I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize contracts with Bonadio & Co. LLP for independent auditing services relating to the County of Monroe's (the County) basic financial statements, plus any contractually agreed upon supplemental services, subject to available appropriations, and for independent auditing services relating to Monroe Community Hospital's (the Hospital) basic financial statements, plus any contractually agreed upon supplemental services, subject to available appropriations, for the three (3) year period of January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2017, for the County in an amount not to exceed \$174,700 for the first year, \$178,750 for the second year and \$182,350 for the third year, and for the Hospital in an amount not to exceed \$32,900 for the first year, \$33,350 for the second year and \$33,940 for the third year, with the option to renew for two (2) additional one-year periods.

The current agreements with the County's Certified Public Accounting Firm, KPMG LLP and the Hospital's Certified Public Accounting Firm, Bonadio & Co. LLP, expired on September 30, 2014.

Services to be provided include expressing opinions on the fair presentation of the County's and the Hospital's basic financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America and other specific reports provided for in the request for proposals.

A request for proposals was issued for these contracts and Bonadio & Co. LLP was selected as the most qualified to provide the services.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or her designee, to execute a contract, and any amendments thereto, with Bonadio & Co. LLP, 171 Sully's Trail, Suite 201, Pittsford, New York 14534, for independent auditing services relating to the County of Monroe's basic financial statements, plus any contractually agreed upon supplemental services, subject to available appropriations, and for independent auditing services relating to the Monroe Community Hospital's basic financial statements, plus any contractually agreed upon supplemental services, subject to available appropriations, for the three (3) year period of January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2017, for the County in an amount not to exceed \$174,700 for the first year, \$178,750 for the second year and \$182,350 for the third year, and for the Hospital in an amount not to exceed \$32,900 for the first year, \$33,350 for the second year and \$33,940 for the third year, with the option to renew for two (2) additional one-year periods, in accordance with Section C2-6(C)(11), Section C6-5(C)(2)(d)(1) and Section C4-8(A) of the Monroe County Charter.

Environmental assessments were completed for these contracts and it was determined that there would be no significant effect on the environment.

Committee Assignment Memorializing Referral

RE: Memorializing the New York State Legislature to Pass and Governor Andrew Cuomo to sign Legislation to Better Regulate Hazardous Material Transportation Outside of New York City.

November 10, 2014

Honorable Legislators:

This year, new federal regulations have relegated the transportation of hazardous waste shipments in New York State to the New York City Fire Department. In the past, New York State has struggled with shipping regulations of dangerous materials, such as gasoline, oil and natural gas that could potentially put citizens at risk if mishandled. New York State is the only state in the nation where a local agency has taken control of state hazmat shipping regulations.

The U.S. Department of Transportation's new registry includes routes that have been designated for hazmat shipments and routes that prohibit hazmat shipping. However, there are currently no listings for the 57 counties outside of New York City, although the City has 47 listings. This lapse permits haulers of hazardous materials to transport hazardous materials through local neighborhoods, around lakes and across water sources like rivers and streams throughout New York—by road and rail. These hazardous material transporters are allowed to drive on any road that permits commercial truckers without any special regulations that consider the possible dangers of hazmat transport. When transported by rail, virtually no information is shared with local authorities about the material being transported or when it will be transiting their community.

The New York City Fire Department is responsible as the state agency for hazmat routing; however its purview is limited to the New York City. Steps must be taken to establish an agency or charge an existing agency such as the Department of Transportation to better handle these matters

Therefore, I urge you to join me in memorializing New York State Legislature to pass

and Governor Andrew Cuomo to sign legislation to better regulate hazardous material transportation outside of New York City.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the County of Monroe Industrial Development Agency (COMIDA), in the amount of \$270,000, for economic development activities, staff services and office expenses, for the period of January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2014.

