Greetings,

Thank you for reviewing the 2023 STOP DWI Report. Monroe County is committed to keeping roads safe through a robust STOP DWI program that includes prevention, awareness, enforcement, and education. The Monroe County Public Safety Department, Office of Probation, and STOP-DWI collaborate together with the Monroe County Sheriff's Office and other law enforcement agencies to discourage anyone from driving while impaired.

In 2023, Monroe County law enforcement agencies received approximately \$116K from the local STOP-DWI Program, resulting in 1,339 local DWI arrests. As part of their DWI-enhanced enforcement efforts, local law enforcement also participated in several High Visibility Engagement Campaign Holiday Periods in conjunction with the NYS STOP-DWI Foundation, sending the message to all that driving while impaired will not be tolerated.

In 2023, 972 people attended DWI Victim Impact Panels where DWI victims addressed an audience of DWI offenders about the traumatic and lifelong consequences of driving while impaired. These Victim Impact Panels are very impactful as there is no substitute for hearing directly from those personally affected by impaired driving incidents. These educational panels are open to the public and high school and college students often attend. Another outgrowth of these panels is the Victim Advocacy Program, which provides resources for therapeutic events, onsite support, and networking connections to victims and survivors of DWI.

STOP-DWI requires our constant vigilance and ongoing focus to ensure that we continue to have an impact. Every driver has the opportunity to make this community safer by choosing not to drive under the influence of drugs and alcohol - and by helping our loved ones make safe choices. It is important to remember that we all have a role to play in saving lives. Thank you for your efforts.

Our team is so grateful to have many incredible Department of Public Safety partners that afford us the ability to have a strong presence in the community. Working within this department provides us with so many opportunities!


As shown throughout this report, this support is imperative in allowing us the ability to showcase the importance of prevention for impaired driving.

### **Community Events**

In 2023 our office was able to attend over 30 community events including parades during High Visibility Engagement periods; fire and law enforcement open houses and national night out events; events in underserved neighborhoods; and more. ### **Traffic Safety Education**





# WI VICTIM IMPACT

The Monroe County DWI Victim Impact Panel (VIP) consists of DWI victims addressing an audience of DWI offenders and guests about the impaired driving crashes in which they experienced injury or a loved one was killed. The goal of the panel is to deliver a message to raise awareness of the ripple effect of impaired driving with the intent to save lives and decrease recidivism. This does not replace conventional sentencing but compliments it. The VIP fees collected are allocated to the Victim Honorariums, staff, security, equipment, and more. The first DWI Victim Impact Panel was held in Monroe County in January 1992. The Panel is required as a sentencing tool for all DWAI/DWI offenders and is open to the public for education.

In 2023, we featured two panelists at each panel with STOP-DWI and statistical information starting out the first part of the program. This is helpful in giving context to the defendants in their ability to make a change going forward. This also shows them the makeup of the audience to show they are not alone in their specific decision, whether drugs or alcohol related.



### **Victim Advocacy**

In April of 2023 our office put on a wonderful Therapeutic Summit for the community in honor of National Crime Victims' Rights Week thanks to a grant from Office of Victim Services. Monroe County Victim Advocates helped us curate presentations to provide healing, resiliency, and resources for positive futures of crime victims going forward. With a Zoom and in person option, this event brought networking to help let them know they're not alone.



### **VIP Appreciation Dinner**

Forty-five people attended the STOP-DWI Victim Impact Panel appreciation dinner at Nucci's Italian Steakhouse on November 27. We were fortunate to be able to show our gratitude to volunteers for their support and victims for their willingness to share their personal experiences. Twenty-three certificates of appreciation were presented to the various attendees who make the Victim Impact Panel possible.

















