Memorializing the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) to

Reconsider Overreaching Emergency Response Regulations

Honorable Legislators:

Across America, from small towns to suburban neighborhoods, volunteer firefighters—our neighbors, friends, and community members—are the backbone of emergency response. These dedicated individuals risk their lives to protect us, often with limited resources and without the backing of large municipal budgets. Yet, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) is poised to impose sweeping new regulations that would undermine the very fabric of these volunteer firefighting agencies.

On February 5th of this year, OSHA proposed a series of regulations to update the Fire Brigades Standard with a new Emergency Response Standard. While these regulations aim to enhance safety for firefighters and emergency responders, they take a one-size-fits-all approach that threatens to decimate volunteer fire departments across the nation. We believe safety is paramount—but not at the cost of the very services these regulations intend to protect.

The proposed rules mandate excessive training, burdensome medical programs, and unnecessary equipment upgrades that would disproportionately affect volunteer fire departments. For example, OSHA's regulations would require comprehensive medical exams every two years, additional health and fitness programs, and frequent assessments—all well beyond what is necessary for the majority of volunteer departments, who serve smaller, less active communities. The training requirements alone would force volunteer firefighters to undergo ten times the current training—a requirement that's not only unrealistic but detrimental to recruitment and retention efforts.

OSHA's proposal also mandates expensive equipment replacements, such as fire trucks and turnout gear, based purely on age rather than actual condition. This would compel departments to replace serviceable trucks every 15-20 years and gear every 10 years, regardless of whether they remain in safe working order. For rural or less active departments, this would be a devastating, unfunded mandate that many simply cannot afford. These regulations place an unfair burden on volunteer departments, which make up the majority of fire services in the United States. With no financial support from federal or state governments, many volunteer agencies will be forced to shut down, leaving millions of Americans without fire protection. This

top-down regulatory overreach not only threatens the livelihood of local fire services but also endangers the safety of the very communities OSHA claims to protect.

We must prioritize common sense over bureaucracy. Local leaders, not federal regulators, understand the unique needs of their communities. It is imperative that OSHA reconsider its one-size-fits-all Emergency Response Standard and allow volunteer fire departments the flexibility to manage their own operations. Therefore, we urge you to join us in calling upon OSHA to revise these unnecessary and damaging regulations. The safety of our firefighters and the strength of our communities depend on it.

Honorable Legislators:

New York State has long been a leader in expanding access to services, but when it comes to transportation for individuals with disabilities, there is more work to be done. While existing law requires that 65% of buses be accessible to those with disabilities, this falls short of ensuring fair and equitable access across all areas of the state. Many residents still face challenges when trying to travel independently, which hampers their ability to fully participate in daily life and the workforce.

Bill A4165/S9703 addresses this critical gap by requiring accessible buses within a three-mile radius of any bus line operated by the authority or its subsidiaries, ensuring that individuals with disabilities have reliable transportation options regardless of where they live within the service area. This common-sense reform moves us toward 100% accessibility for local fixed-route bus services, promoting independence and dignity for all citizens. In addition, it is understood that transportation providers may face operational challenges in achieving full compliance – that is why this bill takes a pragmatic approach by exempting buses with a useful life of six years or less, ensuring that improvements are phased in without imposing an undue burden on local authorities.

Accessible transportation is not just a matter of equity—it is a matter of economic efficiency. When residents with disabilities are able to move freely and access jobs, education, and healthcare, they contribute more fully to our economy and communities. Ensuring reliable, accessible transportation allows everyone to participate in society without unnecessary barriers, reducing dependency on other forms of assistance and promoting personal responsibility.

