RE: Memorializing the United States Congress to Pass the Honoring Our Fallen Heroes Act.

Honorable Legislators:

The Public Safety Officers' Benefits (PSOB) program provides benefits to the survivors of fire fighters, federal, state, and local law enforcement officers, and other first responders who are killed by injuries sustained in the line of duty. The program also provides disability benefits for first responders who become permanently or totally disabled. The Public Safety Officers' Educational Assistance (PSOEA) program, a component of the PSOB program, provides higher-education assistance to the children and spouses of public safety officers killed or permanently disabled in the line of duty. The PSOB and PSOEA programs are administered by the Department of Justice's Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA).

Emergency personnel provide many services including, education to children during fire safety week, providing lifesaving care, and providing extrication from motor vehicle accidents. First responders also make many sacrifices, including giving up time with their families and risking their lives, in addressing emergencies. Firefighters are particularly at risk due to consistent exposure to carcinogens.

The bipartisan legislation Honoring Our Fallen Heroes Act, was introduced in the Senate by Sen. Amy Klobuchar of Minnesota and Sen. Kevin Cramer of North Dakota and in the House of Representatives by Rep. Bill Pascrell of New Jersey and Rep. Carlos Gimenez of Florida. The bill contains language to include first responders who die as a result of cancer caused by exposure to carcinogens during their service. The bill would also extend disability benefits in cases where first responders become permanently and totally disabled due to cancer.

This legislation was brought forth through the advocacy of the family of Michael J. Paidar, a St. Paul, Minnesota fire Captain who passed away from Acute Myeloid Leukemia. Captain Paidar's widow Julie was awarded line-of-duty benefits from the PSOB. This instance was the first time a family had received benefits for cancer incurred in the line of duty under the Minnesota PSOB.

The legislation is endorsed by the International Association of Fire Fighters, as well as the Fraternal Order of Police, International Association of Fire Chiefs, National Association of Police Organizations, National Volunteer Fire Council, Federal Law Enforcement Officers Association, National Fallen Firefighters Foundation, Congressional Fire Services Institute, and Sergeants Benevolent Association of New York City. Representative Gimenez of Florida is quoted as saying, "As the only career firefighter paramedic serving in Congress and as the City of Miami's very first Cuban-American Fire Chief, it's an honor and a duty to introduce the bipartisan Honoring Our Fallen Heroes Act. Our first responders go above and beyond the line of duty to protect the communities they serve and this legislation would guarantee that they have access to the life-saving care they rightfully deserve."

Senate Bill S.930 and the House of Representatives companion bill H.R.1719: would help many firefighters and other first responders and their families in the event of an occurrence of cancer.

We encourage the members of the Senate and the House of Representatives to pass this legislation to help improve the lives of all Emergency Services Professionals who serve communities throughout the United States and their families. We also urge President Biden to follow suit and sign this into law.

RE: Memorializing the United States Congress to Pass Ethan's Law

Honorable Legislators:

Each year, the levels of gun violence and accidental shootings are all-too high. With continued manufacturing and distributing of firearms, the accessibility and reliability is incomparable. Firearms are as easily obtainable as cellphones, and provides the same quick thrill to teenagers. Our expectations have been warped indefinitely by this, and now when a 15 year old boy, such as Ethan Song, is accidentally shot by an unsecured firearm in his neighbor's home, it is greeted with inaction or worse – indifference.

Purposeful and premeditated crimes aside, over 75 percent of firearms used in youth suicide attempts and unintentional firearm injuries were stored in the residence of the victim, a relative, or a friend. Controlling the ease of access to these firearms by requiring owners to properly store their guns will help to reduce these incidents. Helping to reduce the loss of loved ones due to accidents, and guaranteeing children the right to be kept safe by their caregivers. Adding one protective barrier between firearms and people who should not lawfully be in possession of one, guarantees all of US citizens the right to be protected.

Ethan's Law would require firearms that have affected interstate or foreign commerce to be properly stored on residential premises and prohibited from unsafe storage that may result in a minor or ineligible resident being injured or killed. This bill would allow owners of firearms to be charged for improper storage resulting in a fine, for a minor obtaining the firearm and causing injury or death to oneself or another, and allow for seizure and forfeit of improperly stored firearms. Ethan's Law would assist states and tribes with implementing secure gun storage laws, helping resolve the negative economic impact of gun violence in communities is tied directly to the national economy and interstate commerce.

