Re: Enacting a Local Law Amending the Code of Ethics

Honorable Legislators:

As Legislators and public servants, we must be held to the highest standards of conduct. This legislation would strengthen the Monroe County Code of Ethics, adding provisions addressing conflicts of interest, use of county resources for political purposes and sexual harassment.

The Code of Ethics has not undergone substantial revisions in many years. This legislation seeks to begin to bring the Code of Ethics in line with peer counties in New York State.

The reforms proposed in this legislation would do the following:

- Make sexual harassment conduct that is prohibited.
- Require high-ranking officers to receive approval for outside employment.
- Require officials to recuse themselves in writing from matters in which they have a conflict.
- Close the revolving door of officers leaving County employment.
- Prohibit candidates from putting their images on taxpayer-funded mailings and ads before elections.
- Ban coercion of employees and use of County resources for political campaigns.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Schedule and hold a public hearing.
- 2. Adopt the Local Law as attached.

ENACTING A LOCAL LAW AMENDING THE CODE OF ETHICS OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. Section 45-3 of the Administrative Local Laws of Monroe County is amended to read as follows:

INTEREST

A pecuniary or material benefit accruing to a municipal officer or employee, unless the context otherwise requires, and shall be deemed to include the business or financial affairs of the officer's or employee's spouse, minor children and dependents; a firm, partnership or association in which such officer or employee is a member or employee; a corporation of which such officer or employee is an officer, director or employee; and a corporation any stock of which is owned or controlled directly or indirectly by such officer or employee.

HARASSMENT

Verbal, written, or physical conduct that: (1) is based on an individual's protected class under federal, state or local law; (2) is unwelcome; and (3) rises above the level of what a reasonable victim of harassment or discrimination with the same protected characteristic would consider petty slights or trivial inconveniences.

MUNICIPAL AGENCY

Any department of the County of Monroe or division, board, <u>district</u> commission or bureau of any department of the County, <u>including but not limited to the Gates-Chili-Ogden Sewer District</u>. <u>Irondequoit Bay Pure Waters District</u>, <u>Northwest Quadrant Pure Waters District</u>, <u>Rochester Pure Waters District</u>, and the Monroe County local social services district.

OFFICER OR EMPLOYEE

An officer or employee of the County of Monroe, whether paid or unpaid, including members of the Monroe County Legislature, and of any administrative board, commission or other agency of the Monroe County.

SEXUAL HARASSMENT

Harassment on the basis of sex, sexual orientation, self-identified or perceived sex, gender expression, gender identity and the status of being transgender. It includes unwelcome conduct, such as sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, sex stereotyping or other verbal, written, or physical conduct which is either of a sexual nature, or which is directed at an individual because of that individual's sex, sexual orientation, self-identified or perceived sex, gender expression, gender identity, and the status of being transgender.

Section 2. Section 45-4 of the Administrative Local Laws of Monroe County is amended to read as follows:

§ 45-4 General standard of conduct.

No officer or employee shall have any interest, financial or otherwise, direct or indirect, or engage in any business or transaction or professional activity or incur any obligation of any nature which is in conflict with the proper discharge of his duties in the public interest.

- Section 3. Section 45-5 of the Administrative Local Laws of Monroe County is amended to read as follows:
- § 45-5 Interest in business or professional dealings with County.

No officer or employee of the County of Monroe shall have an interest, direct or indirect, in any manner whatsoever except by operation of law, in any business or professional dealings with the County of Monroe or any agency Municipal Agency thereof.

- **Section 4.** Section 45-6 of the Administrative Local Laws of Monroe County is amended to read as follows:
- § 45-6. Representing other persons or corporations in transactions with County.

No officer or employee of the County of Monroe shall act as attorney, agent, broker, representative or employee in business or professional dealings with the County or any agency Municipal Agency thereof for any person or corporation in which he has a direct or indirect interest.

Section 5. Section 45-8 of the Administrative Local Laws of Monroe County is amended to read as follows:

§ 45-8. Incompatible employment.

