Hello Friends:

Thank you for reviewing the 2022 STOP DWI Report. As you can see, Monroe County continues its commitment to keeping our roads safe, through DWI prevention, awareness, enforcement and education. Together, the Monroe County Public Safety Department, Office of Probation, and STOP-DWI collaborate with the Sheriff's Office and other law enforcement agencies to discourage anyone from driving while impaired.

Monroe County Law Enforcement Agencies received approximately \$140K from the local STOP-DWI Program in 2022, resulting in 1,640 local DWI arrests. As part of their DWI enhanced enforcement efforts, local law enforcement also participated in several High Visibility Engagement Campaign Holiday Periods in conjunction with the NYS STOP-DWI Foundation, spreading the message to all that driving while impaired will not be tolerated.

1,038 people attended DWI Victim Impact Panels in 2022, which feature DWI victims addressing an audience of DWI offenders about the traumatic and lifelong consequences of driving while impaired. These panels are open to the public for educational purposes, and often welcome high school and college students. There is no substitute for hearing directly from those who have been personally impacted by impaired driving incidents - these are some of the most impactful programs offered by the Monroe County STOP DWI effort. In addition, an outgrowth of these panels is the Victim Advocacy Program, which provides resources for therapeutic events, support onsite, among other connections to victims and survivors of DWI.

Despite all of our progress, this is an issue that requires our constant vigilance and continued focus and effort, to ensure that we continue to have an impact. Each and every driver has the opportunity to make this community a safer and better place by choosing not to drive under the influence of alcohol and other drugs - and by helping your loved ones make safe choices. It is important to remember that we all have a role to play in saving lives. Thank you for your efforts.

