Subject: Memorializing the United States Congress to Pass and President Trump to sign H.R. 2933, the Protect National Service Act

Honorable Legislators:

AmeriCorps is a federal agency for service that touches on work with veterans, environmental stewardship, disaster response, economic opportunities, and ensures healthy futures for Americans across the country.

The Department of Government Efficiency (DOGE) has gutted the AmeriCorps program, cutting a staggering 41% of the agency's budget, affecting 1,031 organizations, 650 full-time staff, 32,465 service members and senior volunteers. The budget cuts has also eviscerated the National Civilian Community Corps, which plays a critical role in disaster relief and urban and rural development across the country.

Every year, 22,000 AmeriCorps service participants work on over 1,700 projects across New York state. \$26 million in federal funding has been cut, affecting 3,600 service members. The Finger Lakes region has lost a staggering \$2.5 million and threatens the programming of Rochester Youth Year, Flower City Public Health Corps, and Lifespan.

Monroe County depends on AmeriCorps service members to address its most pressing issues. Since 2008, Rochester Youth Year has partnered with local universities to mobilize recent college graduates in national service to bolster academic success in young people, improve job skills training programs, and increase access to medical care. The University of Rochester has documented that to date, 193 VISTA service members have served, mobilizing 13,193 community members and contributing a total of 117,185 service hours.

In 2022, the City of Rochester received \$634,300 to strengthen public health services. The American Rescue Plan Act allocated \$400 million over five years for public health AmeriCorps. These funds have supported preventive health clinics, youth mentoring, and public health training in high-poverty, marginalized neighborhoods. These programs can only continue with renewed support.

This bipartisan bill, sponsored by Congresswoman Doris Matsui, Congresswoman Chrissy Houlahan, and Congressman Don Bacon, prohibits using funds to eliminate the Corporation for National and Community Service. For the last 30 years, AmeriCorps has received bipartisan support and has proven itself successful, with over 1.2 billion hours of community service completed. For every one dollar in federal taxes invested, AmeriCorps returns an average of \$17.30 to our communities. This bill ensures that any reform to the Corporation for National and Community Service is done within existing laws. Additionally, it maintains support for national service, continues to meet obligations, and reaffirms the federal government's active role in meeting the needs of Americans by encouraging citizens to participate in national service programs. The DOGE cuts are an unconstitutional overreach of Presidential power, and the passage of this bill reinforces congressional power over spending.

The passage of H.R. 2933 will ensure that service members can continue their vital work with veterans, environmental stewardship, disaster response, creating economic opportunities, and ensuring healthy futures for people across the country. Therefore, I call on the House of Representatives and the Senate to pass this legislation and on President Trump to sign it into law.

Honorable Legislators,

We are writing to express our deep concern and strong opposition to the proposed reductions to Medicaid, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), and other essential public assistance programs included in the House Budget Reconciliation Proposal. These proposed cuts are not only detrimental but represent a significant and unacceptable threat to the well-being of millions of Americans, particularly vulnerable populations such as the elderly, children, individuals with disabilities, and low-income families.

Medicaid and SNAP serve as critical lifelines for countless individuals, providing essential healthcare and nutrition to those who need it most. The proposal to cut funding by \$700 billion for Medicaid, \$270 billion for nutrition programs, and \$105 billion for the Affordable Care Act would have devastating consequences for both individuals and the broader healthcare infrastructure. If these cuts are enacted, it is estimated that between 1.5 million and 2 million New Yorkers could lose their health coverage, representing 23% of the current enrollees in Medicaid and Affordable Care Act programs. The consequences of such a loss would be profound, as individuals would be unable to afford necessary medical care, leading to preventable illness

and even death. These are not abstract statistics; they represent real people and families in our neighborhoods whose lives are at risk.

The proposed reductions to SNAP are equally alarming. Nearly 1 in 7 New Yorkers depend on food assistance to meet basic needs, and the proposed changes would make it more difficult for these individuals to access the nutrition they require. The imposition of burdensome state matches for SNAP costs, combined with the anticipated additional costs due to error rates, would place an undue financial burden on New York State, an estimated \$2.1 billion annually. Moreover, proposed changes to eligibility and work requirements could leave thousands of New Yorkers without access to critical nutrition assistance.

These proposed cuts would have a catastrophic effect on those who are most in need of support. We strongly urge you to reconsider any actions that would reduce funding for these vital programs. The decision before us is not just a fiscal one, but a moral one. As elected representatives, it is our duty to protect and support our most vulnerable citizens. Any proposal that seeks to undermine these safety nets will have far-reaching and devastating consequences for individuals, families, and communities across the state.

We respectfully call on you to stand firm in opposition to these cuts and to advocate for policies that protect and uplift the most vulnerable members of our society. The stakes are too high to allow these reductions to pass. We ask that you prioritize the well-being of those who rely on these programs and work toward a future where every individual has access to the healthcare, food, and support they need to thrive. These are real people and real families who will suffer if these cuts are passed.

Thank you for your attention to this urgent matter. We look forward to your leadership in safeguarding the interests of New Yorkers and all Americans who rely on these critical programs.



Honorable Legislators:

New York State is home to over 1,600 fire departments representing more than 91,000 firefighters spread throughout the state. Of these departments, 93% are registered as volunteer fire departments. New York's strong volunteer firefighting community represent some of the most committed public servants, dedicating their time to serving in one of the most dangerous professions. Each and every day, these volunteers answer the call to risk their lives by protecting their communities and neighbors—providing a critical service to those in need. However, this important, life-saving work cannot be carried out to its fullest extent without significant investment from both the State and Local governments, as well as the people they protect.

New York State Senate Bill S4949 seeks to better support and uplift our struggling volunteer fire departments and EMS state-wide. If passed, this bill would amend the tax law and state finance law to reallocate excess funds collected by the public safety communications surcharge to the New York State Volunteer Fire Protection Reimbursement Account. From there, these funds would be allocated to various fire departments and EMS across the state for reimbursement of purchases for personal protective equipment and lost revenues due to municipal budget cuts, or the cancellation of public events.

Across the State, our volunteer fire departments rely on fundraising through community events such as fairs and carnivals to continue their services. In doing so, these departments save taxpayers billions in funding each year. In a 2023 study performed by the Firefighters Association of the State of New York, services provided by volunteer departments save taxpayers approximately \$4.6 billion annually. Furthermore, if these volunteer departments were replaced by paid career fire departments, it is estimated to create an average of 28.4% tax increase state-wide. Keeping taxes low through volunteer service in imperative; however, the ability for our volunteer departments to properly fundraise has been met with several challenges throughout the years. This bill would give our heroes the ability to obtain new protective equipment without further strain to their existing budget, allowing our first responders to focus on providing quality service.

Please join us in calling upon the New York State Legislature and Governor Kathy Hochul to enact this important legislation to better support the dedicated volunteer fire departments and first responders across New York State.

Honorable Legislators:

The brave men and women of our Armed Forces put their lives on the line to defend our nation, and when tragedy strikes, their families bear the weight of that sacrifice. Senate Bill S5588, entitled "Expands the Gold Star Exemption" and sponsored by Senator Rob Ortt, is an important step toward honoring those families by expanding the Gold Star exemption to include parents whose children have died on U.S. soil due to a service-connected disability. As we continue to send men and women into harm's way, we must ensure that our policies reflect the realities of modern military service and provide support to all who suffer its consequences.

Supporting this legislation is about doing what is right for families who have already given so much. Therefore, I ask that you join me in calling on the New York State Legislature to pass and Governor Kathy Hochul to sign Bill S5588, "Expands the Gold Star Exemption" so that New York may reaffirm its commitment to military families and ensure that no Gold Star parent is left behind.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a contract with Barton & Loguidice, D.P.C. in the amount of \$37,300 for professional design services for the Northeast Quadrant (Gloria Drive) Landfill Improvements Project ("Project").

Monroe County is responsible for managing the inactive former Northeast Quadrant (Gloria Drive) Landfill in the Town of Penfield. The County requires engineering assistance in preparing environmental, geologic and groundwater assessments, and the design of a cap to mitigate the impacts of precipitation on the landfill. Your Honorable Body approved funding for the Project by Resolution 382 of 2024.