AW ENFORCEMENT

According to New York State Law, an individual is Driving While Ability Impaired (DWAI) if his/her Blood Alcohol Concentration (BAC) is between .05 and .07. They are considered Driving While Intoxicated (DWI) if their BAC is .08 or higher. They are considered Aggravated DWI if their BAC is .18 or higher. They are considered Driving While Ability Impaired by Drugs (DWAI-D) if the driver is impaired by drugs. In 2023, Monroe County DWI/DWAI arrests totaled 1,339. Outside of these arrests, officers have increased engagement with the community at various events facilitated by our office.

Monroe County Law Enforcement Agencies received a sum of \$116,367 from the STOP-DWI Program in 2023 for use in their DWI enhanced enforcement efforts. This includes not only enforcement, but also various equipment and training needs, as well as time in court.

Monroe County STOP-DWI Program also received a grant in the amount of \$63,000 for High Visibility Engagement Campaign holiday periods from the NYS STOP-DWI Foundation. We expanded efforts in 2023 to start off with New Years and enforce during St. Patrick's Day, Memorial Day, July 4th, and Labor Day.

### **STOP-DWI & Traffic Safety Board Awards**

In 2023, we got back to our traditional awards luncheon hosting over 106 people as we honored those who have worked extra hard on keeping our roads safe. Three police departments received awards for their increased DWI efforts: Monroe County Sheriff's Office, Irondequoit Police Department and Brockport Police Department. The STOP-DWI "Top Cop" was awarded to Officer Marcus Capeder, Brighton Police Department. Twenty-one officers were chosen by their departments to receive certificates for their great efforts. This year we also had a Leadership award to RPD Officer Jason Lathrop & a Coordinator's Choice Award to MCSO Captain Frederick Bancroft III for their roles in innovating and teaching for the county as a whole.

The awards and reception are intended to keep the officers motivated to focus on the problem of impaired driving in our community and show our appreciation for their partnerships. We are eternally grateful!

A Drug Recognition Expert (DRE) is a police officer specially trained in recognizing symptoms & behaviors that are caused by drugs. A DRE evaluation is requested when impairment is evident, and alcohol is not suspected, or the impairment is inconsistent with the BAC. The DRE gathers evidence to further support signs of impairment by drugs, a medical issue, or no impairment. There were 151 DRE evaluations conducted in Monroe County during 2023.










### **Forensic Toxicology Drug Submissions**

As part of a grant received from the Governor's Traffic Safety Committee, the Forensic Toxicology Laboratory within the Monroe County Medical Examiner's Office is required to report drug and alcohol findings to our Technical Advisory Panel quarterly. Drug testing submissions have increased and this work is crucial all around in demonstrating drug trends, whether designer, poly-substance, increases of lesser-known substances and more!




The Monroe County Office of Probation - Community Corrections received \$30,750 from STOP-DWI in 2023 to support services of two high risk DWI units. During 2023, these units supervised on average 615 high risk offenders at any given point during the year.

The DWI Felony units are comprised of twelve Probation Officers who supervise offenders, three Officers who prepare DWI Pre-Sentence Investigations and one Probation Assistant who solely monitors conditional discharge cases. Additionally there are two Senior Probation Officers who supervise high risk offenders. One monitors all active Ignition Interlock Devices (IID) which includes installations, deinstallations, subsidized installations and violations of the IID. The other Senior Probation Officer serves as the STOP-DWI liaison.

STOP-DWI funds 10% of this liaison's salary, as this Officer provides assistance to STOP-DWI in the coordination of routine Victim Impact Panels. Duties include obtaining volunteers to work at the Victim Impact Panel, providing payment collection at check in and administering Alco-sensor tests prior to being admitted.

At the end of the year, this Officer provides information needed for financial reimbursement to STOP DWI. This Officer is also responsible for maintaining statistics related to DWI Surveillance details that they coordinate and results of routine home visit monitoring. Overall, the Office of Probation supervised DWI offenders from a total of 1,733 cases during 2023. This includes supervision of misdemeanor DWI offenders, offenders convicted of Vehicular Assault, Vehicular Manslaughter, Leaving the Scene of an Accident in which an Injury Resulted in Death, and numerous offenders convicted of Aggravated Unlicensed Operator.