These funds will be made available to the Monroe County Department of Planning and Development (MCDPD) to support activities to encourage the growth of jobs and businesses in the County; \$245,000 of these funds will be utilized to support MCDPD staff and programs; \$25,000 will be used for office expense reimbursement. In addition to providing staff services to COMIDA, the MCDPD conducts a Business Outreach Program, provides financial packaging and technical assistance to businesses and municipalities, coordinates planning and employment and training activities, and provides marketing and data to a wide variety of local businesses. This will be the 21st year the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents an increase of \$5,000 from past years.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or her designee, to accept a \$270,000 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the County of Monroe Industrial Development Agency, for economic development activities, staff services and office expenses, for the period of January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2014.
- 2. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments.
- 3. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the Monroe County Industrial Development Corporation (MCIDC), in the amount of \$90,000, to support economic development activities in Monroe County, for the period of January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2014.

These funds will be used to support economic development activities in the County. The Department of Planning and Development provides staff services to MCIDC, conducts a business outreach program, provides financial packaging, technical assistance to businesses and municipalities, and marketing and data to the public. This is the 25th year the County has received this grant from MCIDC. This year's funding represents an increase of \$25,000 from past years, due to the increased marketing, underwriting and servicing related to issuance of tax exempt bonds and Small Business Administration (SBA) 504 loans.

The specific legislative actions required are:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a contract with New York Correct Care Solutions Medical Services, P.C. (NYCCSMS), for the provision of necessary medical and mental health care and treatment to the inmates under the care and custody of the Monroe County Sheriff at the Sheriff's jail facilities, subject to available appropriations, for the three (3) year period of January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2017 in an amount not to exceed \$8,195,165 for the first year, \$8,170,165 for the second year, and \$8,413,841 for the third year, and with an option to renew for two (2) additional one-year periods in an amount not to exceed \$8,664,828 in the fourth year and \$8,923,343 in the fifth year.

NYCCSMS will be responsible for all medical and mental health services provided to the inmates at the Sheriff's jail facilities including, but not limited to, regular sick calls, necessary treatment and therapy, diagnostic tests and procedures, x-rays, physical medications, mental health services, and psychotropic medications provided to the inmates. Additionally, NYCCSMS will be responsible for all medical expenses related to necessary medical services including, but not limited to, hospitalizations, treatments, therapies, and diagnostic services provided outside of the County's facilities. Charges will be based upon the negotiated discounted rates paid by NYCCSMS to the outside provider.

A request for proposals was issued for this contract and New York Correct Care Solutions Medical Services, P.C. was selected as the most qualified to provide this service.

This Federal Fiscal Year 2014 grant provides funds for the law enforcement community to support their terrorism prevention and preparedness efforts. Honorable Legislators:

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Sheriff Patrick M. O'Flynn.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the United States Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF), in the total amount of \$50,000, in five (5) annual \$10,000 payments, for the ATF-Monroe County Sheriff's Office Explosive Task Force, for the period of October 1, 2014 through September 30, 2019.

The purpose of the grant is to provide a portion of the costs for Sheriff's Office overtime as a member of a collaborative task force assisting the ATF in the investigation of explosive incidents in the Monroe County, New York area. This is the sixth year the County has received this grant. This grant is for a five-year period and represents the same amount as the last five-year grant.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Honorable Legislators:

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Sheriff Patrick M. O'Flynn.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the Transportation Security Administration (TSA), in the amount of \$757,500, for the National Explosives Detection Canine Team Program (NEDCTP), for the period of October 1, 2014 through September 30, 2019.

The TSA NEDCTP provides partial funding for the deployment of three (3) certified TSA Nitrate Canine Road Patrol Deputies to the Greater Rochester International Airport. The Sheriff's Office will also be responsible for promptly responding to threats at support facilities, rail stations, airports, passenger terminals, seaports and surface carriers. Funds will be used to help support the handlers' salaries, fringe, overtime, uniforms, canine expenses, kenneling, equipment, gas and training for the three (3) Canine Deputies and their assigned canine partners. This is the seventh year of the contract and grant. Grant funding was reduced by \$30,000 per contract year because of the elimination of some program tasks by the NEDCTP.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Authorize the County Executive, or her designee, to accept a \$757,500 grant from, and to execute a contract, and any amendments thereto with, the Transportation Security Administration, for the National Explosives Detection Canine Team Program, for the period of October 1, 2014 through September 30, 2019.

