RE: Memorializing the United States Congress to Pass the Mental Health Emergency Responder Act

Honorable Legislators:

The need to improve behavioral health crisis response systems in the United States has never been clearer. Traditional reliance on law enforcement to address mental health emergencies often leads to unnecessary outcomes. Furthermore, asking law enforcement to take on these additional duties only places an unfair burden on them, when their main priority should be elsewhere. Communities across the nation are calling for more effective and specialized interventions to prioritize the health and safety of individuals in crisis.

H.R. 5706, the Mental Health Emergency Responder Act, would establish a federal grant program to support eligible entities, including local governments, community health organizations, and emergency services, in developing or expanding behavioral health crisis response teams which do not rely primarily on law enforcement. These clinician-led mobile teams and co-responder models would integrate behavioral health professionals directly into emergency response, ensuring people in crisis receive timely and appropriate care.

In response to the local death of Daniel Prude and national outcry during the Black Lives Matter movement in 2020, Monroe County and the City of Rochester have made important efforts to strengthen their behavioral health crisis response systems. These include the integration of the 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline, the development of co-response models, and the creation of specialized mobile crisis units such as the Monroe County Forensic Intervention Team and the City's Person in Crisis Team. These programs provide critical services like inperson crisis intervention, de-escalation, and follow-up care, often in partnership with law enforcement or community organizations. However, despite these promising steps, progress remains uneven, and existing resources are stretched thin, particularly as demand for crisis services continues to grow.

Monroe County is not alone in facing these challenges, but our community would certainly benefit from this legislation. Our region includes both urban and rural populations, with diverse needs and service gaps. As local leaders, health advocates, and public safety professionals call

for smarter crisis response models, this bill offers a powerful tool to help us move from reaction to prevention, from criminalization to care.

We strongly urge Congress to pass the Mental Health Emergency Responder Act and encourage the President to sign it into law. This legislation will help create a national standard for specialized crisis response and ensure communities like ours have the resources to meet mental health emergencies with care, urgency, and respect.

Honorable Legislators:

Access to nutritious, filling meals during the school day is not a luxury, it is a necessity for children to learn, grow, and thrive. Yet here in Monroe County, too many of our students face hunger, and our school meal programs are underfunded and overburdened.

With more than 13% of Monroe County residents living below the poverty line, the need for reliable, nutritious school meals is urgent. For many students across the County, school-provided breakfasts and lunches are their primary source of daily nourishment. However, current federal reimbursement rates for school meals have not kept pace with rising food costs, labor expenses, or inflation. As a result, schools are often forced to stretch their limited food service budgets, leading to meals which may fall short in quality, nutrition, or portion size.

This funding gap has a measurable impact. In districts such as the Rochester City School District, which serves a high concentration of low-income students, academic performance and health outcomes are already compromised by systemic inequities. Hunger only deepens these disparities, making it harder for students to focus, participate, and perform in the classroom.

H.R. 5753, the Healthy Meals Help Kids Learn Act of 2025, would increase federal reimbursement rates for school breakfasts and lunches under the Richard B. Russell National School Lunch Act and the Child Nutrition Act of 1966, providing an additional 45 cents per lunch and 28 cents per breakfast beginning November 1, 2025, with adjustments indexed to inflation moving forward.

Schools shouldn't have to choose between affordability and nutrition. This funding boost would enable local districts to purchase higher-quality ingredients, expand menu variety, and better accommodate the dietary needs of all students. With these resources, schools could invest in infrastructure, kitchen upgrades, and staff training, thus, strengthening their ability to serve fresh, nutritious meals every day. Moreover, by making it easier to source local products,

No child in Monroe County, or anywhere in our nation, should go through their school day hungry or distracted by an empty stomach. The Healthy Meals Help Kids Learn Act is a commonsense, compassionate policy which addresses hunger, supports education, and strengthens our local food system.

We urge Congress and President Trump to support and pass H.R. 5753. Let's ensure every child has access to the nutritious meals needed to succeed in school and life.

Honorable Legislators:

Emergency medical services are a cornerstone of public safety in communities across New York. Every day, EMS providers respond to calls that make the difference between life and death. Yet today, these dedicated men and women face mounting challenges that threaten the reliability of emergency response in every corner of the state. Rising operational costs, unfunded state mandates, inadequate reimbursement rates, and persistent staffing shortages have stretched local departments to their limits. Many volunteer EMS organizations, the backbone of small-town emergency response, cannot directly bill insurance providers, leaving municipalities and taxpayers to shoulder growing financial burdens. The result has been slower response times, the closure of long-standing volunteer agencies, and an alarming strain on the system that protects our residents.

Senate Bill S.1515 and Assembly Bill A.2177-A take an important step toward restoring local control and financial stability by exempting emergency medical services expenditures from the state's property tax cap. This reform recognizes that EMS is not a discretionary expense but an essential public service that must be funded responsibly. By removing this state-imposed restriction, counties, towns, and villages will have the flexibility to invest in personnel, vehicles, and equipment without sacrificing other critical services or breaking local budgets. This commonsense measure puts decision-making back in the hands of local leaders who understand their community's needs best.

In tandem, Senate Bill S.7501-A and Assembly Bill A.8086 strengthen accountability and long-term planning by requiring each county, working with its regional EMS council and local municipalities, to develop a comprehensive plan for EMS delivery. These plans will identify gaps in coverage, improve coordination among responders, and help ensure that every community, urban and rural alike, has access to timely and professional emergency care. By encouraging coordination rather than costly one-size-fits-all mandates from Albany, this legislation empowers local governments to design systems that work for them.

Together, these two bills reflect a balanced, practical approach to addressing the state's EMS crisis. S.1515/A.2177-A provides immediate fiscal relief and flexibility to sustain existing operations, while S.7501-A/A.8086 lays the groundwork for long-term system strength and efficiency. Both measures passed the State Legislature with strong bipartisan support and earned the endorsement of NYSAC, NYCOM, emergency service organizations, and public health advocates. Prompt enactment will allow counties and municipalities to prepare responsibly for Fiscal Year 2026 budgets and begin the coordinated planning needed to stabilize and strengthen New York's emergency response infrastructure.

Therefore, we urge you to join us in calling upon Governor Kathy Hochul to sign Bills S.1515/A.2177-A and S.7501-A/A.8086. This legislation is a vital step toward protecting taxpayers, supporting first responders, and ensuring that every New Yorker, no matter where they live, can depend on timely and effective emergency medical care. Together, these measures reaffirm our commitment to public safety, fiscal responsibility, and the principle that local governments, not Albany, know best how to protect their communities.

Honorable Legislators:

Under Governor Kathy Hochul's aggressive green energy mandates, New York's energy prices have soared to among the highest in the nation. Driven by Albany's overly ambitious and unrealistic climate initiatives, New Yorkers now pay an average of 22.9 cents per kilowatt-hour compared to the national average of 16.3 cents, and costs continue to climb.

The state's Clean Energy Standard requires that 70 percent of electricity come from renewable sources by 2030 and that all power be generated from "zero-emissions" resources by 2040. While well intentioned, this rapid transition has placed tremendous strain on the power grid. As fossil fuels are phased out, energy supply tightens while demand continues to rise. Experts predict that thousands of additional megawatts will be needed statewide by 2035, further stretching New York's already burdened energy infrastructure.

Existing facilities cannot support the scale or pace of Albany's mandates, and billions in new construction will be required to meet these goals. Estimates suggest that a "renewables-only" energy strategy by 2050 could cost taxpayers as much as \$549.9 billion. Even Governor Hochul has acknowledged that the state's current approach will impose a heavy financial burden on families and businesses across New York.