### **Probation Monitoring**

In 2023 this Office monitored a total of 2,163 offenders who were ordered to have an Ignition Interlock Device as a restriction (1,217 probationers and 946 conditional discharge offenders). This monitoring includes reporting to respective Probation Officers, courts and the state on any violations.

Probation Officers frequently conduct monitoring of DWI offenders to ensure compliance with the conditions of probation. DWI Surveillance Details are assembled to target offenders deemed at risk for repeated offenses. The Details are conducted with the goal of enforcing conditions of probation, prohibiting unlicensed operation of a motor vehicle and the consumption of alcohol.

Alco-sensor tests enable officers to confirm the absence or presence of alcohol and, if appropriate, to quickly intervene through either a Violation of Probation and/or suitable treatment alternatives. Urine-screen tests are also conducted in the office to detect the use of alcohol and/or drugs. Early detection and expedient intervention further protect the offender, the community and enhance public safety.

The Office of Probation and Community Corrections is committed to continuing monitoring of high-risk probationers convicted of DWI offenses and ensuring public safety through vigorous monitoring of those sentenced offenders, particularly those sentenced to probation for DWI offenses.

In 2023, the Monroe County Office of Probation collaborated with MCSO & RPD to conduct a plain clothes surveillance detail outside the Probation office. In total 208 probationers were surveilled, resulting in 26 (12.5%) probationers being observed operating a motor vehicle without a valid license. Multiple citations, criminal charges, and Probation violations were issued.

### **Driving While Intoxicated Felonies**

The Vehicular Crimes Bureau of the District Attorney's Office received \$30,750 in STOP-DWI funds in 2023.

### **Pre-Trial Felony DWI Diversion**

Felony DWI Diversion is a deferred prosecution program whereby all criminal proceedings for cases screened to Pre-Trial Diversion are delayed, following an upfront plea to a felony DWI, while the client engages in a planned treatment program. The client is monitored in the treatment program over a six- to eight-month period. Participation is voluntary and clients must agree to immediately surrender their driver's license upon entering the program and pay a program fee. Clients are screened through the District Attorney's Vehicular Crimes Bureau before referral to the Diversion program.

Favorable termination from the Felony DWI Diversion program is based on the client's ability to demonstrate significant attitudinal and behavioral change and follow through on the treatment plan and Diversion contract requirements. This results in an offer to withdraw their felony plea, plead guilty to a misdemeanor, and be sentenced to 3 years of probation.

If termination is unfavorable, then the case proceeds to sentencing on the felony plea and the client is subject to a sentence range of 5 years of probation up to a maximum sentence of 1 1/3 to 4 years with the Dept. of Corrections. There is no reduction to a misdemeanor. Diversion is offered only once.

Pre-Trial Felony DWI Diversion saw fifty-eight cases for intake in 2023. Sixty-nine cases were closed in 2023, as many are carried from the previous year. Of those cases closed in 2023, fifty-seven were closed favorably for an 82.6% success rate.

Pre-Trial is committed to providing effective intervention with multiple DWI offenders & will continue to measure the long-term outcomes for the program.

### **Driving Under the Influence Program**

Structured to provide a sentencing option for those convicted of DWI, the Driving Under the Influence program offers an intervention-focused approach. Those sentenced to this program attend structured classes Tuesday through Wednesday evenings, addressing important issues such as alcohol abuse, personal responsibility and reducing risk-taking behaviors. Judges sentence offenders for a specific number of weeks. Clients are required to pay a program fee. Both attendance and client progress are monitored closely by the staff and reported back to the court.

During 2023, 175 clients were sentenced to the program. Of those who completed within the year, 88% did so successfully. The average number of weeks spent in the program was 7.8.


STOP-DWI funds supplied \$30,750 to support this sentencing option in 2023.







### **Motor Vehicle Fatalities**

- A summons was issued for drinking and driving, and/or other drugs.
- A fatality involving a driver, pedestrian, or bicyclist was found to have alcohol and/or other drugs present.