Several consultants were considered with Barton & Loguidice, D.P.C. rated as the most qualified to provide these services.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract with Barton & Loguidice, D.P.C., 11 Centre Park, Suite 203, Rochester, New York 14614, in the amount of \$37,300 for professional design services for the Northeast Quadrant (Gloria Drive) Landfill Improvements project, and any amendments necessary to complete the project within the total capital fund(s) appropriation.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(2) ("replacement, rehabilitation or reconstruction of a structure or facility, in kind, on the same site, including upgrading buildings to meet building, energy, or fire codes, unless such action meets or exceeds any of the thresholds in section 617.4 of this Part") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

As part of the eight-year review, twenty-five parcels have been submitted for addition and three parcels have been submitted for removal from the existing Agricultural Districts No. 5 and No. 6. These parcels are distributed throughout the County in the municipalities of Chili, Clarkson, Gates, Greece, Sweden, Parma, and Wheatland (Western Dist. No. 5); and Pittsford, Rush, Henrietta, Penfield, and Mendon (Eastern Dist No. 6).

This action includes the modification of Districts No. 5 and No. 6 by adding and removing parcels. Additionally, the action involves the consolidation of Monroe County Agricultural District No. 6 into District No. 5, resulting in a unified district to be known as Monroe County Agricultural District No. 5. The parcels affected are currently used for agricultural purposes and reflect the existing and historic agricultural character of their respective areas. Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body approve the modification of Monroe County Agricultural Districts No. 5 and No. 6 and consolidate District No. 6 into District No. 5, forming Monroe County Agricultural District No. 5. Pursuant to Article 25AA of the NYS Agriculture and Markets Law, a report has been prepared by the Monroe County Agricultural and Farmland Protection Board on the eight-year review of both districts and recommends consolidation of Districts No. 5 and No. 6 into one county-wide district.

Based on the findings from the annual addition and district review process, the report recommends the modification of District No. 5 by adding approximately 537 acres and removing zero acres - the modification results in a gain of 537 acres to District No. 5 and the modification of District No. 6 by adding approximately 288 acres and removing approximately 135 acres - the modification results in a gain of 153 acres to District No. 6. Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a contract with and accept a donation of services from and through Genesee Transportation Council ("GTC") to undertake the creation of a Genesee Valley Park Olmsted Arched Bridges Restoration Plan ("the Plan") at an approximate value of \$125,000, with a \$10,000 match from the Monroe County Department of Planning and Development in monetary and in-kind services.

Through this acceptance of service, GTC will procure and contract with a qualified consultant to prepare a Restoration Plan for the three (3) Olmsted arched bridges in Genesee Valley Park. Goals of this project include identifying appropriate restoration interventions that respect the age and historic significance of the structures; a schedule for ongoing maintenance and repairs; and clarify jurisdictional responsibilities for both the restoration process, ongoing maintenance, and ownership.

The Plan will be 90% funded by the Genesee Transportation Council through the Unified Planning Work Program ("UPWP"), a federally-funded transportation planning program undertaken each year by GTC, its member agencies, and other jurisdictions in the Genesee-Finger Lakes Region. GTC, through UPWP, will fund and administer the Plan at an approximate value of \$125,000. The Department of Planning and Development will provide an in-kind match of \$5,000 from staff support and a monetary match of \$5,000 from the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Planning and Development.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract, and any amendments thereto, with Genesee Transportation Council ("GTC"), 1 South Washington St, Suite 520, Rochester, New York 14614, to accept a donation of services from and through GTC to undertake the creation of a Genesee Valley Park Olmsted Arched Bridges Restoration Plan at an approximate value of \$125,000, with a \$10,000 match from Monroe County in monetary and in-kind services.

Program

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 221 of 2022 to accept additional funding from the New York State Department of Health in the amount of \$117,994 for the Rabies Reimbursement Program and extend the time period for two (2) years, through March 31, 2027.

By Resolution 221 of 2022, Your Honorable Body authorized the acceptance of a grant from the New York State Department of Health for the Rabies Reimbursement Program. The purpose of this grant is to provide financial support to local health departments and individuals exposed to rabies when it has been identified in a county. Funds will be used to contract with Rochester General Hospital to provide human rabies post-exposure treatment services at the Rochester Regional Health Immediate Care—Wilson Center location. In addition, funds will be used for other rabies control related costs, including specimen preparation and shipment, purchase of animal rabies vaccine, and costs for pet vaccination clinics that are carried out according to the New York State Sanitary Code. The additional funding will bring the grant total to \$294,985.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend Resolution 221 of 2022 to accept an additional \$117,994 from, and to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Department of Health for the Rabies Reimbursement Program, bringing to total program award to \$294,985, and extending the time period for two (2) years, through March 31, 2027.
- 2. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 382 of 2018, as amended by Resolutions 83 of 2024 and 148 of 2024, to accept additional grant funding from the New York State Department of Health in the amount of \$75,833 for the STD Testing in Safety Net Populations Program and extend the time period through December 31, 2025.

I further recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 412 of 2020, as amended by Resolutions 421 of 2021, 369 of 2022, 368 of 2023, 83 of 2024, and 148 of 2024, to amend and increase the contract with Rochester Regional Health to provide clinical laboratory services through its Rochester General Hospital Permitted Laboratories for the Monroe County Department of Public Health ("MCDPH") from an amount not to exceed \$1,071,833 to an amount not to exceed \$1,101,713 for the period of January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025.

The purpose of the grant for the STD Testing in Safety Net Populations Program is to provide screening for Chlamydia and Gonorrhea in high-risk populations. Testing is provided at various locations in Monroe County, including MCDPH's Sexual Health Clinic. Funds will be used for laboratory testing through a contract with Rochester Regional Health, using its Rochester General Hospital ("RGH") Permitted Laboratories. The additional funding will be used to support the contract and will bring the total program award to \$501,666.

The RGH lab contract supports the County's Tuberculosis Control Program, Sexual Health Clinic, Sexually Transmitted Infection and HIV Control Program, and the Office of the Medical Examiner. This vendor provides clinical laboratory services, including but not limited to microbiological and hematological testing of specimens submitted by MCDPH.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend Resolution 382 of 2018, as amended by Resolution 83 of 2024, as amended by Resolution 148 of 2024, to accept an additional \$75,833 from, and to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Department of Health for the STD Testing in Safety Net Populations Program, bringing the total program award to \$501,666, and extending the time period through December 31, 2025.
- 2. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Public Health by appropriating the sum of \$75,833 into general fund 9300, funds center 5802030200, STD Investigation & Prevention.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a two-year grant from the Housing Trust Fund Corporation, a subsidiary of the New York State Housing Finance Agency, in the amount of \$1,200,240 for the Leading in Lead Prevention Pilot Program ("LEAD") for the period of April 1, 2025 through March 31, 2027.

The purpose of this grant is to administer a local LEAD program to remediate lead hazards from rental units in an identified area of concern in Monroe County. This will increase lead-safe affordable housing by remediating approximately 26 pre-1980, multifamily rental housing units occupied by children or pregnant women and with documented lead hazards. Units with children or pregnant persons with elevated blood lead levels will be prioritized. Eligible property owners will be provided up to \$40,000 per unit for lead abatement, as well as associated costs. Funds will be used to provide salaries and benefits of existing staff as well as other costs to run the program. This will be the second round of grant funding the County has received.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$1,200,240 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the Housing Trust Fund Corporation, a subsidiary of the New York State Housing Finance Agency, for the Leading in Lead Prevention Pilot Program for the period of April 1, 2025 through March 31, 2027.
- 2. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Public Health by appropriating the sum of \$1,200,240 into general fund 9300, funds center 5806110000, Lead Programs.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a five-year grant from the New York State Department of Health in an amount not to exceed \$521,765 for the Drinking Water Enhancement Program for the period of April 1, 2025 through March 31, 2030.

The purpose of this grant is to enhance local drinking water programs and to provide increased oversight of public and private water supplies in Monroe County, along with ensuring continued compliance with the Federal Safe Drinking Water Act and the New York State Sanitary Code. An allocation formula based on population and the number of public water supplies provides the basis for funding for each local health department. Specific tasks and activities to be performed by the Monroe County Department of Public Health will include water system inspections, plan review, data evaluation, regulatory oversight, and water quality surveillance. Funds will be used to purchase supplies, cover travel expenses, and support existing positions in the program. This will be the twenty-fifth year the County has received this grant. This year's funding level is a reduction from the previous 12 month's period.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a grant in an amount not to exceed \$521,765 from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Department of Health for the Drinking Water Enhancement Program for the period of April 1, 2025 through March 31, 2030.
- 2. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Public Health by appropriating the sum of \$104,353 into general fund 9300, funds center 5806010000, Environmental Health Administration.