Now, the Governor's "All-Electric Buildings Act," set to take effect January 1, would ban natural gas hookups and other fossil fuel sources in newly constructed buildings. The first phase of this ban targets single-family homes and buildings under seven stories, with larger developments to follow. These all-electric buildings are expected to be significantly more expensive to construct than their gas-powered counterparts. According to the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority, annual energy bills for single-family homes that transition to full electrification could rise by \$450 to \$700. Beyond higher energy costs, this policy risks slowing housing development at a time when the state already faces an acute housing shortage. The Executive Director of the New York State Builders Association has warned that

thousands of projects could be delayed because of this electrification mandate, emphasizing that such a rule, implemented without a reliable grid or supply chain, will only worsen the crisis.

Furthermore, the environmental impact of these mandates would be negligible. Research indicates that the reduction in greenhouse gas emissions from New York's energy transition would total roughly 1.8 billion metric tons between 2024 and 2050, compared to the 35 billion metric tons emitted globally each year, a staggering cost for a minimal environmental return.

These irrational, costly, and overreaching policies that restrict New Yorkers from choosing the energy sources that best meet their needs must be stopped. The Energy Choice Act seeks to do exactly that. This legislation would prohibit state and local governments from banning energy connections, reconnections, modifications, installations, or expansions based on the type or source of energy being delivered, directly opposing Governor Hochul's misguided All-Electric Buildings Act.

By enacting the Energy Choice Act, the right to choose affordable, reliable energy would remain with consumers, protecting energy freedom, encouraging competition, and ensuring a more diversified and resilient energy portfolio for New York and the nation. It would also help keep housing affordable and infrastructure costs manageable as energy demand continues to grow.

Please join me in calling upon the United States Congress to pass and President Donald J. Trump to sign the Energy Choice Act in order to bring energy prices under control and return energy autonomy to the American people.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a contract with Fluent Consulting Corporation ("Fluent") for the provision of energy aggregation group management services for Monroe County ("the County") for the period of January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2026, with the option to renew for two (2) additional one-year periods. The cost to the County will be \$0.00065 per kilowatt-hour (kWh) of electricity and \$0.075 per decatherm (Dth) of natural gas.

Since 2001, the County has been authorized by the New York State Public Service Commission to operate as a municipal Direct Customer of the New York State Independent System Operators, Inc., which allows the County to procure natural gas and electricity for itself and members of a municipal energy aggregation group that currently includes sixteen (16) towns and villages, two (2) school districts, two (2) fire districts, the Monroe County Water Authority and the Rochester Genesee Regional Transit Authority. In 2025, Monroe Community College elected to participate in the energy aggregation group for its Brighton and Downtown Campuses. The energy aggregation group currently has approximately 1,700 accounts, of which over 700 belong to the County.

As part of this contract, Fluent will also monitor and schedule the daily nominations related to the County's natural gas and electric accounts as well as its aggregation pools to ensure that an adequate supply of reliable electricity and natural gas is delivered at the most cost-effective rate. Fluent will also provide back office accounting and invoicing support for the County and the aggregation group, as well as utility bill and tariff analysis on behalf of the aggregation group to ensure proper billing. The rates are \$0.00075 per kilowatthour (kWh) of electricity and \$0.085 per decatherm (Dth) of natural gas. The cost to the County, based on the current energy usage and number of accounts, will be approximately \$105,000 per year.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a contract with Barton & Loguidice, D.P.C. ("B&L") in the amount of \$198,700 for professional design services for the preparation of a Local Solid Waste Management Plan for the period of January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2029.

Monroe County is the solid waste planning unit responsible for developing a Local Solid Waste Management Plan ("LSWMP") pursuant to Section 27-0107(1)(a) of New York State Environmental Conservation Law. The original Solid Waste Management Plan was completed in 1991, approved by Your Honorable Body through Resolution 198 of 1991, and approved by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation ("NYSDEC"). An updated Final Local Solid Waste Management Plan, dated July 2015, was approved by Your Honorable Body through Resolution 259 of 2015.

The purpose of the LSWMP is to provide an educational tool to identify the path to pursue for managing solid waste generated in the County during a ten (10) year planning period. The LSWMP provides policy and program direction to reduce waste generation, increase recovery and decrease disposal in an economically and environmentally-sound manner that is consistent with New York State's solid waste management policy. It recognizes that the public, elected officials, local municipalities, NYSDEC, private waste collectors, and facility owners are all stakeholders in the current and future management of solid waste. This project will update the LSWMP for the current ten (10) year planning period.

Barton & Loguidice, D.P.C. was rated as the most qualified to provide these services.



Arboretum redevelopment will focus on the pruning of the existing arboretum specimens as well as the planting of additional specimens and ground covers. enhancements to existing walkways ensuring ADA compliance and connection pathways to others memorials will also occur. Various benches, memorial plaques and other hardscaping / landscaping of existing beds will occur throughout the project site.

The project team will work in close collaboration with the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) as the existing AIDS Remembrance Garden was constructed in close proximity to the Historic Monroe County Insane Asylum Alms House and Penitentiary Cemetery. The penitentiary was operational from the mid 1800s to 1873 and the burial grounds are presumed to be from that same timeframe. The November 1984 Rochester Museum and Science Center Report will be the basis of the historical documentation of the 301 burial locations, however the project consulting team will produce all documents necessary to SHPO for their review and approval. The project will not seek to exhume or disturb any of the existing burial sites.

Classification of Action and Determination of Significance Pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act for the Proposed Northeast Quadrant Landfill Cap Improvements Project in the Town of Penfield

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body determine whether the proposed Northeast Ouadrant Landfill Cap Improvements Project ("the Action") in the Town of Penfield may have a significant adverse impact on the environment pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA").

This project involves Northeast Quadrant Landfill (NEQLF, also known as the Gloria Drive Landfill), which has been closed since the 1980's and has since experienced degradation to the capping system, causing issues with leachate outbreaks and stormwater ponding on the cap. To address these issues, Monroe County will be making improvements to the landfill capping system, landfill gas system, stormwater controls and leachate collection and conveyance. Based on the findings during the design, portions of the leachate collection and conveyance system may be upgraded with new HDPE piping to allow for more efficient collection. A Surface Emission Monitoring (SEM) scan, along with other technical methodologies, will be conducted to analyze and estimate existing landfill gas emissions as well as the effectiveness of the existing landfill gas venting system. The feasibility of a more effective solution to minimize fugitive landfill gas emissions, to be installed during the capping system installation, will be evaluated. The SEQRA regulations found at 6 NYCRR Part 617 require that no agency shall carry out or approve an Action until it has complied with the requirements of SEQRA.

The Action has been preliminarily classified as a Type I action. Notices of Intent for Monroe County to serve as Lead Agency for the purposes of undergoing a coordinated review and Part 1 of the Full Environmental Assessment Form were sent to all involved agencies on October 20, 2025.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Determine that the Action is a Type I action.
- 2. Designate Monroe County to serve as Lead Agency pursuant to a coordinated review.
- 3. Make a determination of significance regarding the Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.7.
- 4. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to take such actions to comply with the requirements of the State Environmental Quality Review Act, including without limitation, the execution of documents and the filing, distribution and publication of the documents required under the State Environmental Quality Review Act, and any other actions to implement the intent of this resolution.

This determination will have no impact on the revenues or expenditures of the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.

The proposed project involves making improvements to the Northeast Quadrant Landfill capping system, landfill gas system, stormwater controls and leachate collection and conveyance. The project will include a review of the existing landfill gas system and leachate collection and conveyance system. Based on the findings during the design, portions of the leachate collection and conveyance system may be upgraded with new HDPE piping to allow for more efficient collection. A Surface Emission Monitoring (SEM) scan, along with other technical methodologies, will be conducted to analyze and estimate existing landfill gas emissions as well as the effectiveness of the existing landfill gas venting system. The feasibility of a more effective solution to minimize fugitive landfill gas emissions, to be installed during the capping system installation, will be evaluated. The proposed project is not anticipated to result in any moderate to large impacts. The project is on county-owned land that has been improved with the Northeast Quadrant Landfill since 1975. The construction activities are anticipated to occur over the course of 18-24 months depending on the finalized design.