- A. No officer or employee shall engage in, solicit, negotiate for or promise to accept private employment or render services for private interest when such employment or service creates a conflict with or impairs the proper discharge of his official duties.
- B. Employees in the Management and Professional classification must seek approval for any outside employment pursuant to the County's Dual Employment Policy, as may be amended from time to time.
- C. If an officer or employee's outside employment creates a conflict with or impairs the proper discharge of his official duties with respect to a particular matter, the officer or employee must recuse himself from that matter. Such recusal shall be made in writing on a form prescribed by the County Law Department and shall be a matter of public record.
- **Section 6.** Section 45-9 of the Administrative Local Laws of Monroe County is amended to read as follows:

§ 45-9. Future employment.

- A. No officer or employee shall, after the termination of service or employment with such municipality, appear or practice before any board or agency Municipal Agency of the County of Monroe in relation to any case, proceeding or application in which he personally participated during the period of his service or employment or which was under his active consideration.
- B. No person who has served as a County officer or employee in the Management and Professional classification shall within a period of two years after the termination of such service or employment appear or practice before any Municipal Agency of the County of Monroe or receive

compensation for any services rendered by such former officer or employee on behalf of any person, firm, corporation, or association in relation to any case, proceeding, or application or other matter before such Municipal Agency of the County of Monroe.

Section 7. Section 45-12 of the Administrative Local Laws of Monroe County is amended to read as follows:

§ 45-12 Gifts.

No officer or employee shall, directly or indirectly, solicit any gift or accept or receive any gift having more than a nominal value, whether in the form of money, services, loan, travel, entertainment, hospitality, thing or promise, or in any other form, from any person, firm, corporation or other entity that has a direct or indirect interest in any contract for the provision of goods or services to the County of Monroe or any agency Municipal Agency thereof. The term "gift" shall be defined pursuant to New York Legislative Law §1-c(j) as amended from time to time. Any local development corporation contracting with the County of Monroe shall include the requirements of the County Code of Ethics in its code of ethics.

Section 8. Section 45-13 of the Administrative Local Laws of Monroe County is amended to read as follows:

§ 45-13. Course of conduct.

- A. Every officer or employee should endeavor to pursue a course of conduct which will not raise suspicion among the public that he is likely to be engaged in acts that are in violation of his trust. He should not use or attempt to use his official position to secure unwarranted privileges or exemptions for himself or others. He should not by his conduct give reasonable basis for the impression that any person can improperly influence him or unduly enjoy his favor in the performance of his official duties or that he is affected by the kinship, position or influence of any party or person.
- B. It shall be a violation of the Code of Ethics of the County of Monroe for an officer or employee to engage in harassment or sexual harassment.
- C. The name or image of a County officer or employee shall not appear on any printed newsletter mailed or distributed to County residents, or in any paid advertisement published in print or online or aired on TV or radio in the County, the cost of which is incurred by the County, within 30 days of any election for public office in which the County officer or employee is a candidate for such office.
- D. Unless otherwise prohibited by law, officers and employees shall not be denied the right to support or refuse to support a political party or committee, or a candidate for public office. Officers or employees shall not coerce, or request or authorize another to coerce, any County officer or employee, consumer of County services or County contractor to support or refuse to support a political party or committee, or a candidate for public office. Officers or employees shall not make use of a County workplace to request, or authorize another to use a County workplace to request, that any person participate in an election campaign or contribute to a political party or committee.
- **Section 9.** Section 45-23 of the Administrative Local Laws of Monroe County is amended to read as follows:

§ 45-23 Penalties for offenses.

Any contract willfully entered into by or with Monroe County or any agency thereof in which there is an interest prohibited by this chapter shall be null and void and wholly unenforceable. In addition to any penalty contained in any other provision of law, any person who shall knowingly and intentionally violate any of the provisions of this code, including engaging in harassment or sexual harassment conduct, may be fined, suspended, or removed from office or employment, as the case may be, in the manner provided by law.

Section 10. Section 45-25(B) of the Administrative Local Laws of Monroe County is amended to read as follows:

B. The Board may also accept from the general public, an officer or employee, or from its own members and consider any complaint or allegation of conflict of interest, harassment, or sexual harassment on the part of any officer or employee of Monroe County. All such complaints or allegations are to be kept in the confidential records of the Board. Should the Board determine that there is apparent merit in the complaint or allegation, it shall send a written invitation to the officer or employee so charged to appear at a private meeting of the Board and explain the apparent conflict of interest, allegation of harassment, or allegation of sexual harassment. Should: (1) such officer or employee fail to appear in response to such invitation or should-he-appear and; (2) such officer or employee fail to satisfy the Board that there is no conflict of interest; or (3) the Board substantiates an allegation that the employee or officer engaged in harassment or sexual harassment, the Board shall send a written report on the matter to the County Executive. The report Reports concerning conflicts of interest shall not be made public except by the County Executive or by the unanimous vote of the Board. Reports finding that the employee or officer engaged in harassment or sexual harassment shall be made public with any identifying information regarding the compliant(s), witness(es), and victim(s) redacted. In the event the Board receives a complaint or allegation that involves harassment or sexual harassment in the workplace, such complaint shall be referred to the Monroe County Department of Human Resources and shall be subject to the provisions of the Monroe County Policy on Unlawful Discrimination and Harassment, as amended or changed.

Section 11. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law or the application thereof to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this law, or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such order or judgment shall be rendered.

Section 12. This local law shall take effect in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Home Rule Law and the Monroe County Charter.



The action is for the acquisition of easements for a highway improvement and rehabilitation project along Hinchey Road in Gates. Part 1 of the EAF indicates the site contains or is near the following: archaeological resources, an adjoining property that has been the site of remediation, and wetlands.

The Remediation Site is at the eastern end of Hinchey Road (Latitude: 43 08'25.7"N Longitude: 77 40'17,6"W; parcel numbers 119.20-3-34.1 and 119.20-3.3) and is formerly the Gates Dump at Hinchey Road and served as a municipal dump/landfill from 1920 to 1939 for the City of Rochester. In 1992 a Phase II was conducted and determined there is no record of hazardous waste disposal at the site and ground samples were tested for extraction procedure toxicity (EP Tox) metals and concentrations were found to be below EP Tox Standards. Ground water is controlled by a storm sewer along Hamlet Court. Groundwater samples collected showed several metals exceeding groundwater standards. However, the area is served by municipal water and sewer and is not expected to be disturbed during this project. None of the easements sought are from the parcels in the State's Remediation Database.

Actions contemplated in this SEQR include road maintenance, reconstruction, rehabilitation, and acquisition of easements related to such work. Paved shoulders, wider than current shoulders are proposed, but no further widening of lanes or other roadway is proposed. Existing road drainage and storm sewers will be modified in line with this project, and in line with typical roadway construction and rehabilitation. The easement acquisition of these properties does not include physical disturbance or development of the parcels and will not result in any significant adverse environmental impacts.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a contract with Bero Architecture for professional design services in the amount of \$45,000 for the Highland Park Children's Pavilion Project.

Highland Park (the "Park") contains 150 acres of parkland and is located within the Mt. Hope-Highland Historic District, which is listed in State and National Registers of Historic Places. The Park hosts the annual Lilac Festival, which celebrates its extensive botanical collection as well as many other events and activities. The Park has many features including: the Lamberton Conservatory, Vietnam Veterans Memorial, Workers' Memorial, War of Terror Memorial, Victims' Rights Memorial, and the AIDS Remembrance Garden.

The original design of the Park was completed in 1889 by Frederick Law Olmsted. The original Children's Pavilion was the focal point of the park and was located at the highest point of the park where all of the paths converged. The Pavilion was conceived by Olmsted at the time as a shelter for the convalescents and sick children. Olmsted believed that fresh air brought health benefits and the Pavilion would provide a healing setting for people who were ill. The Pavilion was dedicated to the Children of Rochester in 1891.

Unfortunately, the Children's Pavilion suffered deterioration and the structure was demolished in 1963 due to safety concerns. A Resolution by the City of Rochester Council permitted the County to demolish the Children's Pavilion provided that it be reconstructed.

The Children's Pavilion will be reconstructed at the original location and it will be a three-story, open-air pavilion with an elevator and ADA improvements. The Pavilion is required by the New York State Historic Preservation Office to comply with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation, which states that the "Reconstructions will be based on the accurate duplication of historic features and elements substantiated by documentary evidence." The reconstruction of the Children's Pavilion is important to restoring Frederick Law Olmsted's vision for Highland Park.

A Request for Proposals was issued, with Bero Architecture selected as the most qualified to perform these services.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract with Bero Architecture, 32 Winthrop Street, Rochester, New York 14607 in the amount of \$45,000 for professional design services for the Highland Park Children's Pavilion Project, and any amendments necessary to complete the project within the total capital fund(s) appropriation.