Honorable Legislators:

We recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the schedule of job titles by salary group for the Department of Public Health, as described and contained in the 2025 Monroe County budget; authorize the position of Deputy Medical Examiner; amend and increase the contracts for the provision of forensic pathology services to the Office of the Medical Examiner; and amend the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Public Health.

In response to ongoing recruitment and retention challenges of Medical Examiner positions stemming from national competition for qualified staff and local compensation levels that have been below prevailing market rates for similarly situated forensic pathology positions, we are recommending an amendment to the schedule of job titles by salary group for the Department of Public Health as follows:

- Amend the Management and Professional salary schedule to include new pay group 43;
- Upgrade the position of Medical Examiner, from Group 33 to Group 43;
- Authorize the position of Deputy Medical Examiner, Group 32; and
- Upgrade three (3) positions of Associate Medical Examiner, from Group 29 to Group 30.

Making the Medical Examiner's office more competitive in recruitment and retention will facilitate the timely and efficient processing of the roughly 4,000 cases received annually. Improving caseloads and case processing times will allow the Medical Examiner's office to pursue national accreditation, which would further assist in recruitment and retention, and which would also enhance the office's operational standards and public trust.

Caccamise Electric Corp. in the amount of \$2,697,682.34 for construction services for the Monroe County Traffic Signal Replacements – Group 1 Project in the Town of Greece and City of Rochester.

The Monroe County Traffic Signal Replacements – Group 1 project will consist of replacement of seven traffic signals at various locations in the City of Rochester and Town of Greece. The signals to be replaced are located on Dewey Avenue at: Denise Road, English Road, Britton Road, Maiden Lane, and Stone Road, and on Ridgeway Avenue at Mount Read Boulevard and at LaGrange Avenue. The work will include replacement of underground conduit, mast arm signal poles, pedestrian signal upgrades, replacement of non-compliant sidewalk ramps, and installation of video vehicle detection. The current schedule is to order long-lead time items in the fall of 2025 and start construction in the spring 2026 with an anticipated completion by the fall of 2026.

Major funding will be provided by Federal and State funds in the amount of approximately 95% of the project cost with overall project administration by Monroe County.

The following three (3) bids were received on March 26, 2025:

M.L. Caccamise Electric Corp. \$2,697,682.34 Power & Construction Group \$3,394,631.20 Cold Spring Construction Co. \$3,571,994.30

The bids have been reviewed and M.L. Caccamise Electric Corp. has been determined to be the lowest responsible bidder pursuant to General Municipal Law §103.

This grant will provide funding to support a portion of the cost of three (3) full-time Assistant District Attorneys. It also provides funding for contracting with a tax auditor, should one be needed during the contract period. The Assistant District Attorneys will investigate and prosecute individuals and businesses operating in Monroe County that violate tax laws, recoup revenue lost due to non-compliance, and increase voluntary compliance with applicable tax laws. In addition, crimes involving failure to collect, report, and pay New York State taxes involving welfare benefits, unemployment insurance benefits and workers' compensation payments will also be investigated and prosecuted by program staff. This will be the twentieth year the County has received this grant. This year's funding is the same amount received in last year's award.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize the creation of one (1) Probation Supervisor, Group 34, and one (1) Senior Probation Officer, Group 37, in the Monroe County Department of Public Safety, Office of Probation - Community Corrections ("Probation").

These positions are necessary as a result of the County's assumption of direct delivery of pre-trial services. The County has a statutory requirement to provide such pre-trial services to the court system. LOCAL LAW NO. ___ OF 2025

ENACTING LOCAL LAW ENTITLED "WAIVER OF RESIDENCY REQUIREMENT FOR ATTORNEYS EMPLOYED BY MONROE COUNTY"

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. A new chapter shall be added as Chapter 392 of the Monroe County Code entitled "Waiver of Residency Requirement for Attorneys Employed by Monroe County" and shall read as follows:

§1 Definitions. Defined terms used in this local law shall have the same meaning as ascribed to them below:

COUNTY shall mean Monroe County.

ATTORNEY shall mean an individual employed by Monroe County as an Assistant District Attorney, a Deputy County Attorney, an Assistant Public Defender, or an Assistant Conflict Defender, provided however that for purposes of this Chapter it shall not mean anyone in a position in Pay Group 22 or above.

- § 2 Residency Requirement. Public Officers Law § 3, as amended or changed, is hereby amended and superseded in its application to the County as follows: provisions of Public Officers Law § 3, as amended or changed, requiring a person to be a resident of the political subdivision or municipal corporation of the state for which he or she shall be chosen or in which his or her official functions are required to be exercised, shall not prevent a person from being employed as an Attorney by the County, provided that such person resides in the County or any adjoining county within New York State.
- Section 2. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law or the application thereof to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this law, or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such order or judgment shall be rendered.
- Section 3. This local law shall take effect in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Home Rule Law and the Monroe County Charter.



Monroe County Planning and Development Home Investment Partnerships Program Project Summary

Rochester Housing Development Fund Corp (RHDFC) - \$1,000,000: Acquisition Rehabilitation Resale – RHDFC will utilize funding to support the Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resale of 20 properties throughout Monroe County, benefiting first-time homebuyers making under 80% Area Median Income (AMI.) They will administer these funds under the framework of their existing programs, Home Rochester (within the city) and Make Monroe Home (throughout suburban Monroe County.)

Rochester Roots - \$789,250: Acquisition Rehabilitation Resale - Rochester Roots will utilize funding to support the Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resale of 8 vacant properties within JOSANA Neighborhood of the City of Rochester benefiting first-time homebuyers making under 60% AMI. The program will build upon previous phases of an existing neighborhood development plan, but will be the first phase to focus on owner-occupied units rather than affordable rental units.

CDS Monarch, Northfield - \$600,000: Affordable Rental Housing Development - Multifarmily CDS will utilize funding to acquire, rehabilitate and lease-up The Northfield in Fairport. The Northfield consists of 69 supportive housing units and is currently managed by Family Services of Rochester. Through this funding, Monarch CDS will preserve 69 supportive housing units, benefiting seniors making under 60% and 50% AMI.

Rural Housing Opportunities Corporation (RHOC) – Home Repair Program - \$250,000: RHOC will utilize funding to assist 8 income-qualified homeowners in making necessary home repairs throughout Monroe County. RHOC, a subsidiary of PathStone, will utilize the structure of their Home Improvement Program, which has operated in Monroe County for more than 30 years.

The Housing Council at PathStone – Homeownership Assistance Program - \$664,414 Housing Council will utilize funding to assist 13 income-qualified, first-time homebuyers with direct down payment assistance and housing counseling services throughout Monroe County. The Housing Council will utilize its existing Homebuyer program as the structure for this assistance.

This proposed project is the construction of a 104 unit 5 building multi-family residential development by Providence housing. The subject property is a 9.2 acre site along Culver Rd. The site is a former landfill, is vacant and enrolled in the Brownfield Cleanup Program (BCP). Comprehensive investigative and remediation plans are in place to address contamination and site cleanup including a Remedial Action Work Plan (RAWP) pursuant to the BCP in New York State DEC regulations. As part of the BCP the applicant adheres to the RAWP protocols for the removal of contaminated soil in the design of a vapor medication system is part of the remediation process. Site remediation will be conducted under state regulations, ensuring that the contamination is addressed prior to site occupancy. The Monroe County Division of Community Development is providing CDBG funding to promote affordable rental housing options throughout Monroe County.

