Board of Cooperative Educational Services ("BOCES #1") in the amount of \$110,000 for reimbursement to the Monroe County Sheriff's Office School Resource Program for the period of September 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024, with the option to renew for two (2) additional one-year terms in an amount agreed upon by the parties but in no event less than \$110,000.

BOCES #1 will be provided a full-time Monroe County Sheriff's School Resource Officer ("SRO") during the ten (10) month, 186 day period. The SRO's primary duty is to maintain an atmosphere where students, teachers and staff feel safe. The SRO may assist in the investigation of suspected criminal activity occurring on BOCES #1 property and/or related to BOCES #1. This assistance shall be provided in consultation with school administrators, in accordance with New York State Law and BOCES #1 policy. As an educator, working with classroom teachers and other BOCES #1 personnel, the SRO may present information and answer questions on a variety of topics, such as the law, drugs, safety, crime prevention, violence prevention, concepts of safety, traffic laws, general law, and crime prevention techniques. The goal of the presentations is to increase student, staff, and community awareness and understanding of laws and personal safety. The SRO shall also perform such other security and/or law enforcement services as may be reasonably assigned by the District Superintendent, in consultation with the Sheriff, as appropriate.

This will be the tenth year the Sheriff's Office has participated in the SRO Program at BOCES #1. BOCES #1 will fund the salary and fringes associated with the Sheriff's Office SRO assigned during the ten (10) month, 186 day period.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute an intermunicipal agreement, and any amendments thereto, with Monroe #1 Board of Cooperative Educational Services, 41 O'Connor Road, Fairport, New York 14450, in the amount of \$110,000 for reimbursement to the Monroe County Sheriff's School Resource Program for the period of September 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024, with the option to renew for two (2) additional one-year terms in an amount to be agreed upon by the parties but in no event less than \$110,000.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

This contract is revenue generating and no net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.

for the Monroe County Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program

## Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a contract with Cornell University in an amount not to exceed \$25,000 to provide renovation, repair, and painting training for the Monroe County Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program for the period of October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024, with the option to renew for two (2) additional one-year terms in an amount not to exceed \$25,000 annually.

By Resolution 118 of 2022, Your Honorable Body authorized the acceptance of a grant from the New York State Department of Health for the Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program. This contract will support the County's Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program. Cornell University will provide Environmental Protection Agency-certified renovation, repair, and painting training for contractors and property owners who engage in maintenance of their own properties or who are interested in learning how to maintain a lead safe home.

A request for proposals was issued and Cornell University was selected as the most qualified vendor to provide these services.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract, and any amendments thereto, with Cornell University, 373 Pine Tree Road, Ithaca, New York 14850, to provide renovation, repair, and painting training for the Monroe County Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program in an amount not to exceed \$25,000 for the period of October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024, with the option to renew for two (2) additional one-year terms in an amount not to exceed \$25,000 annually.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for this contract is included in the 2023 operating budget of the Department of Public Health, general fund 9300, funds center 5806110000, Lead Programs, and will be requested in future years' budgets. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Cornell University is a not-for-profit entity, and the records in the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that it does not owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body approve the Collective Bargaining Agreement among the Monroe County Executive, Monroe County Sheriff's Office, and the Monroe County Law Enforcement Association for the period of January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2026.

The principal terms of this agreement are outlined below:

1. Wage increases, generally, set forth as follows:

2024 - 3,25% schedule increase

2025 - 2.25% schedule increase

2026 - 2.25% schedule increase

- 2. 5-year longevity pay schedule to be increased by 1%. 10-year, 15-year, and 20-year longevity pay schedules to be increased by 1.5%.
- 3. Education incentive payment of 2% for unit members who attain a college degree.
- 4. Upgrade pay group 42 (rank of Sergeant) by 4%.
- 5. Roll call pay to be increased to \$110 per pay period for deputies and \$150 per pay period for sergeants.
- 6. Juneteenth has been formally added to the contract listing of paid holidays.
- 7. Annual payment of \$350 to all bargaining unit members for maintenance of clothing and equipment.

The estimated costs of this referral are:

2024 - \$ 391,517

2025 - \$ 158,663

2026 - \$ 162,233

The specific legislative action required is to approve the agreement among the Monroe County Executive, Monroe County Sheriff's Office, and the Monroe County Law Enforcement Association for the period of January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2026.