Impact on Noise, Odor, and Light

Given that the proposed project is associated with a closed municipal solid waste landfill, mitigative measures will be employed to limit odors, noise, and the migration of leachate or landfill gas.

Impact on Land

The proposed action involves the disturbance of previously developed land. The land is already disturbed and has been developed in the past, minimizing any potential environmental effects associated with this activity.

Impact on Human Health

Given that the proposed project is associated with a closed municipal solid waste landfill, mitigative measures will be employed to limit odors, dust, noise, and the migration of leachate or landfill gas. Local agencies and residential neighbors will be kept apprised of the proposed work throughout the project.

Impact on the Environment

This project is anticipated to include site improvements to already disturbed land and will have minimal or no impacts on geological features, water resources (surface and groundwater), flooding, air quality, plants and animals, agricultural resources, aesthetic resources, open space and recreation, critical environmental areas, transportation, energy, human health, and community plans/character.

Determination

Based on the findings of the environmental review, including the assessments of land use and human health, it has been determined that the proposed project will not result in significant adverse environmental impacts. I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Governor's Traffic Safety Committee in the amount of \$51,690 for the Comprehensive Toxicology Testing in Driving Under the Influence and Driving Under the Influence of Drugs Program for the period of October 1, 2025 through September 30, 2026.

The purpose of this grant is to improve highway safety by expanding the forensic toxicology services provided by the Office of the Medical Examiner's Forensic Toxicology Laboratory in alcohol and drugged driving impairment cases. The Toxicology Laboratory provides alcohol and comprehensive drug testing as well as expert testimony in driving impairment cases. This grant facilitates this work by providing resources necessary for the laboratory to maintain its services, to perform method development and validation as needed to expand the scope of drugged driving testing to meet current needs based on drug trends, and to analyze regional trends in drugged driving. In addition, the grant provides training funds to enhance the expertise of analysts when testifying regarding the effects of drugs on driving performance. This will be the thirteenth year the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents an increase of \$6,325 from last year.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$51,690 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Governor's Traffic Safety Committee for the Comprehensive Toxicology Testing in Driving Under the Influence and Driving Under the Influence of Drugs Program for the period of October 1, 2025 through September 30, 2026.
- 2. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Public Health, by appropriating the sum of \$5,760 into general fund 9001, funds center 5804020100, Forensic Lab/DUI.

Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.

4. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize contracts with the agencies listed in Attachment A in an amount not to exceed \$52,242,013 for the provision of mental health, developmental disability, and alcoholism and substance abuse services for Monroe County residents for the period of January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2026.

The Monroe County Office of Mental Health ("MCOMH") coordinates and manages community behavioral health services in accordance with the local Mental Hygiene Services Plan by contracting with a wide range of local, direct services agencies. Funding for 2026 represents a net increase of \$766,596 from 2025. MCOMH will have an increase in state aid associated with the New York State Office of Mental Health and Office of Addiction Services and Supports due to cost-of-living adjustments as well as increases related to supporting housing program enhancements.

Numerous Requests for Proposals were solicited for these services and the chosen vendors were selected as the most qualified to provide these services.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize intermunicipal agreements with municipalities for Rochester-Monroe County Youth Bureau Programs related to the currently approved Child and Family Services Plan in a total amount not to exceed \$184,056 for the period of October 1, 2025 through September 30, 2026. The list of municipalities, along with a description of the youth services each will provide, and the breakdown of funding to each, is in Attachment A.

The Rochester-Monroe County Youth Bureau enters into fifteen (15) intermunicipal agreements each year. New York State Office of Children and Family Services makes available recreation and youth services funds for all towns and villages via a pass through to local counties. Allocation ceilings are determined through a formula, based on the youth population of each town or village, provided by the state. The recreation and youth services programs to be provided are available to all youth that reside in the respective towns and villages. Recreational programs include a variety of athletic, social, artistic, and cultural events. Youth services programs include youth and family counseling, after-school programs, leadership development, and employment readiness workshops. This year's funding represents no change from last year's funding.

Programs will be evaluated consistently and continually through three methods utilized by the Youth Bureau, documented in its Monitoring and Evaluation Systems Procedures Manual. These methods include: 1) self-report, requiring agency submission of three (3) different self-report instruments; 2) yearly outcome evaluation assessment of contract outcomes; and 3) expenditure review. These contracts will allow for the provision of a comprehensive range of youth services and programs by the municipalities specified in Attachment A.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute intermunicipal agreements, and any amendments thereto, with each municipality listed in Attachment A for Rochester-Monroe County Youth Bureau Programs related to the currently approved Child and Family Services Plan in a total amount not to exceed \$184,056 for the period of October 1, 2025 through September 30, 2026.
- Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute any applications, contracts, agreements
 and any amendments thereto, with New York State and/or the municipalities listed in Attachment A to
 increase or decrease the agreement amount and to extend the length of the agreement(s) in order to
 maximize state reimbursements for these purposes.

MUNICIPALITIES CONTRACTS 2026

1. Town of Brighton \$7,085

This program works with teens in the community to develop and implement the Brighton asset building initiative. A Youth Board will work throughout the community in promoting awareness, support and opportunities for asset building in Brighton. The Youth Board, under the direction of the recreation supervisor, will work closely with Brighton Asset Network in developing and achieving this initiative.

2. Town of Chili \$6,118

This program is designed to promote the constructive use of leisure time to address youth problems in our community. Opportunities for youth, ages 10-19, to participate in leisure and social activities are provided throughout the year.

3. Village of East Rochester \$1,409

The East Rochester Youth Activity Center provides a venue at which the community youth in grades 6-12, can gather in a safe supervised environment, to socialize with their peers, enjoy games, recreational activities, use of computer services and access to tutoring and community special events, activities, homework assistance, tutoring, and education presentations. Youth are provided opportunities to become involved in community service projects and leadership development through the East Rochester Youth Activity Center. .

4. Town of Greece \$38,345

The youth volunteer program utilizes roughly 75-125 students regularly throughout the calendar year for special events, programs and activities. These opportunities give the youth. Experience in 'real working' conditions while serving the public through recreational opportunities. Youth have the same expectations as employees; to show up on time, sign in, dress appropriately, and provide excellent service while performing necessary actions to deliver the leisure service or program that day.

5. Town of Hamlin \$2,101

To serve youth from ages 18 months to 16 years on how to get along and work with others of all ages through play group, playground and youth groups. These programs offer social, education, leisure and community service opportunities.

6. Town of Henrietta \$23,413

The Henrietta Youth Bureau is the leading agency for Henrietta Youth services and Recreation for all youth and families. It also provides targeted services to youth ages 0-21 who attend the Rush Henrietta schools which may include parts of West Brighton, Rush and Pittsford. Services include individual, group and crisis counseling. Programs for all youth, including "high risk" populations are targeted.

7. Town of Irondequoit \$9,689

The drop in playground program is designed to offer leisure time activities for youth ages 5-15 during non-school hours, summer vacation. The program will operate for six weeks, July and August, at three schools in the Town of Irondequoit. Hours of operation are Monday through Friday 9am-3:00 pm. Youth may participate daily, Activities include arts/crafts, sports, board games, swimming, music and field trips. The playground program is free to town youth. Our other community programs such as day camps and sports camps are fee based. As for youth voice, a weekly calendar of activities is developed with youth input.

8. Town of Hilton-Parma \$3,458

The program will provide year-round recreational activities, both active and passive, for school age youth including: individual sports, team sports, instructional programs and open drop-in type programs.