The 9.2 acre site is accessible through Culver Road and is in an area with a mix of residential and commercial uses. Rezoned from R1 to R5 residential it is currently vacant but was previously a landfill and agricultural market. The site contains undocumented film material including construction debris up to 20 feet deep, primarily in former ravine. It was accepted into the Brownfield Cleanup Program in November 2023 as site number C828226. Hobby Creek lies 500 feet north with groundwater generally flowing northeast. A 2024 study found no wetlands, streams, or habitats for endangered species on the site. Based on review of the site, the project does not impact wetlands, the 100 year floodplain or any structures more than 50 years old. The project will not impact existing natural resources, wetlands, historical or cultural resources and will not alter the existing community character. The proposed action is consistent with existing land use. Accordingly, the proposed action will not result in any significant adverse environmental impacts.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$350,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, NEW YORK, TO FINANCE THE COST OF THE CONSTRUCTION OF A 9/11 FIRST RESPONDERS MEMORIAL AT HIGHLAND PARK, IN AND FOR SAID COUNTY, AT AN ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST OF \$350,000 AND SUPERSEDING THE BOND RESOLUTION ADOPTED ON NOVEMBER 14, 2023 (RESOLUTION NO. 330 OF 2023)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE AFFIRMATIVE VOTE OF **NOT LESS THAN TWO-THIRDS OF THE TOTAL VOTING STRENGTH** OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. For the object or purpose of financing the cost of the construction of a 9/11 First Responders Memorial at Highland, in and for the County of Monroe, New York (the "County"), there are hereby authorized to be issued \$350,000 bonds of the County, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The duly adopted current Capital Budget of the County, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is hereby amended to provide for the appropriation of an additional \$100,000 to pay the cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose (\$250,000 having been heretofore appropriated from one or more Capital Budgets). The period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is fifteen (15) years, pursuant to subdivision 19(c) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost thereof is \$350,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$350,000 bonds of said County herein authorized, provided, however, that to the extent any state and/or federal aid and/or grant and/or gift is received for the aforesaid purpose, the County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to accept and shall use such funds to redeem any outstanding indebtedness incurred for such purpose or apply it, dollar for dollar, to reduce the amount of bonds to be issued for such purpose.

Section 3. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, the chief fiscal officer of the County under the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may sell such bonds or notes at public or private sale, at a discount or premium, at fixed or variable rates of interest or at no interest whatsoever, or as capital appreciation bonds, and with such amortization of principal as the Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer shall determine is most favorable to the County, and in compliance with any rules of the State Comptroller applicable thereto. Such bonds or notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, consistent with the provisions of the Local

Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may, in the event it is determined to issue variable rate bonds or notes, enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance, sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds or notes, as authorized under Section 54.90 of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer is also authorized to enter into such agreements and take such other action as may be necessary or appropriate and lawful to assure that, to the extent possible, (i) interest on the bonds and notes authorized hereby will not be includable in the gross income, for federal income tax purposes, of the recipients thereof, and (ii) to enable the purchaser thereof to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12. The Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer is hereby further delegated all powers of this County Legislature with respect to agreements for credit enhancement, derived from and pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, for such bonds or notes, including, but not limited to the determination of the provider of such credit enhancement facility or facilities and the terms and contents of any agreement or agreements related thereto.

Section 5. All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds or notes, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds or notes, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds or notes, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds or notes, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds or notes (and if said bonds or notes are to be executed in the name of the County by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the County), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds or notes, or may contract on behalf of the County for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds or notes shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals, in addition to those required by Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes, as authorized by this resolution, may be contested only if:

- such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or
- 3) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This resolution shall supersede Resolution No. 330 of 2023, being a bond resolution dated November 14, 2023, except to the extent that any indebtedness shall have been contracted or encumbrances made thereunder. The purpose of this superseding bond resolution is to effect the following: to increase the maximum estimated cost of the purpose to \$350,000, and to provide \$350,000 bonds therefor, an increase of \$100,000 over the \$250,000 bonds authorized under Resolution No. 330 of 2023.

Section 8. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$200,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, NEW YORK, TO FINANCE THE COST OF THE ONTARIO BEACH PARK - MASTER PLAN IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT, IN AND FOR SAID COUNTY, AT AN ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST OF \$200,000

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE AFFIRMATIVE VOTE OF **NOT LESS THAN TWO-THIRDS OF THE TOTAL VOTING STRENGTH** OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. For the object or purpose of financing the cost of the Ontario Beach Park - Master Plan Improvements Project, in and for the County of Monroe, New York (the "County"), consisting of entry and exit gates, there are hereby authorized to be issued \$200,000 bonds of the County, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The duly adopted current Capital Budget of the County, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is hereby amended to provide for the appropriation of the amount hereby authorized to pay the cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose. The period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is fifteen (15) years, pursuant to subdivision 19(c) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost thereof is \$200,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$200,000 bonds of said County herein authorized; provided, however, that to the extent any state and/or federal aid and/or grant and/or gift is received for the aforesaid purpose, the County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to accept and shall use such funds to redeem any outstanding indebtedness incurred for such purpose or apply it, dollar for dollar, to reduce the amount of bonds to be issued for such purpose.

Section 3. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, the chief fiscal officer of the County under the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may sell such bonds or notes at public or private sale, at a discount or premium, at fixed or variable rates of interest or at no interest whatsoever, or as capital appreciation bonds, and with such amortization of principal as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine is most favorable to the County, and in compliance with any rules of the State Comptroller applicable thereto. Such bonds or notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may, in the event it is determined to issue

variable rate bonds or notes, enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance, sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds or notes, as authorized under Section 54.90 of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer is also authorized to enter into such agreements and take such other action as may be necessary or appropriate and lawful to assure that, to the extent possible, (i) interest on the bonds and notes authorized hereby will not be includable in the gross income, for federal income tax purposes, of the recipients thereof, and (ii) to enable the purchaser thereof to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12. The Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer is hereby further delegated all powers of this County Legislature with respect to agreements for credit enhancement, derived from and pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, for such bonds or notes, including, but not limited to the determination of the provider of such credit enhancement facility or facilities and the terms and contents of any agreement or agreements related thereto.

Section 5. All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds or notes, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds or notes, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds or notes, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds or notes, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds or notes (and if said bonds or notes are to be executed in the name of the County by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the County), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds or notes, or may contract on behalf of the County for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds or notes shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals, in addition to those required by Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes, as authorized by this resolution, may be contested only if:

- such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or
- 3) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the objects or purposes described herein.

Section 8. WHEREAS, He believed in meeting people where they are, whether standing beside the mayor in a suit or cooking at a community peace barbecue, always showing up with humility and strength; and

WHEREAS, Mayor Malik Evans described him as a trusted advisor and friend, whose life embodied the hymn, "May the works I've done speak for me"; and

WHEREAS, He is survived by his wife, Sharon Saunders, children Victor II and Betty, mother Claudia Brown, and a city forever shaped by his example.

I recommend that the Administrative Board of the Northwest Quadrant Pure Waters District authorize a contract with LeChase Construction Services, LLC in the amount of \$58,956 for agency construction management services for the NWQ WRRF Electrical, Aeration and Preliminary Treatment Improvements projects.

The Department of Environmental Services will commence with a systematic upgrade to several processes at the Northwest Ouadrant Pure Waters District Water Resource Recovery Facility ("NWQ WRRF") including electrical infrastructure, biological aeration systems, and physical preliminary treatment systems. While the design of these individual process components may be completed by separate professional engineering firms, a single agency construction management firm will provide continuity in the logistics of planning and construction of these crucial improvements. Your Honorable Body approved funding for the Electrical Improvements project by Resolution 30 of 2025. Department of Environmental Services anticipates that it will seek funding approval for the Aeration and Preliminary Treatment Improvements projects within the next year.

Several consultants were considered with LeChase Construction Services, LLC rated as the most qualified to provide these services.

The specific Administrative Board action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract with LeChase Construction Services, LLC, 205 Indigo Creek Drive, Rochester, New York 14626, in the amount of \$58,956 for agency construction management services for the NWO WRRF Electrical, Aeration and Preliminary Treatment Improvements projects, and any amendments necessary to complete the projects within the total capital fund(s) appropriation.

LOCAL LAW NO. ___ OF 2025

ENACTING LOCAL LAW ENTITLED "WAIVER OF RESIDENCY REQUIREMENT FOR ATTORNEYS EMPLOYED BY MONROE COUNTY"

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. A new chapter shall be added as Chapter 392 of the Monroe County Code entitled "Waiver of Residency Requirement for Attorneys Employed by Monroe County" and shall read as follows:

§1 Definitions. Defined terms used in this local law shall have the same meaning as ascribed to them below:

COUNTY shall mean Monroe County.

ATTORNEY shall mean an individual employed by Monroe County as an Assistant District Attorney, a Deputy County Attorney, an Assistant Public Defender, or an Assistant Conflict Defender, provided however that for purposes of this Chapter it shall not mean anyone in a position in Pay Group 22 or above.

- § 2 Residency Requirement. Public Officers Law § 3, as amended or changed, is hereby amended and superseded in its application to the County as follows: provisions of Public Officers Law § 3, as amended or changed, requiring a person to be a resident of the political subdivision or municipal corporation of the state for which he or she shall be chosen or in which his or her official functions are required to be exercised, shall not prevent a person from being employed as an Attorney by the County, provided that such person resides in the County or any adjoining county within New York State.
- Section 2. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law or the application thereof to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this law, or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such order or judgment shall be rendered.
- Section 3. This local law shall take effect in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Home Rule Law and the Monroe County Charter.





Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a contract with LeChase Construction Services, LLC in the amount of \$58,956 for agency construction management services for the NWQ WRRF Electrical, Aeration and Preliminary Treatment Improvements projects.

The Department of Environmental Services will commence with a systematic upgrade to several processes at the Northwest Quadrant Pure Waters District Water Resource Recovery Facility ("NWQ WRRF") including electrical infrastructure, biological aeration systems, and physical preliminary treatment systems. While the design of these individual process components may be completed by separate professional engineering firms, a single agency construction management firm will provide continuity in the logistics of planning and construction of these crucial improvements. Your Honorable Body approved funding for the Electrical Improvements project by Resolution 30 of 2025. The Department of Environmental Services anticipates that it will seek funding approval for the Aeration and Preliminary Treatment Improvements projects within the next year.

Several consultants were considered with LeChase Construction Services, LLC rated as the most qualified to provide these services.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract with LeChase Construction Services, LLC, 205 Indigo Creek Drive, Rochester, New York 14626, in the amount of \$58,956 for agency construction management services for the NWQ WRRF Electrical, Aeration and Preliminary Treatment Improvements projects, and any amendments necessary to complete the projects within the total capital fund(s) appropriation.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(2) ("replacement, rehabilitation or reconstruction of a structure or facility, in kind, on the same site, including upgrading buildings to meet building, energy, or fire codes, unless such action meets or exceeds any of the thresholds in section 617.4 of this Part"); and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for this contract, consistent with authorized uses, is included in capital fund 2137 and any capital fund(s) created for the same intended purpose. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Subject: Authorize Grant Contracts Pursuant to the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize grant contracts pursuant to the American Rescue Plan ("ARPA") with the agencies listed in Attachment A in a total amount not to exceed \$3,303,664 for terms to commence on June 11, 2025 and terminate on or before December 31, 2026.

In January, Monroe County issued Requests for Proposals seeking respondents who would use ARPA funding to administer an Acquire, Rehabilitate, and Resale Single-family Homes program, the development of multi-family Affordable Rental Housing, a Home Improvement Program, and a Homeownership Assistance Program. The Acquisition, Rehabilitation, Resale program will increase the supply of single-family homes available to first-time homebuyers who are facing challenges in acquiring the dream of homeownership due to the competitive housing market for lower-income homebuyers. The multi-family Affordable Rental Housing program will make available additional rental units for lower-income seniors and provide high-quality, safe, affordable rental housing opportunities. The Home Improvement Program will provide grants to income-eligible homeowners to repair and revitalize their homes due to the increased cost of construction where they would not otherwise be able to do so on their own. This program will allow homeowners to remain stably housed. The Homeownership Assistance Program will allow a homeowner to realize their dream of homeownership through down payment and closing cost assistance to make their home purchase more affordable.

The Respondents listed in Attachment A were selected as the most qualified to provide these services.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute grant contracts, and any amendments thereto, with the agencies listed in Attachment A in a total amount not to exceed \$3,303,664 for terms to commence on or after June 11, 2025 and terminate on or before December 31, 2026.
- 2. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of these funds, any returned contractor funds, or any deferred revenue, in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments.

3. Should funding of these programs be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program(s) and where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program(s). Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance of the New York State Civil Service Law, and when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

Monroe County will serve as Lead Agency for the following two (2) actions, titled: Homeownership Assistance Program (First Time Home Buyers Program), Acquire, Rehabilitate, and Resale Single-family Homes program (Rochester Housing Development Fund Corporation for the Acquisition Rehab and Resale Program), which have all been preliminarily classified as Unlisted Actions. The provisions of the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act shall be complied with prior to Your Honorable Body undertaking, funding, or approving these projects. The Multi-family Affordable Rental Housing program and the Home Improvement Programs are Type II Actions pursuant to 6 NYCRR §617.5 (c) (2) ("replacement, rehabilitation or reconstruction of a structure or facility, in kind, on the same site, including upgrading buildings to meet building, energy, or fire codes unless such action meets or exceeds any of the thresholds in section 617.4 of this Part") and are not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for these grant contracts is included in the Department of Planning and Development, general fund 9301, funds center 1404010000, Community Development. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Each of these contractors has been reviewed for not-for-profit corporate status and the records in the office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that none of these agencies owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body determine whether the Midvale Commons Project funded through the Monroe County Home Investment Partnerships ("HOME") Program may have a significant adverse impact on the environment pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA").

The proposed project, Midvale Commons, involves the new construction of 28 senior apartments for individuals aged 62 and older, located at 2770 Baird Road in the Town of Perinton. The plan includes the creation of 28 one-bedroom, bungalow-style units arranged across eight single-story buildings. Four of the buildings will each contain four side-by-side units, while the remaining four buildings will each include three units. Each apartment will offer a private entrance and range in size from 730 to 750 square feet. All units are designated to serve income-qualified senior households earning up to 30%, 50%, and 60% of the Area Median Income (AMI). The development is designed to meet New York State Homes and Community Renewal's (NYS HCR) Green Building and Stretch Sustainability Goals, with certification under LEED for Homes Gold and LEED Zero standards. This project is funded through the Monroe County Home Investment Partnerships (HOME) Program, which aims to promote the creation of affordable rental housing options across Monroe County.

The Midvale Commons Project funded through the Monroe County Home Investment Partnerships (HOME) Program has been preliminarily classified as an Unlisted Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617(b). The State Environmental Quality Review Act regulations found at 6 NYCRR Part 617 requires that no agency shall carry out or approve an Action until it has complied with the requirements of SEQRA.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Determine that the Midvale Commons Project funded through the Monroe County Home Investment Partnerships Program is an Unlisted Action.

- 2. Make a determination of significance regarding the Midvale Commons Project funded through the Monroe County Home Investment Partnerships Program pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.7.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to take such actions to comply with the requirements of State Environmental Quality Review Act, including without limitation, the execution of documents and the filing, distribution and publication of the documents required under State Environmental Quality Review Act, and any other actions to implement the intent of this resolution.

This determination will have no impact on the revenues or expenditures of the current Monroe County budget.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body determine whether the Balinsky Gardens Project funded through the Monroe County Home Investment Partnerships ("HOME") Program may have a significant adverse impact on the environment pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA").

The proposed project involves the construction of a 104-unit, five-building multi-family residential development by Providence Housing, located on a 9.2-acre parcel situated behind 2590 Culver Road. The site is positioned along Culver Road in an area characterized by a mix of residential and commercial uses. The development will include 32 townhouse-style units, each offering three bedrooms, and 72 apartment-style units within a low-rise elevator building. The apartment building will feature 32 one-bedroom units and 40 two-bedroom units. The first floor of the elevator building will house various resident-focused amenities, including bicycle storage, resident service offices, leasing offices, maintenance facilities, and shared community space. Additional common areas will feature a community room with kitchenette, on-site laundry, a library, restrooms, secure package drop-off, and mechanical rooms. This project is funded through the Monroe County Home Investment Partnerships (HOME) Program, which aims to promote the creation of affordable rental housing options across Monroe County.

The Balinsky Gardens Project funded through the Monroe County Home Investment Partnerships (HOME) Program has been preliminarily classified as an Unlisted Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617(b). The State Environmental Quality Review Act regulations found at 6 NYCRR Part 617 requires that no agency shall carry out or approve an Action until it has complied with the requirements of SEQRA.

This proposed project is the construction of a 104 unit 5 building multi-family residential development by Providence housing. The subject property is a 9.2 acre site along Culver Rd. The site is a former landfill, is vacant and enrolled in the Brownfield Cleanup Program (BCP). Comprehensive investigative and remediation plans are in place to address contamination and site cleanup including a Remedial Action Work Plan (RAWP) pursuant to the BCP in New York State DEC regulations. As part of the BCP the applicant adheres to the RAWP protocols for the removal of contaminated soil in the design of a vapor medication system is part of the remediation process. Site remediation will be conducted under state regulations, ensuring that the contamination is addressed prior to site occupancy. The Monroe County Division of Community Development is providing CDBG funding to promote affordable rental housing options throughout Monroe County.