This action is a type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR & 617.5(c)(28) ("collective bargaining activities") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

#### Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body determine whether a Pilot Program for the Collection of Food Scraps may have a significant adverse impact on the environment pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA").

Monroe County will be commencing three (3) pilot food scraps collections at the Monroe County Jail, the Monroe Community Hospital, and in partnership with the Town of Pittsford at the Town of Pittsford Dog Park, 34 East Street, Town of Pittsford, New York. This pilot project will collect preconsumer food scraps generated in the kitchens of the Monroe County Jail and the Monroe Community Hospital. Monroe County will partner with the Town of Pittsford to provide food collection lidded buckets to 500 pilot program participants and staff a communal drop off location at the Town of Pittsford Dog Park, and if necessary, an additional location within the Town of Pittsford. The second location, if needed, is anticipated to be owned by the Town and will need to have a parking area of at least 18,000 square feet; provide at least 60 parking spots; offer room for off-street queuing for at least five vehicles; and provide sufficient space for securing the carts.

The Monroe County Food Scraps Pilot Program has been preliminary classified as an Unlisted action. The SEQRA regulations found at 6 NYCRR Part 617 requires that no agency shall carry out or approve an Action until it has complied with the requirements of SEQRA.

#### The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Determine whether a Food Scraps Collection Pilot Program is an Unlisted action.
- 2. Designate Monroe County as Lead Agency for a Food Scraps Collection Pilot Program.
- 3. Make a determination of significance regarding a Food Scraps Collection Pilot Program pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.7.

The sites, Monroe Community Hospital, the Monroe County Jail, and the Pittsford Dog Park are solely serving as drop off and collection points in closed containers. No form or organic recycling such as composting will take place on site. The selected hauler will provide 64 gallon totes (similar to residential garbage and recycling totes) at a location suitable for the site and hauler.

The Pittsford Dog Park may see a slight increase in traffic. However, that increase represents less than 2% of the Town's population. Of which, some are anticipated to already be current dog park users and will consolidate trips to visit the dog park and food scraps drop off site, thereby not adding any new traffic on site.

Additionally, to mitigate any peak traffic issues to the Park or surrounding areas, the location of the carts will be coordinated with the Town's Parks' Officers to minimize disturbances to the park operations and existing circulation patterns. It is also anticipated that carts will be accessible for disposal throughout the week enabling participants to drop off their food scraps at a time of their choosing. This will reduce concerns related to peak traffic as trips can be spread out. Accordingly, traffic impacts are expected to be small.

To ameliorate any disturbances to the Park or surrounding area occur from debris, smell, etc. Town Park staff will monitor the totes and notify necessary parties of any potential nuisance issues. Lastly, the Town and Monroe County will support an education and outreach program to inform participants on how to properly participate in the food scraps collection program and reduce the potential for issues that may impact sites or the surrounding area.

In the event the County and the Town identify a second location for collection, the second location will be required to have a parking area of at least 18,000 square feet; provide at least 60 parking spots; offer room for off-street queuing for at least five vehicles; and provide sufficient space for securing the carts. By meeting these requirements, the second location is not anticipated to have any impacts above the small impacts identified for the first location.

## Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize an intermunicipal agreement with the Town of Pittsford ("Town") for the collection of residential food scraps as part of the Monroe County Food Scraps Collection Pilot Program.

The Town and the County desire to collaborate on the development of a pilot program for the collection of residential food scraps for diversion from landfilling as part of the County's Local Solid Waste Management Plan and Climate Action Plan. The Pilot Project will involve providing countertop food scraps collection bins to 500 residents, and staging at least one public food scraps drop-off location. The Town's Dog Park on East Street was selected as the initial public drop-off locations based on the potential to share staff, convenience for residents, and to minimize potential nuisances. A second location, if needed, is anticipated to be owned by the Town and meet the needs of the Pilot Program. While all residents of the Town will be eligible for the program, participation will be on a first come, first serve basis for the first 500 enrollees.

A contracted vendor will pick up the food scraps collected and transport them to a permitted anaerobic digester. The contracted vendor will provide the County with monthly reports and a final report of food scraps weights, contamination and feedback about the pickup location. The proposed Residential Food Scraps Pilot Program is expected to run for a total duration of 12 months beginning in late September 2023.