9. Town of Penfield \$7,550

The Penfield Recreation Department will provide a creative and constructive program of leisure time activities and asset building opportunities to aid in the positive mental and physical development of the town's youth population.

10. Town of Perinton \$8,909

A comprehensive youth services program offered to youth 20 and under that are residents of Perinton. Programs require a registration form or sign-in, depending on the activity, and include youth-adult partnership opportunities; adventure based programming, social competency development groups and recreation opportunities.

11. Town of Pittsford \$7,309

Pittsford Youth Services, Inc. is a private, not-for-profit agency, providing crisis intervention, counseling, prevention programming, information and referral services to Pittsford youth and families. Examples of concerns youth bring to the agency include drug and alcohol abuse, school problems, depression/suicide, and family and peer relationships. This program also provides crisis intervention, counseling, prevention programming, information and referral services to Pittsford youth and families. Such services include drug and alcohol abuse, school problems, depression/suicide, and family and peer relationships. This is a joint program with the Village of Pittsford.

12. Town of Riga \$784

Provide a year round recreation program to youth, ages up to 20, in the Riga area. Athletics, aquatics, art and special event programs will be offered. Participants will meet new people, experience new activities and enjoy constructive use of leisure time.

13. Town of Sweden \$5,591

This is a joint program with the Town of Sweden, Town of Clarkson and Village of Brockport. The program provides a variety of recreational events for youth and their families to give youth a sense of community and to build and enhance developmental assets.

14. Town of Webster \$7,994

To provide after-school activities that promotes health lifestyles. These programs include development of recreational, problem-solving and social skills. Leadership development is also offered through a youth volunteer program.

15. City of Rochester \$54,301

The Youth Bureau grant funding is currently used to support staff costs for several Recreation programs including, but not limited to: Recreation athletic leagues: Funding is used to fund "Refs on the Move" staff. These staff act as referees and assist with transportation of youth sports team for Recreation-managed softball, flag football, and basketball leagues. Referees are trained in sportsmanship best practices as well as other safety and youth development practices (ex. First Aid and CPR). These leagues primarily serve both male and female youth ages 16 and under, includes participants from the majority of the R-Centers, and are often a youth's first or early experience with athletics prior to participation on a more competitive school teams.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a contract with the University of Rochester Medical Center ("University") in an amount not to exceed \$3,150,000 to provide medical services for Monroe Community Hospital ("MCH"), including specialized Ventilator, Pediatric, Urology, and Dermatology services for the period of January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2026, with the option to renew for four (4) additional one-year terms at a rate of increase not to exceed 3.00% per year.

This will be the 61st year that MCH and the University have maintained an affiliation agreement for physician services for patients of MCH. The provision for medical services to be provided to MCH through an affiliation is permitted pursuant to Section C6-17(B)(5) of the Monroe County Charter. Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a term services contract with EFPR Group, CPAs, PLLC in an amount not to exceed \$60,000 for professional auditing services relating to the Department of Transportation consultant agreements for the period of January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2028.

The Federal Highway Administration ("FHWA") and the New York State Department of Transportation ("NYSDOT") provide federal and state assistance to localities to reconstruct, rehabilitate, and maintain bridges, roads and related transportation infrastructure. The County contracts with consultants who are engaged to provide professional services related to preliminary engineering design, final design, and construction inspection and supervision. Major funding for those capital projects comes from one FHWA program in which the State shares a portion of the non-federal cost (Marchiselli Aid), and from other related FHWA programs. NYSDOT and FHWA administrative procedures require the County to obtain close-out audits for consultant agreements that exceed a certain dollar threshold (currently \$300,000).

These close-out audits are to be performed by an independent Certified Public Accounting firm in accordance with Governmental Auditing Standards. The audits will be performed on an asneeded basis as projects that meet the required dollar threshold are completed. Historically, three to four audits are required each year at a cost ranging from \$5,000 to \$8,000 per audit, and the cost of each audit is reimbursed by New York State at the same reimbursement rate as the underlying capital project under audit.

A Request for Proposals was issued for this contract and EFPR Group, CPAs, PLLC was selected as the most qualified to provide this service.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract, and any amendments thereto, with EFPR Group, CPAs, PLLC, 100 S. This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Sheriff Todd K. Baxter.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 157 of 2024 to amend the intermunicipal agreement with the City of Rochester ("City"), permitting the City to use the Monroe County Jail to detain non-arraigned detainees and arrestees, and to pay the County a nominal booking fee of \$50 for non-arraigned prisoners, except in the case of a New York City warrant suspect being held at which time the rate shall be the U.S. Marshal Service's Detention Services Intergovernmental Agreement rate with the County of \$175. All other terms and conditions are to remain the same.

Effective April 1, 2025, the Centralized Arraignment Part Court ("CAP") went into effect in which all non-arraigned prisoners held by any law enforcement agency in Monroe County will be held in the Monroe County Jail pending CAP arraignment. The County does not charge law enforcement agencies for this service. With the exception of the Rochester Police Department, all law enforcement agencies in Monroe County book their own prisoners prior to them being held at the jail for CAP. The City is included in the CAP plan, and as a result the amount charged to the City is reduced from \$122.13 to the nominal booking rate of \$50.00.

The amendment is necessary to change the fee structure charged to the City from the perdiem rate set forth in the U.S. Marshal Service's Detention Services Intergovernmental Agreement with the County ("USM IGA") of \$122.13 per non-arraigned detainee and arrestee, to a nominal booking charge of \$50 per non-arraigned detainee and arrestee, except in the case of a New York City warrant suspect being held at which time the rate shall be the USM IGA rate with the County of \$175. This reduced fee rate shall be effective of April 1, 2025, the date CAP went into effect. The remaining terms of the resolution shall remain the same.

The specific legislative action required is to amend Resolution 157 of 2024 to amend the intermunicipal agreement with the City of Rochester permitting the City to use the Monroe County Jail for the detention of non-arraigned detainees and arrestees and to pay the County a nominal booking fee of \$50.00 for non-arraigned prisoners, except in the case of a New York City warrant suspect being held at which time the rate shall be the U.S. Marshal Service's Detention Services Intergovernmental Agreement rate with the County of \$175. All other terms and conditions are to remain the same.

Authorize Intermunicipal Agreements with Ten Municipalities for the STOP-DWI Law

Enforcement Program

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize intermunicipal agreements with the ten municipalities within Monroe County that have local police departments for the STOP-DWI Law Enforcement Program in the total amount of \$105,693 for the period of January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2026.

These agreements will reimburse local police departments for enforcement efforts during 2026. The funding formula includes a base allocation of \$3,000 per police department, plus a percentage of the remaining funding derived from the 2024 DWI arrest totals of each law enforcement agency. Additional funding for Victim Impact Panel ("VIP") responsibilities is allocated to reimburse each participating law enforcement agency for security and general support, and is derived from fees paid by offenders to attend the panel.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute intermunicipal agreements, and any amendments thereto, with the City of Rochester and the nine towns and villages listed below for the STOP-DWI Law Enforcement Program in the total amount of \$105,693 for the period of January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2026:

Acceptance of a Grant from New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services for the Office of the Public Defender for the Provision of the Fifth Counsel at First Appearance

Program

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services in the amount of \$750,000 for the Fifth Counsel at First Appearance program in the Office of the Monroe County Public Defender for the period of January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2028.

The Office of the Public Defender will use the funding for part or all of the salary costs equivalent to three (3) existing full-time Assistant Public Defender positions. This grant funding will be used to continue to provide indigent legal services at court arraignments. This is the fifth time the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents the same amount as the last time the County received this grant.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$750,000 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services for the Office of the Monroe County Public Defender for the provision of indigent legal services for the period of January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2028.
- 2. Amend the 2026 operating budget of the Office of the Public Defender by appropriating the sum of \$250,000, into general fund 9300; funds center 2601010000, Office of the Public Defender.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.

4. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

This grant is 100% funded by the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a contract with HCCO, Inc. and Artech Information Systems, LLC in an amount not to exceed \$215,000 annually for temporary staffing personnel for information technology services for the period of January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2028, with the option to renew for two (2) additional one-year periods.

This contract will provide additional Help Desk support for countywide users of devices and software programs, and support the Department of Information Services efforts to install end-user computer devices and complete technical projects in support of various departments. This contract is also critical to supporting the County's cybersecurity initiatives by ensuring sufficient coverage is available to meet the information technology demands of the County.

A Request for Qualifications was issued, with HCCO, Inc and Artech Information Systems, LLC selected as the most qualified to provide these services.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize contracts with Consultadd, Inc. and A+ Consulting, Inc. for staff augmentation to support projects and production support activities for the Enterprise Resource Planning ("ERP") systems, in an aggregate amount not to exceed \$485,000, for the period of January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2026, with the option to renew for two (2) additional one-year periods in an aggregate amount not to exceed \$485,000 annually.

The transition from SAP to Workday is expected to be complete by February 1, 2026, however we are seeking to increase the number of systems used in various County departments that can fully integrate with Workday, and migrate additional historical SAP data into Workday for dayto-day reporting purposes. The requested contracts will keep currently knowledgeable support staff on-site to provide Workday-specific support to our own ERP Specialists.

A Request for Qualifications was issued, with Consultadd, Inc. and A+ Consulting, Inc. selected as the most qualified to provide these services.



Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a contract with LaBella Associates, DPC in a total annual aggregate amount not to exceed \$100,000 for stormwater planning and engineering term services for the period of January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2026, with an option to renew for two (2) additional one-year extensions, with escalations for the extensions to be limited to an amount equal to the increase in the previous year's Consumer Price Index (U.S. City Average CPI-U from the Bureau of Labor Statistics).

Under Resolutions 373 of 2019, Your Honorable Body approved an intermunicipal agreement with the Monroe County Stormwater Coalition ("Coalition") to reduce stormwater pollution and protect water quality in Monroe County and to comply with Federal Phase II Stormwater Regulations set forth by the United States Environmental Protection Agency and the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation. There are twenty-nine (29) municipal members, including the County, that comprise the Coalition. The Coalition's purpose is to: work collaboratively to facilitate compliance with the New York State MS4 General Permit requirements; reduce stormwater pollution and improve water quality; and facilitate the use of existing or future resources, organizations and programs to meet the regulatory and environmental goals.

There are occasions where a high level of planning and engineering support is necessary to evaluate regulatory issues and provide consulting expertise. This contract will allow the County and the Coalition to supplement their staffs with stormwater-specific expertise, on an as-needed basis, to assist with planning, technical support and GIS services related to stormwater issues throughout the County. Services may also include review, maintenance, and modifications of planning studies, engineering reports and regional stormwater initiatives.

LaBella Associates, DPC was rated as the most qualified to provide these services.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract, and any amendments thereto, with LaBella Associates, DPC, 300 State Street, Suite 201, Rochester, NY 14614, to provide Stormwater Planning and Engineering Term Services to Monroe County, in a total annual aggregate amount not to exceed \$100,000, for the period of January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2026, with an option to renew for two (2) additional one-year extensions, with escalations for the extensions to be limited to an amount equal to the increase in the previous year's Consumer Price Index (U.S. City Average CPI-U from the Bureau of Labor Statistics).

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(27) ("conducting concurrent environmental, engineering, economic, feasibility and other studies and preliminary planning and budgetary processes necessary to the formulation of a proposal for action, provided those activities do not commit the agency to commence, engage in or approve such action") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

ESTABLISHING SCALE OF CHARGES FOR ROCHESTER PURE WATERS DISTRICT, COUNTY SEWER DISTRICT FOR COUNTY OF MONROE, NEW YORK

WHEREAS, the Administrative Board of the Rochester Pure Waters District has, pursuant to §266 of the County Law of the State of New York, established a scale of charges for the operation and maintenance of facilities of the District and setting proportionate factors of surcharge for the treatment of industrial wastes and sewerage received by the District; and

WHEREAS, the Administrative Board of the Rochester Pure Waters District has, pursuant to §266 of the County Law of the State of New York and Resolution No. 502 of 1971, as amended by Resolution No. 337 of 1974, called a public hearing, said hearing having been held on the _____ day of December, 2025, at _____ p.m. ET.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE PURE WATERS ADMINISTRATIVE BOARD OF THE ROCHESTER PURE WATERS DISTRICT, as follows:

Section 1.

SCALE OF CHARGES

These Scales of Charges shall be effective commencing January 1, 2026.

ROCHESTER PURE WATERS DISTRICT Operation and Maintenance Charge

\$3.49 per 1,000 Gallons of water consumption (see Notes 1-3).

CHARGES FOR RPWD ZONE 2: No Charge - Operation and Maintenance not provided.

- This charge is based upon recent historic water consumption reflecting normal domestic waste water. It will be adjusted for industrial and commercial users based on the quality of sewage and additional cost of treatment.
- 2. This charge is subject to change based on financial obligations of the District.
- 3. This charge will be included in the 2026 County Tax Bill as a user charge. Accounts for which water consumption has not been calculated by November 1, 2025 will be billed at 60,000 gallons per unit for the user charge separately commencing January 1, 2026. All such bills unpaid as of October 1st will be transferred to the County Tax Rolls.
- 4. In-District and out-of-District agreements may be developed based on but not limited to loadings placed on the total sewerage systems pursuant to the Monroe County Sewer Use Law.

NEW USER CONNECTION FEES

The charges for regulating, permitting and connecting to a public sanitary sewer within the District are based on average costs incurred by the District for such new connections.

The proposed fee schedule for new connections is as follows:

Rochester Pure Waters District: \$300.00 per connection – residential * \$400.00 per connection – non-residential *

SEWER SURCHARGE - APPLICABLE TO ALL DISTRICTS

The owner or lessee of any parcel of real property connected with the District's Sewerage System and discharging any sewage, industrial wastes or other wastes containing acceptable pollutants imparting characteristics that exceed the maximum values established for normal sewage shall be surcharged. The surcharge reimburses the District for increased cost of treating said effluent. The charge shall be arrived at by multiplying the charge for normal sanitary sewage by the surcharge factor. WHEREAS, the Administrative Board of the Northwest Quadrant Pure Waters District has, pursuant to §266 of the County Law of the State of New York, established a scale of charges for the operation and maintenance of facilities of the District and setting proportionate factors of surcharge for the treatment of industrial wastes and sewerage received by the District; and

WHEREAS, the Administrative Board of the Northwest Quadrant Pure Waters District has, pursuant to \$266 of the County Law of the State of New York, and Resolution Nos. 417 and 418 of 1973, and Resolution No. 449 of 1976, called a public hearing, said hearing having been held on the _____ day of December, 2025, at ____ p.m. ET.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE PURE WATERS ADMINISTRATIVE BOARD OF THE NORTHWEST QUADRANT PURE WATERS DISTRICT, as follows:

Section 1.

SCALE OF CHARGES

These Scales of Charges shall be effective commencing January 1, 2026.

NORTHWEST QUADRANT PURE WATERS DISTRICT Operation and Maintenance Charge

\$2.375 per 1,000 gallons of water consumption (see Notes 1-3).

Operation and Maintenance Charge for properties Receiving Local Collection System Services

\$2.835 per 1,000 gallons of water consumption (see Notes 1-3).