- 2. Amend the 2014 operating grant budget of the Office of the Sheriff by appropriating the sum of \$151,500 into fund 9300, funds center 3803140000, Police Bureau Airport Security.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments.
- 4. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Sheriff Patrick M. O'Flynn.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Division of Criminal Justice (NYSDCJS), in the amount of \$5,000, for the Monroe County Sheriff's Office Communication Project, for the period of October 1, 2014 through September 30, 2015.

This funding was made possible through the efforts of Senator Michael Razenhofer.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the United States Department of Justice, Office on Violence Against Women, in the amount of \$650,000, for the Grants to Encourage Arrest Policies and Enforcement of Protection Orders Program; authorize an intermunicipal agreement with the City of Rochester, in an amount not to exceed \$98,598, for a Domestic Abuse Response Team (DART); a contract with The Legal Aid Society of Rochester, New York ("Legal Aid Society"), in an amount not to exceed \$236,840, for legal representation of domestic violence victims; and a contract with Alternatives for Battered Women, Inc. This program is a collaboration of partnerships between criminal justice agencies, victim service providers, and community organizations which respond to domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence and stalking in Monroe County. This grant will fund the following:

- The City of Rochester Police Department will provide DART, a team dedicated to providing targeted police work for high-risk domestic violence cases, and a Victim Assistance Counselor, who provides counseling, safety planning, and accompanies victims to court.
- Monroe County will employ a Criminal Law Assistant for the District Attorney's Office to
 act as a liaison between the attorney prosecuting misdemeanor and violation-level domestic
 violence cases and the victim advocates or victims; the Monroe County Office of Probation –
 Community Corrections will continue to employ an Intensive Supervision Probation Officer
 for the dedicated Domestic Violence Intensive Supervision Program.
- The contract with the Legal Aid Society will fund: 1) a part-time Domestic Violence Consortium Assistant to provide administrative support and assist in the implementation of the Lethality Assessment Protocol; and 2) a civil attorney to provide legal representation to victims seeking orders of protection, and for immigrant and limited English proficient victims seeking services.

 The contract with ABW will fund a victim advocate to provide collaborative-enhanced victim services to individuals petitioning for Orders of Protection in the Domestic Violence Intervention Court division of Family Court.

This will be the sixteenth year that the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents a decrease of \$108,333 annually in comparison to the previous grant award.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services, in the amount of \$15,944 for the Juvenile Accountability Block Grant, for the period of January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2015.

This grant will be used to provide the Girls Circle curriculum to 24 adjudicated female youth (age 9-18 years old) on probation. The Girls Circle curriculum is a research-based model consisting of a strength-based skill building approach which creates a safe place for girls to address their risky behaviors, build on protective factors, and improve relationships. It is recognized as a "promising approach" in the Office of Juvenile Justice Delinquency Prevention Model Programs Guide. Probation Officers will facilitate three 10-week sessions, with the sessions being held at the Office of Probation. Transportation will be provided for the participants to and from the sessions. This is the fifth time this grant is being funded by the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services. This year's funding represents a decrease of \$4,919.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Authorize the County Executive, or her designee, to accept a \$15,944 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services, for the Juvenile Accountability Block Grant, for the period of January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2015.

- 2. Amend the proposed 2015 operating grant budget of the Department of Public Safety, Office of Probation Community Corrections, by appropriating the sum of \$15,944 into fund 9300, funds center 2403020100, Juvenile & Family Services.
- 3. Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets, in the amount of \$131,075, for the Petroleum Product Quality Program, for the period of April 1, 2014 through March 31, 2019, payable in equal amounts of \$26,215 annually for the five-year period.