The Raise the Age legislation was enacted with a number of objectives. It aims to reduce crime victimization; provide meaningful opportunity for a life without the stigma of a criminal record for adolescents who turn away from crime; eliminate the disproportionate incarceration of 16- and 17-year-olds of color in adult jails and prisons; reserve the juvenile placement system for only those young people who present a risk to public safety; and create therapeutic out-of-home placement settings for youth who do not present a risk to public safety.

In order to achieve these objectives, the Monroe County Office of Probation – Community Corrections has developed a Comprehensive Plan that utilizes a combination of increased staff resources, specialized training, and expanded community programs and services.

Implementation of the Comprehensive Plan will reduce the reliance on out-of-home placement, reduce the reliance on detention, reduce the need for family court adjudication, increase the adjustment rate of diversion cases, reduce the rate of probation violations, reduce the rate of long-term recidivism, and arrange for community-based services to improve outcomes for youth.

#### Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize the acceptance of a gift from Wegmans Food Markets, Inc. in the amount of \$50,000 to be used towards the cost of the new spray park at Ontario Beach Park; amend the 2023 Capital Budget for the Monroe County Parks System-Wide Facilities Renovations project in the amount of \$50,000; and authorize an interfund transfer in the amount of \$50,000.

In 2022, this Honorable Body approved additional capital funding in the amount of \$9.4 million for significant investments in system-wide improvements to the amenities offered in the Monroe County Parks System, building on an original \$7.2 million commitment in 2021. One of the projects funded in the 2022 phase was a spray park at Ontario Beach Park, as an alternative for visitors on the days when water quality or visibility issues close the lake swimming beach, as well as for those who cannot or are uncomfortable with swimming in an open body of water.

This \$50,000 gift from Wegmans will ensure that the spray park fully meets the expectations of the community for a full-featured, enjoyable and accessible attraction at Ontario Beach Park.

#### The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a gift from Wegmans Food Markets, Inc. in the amount of \$50,000 to be used towards the cost of the new spray park at Ontario Beach Park.
- 2. Amend the 2023 operating budget of the Department of Parks by appropriating \$50,000 into general fund 9001, funds center 8802060000 Ontario Beach Park.

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- 3. Amend the 2023 Capital Budget to increase funding for the Monroe County Parks System-Wide Facilities Renovations project in the amount of \$50,000.
- 4. Authorize an interfund transfer in the amount of \$50,000 from the Department of Parks, general fund 9001, funds center 8802060000 Ontario Beach Park to capital fund 2010 Monroe County Parks System-Wide Facilities Renovations.

New York State's Statewide Health Care Facility Transformation Program III grant awards are intended to create financially sustainable systems of care or preserve or expand essential health care services. At Monroe Community Hospital ("MCH"), these funds will allow for the expansion of the current wound care program and will allow MCH to increase its wound-care services with quality products and specialized equipment. The \$175,000 operating grant will allow MCH to implement an integrated wound care photography and documentation module within our electronic medical record system and will provide the opportunity to enhance the capabilities of the nursing staff through an advanced certification program in wound care.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$460,500 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, NEW YORK, TO FINANCE THE COST OF WOUND CARE EQUIPMENT AT MONROE COMMUNITY HOSPITAL, IN AND FOR SAID COUNTY, AT AN ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST OF \$460,500

BOND RESOLUTION DATED AUGUST 8, 2023

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE AFFIRMATIVE VOTE OF **NOT LESS THAN TWO-THIRDS OF THE TOTAL VOTING STRENGTH** OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. For the object or purpose of financing the cost of Wound Care Equipment at Monroe Community Hospital in and for the County of Monroe, New York (the "County"), there are hereby authorized to be issued \$460,500 bonds of the County, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The duly adopted current Capital Budget of the County, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is hereby amended to provide for the appropriation of the amount hereby authorized to pay the cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose. The period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is five (5) years, pursuant to subdivision 32 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost thereof is \$460,500, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$460,500 bonds of said County herein authorized; provided, however, that to the extent any state and/or federal aid and/or grant and/or gift is received for the aforesaid purpose, the County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to accept and shall use such funds to redeem any outstanding indebtedness incurred for such purpose or apply it, dollar for dollar, to reduce the amount of bonds to be issued for such purpose.