- 1. This charge is based upon recent historic water consumption reflecting normal domestic waste water. It will be adjusted for industrial and commercial users based on the quality of sewage and additional cost of treatment.
- 2. This charge is subject to change based on financial obligations of the District.
- 3. This charge will be included in the 2026 County Tax Bill as a user charge. Accounts for which water consumption has not been calculated by November 1, 2025 will be billed at 60,000 gallons per unit for the user charge commencing January 1, 2026. All such bills unpaid as of October 1st will be transferred to the County Tax Rolls.

4. In-District and out-of-District agreements may be developed based on but not limited to loadings placed on the total sewerage systems pursuant to the Monroe County Sewer Use Law.

NEW USER CONNECTION FEES

The charges for regulating, permitting and connecting to a public sanitary sewer within the District are based on average costs incurred by the District for such new connections.

The proposed fee schedule for new connections is as follows:

Northwest Quadrant Pure Waters District: \$250.00 per connection - residential \$350.00 per connection - non-residential

SEWER SURCHARGE - APPLICABLE TO ALL DISTRICTS

The owner or lessee of any parcel of real property connected with the District's Sewerage System and discharging any sewage, industrial wastes or other wastes containing acceptable pollutants imparting characteristics that exceed the maximum values established for normal sewage shall be surcharged. The surcharge reimburses the District for increased cost of treating said effluent. The charge shall be arrived at by multiplying the charge for normal sanitary sewage by the surcharge factor. The formula for finding the surcharge factor is as follows:

- **Section 1.** As authorized by section 447-c(1)(b) of the New York Real Property Law, Monroe County opts not to establish a registration system for short-term rental units, as such term is defined in section 447-a(2) of the New York Real Property Law.
- **Section 2.** Section 357-14 of Chapter 357 of the Monroe County Code is amended to add new paragraphs D and E, which shall read as follows:
- **D.** All persons filing a return shall submit as part of the return the property address(es) and gross receipts for all accommodations. Such information shall be confidential subject to Section 357-26 of this Chapter. Other information may be shared in accordance with proper judicial order, as permitted pursuant to Section 357-26 of this Chapter.
- E. If the person filing returns is a booking service, as that term is defined in section 447-a(5) of the New York Real Property Law, the person shall also file at the same time as the filing for the previous year a list of URLs for entire home listings offered on the booking platform as short-term rental units in Monroe County and a list, aggregated by ZIP code, containing the number of entire home listings offered on the booking service operating as short-term rental units during the previous year and the number of nights such properties were occupied during the previous year to the Department of Planning and Development and the Department of Public Safety. Notwithstanding the foregoing, if the person filing returns provides the Department of Public Safety and the Department of Planning and Development with a means of downloading the required list or viewing the required information, the booking service shall not file such information to the Department of Planning and Development and Department of Public Safety pursuant to this Section.
- Section 3. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law or the application thereof to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this law, or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such order or judgment shall be rendered.





Attached hereto are the proposed charges for each of the County Pure Waters Districts.

The specific Administrative Boards actions required are:

- 1. Schedule a public hearing to consider the proposed 2026 Scale of Charges for the Monroe County Pure Waters Districts.
- Establish Scale of Charges per the attached schedules for the Gates-Chili-Ogden Sewer District, the Northwest Quadrant Pure Waters District, the Irondequoit Bay South Central Pure Waters District and the Rochester Pure Waters District for 2026.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26)("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment;") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Attached hereto are the proposed charges for each of the County Pure Waters Districts.

The specific Administrative Boards actions required are:

- 1. Schedule a public hearing to consider the proposed 2026 Scale of Charges for the Monroe County Pure Waters Districts.
- Establish Scale of Charges per the attached schedules for the Gates-Chili-Ogden Sewer District, the Northwest Quadrant Pure Waters District, the Irondequoit Bay South Central Pure Waters District and the Rochester Pure Waters District for 2026.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26)("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment;") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body enact a Local Law authorizing an amendment of Monroe County's stadium lease with Rochester Community Baseball, Inc. ("RCB") dated March 1, 2018 and amended March 27, 2025 ("Lease") by negotiation to permit RCB to serve as the County's marketing agent for naming rights for the County's Stadium located at 1 Morrie Silver Way, Rochester, New York, and an amendment to allow the County to continue to provide WIFI at the Stadium.

The County's current naming rights agreement with Innovative Data Processing Solutions LLC and Frontier Communications of Rochester, Inc. authorized by Your Honorable Body pursuant to Resolution 331 of 2022 will expire on November 15, 2025. Neither company expressed an interest in a long-term renewal of the naming rights agreement. RCB has expressed a desire to serve as the County's agent to search the marketplace and secure one or more suitable companies that would compensate the County for naming rights to the Stadium.

The Rochester Red Wings began playing baseball in 1899 and is the oldest continuously operating AAA professional baseball franchise in the United States. RCB has owned and operated the Rochester Red Wings since 1957, is the sole operator of the Stadium, and possesses extensive and unique knowledge of the operations and management of professional baseball and of the Stadium.

The County's Lease with RCB expires at the close of the Red Wings' 2027 baseball season. Under the terms proposed, for remainder of the Lease's term, RCB would be paid a fee for its marketing services not to exceed 18% of the Stadium naming rights revenue received by the County during the Lease term from the company selected. Additionally, the County would extend its existing obligation to provide WIFI at the Stadium for the remainder of the Lease term.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Schedule and hold a Public Hearing on the proposed Local Law.

2. Enact a Local Law authorizing the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a lease amendment by negotiation on behalf of Monroe County, and any amendments thereto, with Rochester Community Baseball, Inc. to permit Rochester Community Baseball, Inc. to serve as the County's marketing agent for Stadium naming rights, and to be paid a commission for its marketing services for the remainder of the Lease's term in an amount not to exceed 18% of the Stadium naming rights revenue received by the County during the Lease term from the company selected, and to permit the County to continue to provide WIFI at the Stadium for the remainder of the Lease term.

This is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR §617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for the WIFI is included in the 2025 operating budget of Finance-Unallocated, general fund 9001, funds center 1209060600, Baseball Field.

The Lease amendment is revenue generating. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body enact a Local Law, as authorized by New York State, opting out of establishing a registration system for short-term rental units and requiring that certain information be provided on hotel occupancy tax returns.

In 2024, New York State enacted legislation related to short-term rental units in municipalities throughout the state. The legislation, codified as New York Real Property Law § 447-c requires that each county either establish a registration system for short-term rental units or, pursuant to New York Real Property Law § 447-c(1)(a), adopt a local law opting not to establish a registration system. Counties that opt out of establishing a registration system retain the future right to opt in to the registration paradigm. Counties that do not opt out of the registration system requirement are required imminently to establish a registration system and will be required to maintain such system in perpetuity. Establishing a registration system would impose a costly administrative burden on Monroe County and could hinder the ability of Monroe County to collect occupancy and sales taxes.

Monroe County has existing voluntary contribution agreements with short-term rental providers Airbnb, Inc. and VRBO (formerly Vacation Rentals By Owner, now a subsidiary of Expedia Group) to provide for the collection of these taxes, but those agreements may terminate if Monroe County does not opt out of establishing a registration system. The County is regularly engaged with these providers and expects to amend its agreements with them to add more robust protections for the County, including to ensure the County can appropriately receive and analyze important short-term rental data to address any public safety or housing-stock availability concerns that exist or may arise in the future. The proposed local law addresses these public safety and housing-stock availability concerns by require that book services provide the Department of Public Safety and the Department of Planning and Development with URLs for all home listings and a list or means of compiling a list, aggregated by ZIP code, containing the number of home listings offered on the booking service and the number of nights the properties were occupied.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Schedule and hold a Public Hearing on the proposed Local Law.

2. Enact a Local Law, as authorized by New York Real Property Law § 447-c, opting out of the New York State requirement to establish a registration system for short-term rental units and requiring taxpayers to provide certain information on hotel room occupancy tax returns.