The 9.2 acre site is accessible through Culver Road and is in an area with a mix of residential and commercial uses. Rezoned from R1 to R5 residential it is currently vacant but was previously a landfill and agricultural market. The site contains undocumented film material including construction debris up to 20 feet deep, primarily in former ravine. It was accepted into the Brownfield Cleanup Program in November 2023 as site number C828226. Hobby Creek lies 500 feet north with groundwater generally flowing northeast. A 2024 study found no wetlands, streams, or habitats for endangered species on the site. Based on review of the site, the project does not impact wetlands, the 100 year floodplain or any structures more than 50 years old. The project will not impact existing natural resources, wetlands, historical or cultural resources and will not alter the existing community character. The proposed action is consistent with existing land use. Accordingly, the proposed action will not result in any significant adverse environmental impacts.

This proposed project is the construction of a 104 unit 5 building multi-family residential development by Providence housing. The subject property is a 9.2 acre site along Culver Rd. The site is a former landfill, is vacant and enrolled in the Brownfield Cleanup Program (BCP). Comprehensive investigative and remediation plans are in place to address contamination and site cleanup including a Remedial Action Work Plan (RAWP) pursuant to the BCP in New York State DEC regulations. As part of the BCP the applicant adheres to the RAWP protocols for the removal of contaminated soil in the design of a vapor medication system is part of the remediation process. Site remediation will be conducted under state regulations, ensuring that the contamination is addressed prior to site occupancy. The Monroe County Division of Community Development is providing CDBG funding to promote affordable rental housing options throughout Monroe County.

The 9.2 acre site is accessible through Culver Road and is in an area with a mix of residential and commercial uses. Rezoned from R1 to R5 residential it is currently vacant but was previously a landfill and agricultural market. The site contains undocumented film material including construction debris up to 20 feet deep, primarily in former ravine. It was accepted into the Brownfield Cleanup Program in November 2023 as site number C828226. Hobby Creek lies 500 feet north with groundwater generally flowing northeast. A 2024 study found no wetlands, streams, or habitats for endangered species on the site. Based on review of the site, the project does not impact wetlands, the 100 year floodplain or any structures more than 50 years old. The project will not impact existing natural resources, wetlands, historical or cultural resources and will not alter the existing community character. The proposed action is consistent with existing land use. Accordingly, the proposed action will not result in any significant adverse environmental impacts.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body determine whether the Acquisition Rehab Resale Program funded through the Monroe County Home Investment Partnerships ("HOME") Program may have a significant adverse impact on the environment pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA").

This project develops affordable housing opportunities by providing a direct subsidy for income eligible first time home buyers purchasing their first home in suburban Monroe County. A sub recipient acquires a single family home, develops works specifications for rehab, selects a contractor to complete the work and bring home up to minimum standards for resale to individuals purchasing homes, which are still subject to existing municipal building and zoning codes.

This program has no direct effects on the environment, all property involved in this program are privately owned and still subject to the New York State Building Code and municipal zoning laws. This program will not result in construction that results in the expansion of the original footprint; encroachment on wetlands, Critical Environmental Areas, floodplains; encroachment on a building, archaeological site, or district which is listed on the National or State Register of Historic Places, or that has been determined by the Commissioner of the NYS Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation to be eligible for listing on the State Register of Historic Places.

The Acquisition Rehab Resale Program funded through the Monroe County Home Investment Partnerships has been preliminary classified as an Unlisted Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR Part 617. The State Environmental Review Quality Review Act regulations found at 6 NYCRR Part 617 requires that no agency shall carry out or approve an Action until it has complied with the requirements of SEQRA.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Determine that the Acquisition Rehab Resale Program is an Unlisted Action.
- 2. Make a determination of significance regarding the Acquisition Rehab Resale Program pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.7.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to take such actions to comply with the requirements of the State Environmental Quality Review Act, including without limitation, the execution of documents and the filing, distribution and publication of the documents required under the State Environmental Quality Review Act, and any other actions to implement the intent of this resolution.

This determination will have no impact on the revenues or expenditures of the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body determine whether the Town of Brighton Crittenden Road Sidewalk Project funded through the Monroe County Community Development Block Grant ("CDBG") Program may have a significant adverse impact on the environment pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA").

The Town of Brighton is proposing to install 1700 linear feet of concrete sidewalk within the right of way of Crittenden Road on the south side of the road from the corner of West Henrietta Road & Crittenden Road eastward approximately 1700 linear feet to East Squire Drive. These sidewalks will connect to the existing network of sidewalks that service Rustic Village Apartment Complex and surrounding businesses. The proposed sidewalks will improve overall safety for those who walk along Crittenden Road.

This project will not impact existing wetlands, or historical, cultural, or natural resources, nor will it alter the existing community character. The proposed action is consistent with existing land use and will increase the safety of nearby residents.

The Town of Brighton Crittenden Road Sidewalk Project funded through the Monroe County CDBG Program has been preliminarily classified as an Unlisted Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617(b). Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body approve Monroe County's 2025-2029 Five Year Strategic Plan and 2025 Annual Action Plan for Housing and Community Development in Suburban Monroe County and Grant Submission to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development ("HUD") for the Community Development Block Grant ("CDBG"), Home Investment Partnerships Program ("HOME"), and Emergency Solutions Grants ("ESG") programs.

Approval of this submission by HUD will provide the County with funding in the amount of \$3,034,996 for the period of August 1, 2025 to July 31, 2026. This represents the combined total of funds for the CDBG Program in the amount of \$1,755,420; the HOME Program in the amount of \$1,118,591; and the ESG Program in the amount of \$160,985. This year's allocations represent a \$24,605 decrease in funding received from HUD last year. This is the 50th year the County will receive this funding.

The CDBG, HOME and ESG programs have been designed to carry out neighborhood projects, Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) improvements to public facilities, community services, economic development activities, housing activities, and homeless services. Pursuant to HUD regulations, these programs must principally benefit low to moderate-income persons, the elderly, and persons with special needs who live in the towns and villages that participate in the Monroe County Community Development Consortium.

Members of the Consortium and community services agencies apply to the County to receive grants for projects, which are listed in the 2025 Annual Action Plan.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to submit the 2025-2029 Five Year Strategic Plan and 2025 Annual Action Plan for Housing and Community Development in Suburban Monroe County and Grant Submission to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development for the Community Development Block Grant, Home Investment Partnerships Program, and Emergency Solutions Grants programs.
- 2. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept the grant funds in the amount of \$3,034,996 or such other amount as determined by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), subject to HUD approval of the submission.

- 3. Appropriate the sum of \$3,034,996 for grant funds, or such other amount as determined by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), and the sum of \$372,053, which is the estimated Program Income expected to be generated during the program year, into fund 9005; funds center 1501010000, Community Development Grants, contingent on HUD approval.
- 4. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute all contracts, including intermunicipal agreements, and any amendments thereto, that are necessary to carry out the administration of the Community Development Block Grant, Home Investment Partnerships Program and Emergency Solutions Grants programs.
- 5. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute all agreements, debt instruments, and other documents for each loan, grant, relending project or activity which may be approved under the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Section 108 Loan Guarantee Assistance program, pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, and to accept, receive and reappropriate funds which are borrowed from HUD or any other party, and relend the same to qualified borrowers.
- 6. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to approve the use of contingency funds or funds reprogrammed from current or prior years pursuant to the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development regulations.
- 7. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept, receive and appropriate or reappropriate any funds which accrue to the Community Development Office in the form of program income for use in connection with programs offered or funded by the Community Development Office, which administers the grants. All such income shall be utilized in accordance with the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development regulations governing the use of program income.
- 8. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.
- 9. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify such program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law, and when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

The legislative action requested in connection with the 2025-2029 Five Year Strategic Plan is not an "Action," as that term is defined in 6 NYCRR § 617.2(b), and is not subject to review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act. The 2025 Annual Action Plan includes Type II actions pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(1) ("maintenance or repair involving no substantial changes in an existing structure or facility"); (2) ("replacement, rehabilitation or reconstruction of a structure or facility, in kind, on the same site, including upgrading buildings to meet building, energy, or fire codes unless such action meets or exceeds any of the thresholds in section 617.4 of this Part"); (5) ("repaving of existing highways not involving the addition of new travel lanes"); (6) "(street openings and right-of-way openings for the purpose of repair or maintenance of existing utility facilities"); (13) ("extension of utility distribution facilities, including gas, electric, telephone, cable, water and sewer connections to render service in approved subdivisions or in connection with any action on this list"); (26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment); and (31) ("purchase or sale of furnishings, equipment or supplies, including surplus government property, other than the following: land, radioactive material, pesticides, herbicides, or other hazardous materials") that are not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Monroe County will serve as Lead Agency for the following five (5) actions, titled: Town of Brighton's Crittenden Road Sidewalk project, Balinsky Gardens, Midvale Commons, First Time Home Buyers Program, Rochester Housing Development Fund Corporation and the Acquisition Rehab and Resale Program, which have all been preliminarily classified as Unlisted Actions. The provisions of the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act shall be complied with prior to Your Honorable Body undertaking, funding, or approving these projects.