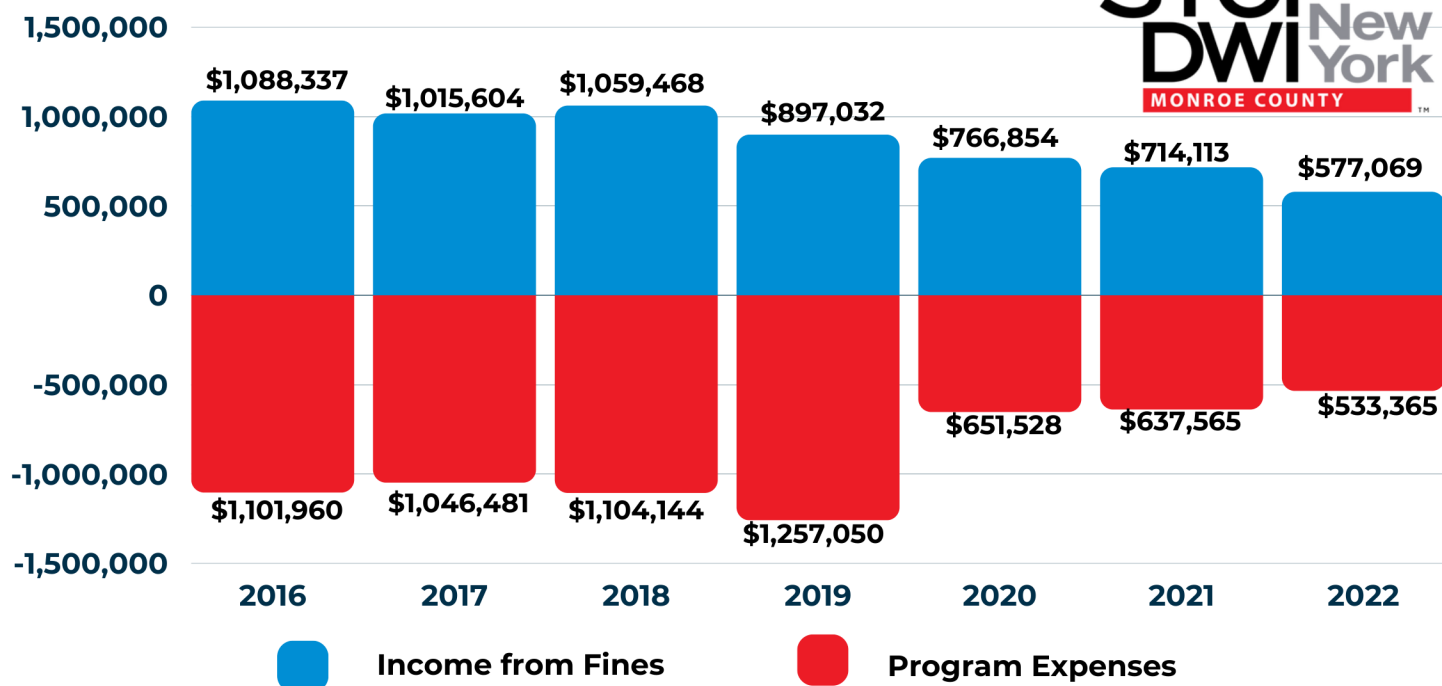

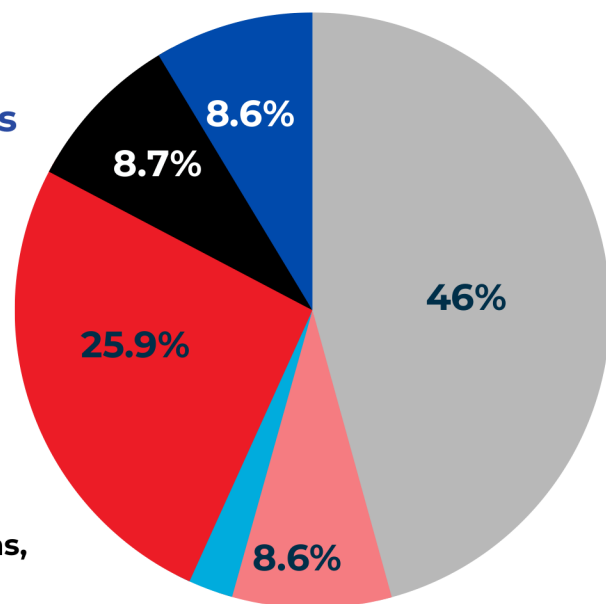


INCOME & EXPENSES



2022 Approved Budget

- Administration and Victim Impact Panel**
46% Our staff works tirelessly to implement every piece of the program and constantly be the known source for all things impaired driving prevention.
- Enhanced Enforcement**
25.9% With our funding coming from fines, proper equipment, training and overtime compensation is crucial for more arrests.
- Probation & Community Corrections**
8.7% Our DWI division within probation oversees an average of around 700 defendants who've proven to be high risk.
- Pre-Trial Services**
8.6% Defendants who are deemed appropriate by the DAs office are sent to diversion programs in an effort to rehabilitate.
- District Attorney's Office**
8.6% To help ensure proper staffing for convictions, our program funds some of the Vehicular Crimes Bureau within the DA's Office
- Public Information & Education**
2.2% Much of our administrative work comes in bringing awareness among as many community members as possible. For this we need supplies.



In 2022 our office was able to attend 25 community events including parades during High Visibility Engagement periods; fire and law enforcement open houses and national night out events; 6 inner city events; and more. Our expanded reach has brought our team to neighborhoods we wouldn't have previously had a presence, but there is a great need. We also were able to expand our Lights on for Life Motorcade, and presence at our sponsored Amerks Game and Red Wings Game.

For 2022, had the ability to bring back high school mini grants, with the added request of follow up for audience involvement and their exposure to STOP-DWI. This data will be used for the best approach in a more hands on offering going forward.

DWI VICTIM IMPACT PANEL

The Monroe County DWI Victim Impact Panel (VIP) consists of DWI victims addressing an audience of DWI offenders about the impaired driving crashes in which they experienced injury or a loved one was killed. The goal of the panel is to deliver a message to raise awareness of the ripple effect of impaired driving with the intent to save lives and decrease recidivism. This does not replace conventional sentencing but supplements it. The VIP fees collected are allocated to the Victim Honorariums, staff, security, equipment, and more. The first DWI Victim Impact Panel was held in Monroe County in January 1992. The Panel is required as a sentencing tool for all DWAI/DWI offenders and is open to the public for educational purposes.

In 2022, we moved our panels to a smaller venue receiving positive feedback, with many of our panelists finding they like the intimacy of the space and ability to better see faces. We also started a new lineup in November with STOP-DWI and statistical information starting out the first part of the program. This is helpful in giving context to the defendants in their ability to make a change going forward.



Victim Advocacy

While our office no longer contracts for a Victim Advocate, we have taken on the clerical responsibilities and expanded our partnerships for further advancements in the future.

- ♥ Providing outreach to DWI victims and informing them of resources and events offered in the community.
- ♥ Coordinating and scheduling speakers for panels.
- ♥ Support victims on site and ensure they are not alone.
- ♥ Continue to solicit funding for therapeutic outreach.

VIP Appreciation Dinner

Around fifty people attended the STOP-DWI VIP volunteer dinner at Nucci's Italian Steakhouse on November 16. We were fortunate to be able to show our gratitude to volunteers for their support and victims for their willingness to share their personal experiences. Thirty certificates of appreciation were presented to the various attendees who make the Victim Impact Panel possible.



According to New York State Law, an individual is Driving While Ability Impaired (DWAI) if his/her Blood Alcohol Concentration (BAC) is between .05 and .07. They are considered Driving While Intoxicated (DWI) if their BAC is .08 or higher. They are considered Aggravated DWI if their BAC is .18 or higher. They are considered Driving While Ability Impaired by Drugs (DWAI-D) if the driver is impaired by drugs.

In 2022, Monroe County DWI/DWAI arrests totaled 1,640 which is over a 12% increase from the 1,462 arrests made in 2021. Outside of these arrests, officers have increased engagement with the community at various events run by our office.