New York should be setting the standard for transportation accessibility, showing that we can balance fairness and practicality without overburdening taxpayers or local governments. This legislation ensures a responsible path forward, providing a clear timeline for progress while considering the realities of implementation. Therefore, we urge you to join us in supporting Bill A4165/S9703 to improve access to public transportation for all.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2024-2029 Capital Improvement Program, the 2024 Capital Budget, and Bond Resolution 488 of 2021 to expand the scope and increase funding for the project entitled "County Office Building Reconstruction;" and authorize contracts with Steve General Contractor, Inc. in the amount of \$2,092,000 for general construction, Bell Mechanical Contractor, Inc. in the amount of \$6,594,400 for mechanical construction, and Concord Electric Corporation in the amount of \$2,530,000 for electrical construction for the County Office Building Reconstruction project.

The Monroe County Office Building ("COB") is a 168,000 square foot, 4-story building located at 39 West Main Street originally completed in 1896. Building systems and equipment are decades old and reaching the end of their useful service life due to age and obsolescence. Monroe County Department of Environmental Services ("DES") completed a Master Plan report in 2009 that identified deficient building infrastructure including recommendations for phased mechanical, electrical, plumbing, HVAC, envelope, energy, and code improvements to maintain the operational integrity of the building and continuity of services to users of the COB. Electrical upgrades were completed in 2012. Several bathrooms were upgraded in 2014. The exterior windows were renovated/replaced in 2021. This project will upgrade HVAC systems, enhance security infrastructure, make improvement required by the NYS Uniform Code, and improve reliability of the elevators at the COB.

Your Honorable Body, through Bond Resolution 488 of 2021, authorized financing for improvements at the COB in the amount of \$10,000,000. The increased need for security, conformance with building codes, upgrades to elevators, and contemporary construction escalation results in the need to increase the total bonding authorization for the project in the amount of \$9,900,000, from \$10,000,000 to \$19,900,000.

The bids have been reviewed by M/E Engineering, P.C., the design consultant, and were found to be acceptable in terms of scope. The Department of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion ("DEI") reviewed the Utilization Plans submitted by the low bidders and found all to be acceptable except that submitted by Landry Mechanical Contractors, Inc. ("Landry"). Several documented communications occurred between DEI and Landry which resulted in Landry failing to meet the criteria of Gantt's Law (Local Law No. 6-2021 adopted by Your Honorable Body) for meeting the Minority Business Enterprise ("MBE") utilization goals. DES, DEI, the Division of Purchasing and Central Services, and the Law Department met to review Landry's MBE Utilization Plan and determined Landry Mechanical Contractors, Inc. to be non-responsive to the public bid requirements. DEI reviewed the MBE Utilization Plan of the next low mechanical bid, submitted by Bell Mechanical Contractor, Inc., and found it to be acceptable. I recommend the award of construction contract to the lowest responsible bidders: Steve General Contractor, Inc. in the amount of \$2,092,000 for General Construction; Bell Mechanical Contractor, Inc., in the amount of \$6,594,400 for Mechanical Construction; and Concord Electric Corporation in the amount of \$2,530,000 for Electrical Construction.

This project is scheduled to be considered by the Monroe County Planning Board on September 26, 2024.

Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract with Bell Mechanical Contractor, Inc., 105 Lincoln Parkway, East Rochester, New York 14445 in the amount of \$6,594,400 for mechanical construction services for the "County Office Building Reconstruction" project, and any amendments necessary to complete the project within the total capital fund(s) appropriation.
- 6. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract with Concord Electric Corporation, 305 Pinewild Drive, Suite 4, Rochester, New York 14606 in the amount of \$2,530,000 for electrical construction services for the "County Office Building Reconstruction" project, and any amendments necessary to complete the project within the total capital fund(s) appropriation.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(2) ("replacement, rehabilitation or reconstruction of a structure or facility, in kind, on the same site, including upgrading buildings to meet building, energy, or fire codes, unless such action meets or exceeds any of the thresholds in section 617.4 of this Part") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for this project, consistent with authorized uses, will be available in capital fund 1850 once the additional financing authorization requested herein is approved, and in any capital fund(s) created for the same intended purpose. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

The records in the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that neither Steve General Contractor, Inc., Bell Mechanical Contractor, Inc., Concord Electric Corporation, nor any of their principal officers, owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes. Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body determine whether the Village of Brockport West Avenue Sidewalk Extension Project, partially funded through Monroe County may have a significant adverse impact on the environment pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA").