This grant is funded by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.

- Section 4. The County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to execute all contracts, including intermunicipal agreements, and any amendments thereto, that are necessary to carry out the administration of the Community Development Block Grant, Home Investment Partnerships Program and Emergency Solutions Grants programs.
- Section 5. The County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to execute all agreements, debt instruments, and other documents for each loan, grant, relending project or activity which may be approved under the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Section 108 Loan Guarantee Assistance program, pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, and to accept, receive and reappropriate funds which are borrowed from HUD or any other party, and relend the same to qualified borrowers.
- Section 6. The County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to approve the use of contingency funds or funds reprogrammed from current or prior years pursuant to the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development regulations.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from Health Research, Inc. in the amount of \$491,274 for the Expanded Partner Services Initiative for the period of April 1, 2025 through March 31, 2026.

The purpose of this grant is to conduct activities necessary to follow up on reports of persons living with a diagnosis of HIV infection within Monroe County and thought to be out-of-care. This funding will support the investigation of out-of-care patients; link patients to medical care and other non-medical services, as identified; elicit, notify, and test partners of their potential exposure to HIV; engage patients and named partners in risk-reduction conversations; provide supplies to prevent the spread of the disease; collect and/or verify identifying and demographic information related to HIV; and complete partner services field investigations. Funds will be used to provide partial salaries and benefits of existing staff, supplies and other costs to run the program. This will be the thirteenth year the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents the same amount as last year.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 234 of 2023, as amended by Resolution 188 of 2024, to amend and increase the contract with Ontario Bus Inc. for bus transportation services for the Monroe County Early Intervention and Preschool Special Education Programs from an amount not to exceed \$15,800,000 to an amount not to exceed \$19,000,000 for the second year (July 1, 2024 through June 30, 2025) and third year (July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2026) of the contract, and appropriate assigned fund balance.

This contract will provide New York State-mandated transportation services to children within Monroe County who are receiving services through our Early Intervention and Preschool Special Education Programs. Children within these programs receive a variety of services, including but not limited to speech therapy, occupational therapy, and physical therapy, which often require transportation to and from the child's home. Ontario Bus Inc. has a history of successfully providing such services to this specialized population.

The Early Intervention Program has increased group capacity by an additional eighteen children, requiring the addition of four bus routes. The Preschool Special Education Program has increased classroom capacity by an additional seventy-two children, requiring an additional nineteen bus routes. The rates charged by Ontario Bus Inc. have not increased.

The specific legislative actions required are:

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a Safe Streets and Roads for All grant from the United States Department of Transportation's Federal Highway Administration in the amount of \$955,476 for the Monroe County Active Transportation Safety Project for the period of August 1, 2025 through December 31, 2027.

The awarded grant is a collaborative effort among the county departments of Transportation, Public Safety, and Planning and Development. I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 329 of 2023 to accept additional grant funding from the Dormitory Authority of the State of New York ("DASNY") in the amount of \$100,000; amend the 2025 Capital Budget to increase funding for the project entitled "Construction of a 9/11 First Responders Memorial at Highland Park" by \$100,000 for a total project authorization of \$350,000; and amend Bond Resolution 330 of 2023 to increase financing for the project by \$100,000, from \$250,000 to \$350,000.

These additional grant funds would bring the total grant allocation for this project to \$350,000.

The proposed 9/11 First Responders Memorial will be located in Beikirch Park, the park formerly known as "Highland Park South," that is currently home to the War on Terror and Vietnam Veterans Memorials, among others. The concept for the proposed memorial includes two (2) eleven-foot-tall granite towers and one (1) 9-foot-tall brick structure surrounded by walkways, lighting, plaques, flagpoles, benches and landscaping. The total project cost is estimated to be \$350,000. The County was originally awarded a grant of \$250,000 for this project from DASNY, which is now being modified to \$350,000. The DASNY grant is sponsored by State Assemblymember Harry B. Bronson.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend Resolution 329 of 2023 to accept an additional \$100,000 from, and to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract, and any amendments thereto with, the Dormitory Authority of the State of New York for the project entitled "Construction of a 9/11 First Responders Memorial at Highland Park," bringing the total award to \$350,000.
- 2. Amend the 2025 Capital Budget to increase funding for the project entitled "Construction of a 9/11 First Responders Memorial at Highland Park" by \$100,000, from \$250,000 to \$350,000, for a total project authorization of \$350,000.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$350,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, NEW YORK, TO FINANCE THE COST OF THE CONSTRUCTION OF A 9/11 FIRST RESPONDERS MEMORIAL AT HIGHLAND PARK, IN AND FOR SAID COUNTY, AT AN ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST OF \$350,000 AND SUPERSEDING THE BOND RESOLUTION ADOPTED ON NOVEMBER 14, 2023 (RESOLUTION NO. 330 OF 2023)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE AFFIRMATIVE VOTE OF **NOT LESS THAN TWO-THIRDS OF THE TOTAL VOTING STRENGTH** OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. For the object or purpose of financing the cost of the construction of a 9/11 First Responders Memorial at Highland, in and for the County of Monroe, New York (the "County"), there are hereby authorized to be issued \$350,000 bonds of the County, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The duly adopted current Capital Budget of the County, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is hereby amended to provide for the appropriation of an additional \$100,000 to pay the cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose (\$250,000 having been heretofore appropriated from one or more Capital Budgets). The period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is fifteen (15) years, pursuant to subdivision 19(c) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost thereof is \$350,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$350,000 bonds of said County herein authorized, provided, however, that to the extent any state and/or federal aid and/or grant and/or gift is received for the aforesaid purpose, the County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to accept and shall use such funds to redeem any outstanding indebtedness incurred for such purpose or apply it, dollar for dollar, to reduce the amount of bonds to be issued for such purpose.

Section 3. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, the chief fiscal officer of the County under the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may sell such bonds or notes at public or private sale, at a discount or premium, at fixed or variable rates of interest or at no interest whatsoever, or as capital appreciation bonds, and with such amortization of principal as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine is most favorable to the County, and in compliance with any rules of the State Comptroller applicable thereto. Such bonds or notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, consistent with the provisions of the Local

Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may, in the event it is determined to issue variable rate bonds or notes, enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance, sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds or notes, as authorized under Section 54.90 of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer is also authorized to enter into such agreements and take such other action as may be necessary or appropriate and lawful to assure that, to the extent possible, (i) interest on the bonds and notes authorized hereby will not be includable in the gross income, for federal income tax purposes, of the recipients thereof, and (ii) to enable the purchaser thereof to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12. The Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer is hereby further delegated all powers of this County Legislature with respect to agreements for credit enhancement, derived from and pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, for such bonds or notes, including, but not limited to the determination of the provider of such credit enhancement facility or facilities and the terms and contents of any agreement or agreements related thereto.

Section 5. All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds or notes, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds or notes, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds or notes, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds or notes, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds or notes (and if said bonds or notes are to be executed in the name of the County by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the County), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds or notes, or may contract on behalf of the County for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds or notes shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals, in addition to those required by Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes, as authorized by this resolution, may be contested only if:

- 1) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or
- 3) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This resolution shall supersede Resolution No. 330 of 2023, being a bond resolution dated November 14, 2023, except to the extent that any indebtedness shall have been contracted or encumbrances made thereunder. The purpose of this superseding bond resolution is to effect the following: to increase the maximum estimated cost of the purpose to \$350,000, and to provide \$350,000 bonds therefor, an increase of \$100,000 over the \$250,000 bonds authorized under Resolution No. 330 of 2023.

Section 8. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the objects or purposes described herein.

Dwyer Veteran Peer-to-Peer Support Program

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Office of Mental Health in an amount not to exceed \$197,864 for the PFC Dwyer Veteran Peer-to-Peer Support Program for the period of January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025.