S173: Ethan's Law will help to regulate the storage of firearms on residential premises at the federal, state, and tribal levels if a minor is likely to gain access without permission or if a resident is ineligible to possess a firearm.

We encourage the United States Senate to pass this legislation to help improve the lives of children and families in Monroe County and New York State. We also urge the House of Representatives to follow suit and President Biden to sign this into law.

Amend Resolution 215 of 2019, as Amended by Resolution 315 of 2022, to Accept Additional Funding from the New York State Department of Health for the Tuberculosis Prevention and Control Program

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 215 of 2019, as amended by Resolution 315 of 2022, to accept additional funding from the New York State Department of Health ("NYSDOH") in the amount of \$118,949 for the Tuberculosis Prevention and Control Program (formerly known as the Public Health Campaign – County Tuberculosis Program) for the period of April 1, 2019 through March 31, 2024.

By Resolution 215 of 2019, Your Honorable Body authorized the acceptance of a grant from the NYSDOH for the Tuberculosis Prevention and Control Program. The purpose of this grant is to provide enhanced tuberculosis prevention, control, and elimination services to Monroe County residents. Funds will be used to cover partial salaries and benefits for staff nurses who perform case management, screening, diagnosis, and treatment of infected and at-risk clients. Additionally, staff outreach workers will provide directly observed therapy and assist with screening and contact investigations. This additional funding will be used to support services to Ukrainian newcomers under the Uniting for Ukraine initiative and to enhance the overall services provided by the County's Tuberculosis Prevention and Control Program program. The additional funding will bring the grant total to \$1,151,680.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend Resolution 215 of 2019, as amended by Resolution 315 of 2022, to accept an additional \$118,949 from, and to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Department of Health, for the Tuberculosis Prevention and Control Program, bringing the total program award to \$1,151,680 for the period of April 1, 2019 through March 31, 2024.
- 2. Amend the 2023 operating budget of the Department of Public Health by appropriating the sum of \$118,949 into general fund 9300, funds center 5802020000, Tuberculosis Control Programs.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Study Program

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 266 of 2019, as amended by Resolution 354 of 2022, to accept additional funding from Columbia University in the amount of \$285,700 for the HEALing Communities Study Program and extend the time period for one (1) year, through March 31, 2024.

By Resolution 266 of 2019, Your Honorable Body authorized the acceptance of a grant from Columbia University for the HEALing Communities Study Program. The purpose of this grant is to generate evidence about how tools for preventing and treating opioid addiction are most effective at the local level. This implementation research study will test the impact of an integrated set of evidence-based settings. The goal is to prevent and treat opioid misuse and opioid use disorder and reduce opioid related deaths by 40 percent. This additional funding will be used for salaries and benefits of existing staff and other program costs to lead and coordinate county-wide project activities and to implement evidence-based practices and communications activities. The additional funding will bring the grant total to \$1,461,064.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend Resolution 266 of 2019, as amended by Resolution 354 of 2022, to accept an additional \$285,700 from, and to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, Columbia University for the HEALing Communities Study Program, bringing the total program award to \$1,461,064, and extending the time period for one (1) year, through March 31, 2024.
- 2. Amend the 2023 operating budget of the Department of Public Health by appropriating the sum of \$285,700 into general fund 9300, funds center 5809010000, Epidemiology and Disease Control.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a five-year grant from Health Research, Inc. in the amount of \$1,325,735 for the Strengthening Public Health Workforce and Foundational Capabilities Program for the period of December 1, 2022 through November 30, 2027.

The purpose of this grant is to invest in the local public health workforce and foundational capabilities to address health inequities and disparities more effectively across populations and regions throughout their jurisdiction and better meet the ongoing and future health needs of New Yorkers. Funds will be used to strengthen the public health workforce through hiring of public health positions, supporting retention of current staff, making upgrades to the workplace to increase employee satisfaction, providing public health training, and providing public health support services to the Department of Public Health. This will be the first year the County has received this grant.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$1,325,735 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, Health Research, Inc., for the Strengthening Public Health Workforce and Foundational Capabilities Program, for the period of December 1, 2022 through November 30, 2027.
- 2. Amend the 2023 operating budget of the Department of Public Health by appropriating the sum of \$265,147 into general fund 9300, funds center 5801010000, Public Health Commissioner.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant contract.