Monroe County Law Enforcement Agencies received a sum of \$139,332 from the STOP-DWI Program in 2022 for use in their DWI enhanced enforcement efforts. This includes not only enforcement, but also various equipment and training needs.

Monroe County STOP-DWI Program also received a grant in the amount of \$50,110 for High Visibility Engagement Campaign holiday periods from the NYS STOP-DWI Foundation. This supported efforts during Memorial Day, July 4th, and Labor Day.

STOP-DWI & Traffic Safety Board Awards

In 2022, we were able to get back to an in-person awards event with a small reception honoring those who have worked extra hard on keeping our roads safe. Three police departments received awards for their increased DWI efforts: Greece Police Dept., SUNY Brockport Police Dept., and New York State Police Dept. The STOP-DWI "Top Cop" was awarded to Officer Joseph Bonacci, Rochester Police Department. Twenty-two officers (including probation) were chosen by their departments to receive certificates for their great efforts. This year we also had a Lifetime Leadership award to RPD Officer Sam Weech & a Coordinator's Choice Award to Officer Dennis Schultz. They are both always willing to mentor and lead their peers.

The awards and reception are intended to keep the officers motivated to focus on the problem of impaired driving in our community and show our appreciation for their partnerships. We are eternally grateful!



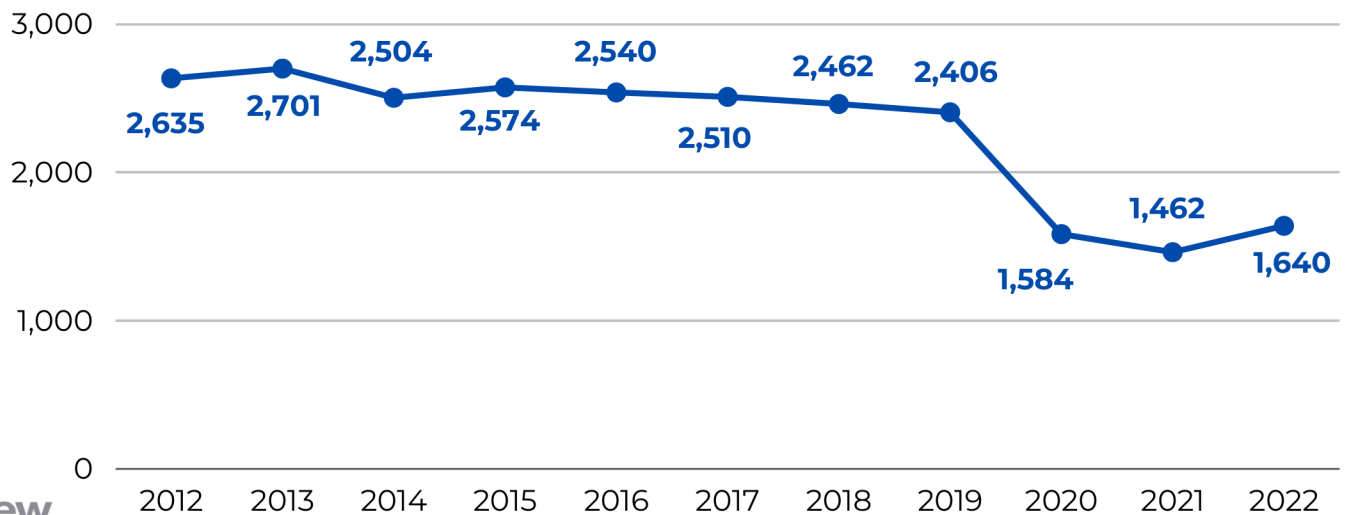

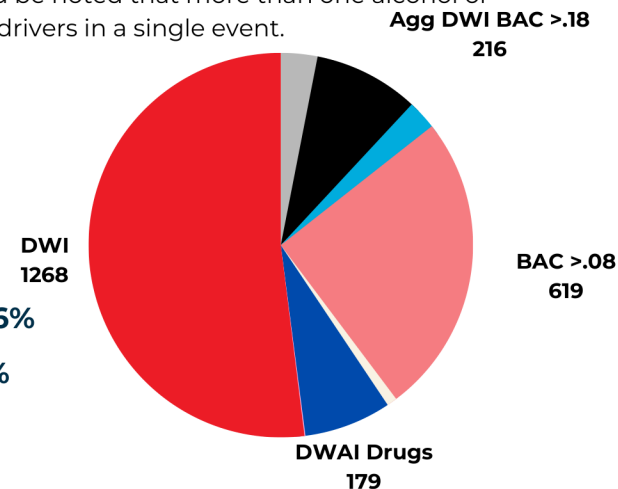
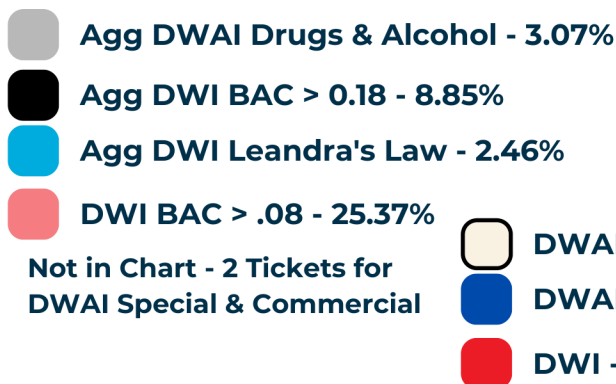