The Monroe County Weights and Measures Division have been performing petroleum quality screening and testing under an agreement with the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets since 1991. Overall, Monroe County has achieved a 99+% compliance rate. The program is designed to ensure the quality of gasoline and diesel products to the consumer. The program is funded from a small percentage of the New York State gasoline tax increase in 1990 and all costs incurred by the municipalities' participation are covered by New York State. Some of these costs include wages, benefits, administration, transportation and mileage, gasoline/diesel sample purchases, postage or any other expenses related to this program.

Detailed vouchers are submitted to New York State on a quarterly basis for reimbursement to the County. During the contract period, the State will establish a quota for gasoline/diesel samples. The County will randomly select retail sites throughout the course of the year for sampling so that nearly every retail gas station will submit samples to be tested. These samples are sent to the state-designated laboratory for testing under strict American Society for Testing Materials (ASTM) guidelines and results are monitored by the County for adherence to specifications. This will be the twenty third year the County has received this funding. This funding represents an increase of \$ 2,375 from the previous grant period.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Authorize the County Executive, or her designee, to accept a \$131,075 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets, for the Petroleum Product Quality Program, for the period of April 1, 2014 through March 31, 2019, payable in equal amounts of \$26,215 annually for the five-year period.

- 2. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements and to make any necessary funding modifications within grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments.
- 3. Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Governor's Traffic Safety Committee, in the amount of \$10,000, for the Child Passenger Safety Program, for the period of October 1, 2014 through September 30, 2015.

This grant will fund the purchase of child safety seats, supplies and handouts for the Office of Traffic Safety's fitting station. A staff member, through a monthly fitting station, will inspect and oversee the installation of child safety seats along with increasing the knowledge of Monroe County residents on the proper use and installation of child safety seats. This will be the 10th year the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents a decrease of \$2,580 from last year.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State STOP-DWI Foundation, in the amount of \$166,225, for DWI Crackdown Weekend Enforcement and Drug Recognition Expert (DRE) Call Outs, for the Department of Public Safety and the Office of the Sheriff, for the period of October 1, 2014 through September 30, 2015, and to authorize intermunicipal agreements with the ten (10) municipalities within Monroe County which have local police departments, and a contract with the New York State Park Police, for the period of October 1, 2014 through September 30, 2015.

The purpose of this grant is to reimburse local law enforcement agencies for overtime incurred during Crackdown Weekends and on DRE Call Outs. The Crackdown Weekends will be a concerted effort among the different police agencies to have extra patrols during specified weekends in order to minimize the number of impaired driving crashes. DRE's are police officers who are trained and certified to recognize impairment in drivers suspected of being under the influence of drugs other than, or in addition to, alcohol. The DRE's may be called out to perform post-arrest examinations for drug impaired drivers. Funding is in the amount of \$117,775 for the Department of Public Safety and in the amount of \$48,450 for the Sheriff's Office. This will be the fourth year the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents an increase of \$14,206.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or her designee, to accept a \$166,225 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State STOP-DWI Foundation, for DWI Crackdown Weekend Enforcement and Drug Recognition Expert Call Outs, for the period of October 1, 2014 through September 30, 2015.

Honorable Legislators:

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept additional funding from the New York State Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance, in the amount of \$64,128, for the Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP), for the period of October 1, 2013 through September 30, 2014.

In February 2014, Your Honorable Body accepted funding for 2013-2014 in the amount of \$1,103,383. Since that award, Your Honorable Body accepted an additional allocation, via Resolution 235 of 2014, which brought the 2013-2014 total award to \$1,550,369. This new funding brings the total award to \$1,614,497.