County Department of Public Health Early Intervention Program

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a contract with Tallavera, LLC in an amount not to exceed \$107,670 to provide nursing services for the Monroe County Department of Public Health Early Intervention Program for the period of October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024, with the option to renew for two (2) additional one-year terms in an amount not to exceed \$107,670 per year.

This vendor will provide licensed nurses to work in the Monroe County Department of Public Health Early Intervention program, overseeing the Developmental Monitoring program in addition to educating health care providers on program components.

A Request for Qualifications was issued for this contract with Tallavera, LLC selected as the most qualified to provide these services.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract and any amendments thereto, with Tallavera, LLC, 19 Cambridge Street, Rochester New York 14607, to provide nursing services for the Monroe County Department of Public Health Early Intervention Program in an amount not to exceed \$107,670 for the period of October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024, with the option to renew for two (2) additional one-year terms in an amount not to exceed \$107,670 per year.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services in the amount of \$50,000 for implementation of components of a plan to address racial and ethnic disparities in the youth justice system for the period of June 1, 2022 through May 31, 2024.

The New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services, Office of Youth Justice, the Center for Children's Law and Policy, and the New York State Youth Justice Institute have partnered to create a new training, technical assistance, and skill-building opportunity for youth justice professionals throughout the state known as the Policy Equity Academy. It is designed to support localities in their efforts to implement policies and reforms that target areas of significant racial and ethnic disparity in the youth justice system. The Policy Equity Academy consists of virtual skill-building and planning opportunities for local professionals that are designed to equip participants with the knowledge base and leadership skills to promote effective efforts to reduce racial and ethnic disparities in their local jurisdictions. The Academy assists with the development of a local level action plan, and provides technical assistance and funding up to \$50,000 to support implementation of action plans.

In order to achieve the objectives of the Policy Equity Academy, the Monroe County Office of Probation and Community Corrections has developed a plan that utilizes support services, juvenile justice education, and group facilitation services to at-risk, juvenile justice-involved, and probation-involved youth in Monroe County. The plan's objectives are to increase the number of youth of color who are offered, engage with, and successfully complete adjustment services, and decrease the number of youth of color referred to the presentment agency for petitions. This is the first time the County has received this grant.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$50,000 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services for implementation of components of a plan to address racial and ethnic disparities in the youth justice system for the period of June 1, 2022 through May 31, 2024.

- 2. Amend the 2023 operating budget of the Department of Public Safety, Office of Probation and Community Corrections, by appropriating the sum of \$50,000 into general fund 9300, funds center 2403020100, Juvenile Services Family Division.
- 3. 

This action is for the sale of 55 parcels totaling approximately 30+/- acres. This property sale is adjacent to, or substantially contiguous to, the Lehigh Valley Trail Ext. running north/south from the Erie Canal to the Monroe County owned Lehigh Valley Trail running east/west and the Town of Brighton's Lynch Woods Nature Park. Additionally, the Monroe County owned and managed Genesee Valley Park and Genesee Valley Golf Course is approximately 466+/- feet from this action.

On Part 2 of the FEAF, guestion #7 indicated that the proposed action may result in a loss of flora or fauna. Currently, these parcels are largely undeveloped. The sale of the parcels may result in development which may cause a loss of flora and fauna on site as the property "will potentially support future substation and transmission upgrades that are in development at this time." Substation and Transmission upgrades may result in clear cutting, filling, and ongoing maintenance to vegetation to the site. The site is not known to host: rare, threatened, or endangered species as listed by New York State or the federal government; any species of special concern or conservation need or any habitat used by the same, as listed by New York State or the federal government. Accordingly, it is not anticipated that any loss of flora or fauna will have no or small impact to the environment.

Question #7(d), Impact on Transportation indicated the proposed action may result in a change to existing transportation systems. The Lehigh Valley Trail Ext, is a non-motorized trail that connects cyclists, pedestrians, and hikers to portions of the City of Rochester and the Town's of Brighton and Henrietta. By connections to other existing trails or mixed use paths, users can connect with many Monroe County communities via the Erie Canal Trail, Lehigh Valley Trail, Auburn Trail, Lake Ontario State Parkway Trail, the Genesee Riverway Trail, the Genesee Greenway Trail, and others. Accordingly, "future substation and transmission upgrades that are in development at this time" may impact the user experience, due to temporary construction debris, delay, or permanent change due to land use changes from forested and early-successional vegetation to developed or commercial land uses. Although, this sale may lead to potential substation and transmission upgrades that may impact the Lehigh Valley Trail the impact is expected to be small and/or temporary in nature.