Section 3. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, the chief fiscal officer of the County under the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may sell such bonds or notes at public or private sale, at a discount or premium, at fixed or variable rates of interest or at no interest whatsoever, or as capital appreciation bonds, and with such amortization of principal as the Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer shall determine is most favorable to the County, and in compliance with any rules of the State Comptroller applicable thereto. Such bonds or notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may, in the event it is determined to issue variable rate bonds or notes, enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance,

sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds or notes, as authorized under Section 54.90 of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer is also authorized to enter into such agreements and take such other action as may be necessary or appropriate and lawful to assure that, to the extent possible, (i) interest on the bonds and notes authorized hereby will not be includable in the gross income, for federal income tax purposes, of the recipients thereof, and (ii) to enable the purchaser thereof to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12. The Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer is hereby further delegated all powers of this County Legislature with respect to agreements for credit enhancement, derived from and pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, for such bonds or notes, including, but not limited to the determination of the provider of such credit enhancement facility or facilities and the terms and contents of any agreement or agreements related thereto.

Section 5. All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds or notes, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds or notes, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds or notes, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds or notes, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds or notes (and if said bonds or notes are to be executed in the name of the County by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the County), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds or notes, or may contract on behalf of the County for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds or notes shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals, in addition to those required by Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes, as authorized by this resolution, may be contested only if:

- such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and
  - an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or
- 3) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the objects or purposes described herein.

This resolution shall take effect in accordance with Section C2-7 of the Monroe County Charter and the Clerk of the Legislature is hereby authorized and directed to publish this resolution or a summary hereof to be published, together with a notice attached in substantially the form and in the manner prescribed by Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

We recommend that Your Honorable Body establish a fund balance policy to safeguard against changes in local economic conditions and/or state policy that may result in revenue shortfalls, and the negative impact of emergencies, disasters, or other catastrophic one-time expenditures.

Since adopting the 2017 operating budget, Your Honorable Body has been annually reaffirming an informal fund balance policy – a financial strategy – that establishes a lower and upper dollar threshold of the combined assigned and unassigned fund balance categories within the general fund. The dollar value of those thresholds have been subsequently modified several times, and while the current financial strategy includes recommended uses for fund balances in excess of the upper threshold, it does not include any recommendations for action should fund balances fall below the lower threshold.

Budget sequestration at the state and federal levels within the past decade and two recent intercepts of local sales tax for state purposes highlighted the importance of financial planning, but the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic cemented the need for local governments to not only plan for, but actually build, financial resiliency.

Maintaining an adequate fund balance can do more than provide financial resiliency, it can provide residents with longer-term property tax stability. Lacking an adequate fund balance, emergencies, disasters, and changes in economic conditions otherwise force local governments into choosing between dramatic tax increases or dramatic reductions in services. An adequate fund balance also provides the County borrowing stability within the investing community. The level of fund balance and the ability to maintain that balance has become a significant factor in determining the County's credit rating, which in turn factors into the County's ability to access financial markets, the demand for County bonds, and ultimately the amount of interest expense the County incurs.

The fund balance policy detailed in Attachment A formalizes the financial strategy for fund balance described in the annual budget book. It replaces the lower and upper dollar thresholds with a corresponding ten percent (10%) of the all-funds adopted budget, provides guidance for using excess balances, and recommends actions to remediate shortfalls in balances.

### **Background**

In accordance with Government Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement 54, governmental fund balances will be classified into the specifically defined categories of non-spendable, restricted, committed, assigned, and unassigned. The last two categories – assigned and unassigned – are generally regarded as comprising "available" fund balance.

Non-spendable fund balance consists of amounts that are not in a spendable form (such as inventory and prepaid expenses) or are legally or contractually required to be maintained intact.

Restricted fund balance consists of amounts that are constrained to a specific purpose by debt covenants, by state or federal statute, or by other enabling legislation.

Committed fund balance consists of amounts constrained to a specific purpose by the County Legislature through adopted resolution. Amounts cannot be used for any other purpose unless the County Legislature takes the same action to remove or change the original constraint.

Assigned fund balance consists of amounts to be used for a specific intent, as identified by the Director of Finance-Chief Financial Officer, to whom the assignment of fund balance has been delegated.

Unassigned fund balance is the least restrictive of all categories of fund balance and consists of amounts that are not reportable in any other category.

When fund balances of more than one category are available for a specific purpose, it is the County's practice to use the most restrictive fund balance first, in the following order: restricted, committed, assigned, and unassigned as they are needed.

### Policy Statement

Monroe County will maintain an available general fund balance (the combined assigned and unassigned fund balance categories) to be within ten million dollars (\$10 million), plus or minus, of ten percent (10%) of the all-funds expenditures in the currently adopted operating budget.