This program provides funds for low income, elderly and public assistance households to help meet the cost of energy bills. A portion of the program funding is used for the administration of the grants. Although New York State issues the actual HEAP payment, Monroe County is responsible for determination of eligibility, transaction processing and payment issuance of some emergency or unusual payments. This is the thirty-second year the County has received this grant.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Amend Resolution 235 of 2014 to accept an additional \$64,128 from, and execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance, for the 2013-2014 Home Energy Assistance Program, bringing the total award to \$1,614,497, for the period of October 1, 2013 through September 30, 2014.

2. Amend the 2014 operating grant budget of the Department of Human Services, Division of Social Services, by appropriating the sum of \$64,128 into fund 9300, funds center 5117010000, Home Energy Assistance Program.

Environmental assessments were completed for this grant and it was determined that there would be no significant effect of the environment.

Partial funding for this grant is included in the 2014 operating grant budget of the Department of Human Services, fund 9300, funds center 5117010000, Home Energy Assistance Program. The appropriated amount will adjust the current funding to that established by the grant. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 267 of 2013 to accept additional funds from the New York State Office of Mental Health, in the amount of \$1,034,325, and amend Resolution 291 of 2013 to increase the current contract with Coordinated Care Services, Inc. (CCSI), for the provision of mental health, developmental disabilities, and alcoholism and substance abuse services for 2014, for the period of January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2014.

CCSI coordinates and manages community behavioral health services in accordance with the local Mental Hygiene Services Plan by contracting with a wide range of local, direct services agencies. The increase of \$1,034,325 is based on the availability of reinvestment funding associated with the New York State Office of Mental Health's commitment to enhance community-based services with the intent of reducing admissions and length of stay within inpatient psychiatric settings.

This is the twenty-second year Monroe County has received this grant and represents an increase of \$387,548 over last year's funding for these programs. This additional funding will bring the grant total to \$35,895,142.

A Request for Proposals was solicited for this service and CCSI was selected as the most qualified to provide this service.

Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, where applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

Monroe County Office of Mental Health, Department of Human Services Purchase of Service Summary Information – 2015 Contract

The Monroe County Office of Mental Health (MCOMH) is the entity required under NYS Mental Hygiene Law for a county to receive state aid for mental hygiene services from the NYS Office of Mental Health, the NYS Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services, and the NYS Office for People with Developmental Disabilities (NYS Mental Hygiene Law 41.03). MCOMH receives dollars through a multitude of funding streams from the three state Offices; some of these are strictly pass-through funds; some are designated for a specific purpose; and some are more flexible in their application. These funds are then allocated by the Monroe County Office of Mental Health to providers to meet specific local needs. When mental hygiene funds pass through MCOMH, local ability to allocate, solicit stakeholder input, and assure provider accountability is greatly strengthened. The Legislative Referral to authorize a contract with Coordinated Care Services. Inc. for the Provision of Mental Health, Alcoholism and Substance Abuse, and Developmental Disability Services for 2015 represents the appropriation of federal, state and county mental hygiene dollars to Coordinated Care Services. Inc., the contract management entity for the MCOMH.

Along with the above fiduciary responsibility, each Local Governmental Unit (LGU) is also charged with ensuring services in the county for those who need mental health, alcohol and substance abuse, and/or developmental disabilities services. As the designated entity for Monroe County, MCOMH oversees the local, comprehensive mental hygiene service system with support from Coordinated Care Services, Inc. (CCSI), which acts on behalf of, and under the direction of, MCOMH. In order to oversee the mental hygiene system, MCOMH relies upon its local Behavioral Health Community Database along with NYS OMH and OASAS data to generate a comprehensive picture of system level and agency level performance. Additional qualitative measures are collected by both MCOMH and NYS OMH or NYS OASAS through the contract monitoring process. In addition contract management staff participate in agency and program site visits which include reviews of staff credentials, board membership, program/client records, reportable incidents, policies and procedures, and interviews with staff and clients.