Question #17, Consistency with Community Plans indicated that the potential development of these parcels for commercial or industrial use is not consistent with the adopted land use plans of the Town of Brighton. The majority of parcels are currently zoned Residential Large Lot (RLL) and future land use maps from "Envision Brighton 2028 - Comprehensive Plan" identify that this area, potentially parcels a part of this sale are identified as Town Parks and Open Space. Specifically, question 17(g) indicates that the proposed action may induce secondary impacts such as clearing of trees and vegetation, access roads, and commercial development in an area currently zoned residential large lot and proposed in a future land use map as Town Parks and Open Space. Although the area is envisioned as Town Park and Open Space, substations and transmission lines for utilities are ubiquitous in Monroe County and the Town of Brighton and are often intermixed into residential, rural, suburban, and commercial land uses. The development of such, may have small impacts to the community and be inconsistent with community plans, however these impacts may be further ameliorated by buffers, barriers, and site design that allow utilities or industrial uses to fit in to existing land uses or be in close proximity to dissimilar land uses.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept two (2) grants from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation ("NYSDEC") in the amounts of \$75,000 for the Climate Vulnerability Assessment and \$100,000 for the Climate Adaptation Plan.

Monroe County was awarded two (2) grants as part of an initiative by the NYSDEC to provide resources for projects aimed at addressing climate change and its effects. This project complements the goals established in the Monroe County Climate Action Plan, Phase I of which was approved by Your Honorable Body under Resolution 276 of 2022, and the Climate Smart Communities Program, which Your Honorable Body approved under Resolution 260 of 2020. As part of the Climate Smart Communities program, completion of these projects will further Monroe County's goal of achieving Silver Certification in the Climate Smart Communities Program, the highest level in the program.

The grants for the Climate Vulnerability Assessment and the Climate Adaptation Plan will support the development of a Monroe County Climate Adaptation and Resiliency Plan ("CARP"). The CARP will identify, analyze, and prioritize the effects of climate hazards and risks (such as flooding, heat stress, or drought), on specific population segments and the entire community, specific areas, assets, and entire systems. It will consider diversity, equity, inclusion, and justice issues since vulnerabilities will likely lead to varying risks across the diverse populations in our community.

This grant was submitted through the New York State Consolidated Funding Application program in 2022, and the award was announced in January 2023. The Monroe County Department of Environmental Services will lead the project funded by this grant and administer the grant requirements.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$75,000 grant from, and execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation for the Climate Vulnerability Assessment.
- 2. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$100,000 grant from, and execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation for the Climate Adaptation Plan.

- 3. Amend the 2023 operating budget of the Department of Environmental Services by appropriating the sum of \$175,000 into general fund 9300, funds center 8301020000 Climate Initiatives.
- 4. Amend the 2023 operating budget of the Department of Environmental Services by appropriating the sum of \$175,000 of general fund committed fund balance into general fund 9001, funds center 8301020000 Climate Initiatives.
- 5. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments.
- 6. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(27) ("conducting concurrent environmental, engineering, economic, feasibility and other studies and preliminary planning and budgetary processes necessary to the formulation of a proposal for action, provided those activities do not commit the agency to commence, engage in or approve such action") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

These grants require equal local funding matches, in the amounts of \$75,000 for the Climate Vulnerability Assessment and \$100,000 for the Climate Adaptation Plan. The local matches will require additional net County support, for which the appropriation of general fund committed fund balance is requested.

Extension of Provisions of Section 89-p of the New York State Retirement and Social

Security Law to Members Employed as Deputy Sheriff-Civil in the County of Monroe

Honorable Legislators:

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Sheriff Todd K. Baxter.

On April 11, 2023, Your Honorable Body adopted Resolutions 129 and 130 of 2023 requesting that the New York State Legislature enact legislation to amend the New York State Retirement and Social Security Law to change the retirement classification for deputy sheriffs-civil to allow for their retirement after twenty-five years of creditable service.

In response to Resolutions 129 and 130, the New York State Legislature enacted and Governor Kathy Hochul signed into law Section 89-x of the New York State Retirement and Social Security Law entitled "Retirement of deputy sheriffs-civil in Monroe county." The new State law became effective May 3, 2023 and will allow for the change in retirement classification for deputy sheriffs-civil in Monroe County under Section 89-p of the Retirement and Social Security Law and permit their retirement after twenty-five years of creditable service.