The purpose of this grant is to support the design, implementation, and evaluation of peer-to-peer programs for veterans who are experiencing post-traumatic stress symptoms. The goals of the program are to provide outreach and education regarding available peer-to-peer counseling. It should also encourage family, friends and community connectedness as well as provide access to suicide prevention/intervention measures. This is the eleventh year the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents an increase of \$5,464 from last year.

This grant funds our efforts in support of veterans including the contract for the Compeer, Inc. for the Compeer Corps Peer Mentoring program. Compeer, Inc. provides an array of services, including one-on-one peer mentoring, group sessions facilitated by peer mentors and licensed therapists as consultants; and enhancement of social networking capabilities, virtual meeting spaces and other technological tools designed to help veterans connect with one another remotely.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a grant in an amount not to exceed \$197,864, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto, with the New York State Office of Mental Health for the PFC Dwyer Veteran Peer-to-Peer Support Program for the period of January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025.
- 2. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the Veterans Service Agency by appropriating the sum of \$5,464 into general fund 9001, funds center 7401020000, Dwyer Peer to Peer Support.

- 3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to re-appropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.
- 4. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to modify or terminate the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This is a Type II action pursuant to 6 NYCRR Section 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management not including new programs and major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Partial funding for this grant is included in the 2025 operating budget of the Veterans Service Agency, general fund 9001, funds center 7401020000, Dwyer Peer to Peer Support. The appropriated amount will adjust the current funding to that established by the grant.

This grant is 100% funded by the New York State Office of Mental Health. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize contracts with the agencies listed in Attachment A in a total amount not to exceed \$200,000 for 2025 Community Festivals for the period of January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025.

This is the third year Monroe County has offered Community Festival Support. In total, forty-three (43) festivals will be funded at an amount not to exceed \$461,000, of which four (4) festivals were selected to receive support exceeding \$20,000.

The festivals were selected through a competitive application process. Festivals were required to apply for funding under one or more of the following four (4) categories pursuant to County Law § 224: (1) Events or festivals related to armistice, memorial, or other recognized national patriotic observance; (2) Events or festivals that commemorate historical events of county-wide interest and concern; (3) Events or festivals that provide for the maintenance and operation of a professional symphony or philharmonic orchestra, musical festival, or vocal, dance, drama, or performing arts troupe, group, or activity of any kind or nature; and/or (4) Events or festivals that publicize the advantages of the county. Additional requirements were also established related to event date, location, size, and cost.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute contracts, and any amendments thereto, with each approved agency as listed in Attachment A for community festival support in a total amount not to exceed \$200,000 for the period of January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2025-2030 Capital Improvement Program to advance the "Ontario Beach Park – Master Plan Improvements" project from 2026 to 2025; amend the 2025 capital budget to add a project entitled "Ontario Beach Park – Master Plan Improvements" in the amount of \$200,000; and authorize financing.

While the "Ontario Beach Park – Master Plan Improvements" project contemplates an array of improvements, this proposal seeks an authorization of \$200,000 to accelerate the design and installation of entry and exit gates at the Monroe County-controlled parking lots at Ontario Beach Park.

The Rochester Police Department and Monroe County Sheriff's Office have been in consultation with the Monroe County Parks Department and Department of Environmental Services regarding maintaining a safe environment for park patrons and staff at Ontario Beach Park. They have expressed that establishing additional control over when vehicles can arrive at the park is a top priority. Recent security concerns at Ontario Beach Park have prompted the desire to accelerate this component of the project from 2026 to 2025.

These gates will be installed at all points of entry and exit from the Monroe County-operated lots at Ontario Beach Park, and will be opened and closed each day when the park itself opens and closes. Three will be manual gates, which will be opened and closed by Parks staff. The fourth will be an automatic gate that will allow the electronic detection of vehicles wishing to exit the lot at all times, to prevent vehicles from becoming unable to depart after hours. Signage will clearly direct vehicles wishing to exit the lot after gate closing time to the automatic gate.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend the 2025-2030 Capital Improvement Program to advance the "Ontario Beach Park Master Plan Improvements" project from 2026 to 2025 in the amount of \$200,000.
- 2. Amend the 2025 Capital Budget to add the project entitled "Ontario Beach Park Master Plan Improvements" in the amount of \$200,000.
- 3. Authorize financing for the "Ontario Beach Park Master Plan Improvements" project in the amount of \$200,000.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$200,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, NEW YORK, TO FINANCE THE COST OF THE ONTARIO BEACH PARK - MASTER PLAN IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT, IN AND FOR SAID COUNTY, AT AN ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST OF \$200,000

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE AFFIRMATIVE VOTE OF **NOT LESS THAN TWO-THIRDS OF THE TOTAL VOTING STRENGTH** OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. For the object or purpose of financing the cost of the Ontario Beach Park - Master Plan Improvements Project, in and for the County of Monroe, New York (the "County"), consisting of entry and exit gates, there are hereby authorized to be issued \$200,000 bonds of the County, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The duly adopted current Capital Budget of the County, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is hereby amended to provide for the appropriation of the amount hereby authorized to pay the cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose. The period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is fifteen (15) years, pursuant to subdivision 19(c) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost thereof is \$200,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$200,000 bonds of said County herein authorized; provided, however, that to the extent any state and/or federal aid and/or grant and/or gift is received for the aforesaid purpose, the County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to accept and shall use such funds to redeem any outstanding indebtedness incurred for such purpose or apply it, dollar for dollar, to reduce the amount of bonds to be issued for such purpose.

Section 3. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, the chief fiscal officer of the County under the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may sell such bonds or notes at public or private sale, at a discount or premium, at fixed or variable rates of interest or at no interest whatsoever, or as capital appreciation bonds, and with such amortization of principal as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine is most favorable to the County, and in compliance with any rules of the State Comptroller applicable thereto. Such bonds or notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may, in the event it is determined to issue

variable rate bonds or notes, enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance, sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds or notes, as authorized under Section 54.90 of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer is also authorized to enter into such agreements and take such other action as may be necessary or appropriate and lawful to assure that, to the extent possible, (i) interest on the bonds and notes authorized hereby will not be includable in the gross income, for federal income tax purposes, of the recipients thereof, and (ii) to enable the purchaser thereof to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12. The Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer is hereby further delegated all powers of this County Legislature with respect to agreements for credit enhancement, derived from and pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, for such bonds or notes, including, but not limited to the determination of the provider of such credit enhancement facility or facilities and the terms and contents of any agreement or agreements related thereto.

Section 5. All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds or notes, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds or notes, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds or notes, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds or notes, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds or notes (and if said bonds or notes are to be executed in the name of the County by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the County), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds or notes, or may contract on behalf of the County for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds or notes shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals, in addition to those required by Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes, as authorized by this resolution, may be contested only if:

- such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or
- 3) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2025-2030 Capital Improvement Program to advance the "Ontario Beach Park – Master Plan Improvements" project from 2026 to 2025; amend the 2025 capital budget to add a project entitled "Ontario Beach Park – Master Plan Improvements" in the amount of \$200,000; and authorize financing.

While the "Ontario Beach Park – Master Plan Improvements" project contemplates an array of improvements, this proposal seeks an authorization of \$200,000 to accelerate the design and installation of entry and exit gates at the Monroe County-controlled parking lots at Ontario Beach Park.

The Rochester Police Department and Monroe County Sheriff's Office have been in consultation with the Monroe County Parks Department and Department of Environmental Services regarding maintaining a safe environment for park patrons and staff at Ontario Beach Park. They have expressed that establishing additional control over when vehicles can arrive at the park is a top priority. Recent security concerns at Ontario Beach Park have prompted the desire to accelerate this component of the project from 2026 to 2025.

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The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend the 2025-2030 Capital Improvement Program to advance the "Ontario Beach Park Master Plan Improvements" project from 2026 to 2025 in the amount of \$200,000.
- 2. Amend the 2025 Capital Budget to add the project entitled "Ontario Beach Park Master Plan Improvements" in the amount of \$200,000.
- 3. Authorize financing for the "Ontario Beach Park Master Plan Improvements" project in the amount of \$200,000.

This is a Type II action pursuant to 6 NYCCR 617.5(c)(22) ("installation of traffic control devices on existing streets, roads and highways") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for this project, consistent with authorized uses, will be available in the capital fund to be created, and any other capital fund(s) created for the same intended purpose once the financing authorization requested herein is approved. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that this matter receive favorable action by Your Honorable Body.