This project involves Monroe County providing funding to the Village of Brockport to install 2,370 linear feet of new concrete sidewalks between Carolin Drive and Briar Rose Lane on the south side of West Avenue. The Village will also install eight detectable warning plates at curb ramps and street crossings on this stretch of West Avenue. This project will extend the sidewalk system that currently ends at Carolin Drive further west to increase pedestrian safety.

- 1. Determine that the Village of Brockport West Avenue Sidewalk Extension Project is an Unlisted Action.
- 2. Make a determination of significance regarding the Village of Brockport for the West Avenue Sidewalk Extension Project pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.7.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to take such actions to comply with the requirements of SEQRA, including without limitation, the execution of documents and the filing, distribution and publication of the documents required under SEQRA, and any other actions to implement the intent of this resolution.



I recommend that Your Honorable Body determine whether the Town of Brighton Allens Creek Road, Edgewood Avenue, Elmwood Avenue and Westfall Road Sidewalk Extension Project, partially funded through Monroe County, may have a significant adverse impact on the environment pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA").

This project involves Monroe County providing funding to the Town of Brighton to install 6,300 +/- linear feet of ADA compliant, five-foot wide concrete sidewalk at four locations: 1. Elmwood Avenue (north side) between 2700 Elmwood Avenue and Highland Avenue (2,450 LF), 2. Westfall Road (north side) between Roosevelt Road and Monroe Avenue, Westfall Road (south side) between Del Rio and Edgewood Avenue (2,850 LF); 3. Edgewood Avenue (west side) between 17 Edgewood Avenue and Monroe Avenue (500 LF); 4. Allens Creek Road (north side) between Monroe Avenue and Schoolhouse Lane (800 LF).

- 1. Determine that the Town of Brighton Allens Creek Road, Edgewood Avenue, Elmwood Avenue and Westfall Road Sidewalk Extension Project is an Unlisted Action.
- 2. Make a determination of significance regarding the Town of Brighton Allens Creek Road, Edgewood Avenue, Elmwood Avenue and Westfall Road Sidewalk Extension Project pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.7.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to take such actions to comply with the requirements of SEQRA, including without limitation, the execution of documents and the filing, distribution and publication of the documents required under SEQRA, and any other actions to implement the intent of this resolution.

The State Environmental Quality Review Act regulations found at 6 NYCRR Part 617 requires that no agency shall carry out or approve an Action until it has complied with the requirements of SEQRA.

This designation will have no impact on the revenues or expenditures of the current Monroe County budget.







The Town of Brighton 2024 Sidewalk Project involves installation of 6,300 +/- linear feet of ADA compliant, five-foot wide concrete sidewalk at four locations: 1. Elmwood Avenue (north side) between 2700 Elmwood Avenue and Highland Avenue (2,450 LF), 2. Westfall Road (north side) between Roosevelt Road and Monroe Avenue, Westfall Road (south side) between Del Rio and Edgewood Avenue (2,850 LF); 3. Edgewood Avenue (west side) between 17 Edgewood Avenue and Monroe Avenue (500 LF); 4. Allens Creek Road (north side) between Monroe Avenue and Schoolhouse Lane (800 LF).

The Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) EAF Mapper indicated that the sidewalk projects are near various environmental remediation sites. The Town and Country Dry Cleaners site is listed as a State Superfund Site and located approximately 750 feet northwest of the Edgewood sidewalk project, 1,350 feet north of the Westfall Road sidewalk project and 2,300 feet northwest of the Allens Creek Road sidewalk project. The remediation site will not impact these sidewalk projects as remedial actions are complete and measures are in place to control the potential for coming in contact with contamination remaining at the site. The Carriage Cleaners is a State Superfund Site and is located approximately 1,000 feet south of the Elmwood Avenue sidewalk project. This site will not impact the sidewalk project as remedial actions have successfully achieved soil cleanup objectives for commercial use. Residual contamination in the soil, groundwater, and indoor air is being managed under a Site Management Plan.