Enactment of this local law will have no impact on the revenues or expenditures of the current Monroe County budget.





The Monroe County Department of Transportation has identified the need to relocate a section of watermain just east of Bard Lane. After discussions with the Monroe County Water Authority, the optimal location for the relocated watermain has been determined to be 10 feet north of the existing sanitary sewer. This change necessitates a revision to Map 60. While a 1,050-square-foot easement area was previously acquired under Resolution 362 of 2023, the relocation will require the acquisition of an additional 1,113 square feet of easement area

The acquisition of easements for Calkins Road Highway Improvement Project in the Town of Henrietta has been preliminarily classified as an Unlisted Action. The SEQRA regulations found at 6 NYCRR Part 617 requires that no agency shall carry out or approve an Action until it has complied with the requirements of SEQRA.





The Monroe County Department of Transportation has identified the need to relocate a section of watermain just east of Bard Lane. After discussions with the Monroe County Water Authority, the optimal location for the relocated watermain has been determined to be 10 feet north of the existing sanitary sewer. This change necessitates a revision to Map 60. While a 1,050-square-foot easement area was previously acquired under Resolution 362 of 2023, the relocation will require the acquisition of an additional 1,113 square feet of easement area.

The project will also add an ADA Accessible roll-in chariot while maintaining the Carousel's historic aesthetics. Your Honorable Body approved funding for the project by Resolution 277 of 2022.

An updated Attachment A is attached.

This additional funding is intended to support waiting list and unmet need situations, and will be used by the Monroe County Office for the Aging to serve additional clients and expand existing services. The County issued a questionnaire to existing vendors in order to identify Unmet Needs in the community and allocate funding where the greatest needs exist. The following programs and services will be expanded to serve additional clients: Catholic Charities Family and Community Services (In Home Contact Services/Transportation Services/Personal Emergency Response Systems/Ancillary Services, etc.), Legal Assistance of Western NY (Legal Services), Medical Motor Services (Transportation), UR Medicine Home Care, Community Services, Inc (Home Delivered Meals), and Lifespan of Greater Rochester (Eldersource/Caregiver Services/NY Connects Information and Assistance).

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept federal and state aid for the operation and maintenance of the James R. Pond Regional Traffic Operations Center ("Operations Center") and authorize a contract with the New York State Department of Transportation for reimbursement of all eligible expenses for the operation of the Operations Center, in the amount of \$1,301,240, for the period of July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2026.

For many years, Monroe County has received federal and state aid to fund the operation of the Operations Center. The Operations Center was recently awarded funding to continue to provide for congestion management at local signalized intersections by a central computer that maintains and improves acceptable levels of service to reduce congestion as well as for eligible Operations Center facility expenses. The Operations Center provides efficient traffic operations and congestion management at local signalized intersections through the Intelligent Transportation System, which is a combination of a centralized traffic signal system and a network of closed-circuit traffic monitoring cameras. This system allows the Operations Center to provide reliable and consistent traffic signal operation, continuously monitor traffic conditions, make real time adjustments to traffic signal operation, and accommodate changes in traffic flow in response to traffic incidents.

The breakdown of the funding is as follows:

Federal Aid \$1,041,000.00 State Aid 31,240.00 Local Share 229,000.00 Total \$1,301,240.00

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept federal and state aid from, and to execute a contract with, the New York State Department of Transportation, for reimbursement of all eligible expenses for the operation of the James R. Pond Regional Traffic Operations Center in the amount of \$1,301,240 for the period of July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2026, along with any amendments necessary to complete the project within the annual operating budget appropriations.

Honorable Legislators:

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Sheriff Todd K. Baxter.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services, in the amount of \$15,000, for the FY22 Explosive Detection Canine Team Grant Program (Enhancement), for the period of August 1, 2025 through August 31, 2026.

This Federal Fiscal Year 2022 grant provides funds for the law enforcement community to support terrorism prevention and preparedness efforts. The funds will be used for training to enhance the capabilities of the Monroe County Sheriff's Office Explosive Detection Canine Team Program. This is the ninth year the County has received this grant. This year's funding is the same as last year's funding.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$15,000 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto, with the New York State Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services, for the Explosive Detection Canine Team Program (Enhancement), for the period of August 1, 2025 through August 31, 2026.
- 2. Amend the 2025 operating grant budget of the Office of the Sheriff by appropriating the sum of \$15,000 into general fund 9300, funds center 3803010000, Police Bureau Administration.

- 3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any encumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.
- 4. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This grant provides funds to law enforcement agencies to conduct targeted traffic enforcement and participate in the national "Click It or Ticket" seat belt enforcement mobilization. Targeted traffic enforcement is based on local crash data for Monroe County. This grant will pay a portion of the cost incurred by the Sheriff's Office for overtime, training, and travel. Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2025 capital budget to increase funding for the ERP System Replacement project in the amount of \$400,000, for a total authorization of \$13,000,000, and decrease funding for the ERP/Security project in the amount of \$400,000, for a total authorization of \$4,670,000; amend Resolution 66 of 2024 to increase contracts for Enterprise Resource Planning ("ERP") and component system software and related project management and implementation services, as detailed in the updated Attachment A attached hereto, in the amount of \$1,950,000, from an aggregate amount of \$11,050,000 to an aggregate amount of \$13,000,000; and authorize an interfund transfer.

Your Honorable Body originally established the ERP System Replacement project, capital fund 2078, in 2023 and then adopted Resolution 66 of 2024 to authorize ERP system licensing, project management, and project implementation contracts. Subsequently, Your Honorable Body authorized a \$1,550,000 increase in funding and interfund transfer to the ERP System Replacement project, pursuant to Resolution 394 of 2024, in connection with adopting the 2025 capital budget. The increase in funding for the capital budget, however, neglected to authorize the requisite increase in contracts. We are requesting to correct that omission at this time.

In addition, and in light of a recent and high-profile local ERP system implementation that resulted in significant payroll issues, we are seeking to extend the implementation schedule for our project by three months to allow for additional payroll and benefits testing and any necessary system configuration changes. The cost of this time extension can be accommodated within existing capital project authorizations, but we are seeking to transfer \$400,000 between similar capital funds so that the aggregate cost of the ERP System Replacement project can be accounted for in one discrete capital fund.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend the 2025 capital budget to increase funding for the ERP System Replacement project by \$400,000, for a total project authorization of \$13,000,000.
- 2. Amend the 2025 capital budget to decrease funding for the ERP/Security project in the amount of \$400,000, for a total project authorization of \$4,670,000.
- 3. Authorize an interfund transfer in the amount of \$400,000 from capital fund 1815, ERP/Security, to capital fund 2078, ERP System Replacement.
- 4. Amend Resolution 66 of 2024 to increase the contracts for licensing ERP and component system software and related project management and implementation services, as detailed in the updated Attachment A, in the amount of \$1,950,000, from an aggregate amount of \$11,050,000 to an aggregate amount of \$13,000,000.

Honorable Legislators:

I am submitting for your consideration and approval the proposed 2026 Monroe County Operating Budget.

The proposed 2026 County budget comes at a time of significant uncertainty, unlike anything we have faced in County government in recent years. Much of this stems from questions surrounding future federal government support, the rescission of funds previously appropriated by Congress, and the trickledown effect these cuts will have on County government. While the impacts of the "One Big Beautiful Bill Act" remain unclear, we anticipate that the loss of federal funding and programmatic cuts over the next 12-24 months will severely impact Monroe County's financial future.

Developing the proposed 2026 County budget amid such uncertainty has required a disciplined, cautious approach. With so many unknowns on the horizon, it is critical that every financial decision we make today protects the County taxpayers and the County's stability for tomorrow. Exercising restraint now is essential to safeguarding vital services, preventing future cuts, and avoiding layoffs in the coming years.