The Director of Finance-Chief Financial Officer shall calculate annually, at the time audited financial statements are filed with the Clerk of the Legislature, compliance with this policy.

Available fund balance in excess of the maximum requirement may be used in subsequent budgets to provide property tax stability, capital project funding, and/or debt reduction, or for any other lawful purpose approved by the County Legislature.

In the event available fund balance falls below the minimum requirement, the Director of Finance-Chief Financial Officer shall prepare a plan to restore the available fund balance to the minimum requirement in the next budget year or other appropriate period of time.

### Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a contract with Benefit Resource, LLC ("BRI") for Third-Party Administration of Monroe County's Flexible Spending Account Benefit, Qualified Pre-Tax Parking Program and Health Reimbursement Accounts, for a three (3) year and four (4) month term from September 1, 2023 through December 31, 2026 in an annual amount not to exceed \$135,000 beginning with the 2024 calendar year, and each year thereafter subject to appropriation, with the option to renew for two (2) additional one-year terms in an amount not to exceed \$135,000 per year.

This referral is being submitted as a Matter of Urgency pursuant to Section 545-24(A)(3) of the Monroe County Code given that BRI and Monroe County need to begin pre-contract on-boarding as soon as possible. Prior to January 1, 2024, Human Resources staff will work with BRI to begin on-boarding existing employee and retirees accounts. Although there is no cost to the County for the on-boarding process, a fully executed contract is needed to secure BRI's confidentiality and to protect our employees' and retirees' personal information.

Beginning January 1, 2024, BRI will receive, review, approve, and process claims, and disburse claim payments to employees participating in the County's voluntary Flexible Spending Account plans, including Medical/Dental Flexible Spending, Dependent Care Accounts, and Pre-Tax Parking accounts. Additionally, BRI will review, approve, and process claims for the Retiree Health Reimbursement Account plan for Medicare County retirees.

A request for proposals was issued for this contract with BRI selected as the most qualified to provide this service.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract, and any amendments thereto, with Benefit Resource, LLC for Third-Party Administration of Monroe County's Flexible Spending Account Benefit, Qualified Pre-Tax Parking Program and Health Reimbursement Accounts, for a three (3) year and four (4) month term from September 1, 2023 through December 31, 2026 in an annual amount not to exceed \$135,000 beginning with the 2024 calendar year, and each year thereafter subject to appropriation, with the option to renew for two (2) additional one-year terms in an amount not to exceed \$135,000 per year.

This is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for the first year of this contract will be requested in the 2024 operating budget of the Department of Human Resources, general fund 9001, funds center 1703010000 Employment Support Services, and will be requested in future years' budgets. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County Budget.

The records of the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that neither Benefit Resource LLC, nor Jason Hall, Chief Executive Officer, nor Rachel Kielon, Chief Financial Officer, owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes.

Subject: Amending Resolution 265 of 1965 to Extend the Expiration Date of the Additional 1% Sales

Tax Rate and to Provide for its Distribution

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 265 of 1965, as amended, for extending the expiration date of the additional 1% County sales tax rate from November 30, 2023 to November 30, 2025.

Through Resolutions 156 and 157 of 2023, Your Honorable Body requested the New York State Legislature to enact Senate Bill No. S.6149-A and Assembly Bill No. A.6142-A to authorize Monroe County to extend the expiration date of the additional 1% County sales tax rate from November 30, 2023 to November 30, 2025. Governor Kathy C. Hochul signed Senate Bill No. S.6149-A and Assembly Bill No. A.6142-A into law. This resolution is the next step in the process to effectuate this extension.

The specific legislative action required is to amend Resolution 265 of 1965, as amended, to extend the expiration date of the additional 1% County sales tax rate from November 30, 2023 to November 30, 2025, and to provide for its distribution.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

This action will have no impact on the revenues or expenditures of the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that this matter receive favorable action by Your Honorable Body.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. The first sentence of Section 2 of Resolution No. 265, as enacted in nineteen hundred sixty-five, as amended, is amended to read as follows:

SECTION 2. Imposition of sales tax.

On and after August 1, 1965, there is hereby imposed and there shall be paid a tax of 3 percent upon, and for the period commencing December 1, 1993, and ending November 30, [2023] 2025 there is hereby imposed and there shall be paid an additional tax of one percent upon:

Nothing herein shall be deemed to exempt from tax at the rate in effect prior to December 1, 1993, any transaction which may not be subject to the additional one percent rate of tax imposed effective on that date.