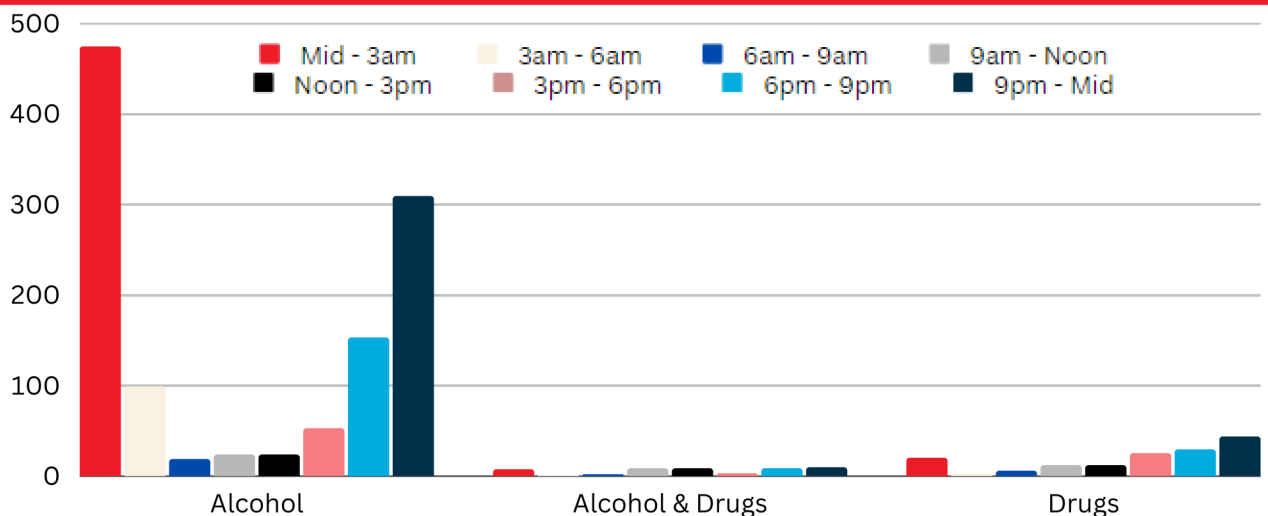

Alcohol vs. Drug Tickets by Time of Day

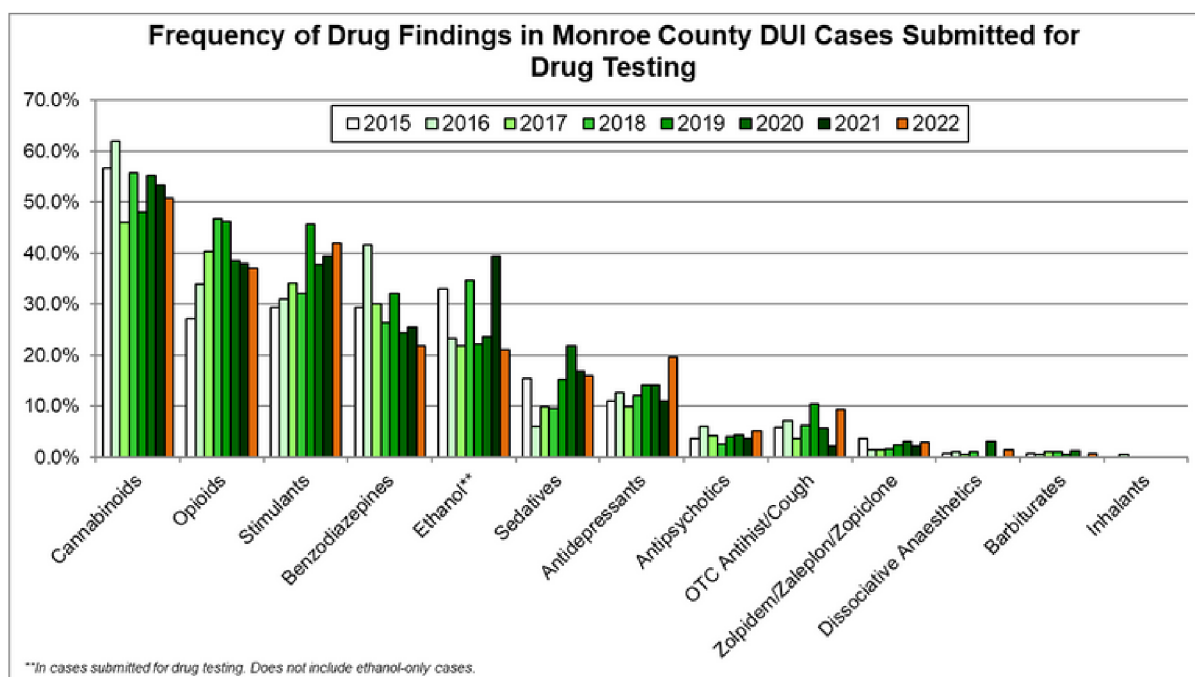

As part of a grant received from the Governor's Traffic Safety Committee, the Forensic Toxicology Laboratory within the Monroe County Medical Examiner's Office is required to report drug and alcohol findings to our Technical Advisory Panel quarterly. While submissions for drugs are down, their work is crucial all around in demonstrating drug trends, whether designer, poly-substance, increases of lesser-known substances and more!

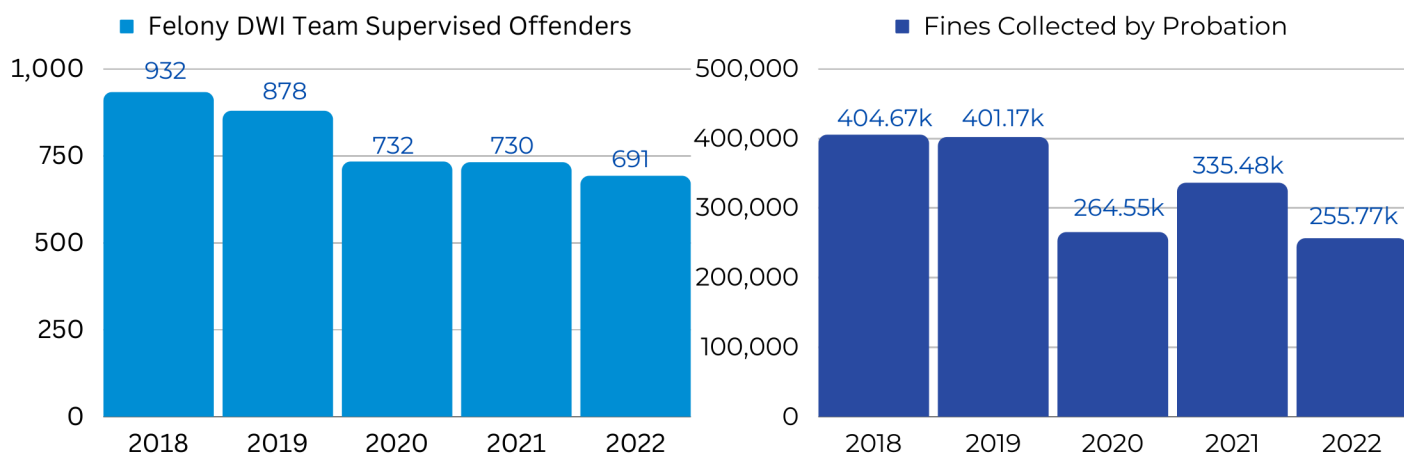


The Monroe County Office of Probation -- Community Corrections received \$49,660 from STOP-DWI in 2022 to support services of two high risk DWI units. During 2022, these units supervised on average 691 high risk offenders at any given point during the year.

The DWI Felony units are comprised of nine Probation Officers who supervise offenders, two Officers who prepare DWI Pre-Sentence Investigations and two Senior Probation Officers who supervise offenders and have additional DWI related duties. One Senior Probation Officer is the assigned Ignition Interlock Monitor for Probation, and another is the STOP-DWI Liaison for Probation.

STOP-DWI funds 25% of this liaison's salary, as this Officer provides assistance to STOP-DWI in the coordination of routine Victim Impact Panels. Duties include obtaining volunteers to work at the Victim Impact Panel, providing payment collection at check in and administering Alco-sensor tests prior to being admitted. The Officer also helps in securing the location used for the panels and the dates that the panels will be held.

At the end of the year, this Officer provides information needed for financial reimbursement to STOP DWI. This Officer is also responsible for maintaining statistics related to DWI Surveillance details that they coordinate and results of routine home visit monitoring. Overall, the Office of Probation supervised DWI offenders from a total of 1,143 cases during 2022. This includes supervision of misdemeanor DWI offenders, offenders convicted of Vehicular Assault, Vehicular Manslaughter, Leaving the Scene of an Accident in which an Injury Resulted in Death, and numerous offenders convicted of Aggravated Unlicensed Operator.

In 2022 this Office monitored a total of 1,440 offenders who were ordered to have an Ignition Interlock Device as a restriction (902 probationers and 538 conditional discharge offenders). This monitoring includes reporting to respective Probation Officers, courts and the State of New York on any violations.

Probation Officers frequently conduct monitoring of DWI offenders to ensure compliance with the conditions of probation. DWI Surveillance Details are assembled to target offenders deemed at risk for repeated offenses. The Details are conducted with the goal of enforcing conditions of probation, prohibiting unlicensed operation of a motor vehicle and the consumption of alcohol.