This action is an Unlisted Action under the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA"). Pursuant to Resolution 71 of 2022, the Monroe County Legislature issued a Negative Declaration for this action. No further action under SEQRA is required.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize the initiation of the process for making additions to Monroe County's Agricultural Districts.

Section 303-b of the Agriculture and Markets Law requires Your Honorable Body establish an annual 30-day period during which landowners can submit proposals to include land that is predominantly viable agricultural land within a certified agricultural district. Monroe County would begin this addition process by publishing a general notice to make landowners aware of the 30-day submission period. At the end of the 30-day submission period all requests for inclusion will be referred to the Monroe County Agricultural and Farmland Protection Board ("AFPB") for its recommendations. The AFPB then has 30 days to make a recommendation to Your Honorable Body concerning any proposed additions to the state-certified agricultural districts. Upon receipt of the recommendation, Your Honorable Body must hold a public hearing before taking action to adopt or reject the addition of any parcels to any district. A second referral will be submitted to Your Honorable Body after the report of the AFPB to schedule the public hearing and recommend adoption or rejection of the addition of parcels to any district.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Authorize the Clerk of the Legislature to publish and post notice of the 30-day submission period for requests to include land, which is predominantly viable agricultural land, within state-certified Monroe County agricultural districts.

2. Direct the Monroe County Agricultural and Farmland Protection Board to prepare and submit a report, within 30-days of the termination of the submission period, with its recommendations as to whether inclusion of each piece of land proposed to be included in the certified agricultural districts: a) consists predominantly of viable agricultural land, and b) would serve the public interest by assisting in maintaining a viable agricultural industry within the certified agricultural districts.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 526 of 2021 to amend and increase the contract with the University of Rochester for clinical and prevention services for the Monroe County Department of Public Health Sexually Transmitted Disease ("STD") Program and other Nursing Services Division programs from an amount not to exceed \$900,505 to an amount not to exceed \$918,511 for the first (1st) additional one-year renewal for the period of January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2023; in an amount not to exceed \$936,881 for the second (2nd) additional one-year renewal for the period of January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2024; in an amount not to exceed \$955,622 for the third (3nd) additional one-year renewal for the period of January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025; and in an amount not to exceed \$974,736 for the fourth (4nd) additional one year renewal for the period of January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2026.

This contract will support the County's STD Program and other clinics in the Nursing Services Division programs. Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept funding from the New York State Office of Addiction Services and Supports, in the amount of \$212,700 and amend Resolution 517 of 2021, as Amended by Resolutions 122, 174, and 368 of 2022, authorizing contracts for the provision of Mental Health, Developmental Disability, and Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services in 2022 from an amount not to exceed \$44,235,205 to an amount not to exceed \$44,447,905 for the period of January 1, 2022 through December 31, 2022.

This one-time funding, as designated by the New York State Office of Addiction Services and Supports, will be used as follows: \$171,700 will be used by Delphi Drug and Alcohol Council, Inc. to resume, sustain, and/or improve the existing Substance Use Disorders program services and \$41,000 will be used by East House Corporation to support additional costs related to the conversion to Part 820-Residential Services.

Please refer to the attached Purchase of Services Information Form for disclosure of information required pursuant to Resolution 223 of 2007, as amended by Resolution 11 of 2008.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept \$212,700 from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Office of Addiction Services and Supports for the period of January 1, 2022 through December 31, 2022.
- 2. Amend the 2022 operating budget of the Department of Human Services, Office of Mental Health, by appropriating the sum of \$212,700 into general fund 9001, funds center 5702030000, Alcohol and Other Substance Abuse Services.

- 3. Amend Resolution 517 of 2021, as amended by Resolutions 122, 174, and 368 of 2022, to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute contracts, and any amendments thereto, with the agencies listed in Attachment A and any other agencies as necessary to provide mental health, developmental disability, and alcoholism and substance abuse services for Monroe County residents from an amount not to exceed \$44,235,205 to an amount not to exceed \$44,447,905 for the period of January 1, 2022 through December 31, 2022.
- 4. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments.
- 5. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

This grant is 100% funded by New York State Office of Addiction Services and Supports. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Delphi Drug & Alcohol Council, Inc. and East House Corporation are not-for-profit community-based agencies, and the records in the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that neither owes any delinquent Monroe County property taxes.