CCSI Purchase of Service (POS) Information*

The attached POS is divided into four sections: one for LGU Functions and Special Projects provided by CCSI, and one each for subcontracts in the three disability areas: Mental Health (MH): Alcoholism and Substance Abuse (ASA), and Developmental Disabilities (DD). Within each of the disability areas, agency information is supplied followed by each program in that agency having a deliverable for MCOMH through the CCSI contract.

Maintaining access to a coordinated, comprehensive continuum of treatment, recovery, and rehabilitative mental hygiene services is one indicator of the mental hygiene system's ability to meet community needs and is a requirement of all contracts issued by CCSI on behalf of MCOMH. Therefore, capacity (where applicable) and/or the number of individuals served is the primary performance indicator for the programs listed on the following pages. A secondary indicator of performance is also identified for each program: the secondary indicator focusing on program outcomes. Please note that the performance and outcome indicators listed in this document are merely a small subset of the indicators MCOMH utilizes to monitor program performance. It is also important to note that the outcomes indicator listed for each program may represent only a portion of the individuals served in the program. In addition to routine monitoring of trends, incidents, complaints, and other pertinent issues, certain programs participate in evaluations of effectiveness (including cost savings) conducted on an annual basis and/or submit annual reports that are closely reviewed by MCOMH staff.

The public behavioral health service sector will undergo a significant transition and transformation in the following 12 to 24 months. The following three initiatives will significantly impact both the service delivery system and the provider network:

- Transition of Medicaid behavioral health services from fee-for-service reimbursement to a managed care environment
- Transition of behavioral health service treatment model focus away from inpatient psychiatric and rehabilitation units and into community-based living and recovery support services
- Transformation of the Medicaid service delivery system via regional networks of providers within the context of the New York State Delivery System Reform Incentive Payment (DSRIP)

The identified initiatives are being driven by state practice and policy change and will significantly impact the service delivery system within the local Monroe County community. Therefore, the planning and system oversight function of MCOMH will continue to be crucial to ensure that state driven practice changes is implemented within the local community in a manner that is most comprehensive and most effectively links individuals with the appropriate level of service to meet their individual needs.

The goals of a clinic treatment program that serves children are early assessment and identification of childhood emotional disturbances and engagement of the child and family in developing a plan of care designed to minimize the symptoms and adverse effects of illness, maximize wellness, assist the child in developing a resilient and hopeful approach to school, family, and community, and to maintain the child in his or her home and community.

PROS programs are the result of a New York State Office of Mental Health statewide initiative to consolidate a range of services previously available through a number of separate mental health programs (e.g., Continuing Day Treatment, Intensive Psychiatric Rehabilitation Treatment, supported employment, transitional employment, etc.). The goal of the program is to integrate treatment, support, and rehabilitation in a manner that facilitates the individual's recovery. Goals for individuals in the program are to: improve functioning, reduce inpatient utilization, reduce emergency services, reduce contact with the criminal justice system, increase employment, attain higher levels of education, and secure preferred housing. There are four Components in the PROS program: Community Rehabilitation and Support (CRS); Intensive Rehabilitation (IR); Ongoing Rehabilitation and Support (ORS); and Clinical Treatment, an optional component of a PROS program. Challenges in moving this population toward employment have resulted in lower than anticipated employment outcomes at discharge, but program continues to actively address this

STAGES is a prevention program to boost self-esteem and encourage children to make positive and healthy choices in daily activities. The program partners with schools and community-based programs to deliver services. The overall goal of the program is to provide at-risk youth with the life skills, tools, and knowledge to confidentially face challenges in their varying environments. In order to assist in this goal, the curriculum includes self-esteem, feelings, anger management, communication, drug and alcohol prevention, and the importance of values and goals. The program meets during and after school depending on the needs of the participating school district. The after-school program is two hours per meeting, and during the school day the program runs for 45 minutes per meeting. These programs run for 12-14 consecutive weeks following the school calendar. A summer program is also offered four days a week for two weeks. It is expected that STAGES staff will have regular contact with school counselors, parents, and teachers of all participants.