Alco-sensor tests enable officers to confirm the absence or presence of alcohol and, if appropriate, to quickly intervene through either a Violation of Probation and/or suitable treatment alternatives. Urine-screen tests are also conducted in the office to detect the use of alcohol, marijuana, cocaine, amphetamines, benzodiazepines, and morphine-based drugs. Early detection and expedient intervention further protect the community and enhance public safety.

The Office of Probation and Community Corrections is committed to continuing monitoring of high-risk probationers convicted of DWI offenses. The Office remains highly motivated to pursue the mission of ensuring public safety through vigorous monitoring of those sentenced offenders, particularly those sentenced to probation for DWI offenses.

Pre-Trial Felony DWI Diversion

Felony DWI Diversion is a deferred prosecution program whereby all criminal proceedings are delayed while the client engages in a planned treatment program. The client is monitored in the treatment program over a six- to eight-month period.

Participation is voluntary and clients must agree to immediately surrender their driver's license upon entering the program and pay a program fee. Clients are screened through the District Attorney's Vehicular Crimes Bureau before referral to the Diversion program.

Successful completion of Felony DWI Diversion program is based on the client's ability to demonstrate significant attitudinal and behavioral change, and results in an offer to plead to a misdemeanor in satisfaction of the felony charge. If the client fails to follow through on the treatment plan and the Diversion contract requirements, the case is returned to court for prosecution. Diversion is offered only once.

Pre-Trial Felony DWI Diversion saw Fifty-eight cases for intake in 2022. 62 Cases were closed successfully in 2022 as many are carried from the previous year. Of those both closed and opened in 2022, 79.3% were successful.

Pre-Trial Services is committed to providing effective intervention with multiple DWI offenders and will continue to measure the long-term outcomes for the Felony DWI Diversion Program.