Authorizing the Acceptance and Payment of Health Care and Mental Hygiene Worker Bonuses to Monroe County Employees and the Amendment of Contracts to Pay Health Care and Mental Hygiene Worker Bonuses to Monroe County Contractors

#### Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize the acceptance and payment of Health Care and Mental Hygiene Worker Bonuses to Monroe County employees pursuant to Section 367-w of New York's Social Services Law ("Section 367-w"). I further recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize the amendment of various contracts between Monroe County and vendors who provide contract workers to the County to provide for the payment of bonuses for those contracted workers pursuant to Section 367-w.

As Your Honorable Body is aware, Section 367-w was enacted to provide Health Care and Mental Hygiene Worker Bonuses to health care and mental hygiene workers. Section 367-w provides for a bonus of up to \$1,500 per employee based upon hours worked during a six-month vesting period. Section 367-w sets forth a schedule of five vesting periods from October of 2021 through May of 2024. Employees are eligible for a maximum of \$3,000 during the five vesting periods. Employee eligibility is solely determined by Section 367-w and based upon an employee's job title as set forth by the New York State Department of Health.

Pursuant to Resolutions 309 of 2022 and 465 of 2022, Your Honorable Body approved payments of bonuses to Monroe County employees for the first and second vesting periods. In addition to certain Monroe County employees being eligible for the bonus, certain contract workers who are employed on behalf of Monroe County pursuant to a contract with a vendor are also eligible. Under the terms of the bonus program, Monroe County is required to submit claims for those contract workers. The New York State Department of Health allowed employers the opportunity to submit claims on behalf of employees and contract workers for vesting period three on or before June 1, 2023. Monroe County has now timely submitted claims on behalf of eligible employees and eligible contract personnel who work for Monroe County for the first, second, and third vesting periods.

Under Section 367-w, once payment is made by the state to an eligible employer, such as Monroe County, an employer must pay bonuses to its eligible employees within 30 days of receipt of the bonus.

#### The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept Health Care and Mental Hygiene Worker Bonus payments from the State of New York pursuant to Section 367-w in an amount not to exceed \$300,000.

- Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to make payment of Health Care and Mental Hygiene Worker Bonus payments to eligible Monroe County employees pursuant to Section 367w.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute amendments to the following contracts in a total aggregate amount not to exceed \$40,000 for purposes of making payment of Health Care and Mental Hygiene Worker Bonus payments to eligible Monroe County contractors:
  - A. Morrison Management Specialists, Inc., an affiliate of Morrison Healthcare, a Division of Compass Group USA, Inc. for food, nutritional, and vending service management and operation at Monroe Community Hospital, as authorized by Resolution 415 of 2020, as amended by Resolution 465 of 2022; and
  - B. PrimeCare Medical of New York, Inc. for comprehensive medical and mental health care for the incarcerated persons in the custody of the Monroe County Sheriff, as authorized by Resolution 405 of 2017, as amended by Resolution 88 of 2020, Resolution 254 of 2020, Resolution 409 of 2020, Resolution 224 of 2021, Resolution 349 of 2021, and Resolution 465 of 2022.
- 4. Amend the 2023 operating budget of Monroe Community Hospital, hospital fund 9012, funds center 6201010000 Administration, in the amount of \$208,841; funds center 6202080000 Food and Nutrition, in the amount of \$4,845; funds center 6202010000 Maintenance and Repair, in the amount of \$1,615; the Department of Public Health, general fund 9001, funds center 5801010000 Public Health Commissioner, in the amount of \$35,525; funds center 5802050100 Immunization Program, in the amount of \$539; the Department of Aviation, airport fund 9010, funds center 8101010000 Airport Administration, in the amount of \$3,768; the Department of Human Services, general fund 9001, funds center 5701010000 Mental Health Administration, in the amount of \$3,768; the Office of the Sheriff, general fund 9001, funds center 3801010000 Sheriff Administration, in the amount of \$1,615; and funds center 3804090000 Jail Medical, in the amount of \$29,066.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR §617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for the Health Care and Mental Hygiene Worker Bonuses is being provided by the State of New York pursuant to Section 367-w. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that this matter receive favorable action by Your Honorable Body.