In prior years, STAGES has held open summer sessions through local community-based programs (such as community centers), having very high numbers (200+) begin the program but only a handful of these youth completing the session. Beginning in 2014, STAGES is serving fewer youth in their summer programming, however the completion rate has increased significantly, meaning more youth are receiving the full benefits of STAGES programming.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept two (2) grants from the Oswego County Soil and Water Conservation District, the first in the amount of \$38,250, for the period of April 1, 2013 through March 31, 2015, and the second in the amount of \$49,920, for the period of April 1, 2013 through March 31, 2016, both for the Water Quality Program.

The purpose of these grants is to assist counties, which are members of the Finger Lakes-Lake Ontario Watershed Protection Alliance (FL-LOWPA), in funding programs to improve water quality. Oswego County Soil & Water Conservation District is the sponsor organization for FL-LOWPA responsible for the administration of this grant. In Monroe County, program components will include implementing the County's water quality management plan through planning, education, and implementation of individual projects to improve water quality. The grants will be used to undertake various studies to address water quality issues and promote water quality education as well as partially fund the County's share of the Monroe County – United States Department of the Interior Geological Survey Cooperative Agreement for monitoring water quality, and for oxygen and tank rental for the Irondequoit Oxygenation project. This will be the twenty-first year the County has received grants for this program. This year's funding level is increased by \$11,670 from the prior appropriation due to New York State Legislative appropriation of the Environmental Protection Fund.

Per Resolutions 226 of 2004 and 314 of 2009, Your Honorable Body authorized an intermunicipal agreement with municipal corporations to reduce stormwater pollution and protect water quality in Monroe County and to comply with Federal Phase II Stormwater Regulations set forth by the United States Environmental Protection Agency and the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation.

The Coalition's purpose is to: work collaboratively to facilitate compliance with the New York State MS4 General Permit requirements; reduce stormwater pollution and improve water quality; and facilitate the use of existing or future resources, organizations and programs to meet the regulatory and environmental goals.

The Coalition members contribute an annual base fee and supplement fee. The base fee is \$5,000 for regulated towns, \$2,500 for regulated villages, \$2,000 for non-regulated towns, and \$1,250 for non-regulated villages. The supplemental fee is based on population data obtained from the 2010 census and is calculated as \$0.14 per resident for all regulated Coalition members. The County provides staff and other in-kind services in lieu of paying a fee.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2014-2019 Capital Improvement Program, the 2014 Capital Budget, and Bond Resolution 7 of 2014 to expand the scope and increase the project authorization for the Terminal Improvements Project at the Greater Rochester International Airport; and authorize a contract with CHA Consulting, Inc., in the amount of \$606,494.31, for design services, for the Terminal Improvements Project at the Greater Rochester International Airport.

The original project scope included construction of new walls, corridors, and passenger circulation modifications to support both improved circulation and to provide additional leased space for airline usage. It has been determined that the current HVAC and building management systems have reached the end of their operational usefulness and need to be upgraded. This project will upgrade the Airport's HVAC system including replacement of two (2) water towers and related piping, along with the installation of a new energy management control system. The project will improve HVAC system reliability and decrease energy consumption for heating and cooling in the main air carrier terminal building. The total estimated project cost is now \$4,500,000.

Approximately 64% of this project will be funded by passenger facility charges and the remainder from local share funding through the Monroe County Airport Authority.

The Department of Aviation recommends authorization of a contract with CHA Consulting, Inc., a designated airport consultant per Resolution 241 of 2011, to provide design services for the Terminal Improvements Project in the amount of \$606,494.31.

This project is scheduled to be considered by the Monroe County Planning Board at its November 20, 2014 meeting.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Amend the 2014-2019 Capital Improvement Program to expand the scope of the "Terminal Improvements Project" at the Greater Rochester International Airport to include the upgrade of the Airport's HVAC system and to provide for a \$3,000,000 increase in the cost of the project making the total project cost \$4,500,000.