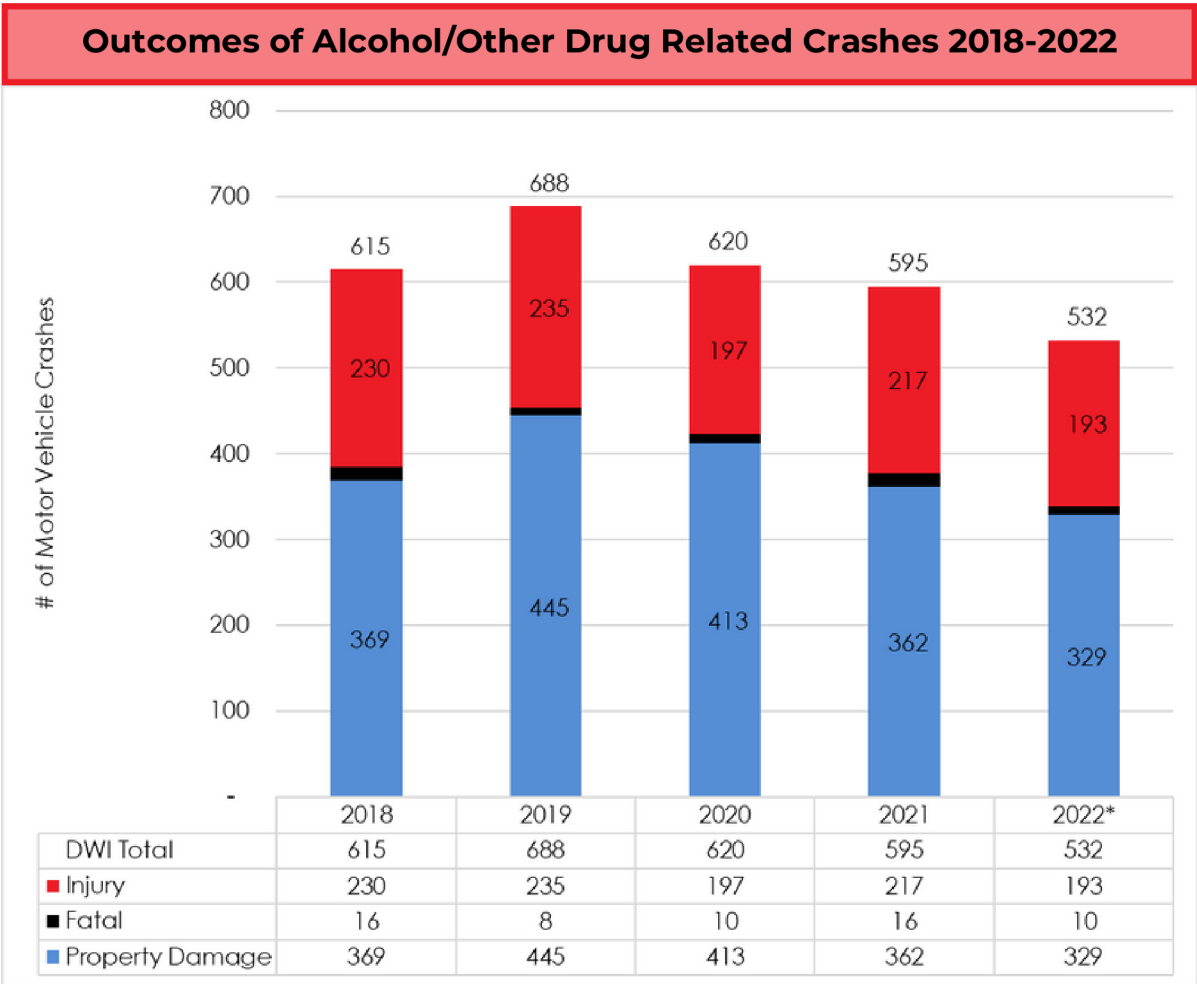
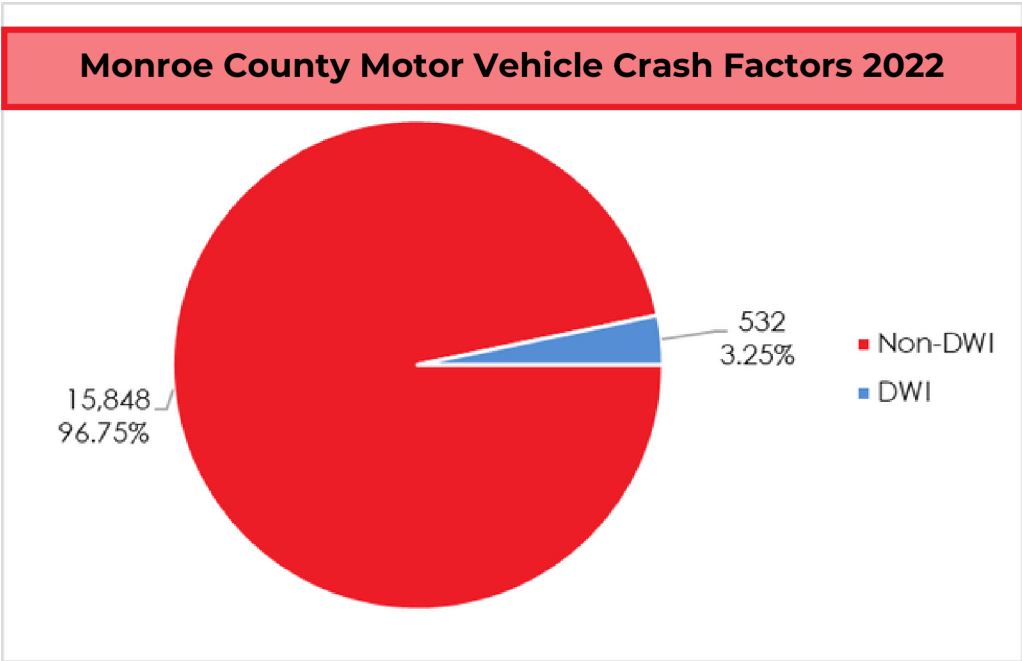
Driving Under the Influence Program

Structured to provide a sentencing option for those convicted of DWI, the Driving Under the Influence program offers an intervention-focused approach. Those sentenced to this program attend structured classes from Tuesday through Wednesday evenings, addressing important issues such as alcohol abuse, personal responsibility and reducing risk-taking behaviors. Judges sentence offenders for a specific number of weeks. Clients are required to pay a program fee. Both attendance and client progress are monitored closely by the staff and reported back to the court.

During 2022, 139 clients were sentenced to the program. Of those who completed within the year, 92.8% did so successfully. The average number of weeks spent in the program was 5.99.

STOP-DWI funds supplied \$49,600 to support this sentencing option in 2022.