Portions of the Edgewood Avenue, Elmwood Avenue and Westfall Road project are in a 100 year floodplain, however the impact will be negligible as the sidewalks will be constructed in an already developed area adjacent to existing roads. The Allens Creek Road sidewalk project is not within a floodplain. These sidewalk projects do not impact any structures more than 50 years old. The projects will not impact existing natural resources, historical or cultural resources and will not alter the existing community character or increase traffic. The proposed actions are consistent with existing land use. Accordingly, the proposed actions will have no significant effect upon the environment and is determined to be a negative determination.

Section 131-k of the New York State Highway Law provides that the County Legislature may appropriate funding to a municipality within the County for the construction, reconstruction or improvement of any highway, bridge, culvert or arterial roadway situated within the County. The City desires that the County provide funding for the construction, reconstruction or improvement of City streets that carry arterial designations. Funding for these services will be programmed in future Monroe County Capital Improvement Programs as funding is available.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 155 of 2021 to increase and extend the contracts with the County of Monroe Industrial Development Agency from the amount of \$200,000 to the amount of \$333,895 for general planning services, and Environmental Design & Research, Landscape Architecture, Engineering & Environmental Services, DPC ("EDR") from the amount of \$184,953 to the amount of \$318,848 for professional consulting services for the Monroe County Comprehensive Plan, and to extend the contract period through December 31, 2026, with the option to extend for one (1) year at no additional cost.

Monroe County's last Comprehensive Plan was adopted over forty years ago. The updated Comprehensive Plan will be a blueprint that guides decision-making for the County, its municipalities, and its residents for years to come. The Plan process will lead to a community-inspired vision, community supported goals, and implementable strategies to guide policy and investment within and throughout the County.

The additional funding is essential for expanding public engagement and enabling the project team to address critical issues such as public safety, public health, workforce development, and other emerging concerns within the County. An extension of the contract and the provision of these additional funds is necessary for EDR to finalize the Comprehensive Plan and ensure that the Plan meets the needs and priorities of the community.

- 1. Amend Resolution 155 of 2021 to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to increase the contract with the County of Monroe Industrial Development Agency for general planning services from the amount of \$200,000 to the amount of \$333,895 and to extend the time period through December 31, 2026.

The Operations Center was recently awarded funding to continue to provide for congestion management at local signalized intersections by a central computer that maintains and improves acceptable levels of service to reduce congestion as well as for eligible Operations Center facility expenses. The Operations Center provides efficient traffic operations and congestion management at local signalized intersections through the Intelligent Transportation System, which is a combination of a centralized traffic signal system and a network of closed circuit traffic monitoring cameras. This system allows the Operations Center to provide reliable and consistent traffic signal operation, continuously monitor traffic conditions, and make real time adjustments to the traffic signal operation to accommodate changes in traffic flow and in response to traffic incidents.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a contract with Game Plan Marketing, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$50,000 to provide media buying services for departments of Monroe County for the period of August 1, 2024 through August 1, 2025, with the option to renew for four (4) additional one-year terms at rates increasing annually in an amount not to exceed 3.0%.

To ensure appropriate reach of Monroe County's departmental public service announcements, commercials, and advertisement campaigns to its residents, it is necessary that Monroe County Communications and Special Events contract with a vendor that is able to provide media buying services, including but not limited to creative design, scriptwriting, talent acquisition, video and animation production, graphic design and visual effects, audio production and airtime management and acquisition for print, radio, television or online digital delivery as necessary to communicate key messages. The vendor must be prepared to deliver final productions of commercials, advertisements, or public announcements in Spanish language, as required by departments.

A Request for Proposals was issued, with Game Plan Marketing, Inc. as the successful respondent.

The County workforce provides critical services throughout the county and it is imperative that positions are filled and services are able to be delivered to residents.