Despite these challenges, this budget supports my administration's priorities with investments in public safety and public health, while also maintaining our focus on economic and workforce development and quality of life improvements. The budget is a responsible, common-sense plan that recognizes the economic pressures that confront our community, and complies with the Monroe County Taxpayer Protection Act and the New York State property tax cap.

Overall, the 2026 proposed budget calls for \$1,567,679,468 in spending, an increase of roughly 1.9% over the adopted budget of 2025. That spending growth is concentrated in two areas: employee payroll and benefits, and public assistance benefits and Medicaid. While the number of positions county-wide remains relatively flat in this year's proposed budget, recent collective bargaining agreement settlements and yearly step increases have raised all salary lines by \$20.6 million. Increased spending for Public Assistance benefits and Medicaid accounts for an additional \$20.1 million in operating costs.

Offsetting these increases, spending on contractual services and supplies is decreasing by a combined \$20.2 million in 2026. The decrease in contractual services is primarily due to the one-time inclusion of \$25 million of Anti-Poverty grant funding Monroe County received from New York State in 2025. While more than \$24 million of that grant funding is still to be invested in 2026, it is not reflected in the 2026 proposed budget as it was allocated in 2025.

The proposed 2026 budget reduces the County property tax rate to historic low of \$5.67 per \$1,000 of taxable value – a decrease of thirty-six cents from the current year. This is the sixth tax rate reduction under my administration, resulting in the lowest property tax rate in this County's recorded history. Inclusive of this proposal, my administration's budgets have cut the tax rate a cumulative \$3.12 per \$1,000 of taxable value in six years.

We continue to build on the sound financial practices that have resulted in six credit rating upgrades since 2021, with Fitch Ratings affirming our bond rating at AA during our most recent review. Our outstanding credit rating can be attributed to the County's solid financial performance, conservative budgeting, and strong fiscal controls.

The 2026 proposed County budget makes new and critical investments in vital County services and programs, while remaining mindful of the possible impacts of potential federal funding cuts. First and foremost, we are improving our public safety and emergency response operations by investing in a new mass public emergency alerting system, MonroeAlert. This platform will distribute emergency messaging to the public via text message, phone calls, emails, and more, to alert residents of incidents that are immediately impactful to life and health.

Further strengthening our emergency response efforts, the Monroe County Department of Public Safety will develop and implement a new EMS dashboard, which will focus on building a patient-centric EMS system to allow the 17 EMS agencies in Monroe County to essentially operate like a single EMS system. Among other things, the EMS dashboard will alert 911 dispatchers to potential coverage gaps in the system, allowing redistribution of resources. The real-time data analytics that will come from the EMS dashboard will allow agencies to merge their data into in single platform, improving efficiencies and identifying potential weaknesses.

Beginning in 2026, the Office of Probation and Community Corrections will equip officers with body-worn cameras—a major step forward in transparency and accountability. This technology will help strengthen trust between officers and the individuals they supervise, while also providing valuable evidence and training resources to enhance officer safety and professionalism.

We continue to make significant investments in public health and wellness, with a focus on responding to the opioid crisis and improving health outcomes for people struggling with substance use disorders. This budget further supports efforts to combat the opioid crisis by funding the IMPACT team, the 24/7 Opioid Crisis hotline, and additional Naloxone distribution boxes

throughout the community to help prevent overdose deaths. It also invests opioid settlement funds into the second year of our "Call to Action" public education campaign, which is designed to reduce addiction misinformation, prevent accidental overdoses, and continue to improve awareness of Naloxone availability. Additionally, the Office of Mental Health will pilot a Peer Support Services Transportation program, which will support people in crisis who need transportation to local diversion services rather than going to the emergency room.

As previously mentioned, the Monroe County Department of Human Services received significant grant funding from New York State in 2025 – including \$25 million for the anti-poverty grant "Project Prosper" and \$3 million for the Monroe Ladder Demonstration project. Although these funds are not reflected in the 2026 proposed budget, most of these dollars remain available and will be invested next year to continue and complete this important work.

Lastly, the need for reliable childcare for families continues to grow throughout Monroe County. This budget will increase daycare funding by \$11.2 million to account for a projected increase in enrollment, ensuring more families have access to childcare services they count on every day.

The fiscal uncertainty facing Monroe County is real, and the decisions made at the federal level in the months ahead will undoubtedly shape our financial future. This proposed budget reflects the discipline and foresight needed to navigate that uncertainty. By carefully balancing investment with restraint, we are positioning Monroe County to weather potential challenges without sacrificing the services and programs our residents depend on every day.

This budget is more than a financial plan—it is a roadmap for responsible governance during unpredictable times. It protects taxpayers, preserves core services, and continues to strengthen the foundation of our community. With your approval, we can ensure that Monroe County remains strong, stable, and ready to meet whatever challenges lie ahead—together.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Pursuant to Section C4-3 of the Monroe County Charter, schedule a public hearing on the 2026 Monroe County Budget and direct the Clerk of the Legislature to cause notice of said public hearing to be published at least once in one or more daily newspapers of general circulation in the County at least five (5) days before the date of said hearing and to cause a summary of said budget, as attached hereto, to be published with said notice.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize agreements with the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority ("NYSERDA") for the payment of recurring obligation amounts ordered by the New York State Public Service Commission ("PSC") in connection with Bulk Energy Storage, Compensation for Hydroelectric Baseline Generating Facilities, and the Purchase of Tier 4 Renewable Energy Certificates.

Since 2001, Monroe County has been authorized by the PSC to operate as a municipal Direct Customer of the New York State Independent System Operators, Inc., which allows the County to procure natural gas and electricity for itself and members of a municipal energy aggregation group that currently includes sixteen (16) towns and villages, two (2) school districts, two (2) fire districts, the Monroe County Water Authority and the Rochester Genesee Regional Transit Authority. The energy aggregation group currently has approximately 1,700 accounts, of which over 700 belong to the County.

The PSC issued three orders directing NYSERDA to implement New York State initiatives in connection with Bulk Energy Storage, Compensation for Hydroelectric Baseline Generating Facilities, and the Purchase of Tier 4 Renewable Energy Certificates, and NYSERDA issued three implementation plans in 2025. Each plan involves the imposition of a recurring obligation amount on Load Serving Entities ("LSEs"), which is defined as any entity that sells retail commodity electrical supply to an end-use customer in New York State.

The Bulk Energy Storage program seeks to expand bulk energy storage capabilities in New York State utilizing an incentive mechanism. The incentive mechanism will be funded by LSEs, and calculated in proportion to each LSE's share of statewide load.

The Compensation for Hydroelectric Baseline Generating Facilities initiative seeks to adopt a new compensation mechanism for hydroelectric renewable facilities, and the cost of the compensation mechanism will be funded by LSEs in proportion to each LSE's share of statewide load.

The Purchase of Tier 4 Renewable Energy Certificates involves a modification of PSC's Clean Energy Standard whereby LSEs are obligated to purchase qualifying Tier 4 Renewable Energy Certificates in proportion to each LSE's share of statewide load.

NYSERDA requires LSEs, such as Monroe County, to execute an agreement in connection with each of the initiatives above, whereby the LSE will be charged an obligation amount on a monthly basis, and will be liable for the difference between the LSE's aggregate monthly payments and an annual amount calculated at the conclusion of each compliance year.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute agreements, and any amendments thereto, with the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority for the payment of recurring obligation amounts ordered by the New York State Public Service Commission in connection with Bulk Energy Storage, Compensation for Hydroelectric Baseline Generating Facilities, and the Purchase of Tier 4 Renewable Energy Certificates.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment;") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for these agreements is included in the proposed 2026 operating budget of various County Departments, and will be requested in future years' budgets. The cost of these services is shared proportionately with the members of the energy aggregation group. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.