TRAFFIC CRASH STATISTICS

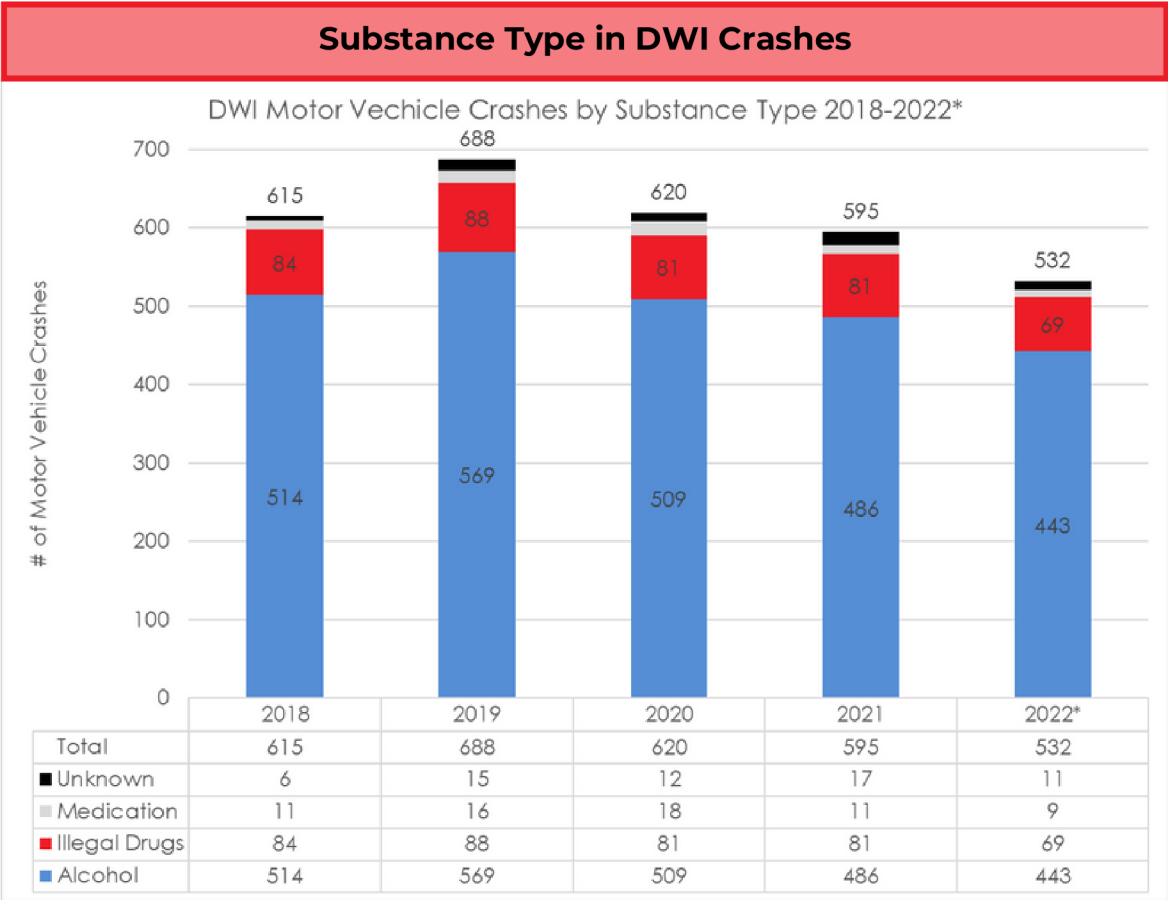
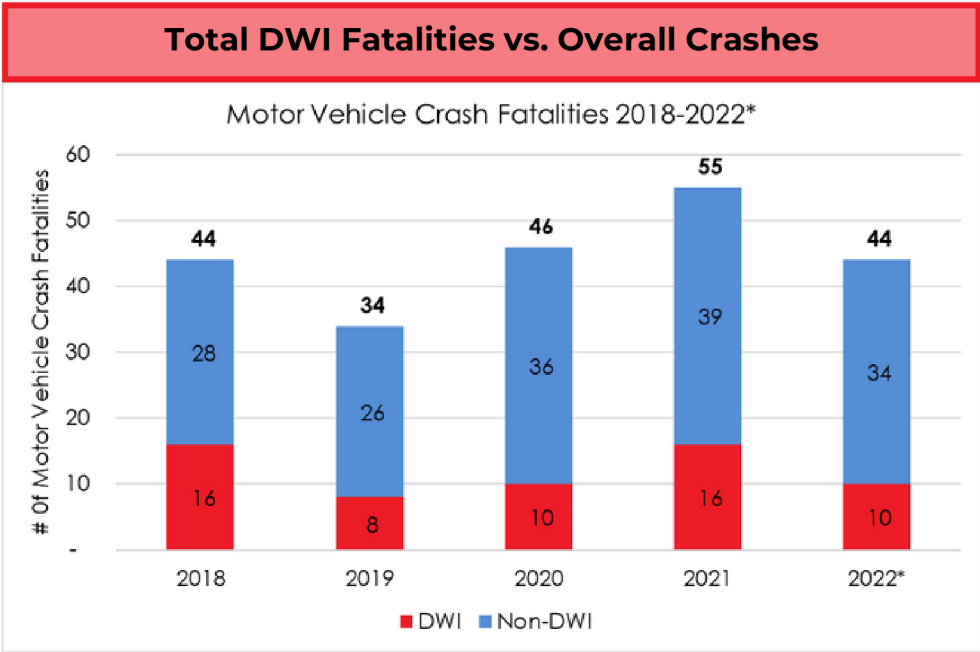

There were a total of 44 Traffic Fatalities in Monroe County during 2022, with ten, or 23% being related to alcohol or another drug. In order to determine alcohol and/or other drug involvement, one or more of the following DMV guidelines was utilized:

- Alcohol and/or other drugs were listed as a contributing factor on the report.
- A summons was issued for drinking and driving, and/or other drugs.
- A fatality involving a driver, pedestrian, or bicyclist was found to have alcohol and/or other drugs present.
