Authorize Grant Contracts and Appropriation Transfers Pursuant the American

Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)

Honorable Legislators:

We recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize grant contracts with the agencies listed in Attachment A in a total amount not to exceed \$6,205,421 pursuant to the American Rescue Plan Act ("ARPA") for terms to commence on or after May 1, 2023 and terminate on or before December 31, 2026, and to authorize appropriation transfers.

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 was signed into law on March 11, 2021. ARPA allocated \$1.9 trillion in emergency relief and recovery, of which \$350 billion was designated to support state, local, territorial, and Tribal governments. Monroe County is the recipient of \$144,080,127 in State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds through ARPA. As part of its ARPA response, Monroe County designated a portion of its funds to support entities that provide fire protection services and/or certified ambulance and advanced life support first response services in Monroe County.

On December 16, 2022, Monroe County issued a Request for Proposals for entities that provide fire protection services and/or certified ambulance and advanced life support in Monroe County. Respondents were invited to submit grant proposals that complied with ARPA requirements, which included but were not limited to: improving the efficacy of public health and economic programs through tools like program evaluation, data, and outreach; restoring prepandemic employment in the public sectors; and COVID-19 mitigation and prevention. 25 proposals were submitted for consideration and 13 applications were selected.

## The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute grant contracts, and any amendments thereto, with the agencies listed in Attachment A in a total amount not to exceed \$6,205,421 for terms to commence on or after May 1, 2023 and terminate on or before December 31, 2026.
- 2. Authorize an appropriation transfer in the amount of \$4,000,000 from the Monroe County Legislature, general fund 9301, funds center 1001030000, Local Recovery Fund to the Department of Finance, general fund 9301, funds center 1403930103 ARPA-Public Safety.

- 3. Authorize an appropriation transfer in the amount of \$2,205,421 from the Department of Public Health, general fund 9001, funds center 5801090100 Pandemic Response to the Department of Finance, general fund 9301, funds center 1403930103 ARPA-Public Safety.
- 4. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of these funds, any returned contractor funds, or any deferred revenue, in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments.
- 5. Should funding of these programs be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program(s) and where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program(s). Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with the New York State Civil Service Law, and when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

The grant contracts are Type II Actions pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and (31) ("purchase or sale of furnishings, equipment or supplies, including surplus government property, other than the following: land, radioactive material, pesticides, herbicides, or other hazardous materials") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for these grant contracts will be included in the Department of Finance, general fund 9301, funds center 1403930103 ARPA-Public Safety once the appropriation transfers are authorized. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget

Each of these contractors has been reviewed for not-for-profit corporate status and the records in the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that none of these agencies owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes.

We recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.