Section 89-x of the New York State Retirement and Social Security Law authorizes Monroe County to adopt a resolution on or before December 31, 2024 to extend the provisions of Section 89-p to members employed as deputy sheriff-civil.

The New York State and Local Retirement System estimates that the extension of the provisions of Section 89-p to members employed as deputy sheriff-civil will increase Monroe County's annual contribution to New York State for fiscal year ending March 31, 2024 by approximately \$24,000 and cause Monroe County to incur a past service cost of approximately \$147,000. In future years, the annual contributions will vary as the billing rates and salary of the affected members change.

The specific legislative action required is pursuant to Section 89-x of the New York State Retirement and Social Security Law, authorize the extension of the provisions of Section 89-p of the New York State Retirement and Social Security Law to those members employed as deputy sheriff-civil in Monroe County.

This is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR §617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for this action is included in the 2023 operating budget of the Sheriff's Office, fund 9001, funds center 3802010000, Civil Bureau, and will be requested in future years' budgets. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.

Amend the 2023-2028 Capital Improvement Program and the 2023 Capital Budget to Add a Project Entitled "CDC Annex - Mod B Renovation" and Authorize Financing for the Project

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2023-2028 Capital Improvement Program and the 2023 Capital Budget to add a project entitled "CDC Annex - Mod B Renovation," in the amount of \$1,000,000, and authorize financing for the project in the amount of \$1,000,000.

Pursuant to Resolution 62 of 2023, Your Honorable Body authorized a contract for the construction of new facilities at the Children's Detention Center in the Town of Rush. A notice-to-proceed was issued and the work began in May of this year. The project's estimated completion date is December 2024. In the interim, the Courts have increased the number of juveniles assigned to the Children's Detention Center and the occupancy limit at the Detention Center has been exceeded on various occasions. In response to the increased number of youths assigned to the Detention Center, the New York State Office of Children and Family Services ("OCFS") has permitted Monroe County to use the former Monroe County Correctional Facility located at 750 East Henrietta Road in the Town of Brighton for the supplemental placement of juveniles.

This project will create ten additional bedrooms and associated program space for the placement of juveniles at times when the Rush facility is at capacity. Modular Unit B at the former Monroe County Correctional Facility will be renovated to meet secure detention criteria to permit its potential use as a secure facility for juveniles. OCFS provided approval for design of this project on July 12, 2023. Over time OCFS will reimburse the County for forty-nine percent of the cost of constructing the secure detention beds.

This project will be considered by the Monroe County Planning Board on August 24, 2023.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend the 2023-2028 Capital Improvement Program to add a project entitled "CDC Annex Mod B Renovation," in the amount of \$1,000,000.
- 2. Amend the 2023 Capital Budget to add a project entitled "CDC Annex Mod B Renovation," in the amount of \$1,000,000.
- 3. Authorize financing for the project entitled "CDC Annex Mod B Renovation," in the amount of \$1,000,000.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR §617.5(c)(1) ("maintenance or repair involving no substantial changes in an existing structure or facility") and (2) ("replacement, rehabilitation or reconstruction of a structure or facility, in kind, on the same site, including upgrading buildings to meet building, energy, or fire codes unless such action meets or exceeds any of the thresholds in section 617.4 of this Part") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for this project, consistent with authorized uses, will be included in the capital fund to be created and any other capital fund(s) created for the same intended purpose. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.

Subject: Authorize Various Budget Appropriations Transfers Related to the 2023 Operating Budget

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a series of budget appropriations transfers which will revise the 2023 amended budget to conform to the 2023 anticipated financial needs. The reason for the necessity of these transactions is to allow for cash-funding of certain capital project expenditures, to better align employee benefit contracts with the Human Resources department, support higher service volumes at County parks and golf courses, and address other areas of need.

This action is consistent with similar actions taken in prior years during the 4th quarter. It is authorized by Monroe County Administrative Code Section A8-4, "Supplemental Appropriations", Section A8-6, "Unanticipated Revenues" and Section A8-8, "Budget Controls."

The specific legislative action required is to authorize various budget appropriations transfers related to the 2023 operating budget in accordance with the attachment hereto.

There will be no net effect on the County's property tax levy as a result of this action.