Both bond issues are callable June 1, 2015 and conditions in the bond market offer the potential for significant savings to taxpayers if the County refinances all or a portion of the outstanding balance of these bond issues by issuing refunding bonds. This would have the effect of reducing the interest cost of the original bond issues since the refunding bond issue would incur a lower interest cost and therefore result in lower debt service cost.

While the exact amount of savings cannot be determined until the interest rates for the refunding bonds are set, it is anticipated that the present value savings will be in excess of \$5 million over the remaining life of the bond issues.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the issuance of refunding bonds in a total amount not to exceed \$86 million. The proceeds will be used to pay the remaining debt service costs (or portions thereof) associated with the 2005 and 2007 Public Improvement Bonds.

Environmental assessments were completed for the issuance of refunding bonds and it was determined that there would be no significant effect on the environment.

No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body enact a Local Law authorizing the sale of a surplus parcel of real property consisting of approximately 0.92 acres of improved land on East Henrietta Road in the Town of Brighton, having an address of 1285 East Henrietta Road, to B&R (NY) Realty, LLC, for the negotiated sale price of \$240,000.

This parcel was acquired in 1981 and is a vacant single story structure. The sale price of the property is based upon the valuation found in an independent appraisal performed by Midland Appraisal.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Schedule and hold a Public hearing on the proposed Local Law.
- 2. Enact a Local Law authorizing the County Executive, or her designee, to execute all necessary documents, deeds and agreements to effectuate the sale of a surplus parcel of County owned real property consisting of approximately 0.92 acres of improved land on East Henrietta Road in the Town of Brighton held in trust for Monroe Community College, having an address of 1285 East Henrietta Road and tax identification #149.18-2-2, to B&R (NY) Realty, LLC, for the negotiated sale price of \$240,000.

An environmental assessment was completed for the sale of the surplus property and it was determined that there would be no significant effect on the environment.

No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

The records in the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that B&R (NY) Realty, LLC does not owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.

Authorize an Intermunicipal Agreement with the City of Rochester Regarding the City of

Rochester's Use of the Monroe County Jail for the Detention of Non-Arraigned Detainees and

Arrestees

Honorable Legislators:

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Sheriff Patrick M. O'Flynn.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize an intermunicipal agreement with the City of Rochester, permitting the City to use the Monroe County Jail to detain non-arraigned detainees and arrestees, and to pay the County the amount of \$500,000 for the period of January 1, 2014 through June 30, 2014. Thereafter, the City shall pay the County at the rate of \$109.92 per non-arraigned detainee and arrestee, with a minimum required payment to the County in the amount of \$1,000,000 per City fiscal year, for the period of July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2019.

The City of Rochester does not have its own detention facility to hold individuals arrested or otherwise detained by its Police Department and would like to utilize the services of the Monroe County Jail as opposed to building and maintaining its own detention facility. The amount received from the City will reimburse the County for the costs of providing these services. New York Correction Law §500-a requires and authorizes Monroe County to enter into an agreement with the City of Rochester to use the Monroe County Jail to provide such services to the City. Monroe County has provided these services to the City of Rochester in the past, and most recently pursuant to an agreement authorized by Resolution 262 of 2012. This is the 11th year of this effort. The annualized amount of the agreement anticipates a slight increase from that in previous years.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or her designee, to enter into an intermunicipal agreement, and any amendments thereto, with the City of Rochester, permitting the City to use the Monroe County Jail to detain non-arraigned detainees and arrestees, and to pay the County in the amount of \$500,000 for the period of January 1, 2014 through June 30, 2014 and thereafter, at the rate of \$109.92 per non-arraigned detainee and arrestee, with a minimum required payment to the County in the amount of \$1,000,000 per City fiscal year, for the period of July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2019.

Environmental assessments were completed for this agreement and it was determined that there would be no significant effect on the environment.

This agreement is revenue generating and no net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.
